JERUSALEM, uly 9: (CP) -Strikes are complicating the problems which the authorities are having in their endeavours to restore order in Palestine following latest outbreak of terrorism with numerous deaths and woundings as a result of new conflicts between Arabs and Jews. In the last three days it is estimated that at least 61 persons have been killed and 153 injured.

Construction Of Larger Mill Than One Destroyed By Fire Is Planned For Surf Point

Alex Smith, superintendent of Surf Point mine for the Reward Mining Co., returned on the Princess Adelaide yesterday afternoon from a business trip to Vancouver and proceeded the same evening to Porcher Island to engage in some geological work in connection with the company's properties.

Although arrangements are not completed as yet, it is understood that, following the recent fire which destroyed the mill, the Reward Mining Company plans to continue the low level Edye Pass tunnel under Surf Point mine workings and to erect a larger mill than the former one to handle ore from both properties. This would necessitate the construction of about a mile of plank road to connect the mill with the present Surf Point mine wharf.

These plans will naturally take some time to prepare and Mr. Smith said he was at present unable to state how soon active operations would be resumed at the property.

COINAGE PROBLEM

Metal in Pickle Gives John Bull Line on Best Materials

LONDON, July 9: (CP)—The Royal Mint has just completed the world's biggest coinage operationwithdrawal of silver coins in circulation in 1920.

It has taken officials 18 years to recover 1,000,000,000 coins valued at £65,000,000 (\$355,000,000) and weighing 7,000 tons. The government decided to withdraw the coins when the price of silver rose to such a height that the half-crown piece was worth tenpence more than its face value. An Act of 1920 reduced the silver content from 925 parts in 1,000 to 500 in 1,000.

The big task of selecting the coinage scheduled for withdrawal was left with the Bank of England. Banks throughout the land cleared all their silver from time to time to Threadneedle Street and here the coins were passed through machines which separated the coins

according to their silver content. But the parliamentarians who decided on the necessity for a lower silver content didn't attempt to discover a metal suitable for the second 500 parts. 


