VOTE DOWN C.C.F. BILL

Measure To Improve Working Conditions For Nurses Rejected In Legislature VICTORIA, Dec. 8. (CP)—A bill sponsored by E. E. Winch, C. C. F. member for Burnaby, which would have reduced working hours of hospital nurses, was rejected by a vote of 29 to 12 in the Legislature yesterday.

IS NAMED MINISTER

Ned Tobey Appointed to Cabinet of British Columbia's Boys' Parliament For the first time in the history of British Columbia Boys' Parliaments, Prince Rupert is honored with the choice of its representative as a cabinet minister. Yesterday Ned Tobey was advised by Jack Ewen of Vancouver, Premier of Boys' Parliament, that he had been selected minister of programs.

MOTION IS REJECTED

Colonial Pooling Proposal of Labor Is Defeated in British House Of Commons LONDON, Dec. 8. (CP)—The House of Commons last night rejected by a vote of 253 to 127 a Labor motion which would have pooled under one mandate all colonies not prepared for self-government. The resolution would also have put the House on record as favoring no distribution of colonies without consent of natives. This would have been for the "common good of the world" it was contended. India, Ceylon, West Indies and other colonies almost ready for self-government would have been excluded from the pooling plan.

Dr. Telford Calls Prince Rupert "Siwash Village" And Won't Take It Back

VICTORIA, December 8: (CP)—Dr. Lyle Telford called Prince Rupert a "siwash village" in the Legislature this morning during discussion of the Redistribution Bill. "So far as Prince Rupert is concerned, you know that's a siwash village," said Telford. There's an elevator there and other government undertakings where jobs can be handed around. E. T. Kenney, member for Skeena, resented Telford's remarks, calling them disgraceful, but the C.C.F. member did not retract. Telford remarked that two seats might be opened by the bill. The debate on the bill's second reading was adjourned after R. L. Maitland, Opposition Leader, complained that the Conservatives had not been consulted in framing the new measure. He declared that the old electoral map had been satisfactory from 1933 to 1937. Premier Pattullo said the map was based on community interest and topography of the country.

TOOK HIS OWN LIFE

Well Known and Successful Young Salmon Troller Blows Brains Out Except that he might have been driven by pain to commit the rash act, there was no accounting up to this morning for the suicide of Harold Jacobsen, well known and successful young salmon fisherman in the Westholme Rooms here last night. Jacobsen about 5:45 went into Howe & McNulty's hardware store and purchased a single-barreled twelve-gauge shotgun and box of ammunition. After having the weapon broken and boxed up, he proceeded to the rooming house upstairs and rented a room. Within ten minutes a muffled thud was heard emanating from the room and the police were called. Constables Terry Stewart and McIndoe, answering the call, went to the room and found Jacobsen lying dead on the floor with a gunshot wound through the head, the gun lying against the bed on which the package of shells had been placed. One shell had been used and the indications were that Jacobsen shot himself through the mouth, virtually blowing his brains out. All to be found in his clothing was \$36 in cash. Identity was established by acquaintances viewing the body. Jacobsen was in good financial circumstances and, as far as can be learned, had no worries. He had been receiving treatment for hemorrhoids. An inquiry is being held this afternoon. Jacobsen was a married man and his widow resides here. He was born April 4, 1904, in Oknes, Norway. He arrived in Prince Rupert July 1924 and had made his home here since then. He was naturalized in 1930. He had been quite successful as a salmon troller and owned different boats at various times, the last one being the Active II, which he sold this fall.

WOMAN IS EXECUTED

Supreme Penalty Exacted of Mrs. Anna Hahn in Electric Chair For "Poison Killing." COLUMBUS, Ohio, December 8—Last minute legal efforts to save her life failed, Mrs. Anna Hahn was put to death in the electric chair last night for the "poison killing" of elderly Jacob Wagner of Cincinnati. Stumbling as she was being led to the death chamber, the woman collapsed and had to be carried to the chair. Fifty persons witnessed the execution.

