PRESIDENT DIAZ TO END HIS DAYS IN EUROPE

ELOPING COUPLE WERE ARRESTED AT QUEBEC

Abbadie D'Arrast and Miss Helen Benoit Have Occasion for Concluding That This is a Very Meddlesome Age---Travelled from France Under Assumed Names Only to be Apprehended as Undesirables in Canada

(Canadian Press Despatch) Quebec, May 22.—On the arrival of the C. P. R. steamer *Manitoba* here at two-thirty this morning, the immigration officials and newspaper men located the couple registered at Mr. and Mrs. William F. Wye, who proved to be an eloping couple, Abbadie D'Arrast of Evreux, France, and Miss Helena Benoit. D'Arrast at first denied his identity stating he was going to Canada to take part in farming in the west. He was supercilious when told he was under suspicion as being the missing man from Evreux, and that his story was a manufactured one. An attempt to obtain a photograph roused his anger this morning, as he disembarked and D'Arrast uttered a threat to do violence to the photographer, his remarks being made in English. The couple are held at the immigration building pending a decision as to their deportation as undesirables. D'Arrast it is stated, has admitted to the immigration authorities that he is Abbadie D'Arrast and that he had eloped with Miss Benoit after leaving his hat, card case and cane on one of the Seine bridges. He says he spent two years at Beaconsfield as a farmer and that the couple intended to go to Saskatoon. Camille Abbadie D'Arrast, a brother of the man detained, whose full name is said to be Jean Abbadie D'Arrast, is here and had an interview with his brother. One of Miss Benoit's brothers is here also. A decision as to their deportation is expected to be made today.

DIAZ TO RETIRE TO EUROPE

Will Vacate Office on Wednesday and Sail Immediately

(Canadian Press Despatch) Mexico City, May 22.—A semi-official announcement was made today that President Diaz will resign on Wednesday, and immediately board the French steamer *Espagne* at Vera Cruz and sail for Europe. He will stop only at Havana to confer with General Reyes, who is waiting there.

SIR WILFRID AT THE KING'S TABLE

Attended Luncheon at Buckingham—No Speeches Made

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, May 22.—King George entertained the delegates to the Imperial conference at a luncheon today at Buckingham Palace, sixty covers being laid. The occasion was informal, no speeches being made. Yesterday Sir Wilfrid Laurier attended Mass at Westminster Cathedral and afterwards called on Bishop Bourne.

WILL TELL MILLIONS ABOUT PRINCE RUPERT

Mr. Wm. Campbell, Well Known British Newspaperman, Commissioned by Dominion Government to Write Up Canada from Sea to Sea---Spent Sunday Sight-seeing in Prince Rupert---Will Also Give Lectures

For a flying visit during the stay of the S.S. *Prince George* Mr. William Campbell, Dominion Government Commissioner, was in Prince Rupert. Prince Rupert marked the westernmost boundary of an extensive coast to coast tour which Mr. Campbell is taking on behalf of the Government for the purpose of making known still more widely in Great Britain the advantages and resources of Canada. striking facts in its history as well as studying its present appearance for a series of articles he is writing for the British press under Government auspices. With carte blanche to record his impressions of Canada in an absolutely unbiased manner, Mr. Campbell has visited all the principal cities between Montreal and Prince Rupert, and on his return journey is taking in the fruit and agricultural lands of B. C. and the prairie provinces. For the publication of his articles in a number of British newspapers, and during the two months of his tour to date he has been in constant touch with the old country, his articles being read by some two million readers of the papers he represents. A newspaperman of wide travel and experience Mr. Campbell was war correspondent for the London "Regiment" during the South African war, and is describing matters military in Canada for the same paper on this tour.

STORM HITS CHICAGO DEATH FROM LIGHTNING

Lightning Struck a Brick Tenement Injuring Every Occupant of the Building—Downpour of Cold Rain Puts End to Sufferings from Heat

(Canadian Press Despatch) Chicago, May 22.—In an electrical storm which broke over the city last night, one woman was killed and half a dozen others seriously injured. In addition hundreds of telephone and telegraph wires are out of commission, and thousands of dollars worth of damage has been done. The storm was one of the most gale-like that ever visited Chicago. It came without warning after a day of intense and unendurable heat. Striking a brick tenement house it killed one woman outright, and injured practically every person in the vicinity. The bolts struck the telephone wires, ripping them from the poles and fusing the instruments. The sudden downpour of rain which followed, however, has put an end to the awful heat, and given relief to the sufferers in the congested districts.

