TELLS OF NEW CURE

To Rotary Club That Devil's Club Treatment for Diabetes Is Not Yet Proven

Indications Good

Explains How It Was Stumbled Upon by Local Practitioner And Experimental Work Since Then

"I have had about five hundred communications in regard to the experiments Dr. Large and I have been conducting into the possible development of a cure for diabetes from the root of the devil's club," Dr. H. N. Brocklesby told the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at its weekly luncheon yesterday afternoon. "Some of these have been from Eastern Canada, United States, West Indies, Europe and many other parts of the world. I was sorry publicity was given to what we are doing as it places us on the spot. We had no intention of giving it to the public yet. We sent the result of our findings to the Medical Society and they decided to have it published in the Medical Journal and from it the Canadian Press sent it to all parts of the world. We considered it premature publication and the results have caused us a lot of worry."

Dr. Brocklesby said in his address that the great feature of the substance on which they were working was that it was taken through the mouth whereas insulin had to be injected into the blood. On the other hand while the action of insulin was very rapid the new substance was very slow.

The work was being continued by some doctors in Toronto with whom arrangements had been made.