EUROPE IS DISCUSSED

President Roosevelt in Conference Yesterday With His Key Ambassadors WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 8:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt was in conference at the White House yesterday on the European situation with three of the key ambassadors. William C. Bullitt, the ambassador to France; William Phillips, ambassador to Italy; and Hugh Wilson, ambassador to Germany. Sumner Welles, Under Secretary of State, also attended the conference in the absence of Secretary of State Cordell Hull, who is away to Lima, Peru, to attend the Pan-American Conference. Joseph P. Kennedy, United States ambassador to England, is leaving London Saturday for home and will be in the United States until February.

GARNER AS PRESIDENT

Would Consider Nomination Despite Advanced Age—Republican Possibilities NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—Texas is beginning to organize a campaign in support of Vice-President John Nance Garner for President. Although he is seventy years of age, it is said that Garner would accept nomination if it were offered to him. Those mentioned as possible Republican presidential candidates include Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts, Thomas E. Dewey of New York, Robert Taft of Ohio and Frank Fitzgerald.

WESLERLY GALE A stiff westerly gale struck the local waterfront suddenly this morning, and caused considerable commotion and slight damage among the boats at the various docks. Prompt action, however, prevented any very serious loss. Had the wind come out at night instead of by day it might have been different. A houseboat was virtually sunk at the fishermen's floats east of the dry dock. At the C.N.R. Yacht Club float, William Reid's boat sank but was soon raised and is now on the ways. Many lines were broken.

TRAGEDY DURING FUNERAL OSLO.—One person was killed and seven injured when the roof of a building collapsed during the funeral service of Queen Maud today. The Queen died in London November 20. Her body will lie in state and will later be placed in a mausoleum.

IMPORT TRADE LICENSED OTTAWA.—The New Zealand government has placed all import trade on a licence basis. Hon. W. D. Euler, minister of trade and commerce, was advised today by a cable from the departments' Auckland representative. All imports will be prohibited except by licence.

UNIFY CANADIAN LABOR MONTREAL.—Canadian Federation of Labor, in its concluding convention session last night, instructed its new executive to take necessary steps to involve all Canadian labor movements into one body. This would involve re-affiliation with the All Canada Congress of Labor which split with the Canadian Federation of Labor two years ago. Allan Emble of Winnipeg was elected President.

BAD TYPHOON IN PHILIPPINES MANILA.—A typhoon swept over several provinces southeast of Manila today, leaving thousands homeless, causing floods over a wide area, disrupting communications and causing seventy-nine persons to be listed as dead.

CHICAGO NEWSPAPER STRIKE CHICAGO.—Eight Chicago Newspaper Guild members were arrested during a melee today along a picket line at the Hearst building where members are striking against the Evening American and the morning Herald and Examiner. The papers have continued publication despite strike picketing since Monday.

Weather forecast General Synopsis.—A disturbance, centred on the coast near Prince Rupert, is causing westerly gales on the Northern British Columbia coast. Germany Approves Demands for Tunis and Corsica—Outlook Becomes More Menacing as Warlike Gestures Become More Intense

PARIS, December 8: (CP)—Concern has spread here with receipt of reports from the Spanish frontier that Italian troops are concentrating in insurgent Spain within easy distance of France. The reports, lacking official confirmation, said that Italian troop movements began November 22 and are still incomplete. It was pointed out that the troops might be for a new insurgent drive in northern Spain but the French are concerned because they are reported to be so close to the border. Reports are also spreading that Germany and Italy are uniting to enforce Italy's territorial claims on France's Tunisia, Corsica and Djibouti. Thousands of students, demonstrating against Italy, battled police in Paris streets.

MILLIONS MAKE ARMS

Return of World to Sanity Would Make Serious Economic Problem, It is Said NEW YORK, December 8: (CP)—Fifteen million people are employed today throughout the world in armament production, the national industrial conference board was told here yesterday. A "return to sanity," throwing these workers into normal industries, would bring about a serious economic problem, it was pointed out.

TEST FOR DALADIER

May Face Showdown Over German Pact in French Chamber of Deputies PARIS, Dec. 8: (CP)—Premier Edouard Daladier may face a showdown today over the friendship pact with Germany. This would be in the Chamber of Deputies where the leftist element is definitely opposed to the treaty. The Senate, with its Conservative proponderance, is almost unanimously in favor of the treaty. Political observers estimate the Chamber may give Daladier a majority of eighty.

