Between Three And Four Hundred Italians Killed-Injured In Arms Blast

SEGNI, Italy, January 29: (CP)-From three hundred to four hundred persons are believed to have been killed and injured in a series of explosions in one of Italy's munitions factories today. Stores of wool used in making high explosives burned in the series and the smoke prevented rescue work.

Many persons were injured by flying glass and splinters and tiles hurled from the roof tops of neighboring buildings.

Premier Benito Mussolini is expected to personally superintend rescue operations.