STRANGE CLUE IS FOLLOWED

Prince Rupert Fishing Party's Peculiar Device

A Sunday fishing party which crossed the harbor on pleasure and angling bent yesterday afternoon returned safely to Prince Rupert. That the members of that party, who are all well-known citizens, had evidently had doubts as to their ability to find their way back through the bush is revealed by the accidental discovery of the strange clue they made use of like the old-time Greek Hero to feel their way back from the labyrinth of trees. The clue is a black linen thread about 700 yards long, which was attached to a root at the water's edge, the other end being held in the hand of the leader of the party. The thread was found by another citizen after the fishermen had done with it or forgotten it. Should they require it again they may have it by applying at the Daily News office.

CONSTRUCTION STARTED

Contractors Making Good Progress on Buoy Station

Actual construction work on the new marine and buoy station at Digby Island has been started. The site is all cleared and last week work began on the chief's house.

For the first time since the Pacific Coast Construction Company, contractors at the station built their wharf boats called a few days ago *The Amur* and the *Princess Ena* called with machinery and general building materials.

Mr. W. Stedham, the company's manager at the works and F. J. Jennings, the Government engineer, say they are confident the station will be built before the snow flies next winter.

Mr. Thomas Stedham of Victoria, an official of the contracting company, arrived from Victoria on Saturday on a visit to his brother, the resident manager at the station, and to look over the work.

FRENCH WAR MINISTER IS KILLED AT PARIS

Was Watching the Start of the Paris to Madrid Race When Aeroplane Swooped Down on M. Bertheaux—Premier Monis Has Leg Broken

(Canadian Press Despatch) Paris, May 22.—Despite a compound fracture of the right leg, a broken nose and a torn scalp, Premier Monis who was injured at Issay on Saturday when an aeroplane fell on him and killed his companion, Minister of War Bertheaux, will recover.

It will be weeks however, before he can assume his ministerial duties. Fully two hundred thousand people who gathered to see the start of the Paris and Madrid race witnessed the accident and generally admitted that the grounds were inadequately patrolled. A state funeral is being planned for Bertheaux.

Henri Maurice Bertheaux, had only held power since March 2nd when the new Monis ministry came into power. His attendance at the aviation meet was because of his interest in the aeroplane as an instrument for war and defence. His sudden death created a feeling of great regret.

RIENDS ARE SEARCHING FOR CLEMENT GOODMAN

Englishman from Essex Has Not Been Heard of Since March 1908 When He Was in Calgary With a Man Named Burton—Solicitors Offer Fifty Pounds for Information

(Canadian Press Despatch) Winnipeg, May 20.—Advertisements are being published here offering fifty pounds reward for information that will lead to the discovery of Clement Goodman, an Englishman formerly of Woodford Green, Essex, England, who arrived at Halifax, N. S., April 9th, 1907, on his way to Alberta.

He left MacLeod on March 14th, 1908, for Calgary and registered at the Dominion hotel in the latter city. It is understood that he left the hotel on the following day, in company of a man named Burton, and has not been heard of since. His solicitors in London are enquiring for him.

The canoe drifted ashore during a strong south east wind, and may have drifted from the mainland. The only reassuring feature about the find is the fact that the contents of the craft were still dry, and there was no indication that the owner had had any accident while paddling.

THE EYES OF CANADA ARE ON PRINCE RUPERT

"It is one of the amazing things to contemplate, that the people of a country should have to be argued with by the Government to induce them to see that a proposal to remove \$3,000,000 taxes from their food bill is a wholly desirable thing."

The first newspaper to reproduce the sentence in its editorial columns was the Samia Observer on April 28th. On the following day it appeared some hundred miles further east in the columns of the Napanee Express.

An even more widely copied editorial was one which appeared on April 17th on "How to Help Prince Rupert." The particular portion which caught the widest notice reads:

"Sending away for your goods builds up some other locality and leaves your home town dead. Toronto and Montreal are growing rapidly because of the growth of the West. When you send away for goods you pay your money to the express companies and to the eastern dealer and none of it ever comes back to you."

