BOURASSA STIRRING UP THINGS AGAINST BORDEN

REAL MONTENEGRIN DRAMA REPRODUCED IN RUPERT

"TRAGEDY OF THE BALKAN EMPRESS" RENDERED FOR THE FIRST TIME IN CANADA ATTRACTS CROWDED HOUSE AT THE EMPRESS THEATRE ON SATURDAY NIGHT.

Reproduced by local Montenegrin talent of remarkably high order on Saturday night in the Empress Theatre, the Serbian historical drama of the "Balkan Empress" attracted a full house. As the play was given in the Montenegrin language, the Montenegrins themselves predominated in the audience, but a large number of English speaking citizens availed themselves of the opportunity of seeing performed this unique play, which, it is claimed, has never before been produced in Canada.

With the help of a program which gave in English a brief synopsis of the plot and a compressed account of the principal scenes act by act, the English speaking portion of the audience was able to follow the play fairly well—in fact, well enough to wish they could understand the longer speeches which were made by the characters. Patriotism is the sentiment principally awakened in the Montenegrin by this play, and applause frequently rang out at patriotic passages in the piece. The players were all well known local Montenegrins, and their appearances were greeted with cheers by their friends.

The story of the play was given

is the tragedy of the royal maiden Danice, who is loved by Stanko, a traitor to his land. The play recalls incidents in a great battle well known in Montenegrin history when the Montenegrins overthrew the Turks, and 20,000 soldiers were killed.

No expense was spared by the local Montenegrins, members of the Serbian Society, to have the play properly staged. The dresses and uniforms were complete to the last detail and richly embellished. The stage of the Empress Theatre was never seen brighter with color, the barbaric splendor of the reproductions of historic Montenegrin dress for warfare being brilliant. The part of Stanko, which is the heaviest in the play, was very well performed and Danice, too (played by a slender featured youth instead of a girl), was really a clever bit of work. The other members of the company all showed absolutely perfect facility, speaking with never a sign of faltering, and acting with an intensity which carried its meaning well.

The whole play is well worth seeing. It is to be given again on Tuesday night, and explanations of each act will be given aloud in English between the acts so that everyone may know what

PROTECTION OF WOMEN'S 'RATS'

All Shipments of Hair Combed of Chinamen's Queues Must Be Disinfected Before Landing at Canadian Ports.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Ottawa, Jan. 29.—Owing to the wholesale cutting off of the queue by Chinamen in China, and the consequent large export of human hair to foreign countries for commercial purposes, the Government has amended quarantine regulations to the effect that all vessels carrying a shipment of human hair to Canadian ports must have the same disinfected and cleaned before landing it.

STEWART HOTLY PURSUES THE PEACE RIVER TRADE

CITY CLAIMS TO BE THE COAST TERMINAL OF THE C. N. E. TRANSCONTINENTAL, QUOTES DESPATCH FROM OFFICIAL SOURCES, AND BELITTLES VANCOUVER'S CHANCES.

That Stewart is definitely settled to be the Pacific coast terminus of the Canadian Northeastern Railway is now confidently asserted by the Portland Canal Miner on the strength of a telegraphic despatch in the Montreal Star. Following is the despatch quoted in the latest issue of the Miner:

"Toronto, Jan. 10.—Information of two important new lines of railway proposed by the Canadian Northern in widely separated parts of Canada comes out here from official sources. One of these is an extension of the Canadian Northeastern from Edmonton or Athabasca Landing to the Pacific coast, across the Peace River district through the northern interior, eventually terminating at Stewart on the Portland Canal in Northern British Columbia."

In another article on the C.N.E. in the same issue the "Miner" goes on to say: From no part of the province will there be any opposition. There can be hardly too many railways in B. C. It has often been said, and probably with truth, that it is the hardest country on earth in which to build roads or railways, but it may be said with equal truth that nowhere else on earth have gigantic engineering problems been

so boldly and energetically attacked.

"Vancouver is not and cannot become the natural port and outlet for the future wealth of the Peace river district. Its products will seek and will reach tidewater by the shortest and easiest route to the nearest and best harbor. The most cursory glance at the map of British Columbia will convince anyone that the natural route is straight westward and the port is Stewart."

"The early development of the northern interior is as certain as the earth's journey round the sun, and that development cannot take place without making Stewart at once an active and important seaport city and the terminus of an important part of a transcontinental railway system."