CROSS WORD PUZZLE

Europe is today a cross-word puzzle. This week Germany signed an accord with France, the first voluntary pact in many years, possibly the first ever signed except under compulsion. On the same day an Italian minister suggests that Italy is going to take Tunisia from France and Italy is an ally of Germany. Italy also made a pact recently with Great Britain and Britain will support France over any territorial dispute.

In the meantime we have the advantage that these nations have agreed to discuss any questions on which they are not agreed before taking steps to enforce their demands. If they do this it is quite probable there may be no war for years, possibly not at all.

There will, doubtless, be a lot of sniping and boasting and haranguing and demonstrating and, of course, this is dangerous to peace. Some bluff may be called suddenly and then the world will be at war and, make no mistake about it, Canada will be at war.

We suggest as an empire policy that we try to think peace and prepare for war.

HOME FROM CIVIL WAR

Four Canadians Included Among Three Hundred Britishers Returning From Spanish Civil War

LONDON, Dec. 8. (CP)—Four Canadians were included among three hundred British volunteers who arrived in London yesterday from Spain where they have been serving with the loyalists in the Civil War. Labor members of Parliament were among those on hand to greet them.

The veterans said that 4000 civilians had been killed by insurgent aerial bombing and that 3500 had been slain by raids on Barcelona.