Other instances in which the Daily News was quoted last month were in the case of the Montreal Herald, which instanced the account of the Reciprocity meeting addressed by Mr. Duncan Ross, as showing how Prince Rupert feels in the matter, and in the case of the far distant and staid London Stock Market Review which reproduced our story of the refitting with oil burners of the C. P. R. steamer Princes May.

TRACTION CARS FOR CARIBOO

Experiment With Gasoline Freight Trucks to be Tried

A ten ton gasoline freight engine to have a five ton trailer is being built in Vancouver for experiment on the mud and grades of the Cariboo Road. The engines will be of 200 horsepower.

The first truck will be tried on the Cariboo road during the month of June and, if a success, others will be placed in commission as fast as they can be manufactured.

It is claimed the truck can run wherever a horse and buggy can go. The wheels will be of double tread sixteen-inch solid rubber tires. An ingenious device is carried with every truck, that will be laid down whenever a culvert or bad stretch of surface is to be run over, distributing the weight evenly and preventing destruction of culverts.

GARDEN HINTS

Prince Rupert Garden Makers Getting Busy

Gardening in Prince Rupert is a little different from gardening in a more developed city, but already some excellent results have been obtained from gardens on Prince Rupert lots, and this year more gardens than ever are being prepared.

As soon as the ground can be readily worked it is time to plant some of the hardy vegetables. The seeds of some of these are liable to be slow in starting, and the young plants thrive better in the cool weeks. Some vegetables also require a long season in order to attain to the best size. Parsnips do. The seeds should be sown thickly an inch deep in rows in good rich soil, and afterwards the seedlings should be thinned to about six inches apart.

Other seeds which should be planted as soon as possible are the garden peas, and parsley (which should be soaked in water before planting), and beet seed, which should be put in a drill about an inch deep. These are all, however, vegetables grown mainly by those who have considerable garden space.

For the person who has only a few feet of ground to utilize, most

profit and satisfaction will be obtained by limiting oneself to radishes, lettuce, tomatoes and beans. The young tomato plants may be bought from the greenhouse later on and set out, but the other seeds should be sown as early as possible. It is best not to be too sparing of the seed, as frequently part may refuse to come up, and if sown too thickly the little plants can easily be thinned.