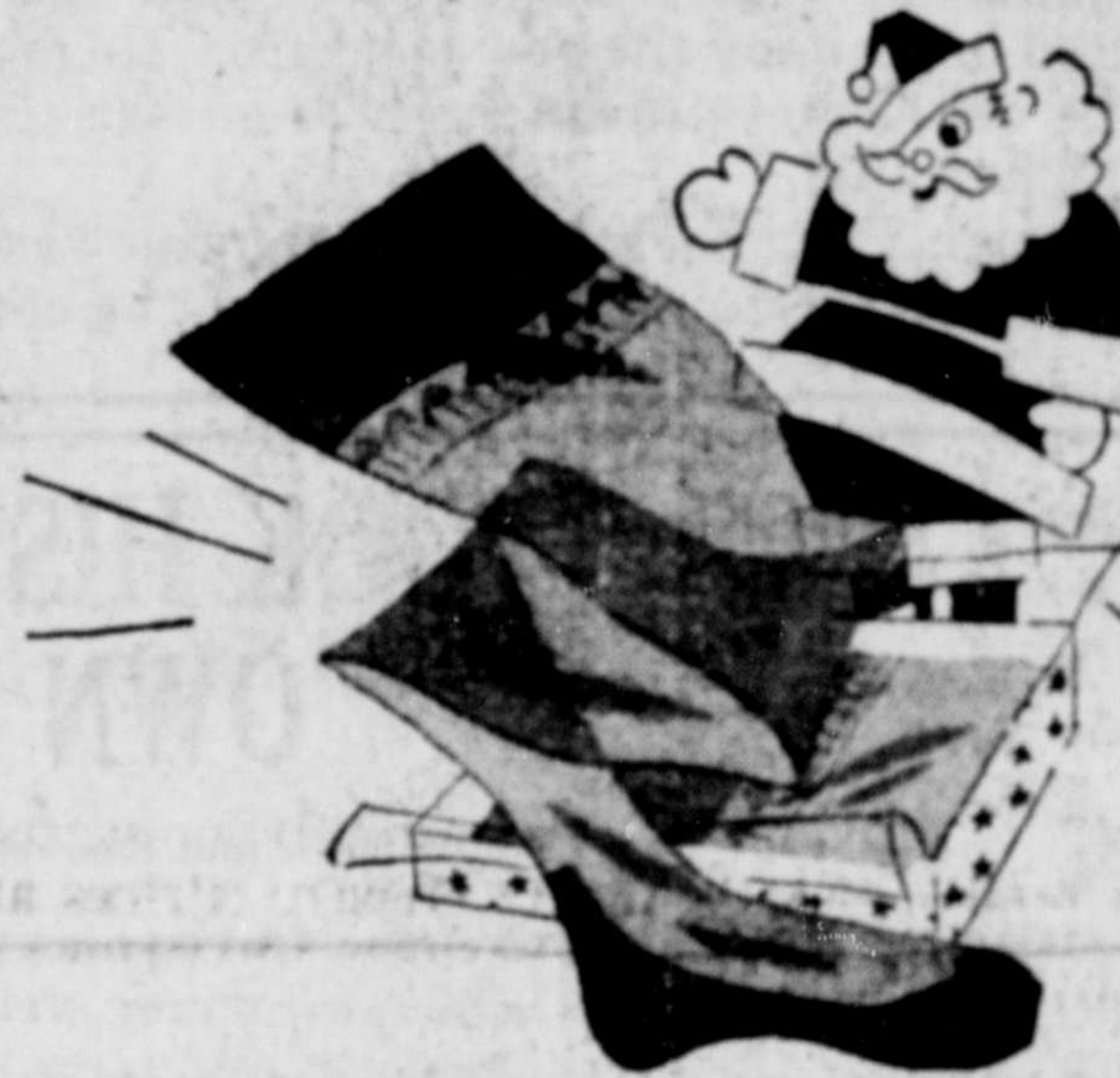

He was married in 1906 and besides his widow, is survived by two daughters. He was a Liberal and a Roman Catholic.

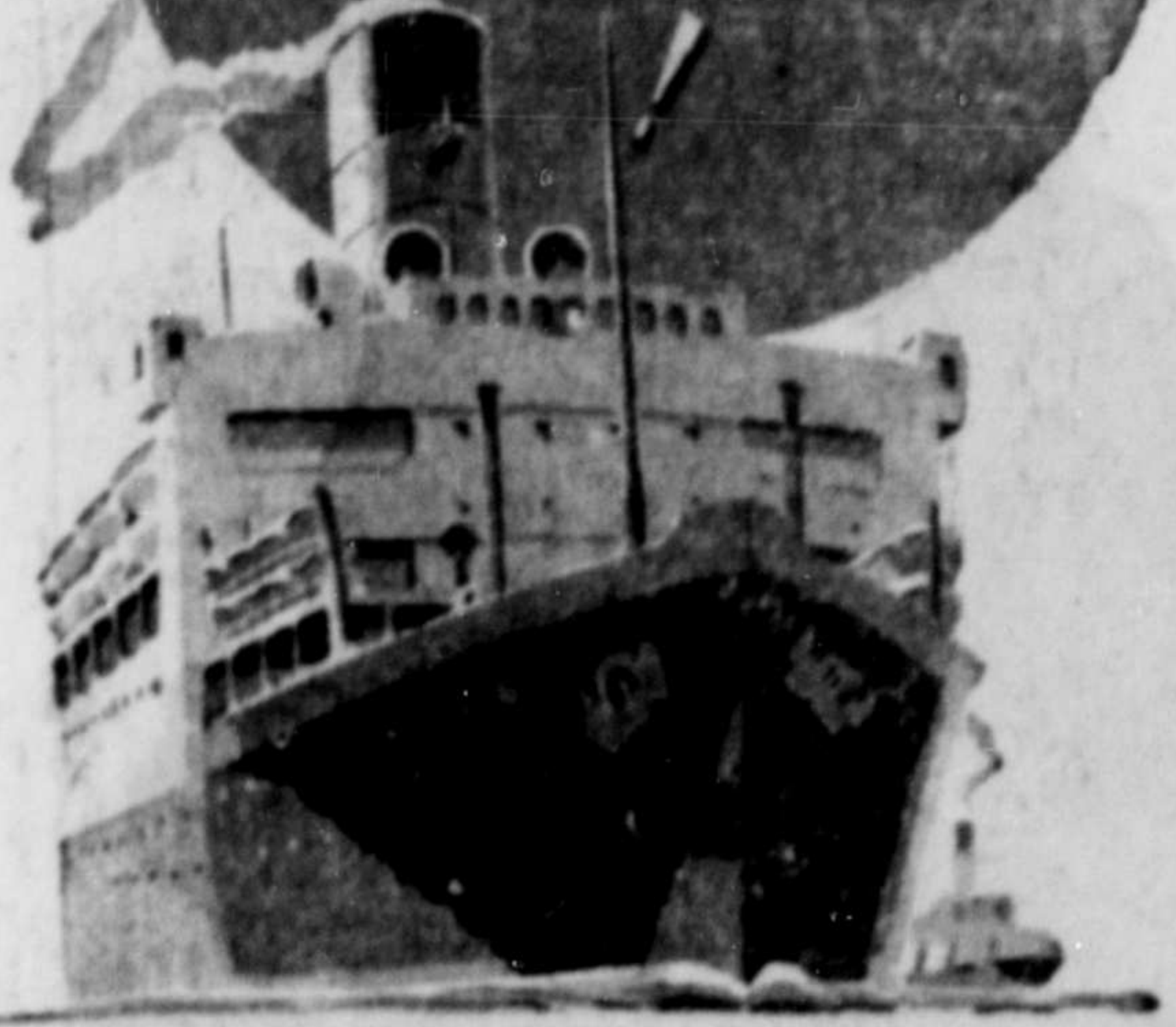

BOUNDARY DISPUTE

Early History of This Part of the Country Recalled by Speaker At Gyro Club

"Some Aspects of the Oregon Boundary Dispute" was the subject of an interesting talk, largely along historical lines, which was delivered yesterday at the regular weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club by James T. Harvey.

Mr. Harvey told how in the year 1792 Russia claimed the territory above Sitka and Spain that below the Columbia River while there was uncertainty between the claims of Great Britain and United States for the intervening country. In 1792 Capt. George Vancouver had been delayed by a storm in landing at the mouth of the Columbia River and it so happened that Robert Gray was the first to land there.

In 1793 Sir Alexander Mackenzie essayed to cross overland to the mouth of the Columbia but finally ended up by going down the Bella Coola River. Meanwhile the Americans, Lewis and Clark, made the trip overland to the mouth of the Columbia. In 1809 Simon Fraser arrived at the coast by way of the Fraser. In 1810 John Jacob Astor sent his fur traders, many of whom had been formerly with the Northwest Company, to the mouth of the Columbia and established Astoria where David Thomson arrived just two months later. Came the war of 1812 and while Great Britain was sending a ship around Cape Horn with a view to taking Astoria, the Northwest Company was successful in buying it from Astor, leaving the United States without claims. Under the Treaty of Ghent, which ended the War of 1812, either "the country" was given back what

country had been taken from it but this still left Oregon, by which all the country generally between Northern California and Alaska was then known, in doubt since Astoria had been purchased by the British company and not taken. Followed a more or less loose arrangement in 1818 under which the two countries were given joint sovereignty and the right to trade and settle. John McLaughlin, the factor of the Hudson Bay Co. at Astoria, being virtual ruler. American settlers started to come after the removal from Astoria to Vancouver (Washington). In 1848 California was taken by United States and the agitation arose in that country to take over Oregon as well and settle a boundary once and for all. Great Britain laid claim to the country north of the Forty-Ninth parallel and the Columbia River while the United States cry was "Fifty-Four Forty or Fight." Eventually ensued the settlement on the Forty-Ninth parallel with Vancouver Island going to Great Britain.

Concluding, Mr. Harvey alluded to the good fortune that between the United States and Canada today there were no boundary disputes which were constantly going on in Europe and were the subject of almost constant dispute. Mr. Harvey was thanked for his very interesting talk by President D. G. Borland who was in the chair.