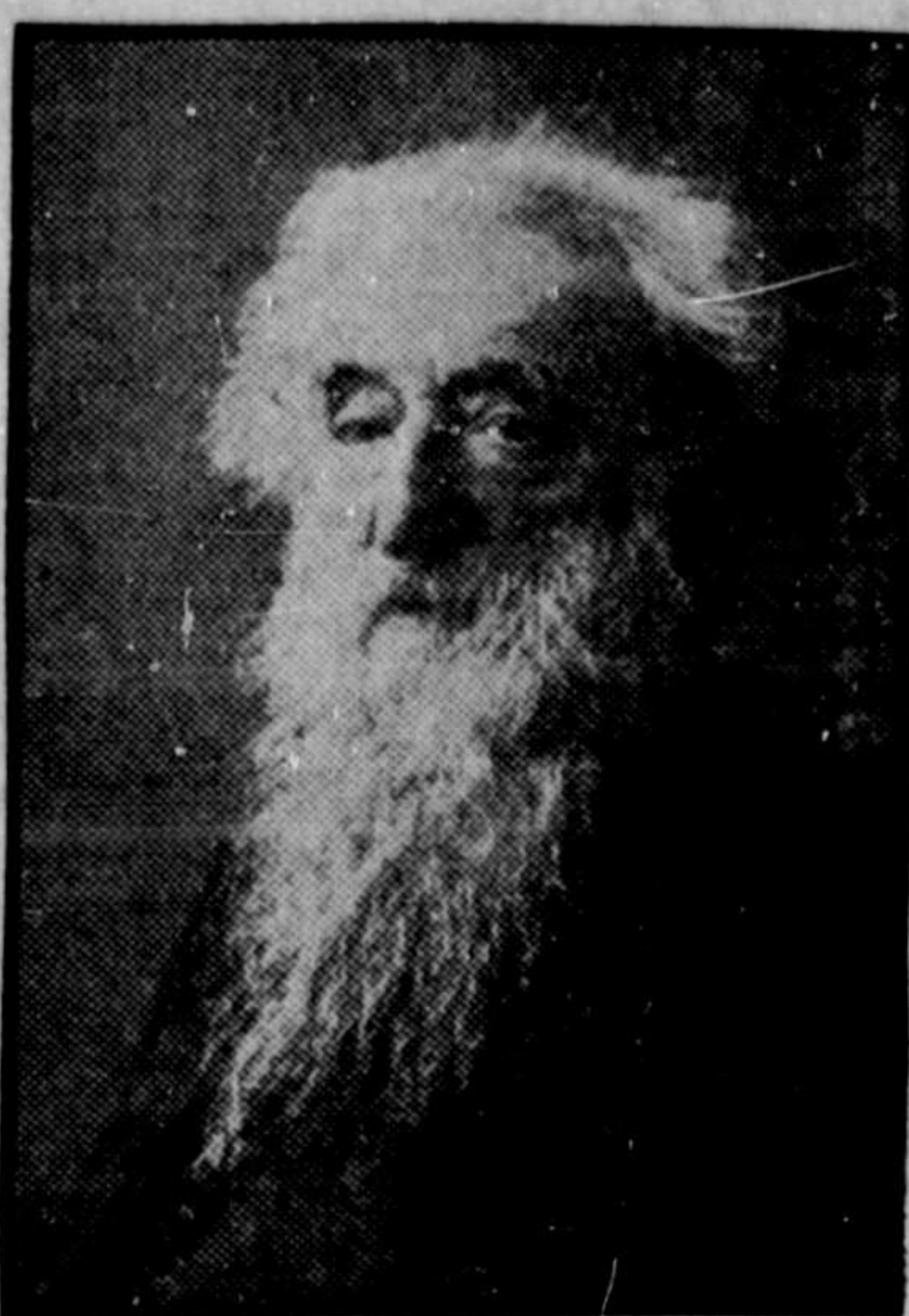

General Booth--Leader of Men

(Colonial Press Despatch)
 London, May 19.—General Booth, who attained his 82nd birthday on Monday, April 10, assured an interviewer at his Hadley Wood home, that as regarded health, he was gradually creeping back to his old condition and vigor. He hoped to have the impediment on his other eye removed, and then to be largely himself again.

The General's plans include visits to Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Finland, possibly St. Petersburg, and to Canada and the United States.

Speaking of his schemes for reforming criminals in Great Britain he said Mr. Churchill seemed afraid to go right over to his views, and modifications had been rendered necessary, but the Salvation Army was still at work.

The only physical trouble of the aged leader of the Army is occasioned by the almost entire loss of sight, which has proceeded from the growth of cataract, but notwithstanding this drawback, which is naturally very serious to a man of active temperament, the amount of work he can still undertake, both at his desk and on the public platform is surprising.

Activity is the soul of his existence. Those who know him most intimately are aware that, despite his fourscore years, he delights in a long day's engagements, and probably never has he manifested keener interest in the welfare of the organization that he established and now controls. Its success fills him with

the keenest satisfaction, and he is always anxious to extend its influence.

Fortunately for him, he receives the unstinted support of his son, Mr. Bramwell Booth, who is chief of the Army staff.

Only thirty-three years have elapsed since the Salvation Army first came into being. A grand picturesque figure, a dominant personality, a great "human," and an intense religious force are embodied in the patriarchal General, who received on his birthday the congratulations of tens of thousands of his followers.

He is now in England at his home at Hadley Wood, but after the Social Congress of the Salvation Army he has arranged to go abroad.

DEMOCRACY IN ACTION

A Brief but Valuable Article by Francis Marshall Elliot

In 1902 the city of Los Angeles secured a charter embodying the Initiative, Referendum and Right of Recall.

Among the various measures submitted to popular vote under these provisions the following are of special interest:

Protecting Citizens' Lives

In 1907, the city council, having used to pass an ordinance compelling the street railway companies properly to equip their cars with efficient fenders, although

the mortality and accidents caused by the street cars of Los Angeles were far greater proportionally than those of any other city in the world, the people framed a tender ordinance, and went before the council with a petition sufficiently large to compel a special election.