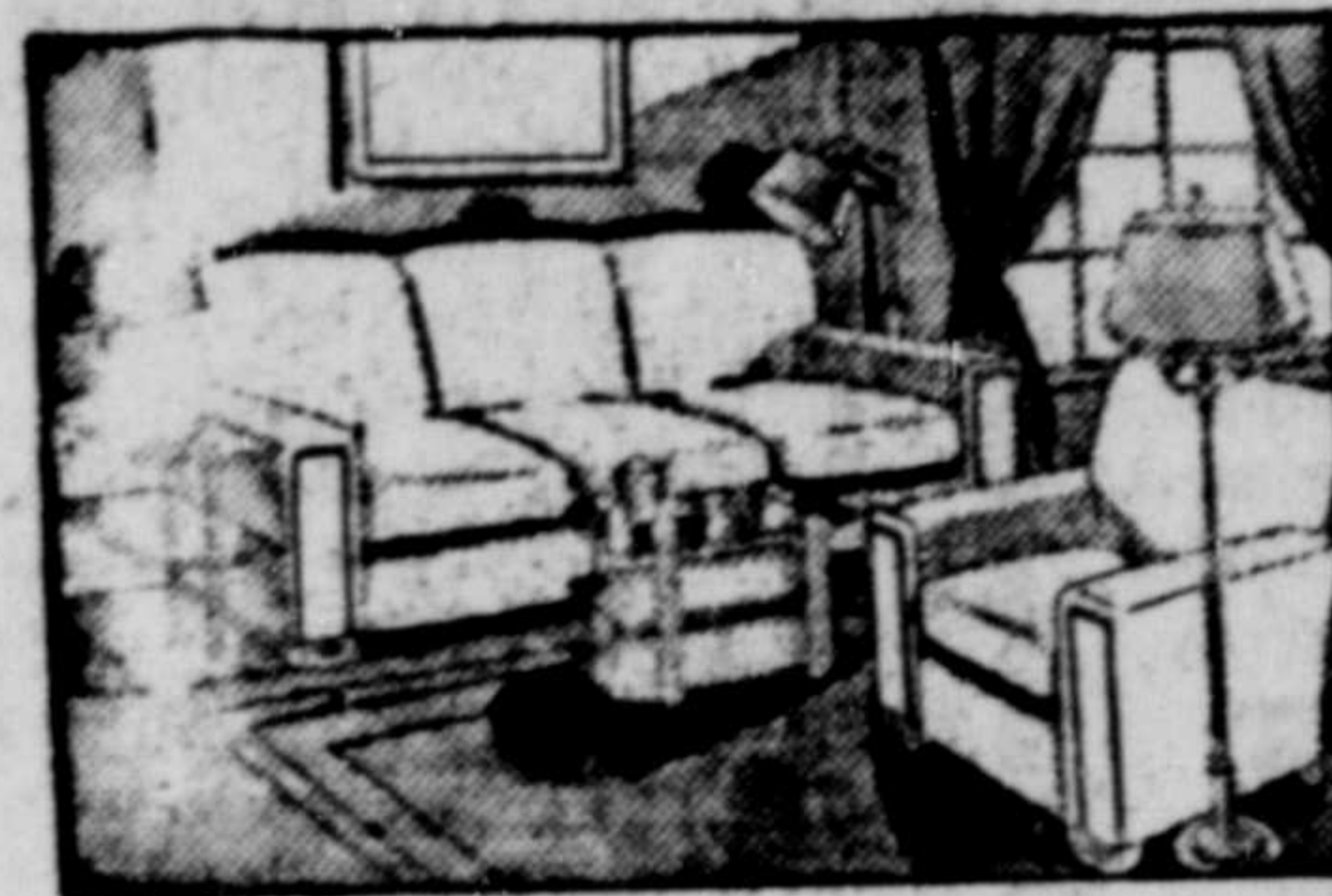

WINNIPEG, Dec. 8.—Pilots of Trans-Canada Air Lines eat regularly as to time but vary the place as only men with wings can do. For example, heavy fog over Winnipeg recently forced the west-bound mail flight from Montreal to fly right on to Regina, passing up the Manitoba capital after landing at Wazaming, Ontario, 903 miles from the Saskatoon center. Crew of that plane breakfasted in Montreal, lunched in their aircraft as they winged over Ontario, dined in Regina at eight a.m. Later in the night they transferred in the eastbound machine from Vancouver in time to have their breakfast in Winnipeg. The 908-mile non-stop flight from Wazaming to Regina is long but not unusually so. Frequently the Lockheeds have flown non-stop from Vancouver to Winnipeg a distance of nearly 1200 miles.

AIR MAIL AND 'XMAS

Procrastinators May Still Get Their Greetings to Old Land

WINNIPEG, Dec. 8.—To mail early for Christmas is still advisable, according to Post Office officials, but this year air mail and express service over Canada, connecting with United States lines and last sailings to the Old Country, is offered as solution to those Yuletide procrastinators who habitually leave dispatching of cards and gifts until the last minute.

Under the new schedules of Trans-Canada Air Lines the Pacific Coast is only a day's flight from the Atlantic. Cards mailed in Montreal one day are in Vancouver the next, ready for morning delivery. Similarly, hardly a city in the United States is more than 24 hours travel from Winnipeg and, if special delivery is designated, letters are released immediately on arrival instead of being withheld until the following regular postal delivery.

Last air mail date for Old Country connections is December 15, the planes to make connections with the sailing of the Queen Mary from New York.