The council, seeing that the people were determined to protect their lives, grudgingly passed the desired ordinance and the cars were promptly equipped with fenders, and these fenders in the two

years of their use have picked up two hundred people, practically unhurt, who would otherwise have been maimed for life or killed outright.

Franchises were Saved

In 1908, the city council, in defiance of a decision of the decision of the Supreme Court of the state and against the advice of the city attorney, and over the protest of a great number of voters, sold for \$500 a street railway franchise worth several hundred thousand dollars.

The people at once secured the necessary 7 per cent referendum petition to veto the action of the council and refer the matter to a decision of the voters at the next general election, which was held in December, 1909, and resulted in the overwhelming defeat of the proposed sale, the majority against it being more than 5,000 out of a total vote of 25,000. The cost of this action on the part of the people was exactly twenty dollars.

In 1908, the city council, at the behest of the street railway corporations, granted a franchise to the agents of these companies which was known as the "River Bed Franchise." This franchise was exceedingly valuable, worth at granting at the least calculation a million dollars, as it controlled the only right of way for ingress and egress to the city for competing lines of railroad, thus assuring present corporations an absolute monopoly of transportation within the city for all time to come.

The franchise was granted without debate and without notice to the public, in the hope of catching the people napping. But knowledge of its secret passage soon spread abroad and aroused the most intense excitement.

Not only was a referendum petition at once inaugurated, but the irate constituencies of the recalcitrant council commenced the circulation of Recall petitions for every member of that body.

At once the council became alarmed and as swiftly as they had enacted the ordinance, they shamefacedly repealed it, and thus saved their political lives by the very narrowest of margins.

Result, a saving to the city of at least a million dollars, and what was of vastly more significance was the lesson to the council that they were the servants and not the masters of the people.

In 1909, the city council passed an ordinance permitting the telephone companies to raise their rates to their patrons in the city. At once the people invoked the Referendum and at the general election in December, 1909, the ordinance was defeated by a large majority of the popular vote.

S. A. CITADEL WAS PACKED TO DOORS

Ensign Johnstone and His Helpers Have Scored Another

With the brightly lighted hall in the Citadel packed to the doors the Salvation Army concert last night was another splendid success. The long and pleasantly varied programme of songs, recitations and instrumental music went through in swinging style, and the encouraging personality of Ensign Johnstone pervaded the whole of his own staff and all his willing assistants. It overflowed to the audience also and everyone enjoyed the concert up to the limit.

Very effective indeed were the four different picturesque varieties of drill performed by Lieutenant Wright's pupils. Sash Drill, Flag Drill, Dumb-bell, and Indian Club Drill exhibitions were all cleverly carried out, and very much appreciated. Lieutenant Wright, herself a graceful exponent of the pretty exercises she teaches the children, deserves great credit for her training of them.

Mayor Manson presided over the gathering, and the presence of Miss E. A. Froud as accompanist was much appreciated both by the audience and those taking part in the programme.

A Strange Death

Boy Was Frozen to Death in a Car of Oranges

Pasadena, Cal., May 20.—Fred Peck, son of William Peck of Marcellus, N. Y., was taken out of an ice car of oranges at Canadian, Texas, with his hands and feet so badly frozen that he will die, according to word received here today by relatives. Peck had been visiting an aunt in Pasadena and told a friend that he was going to sreal a ride home in a refrigerator car.

New York, May 20.—Walter E. Duryea, who lived almost a dozen years with a broken neck, is dead at his home here today in his 44th year. Duryea broke his neck in August, 1899, by jumping at the Casino at Glencove, landing in the sand on his head in three feet of water.

After spending ten months in a hospital Duryea recovered his faculties to such an extent that by shrewd investment he increased about \$800,000 which he inherited from his father to \$2,500,000.

Prince Rupert girls who dread being hurt by a blast fired in the street-grading, and who go cautiously accordingly, may be the unsuspecting wearers of gun cotton ribbons and explosive waists liable to blow up at any moment, is a startling possibility just brought to light. Nor is the masculine sex immune from the danger since socks and ties may likewise be articles of destruction. This unsuspected condition of affairs has been discovered through a protest recently filed against the manufacture of artificial silk from cellulose, in which it appears that there is a possibility that almost any article of wearing apparel made to imitate real silk may actually be explosive.