Air mail shipments over the Dominion have been consistently heavy since December 1. Recently, a Trans-Canada Air Lines machine carried 800 pounds of Christmas mail to Edmonton. There, the load was transferred to the cabins of scheduled aircraft serving the festive season residents in remote areas of the Territories.

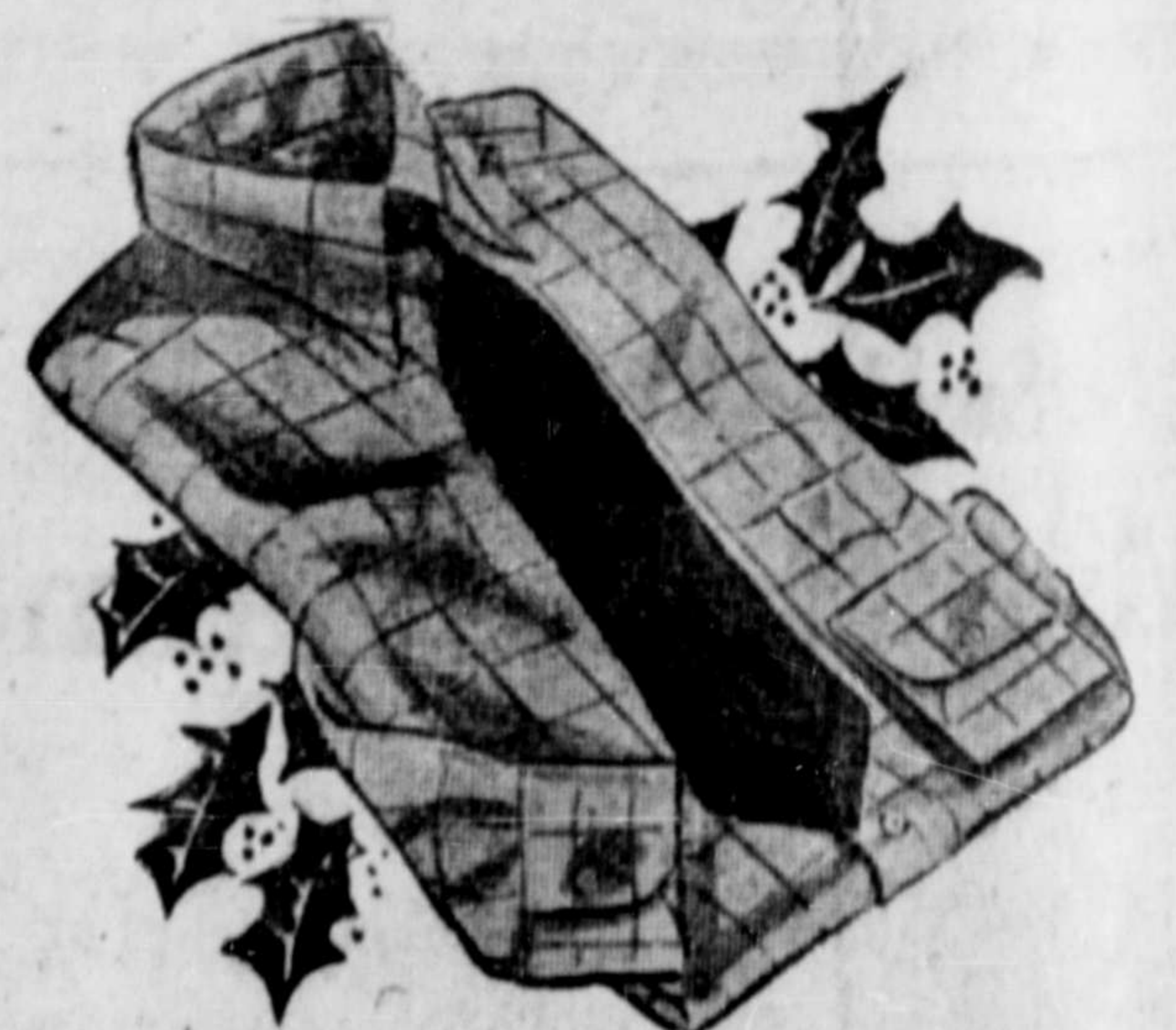