UGLY CHARGE IS DISMISSED

Joe Eamens Used Knife in Self Defense When Desperately Afraid for His Life—Scrap Arose Over a Whisky Shampoo.

Joe Samens was acquitted of the charge of unlawfully wounding Harry Williams and J. Conley at Kitsumkalum on Xmas Eve last. Accused appeared today before Judge Young, and his case was defended by W. E. Williams. On the charge of escaping from custody he pleaded guilty. A witness named Johnston gave involved and peculiar evidence which amused those who heard it, but was far from satisfactory to the Court. Witness wore bandages about his head, having been in a gasoline explosion two days ago. He said that all the trouble had arisen out of a whisky shampoo administered to Harry Williams, who after a mock trial had been sentenced to drink two glasses of whisky and go to bed. (Laughter.) Later there began the scrap in which the knife play began, and during this witness Johnston loaded his rifle and prepared to defend himself from his bunk. Witness gave his evidence with careful reservations at critical points which did not favorably impress the Court. "Not to my knowledge," was his standby, and this failed to convince. Judge Young found prisoner had used the knife in self defense, and dismissed the charge accordingly.

DIVER WILL DESCEND AGAIN

One of the Slings About the Glen Rosa Must Be Adjusted—Expect to Raised the Wrecked Tug Today.

Before the wrecked Glen Rosa can be raised another trip to the bottom of the sea must be made by Diver Evanson. He will descend today at 2 p. m. One of the slings has got to be adjusted to make the lifting perfectly safe. "It would be possible," said Captain Norman Broadhurst this morning, "to raise the wreck and pump her out at the surface by the wharf here, but what we intend to do is to take her into shallow water at Hays Creek and there beach her. Then in case of anything slipping during the pumping out the boat will be easily secured again."

The Glen Rosa rests on a ledge below the Rupert Marine wharf, within a few feet of a regular chasm some thirty fathoms deep, into which had she rolled when she sank she would probably have remained. There is little hope now that the bodies of Captain Tallander and his son will be recovered.

To Develop Fisheries.

Mr. Wilfred Doughty, who is to be manager of the B. C. Fisheries Company, and Mr. F. H. Rosher of this city, were in Ottawa recently en route to Victoria to prepare for the development of the Northern British Columbia fisheries.

Sir George Doughty and his rival of his principal, stated yesterday to a representative of the World, in discussing the aims and objects of the newly organized company: "This is an industrial company, with an English charter, established to develop the fisheries on the coast of British Columbia, and has been formed with a capital of \$1,250,000, divided half into 7 per cent. cumulative participating preference shares and half into deferred shares. Sir George Doughty, the chairman, has agreed to be responsible for the organization of the business in British Columbia, and the knowledge and experience of commercial fishing, both of himself and Mr. W. V. Doughty, who is also on the board and will act as general manager, is well known.

"The company has entered into satisfactory arrangements with the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway which should prove of valuable assistance in marketing their products. It is well known that the coast of British Columbia is exceedingly rich in its fisheries, which have hitherto been but inadequately developed, and our company, properly equipped with the necessary capital and experience, should do well.

"The fishing stations now being acquired include a salmon cannery and saltery at Skidegate, Graham Island, with plant for the manufacture of fish oil; an oil works at Cumsheewa Inlet, and freehold sites at the mouth of Skidegate Inlet, with extensive water frontages.

"We are also arranging for the employment of about 50 families of white Labrador fishermen of Devonshire stock, as we want to give white labor preference wherever possible. We also contemplate building up the herring industry to a considerable extent and we have already ordered several power boats to enable us to go in for deep sea fishing."

MORE POWER IN SIGHT FOR PRINCE RUPERT

Machinery Arrives to Give Additional Unit of Power Production at the City Light Plant

By the G. T. P. steamer Henriette there has just arrived the transformer and other machinery necessary to increase the current production at the city light plant. An entire extra unit is to be added to the plant, and this will so materially increase the amount of "juice" that can be turned out that before very long now the era of electrical power applied to elevators and small plants in the city will begin.

The new machinery is to be un-

loaded at the G. T. P. wharf, not at the Government wharf, as had been intended at first. It will be teamed over to the plant and there erected with all possible speed by Mr. Matthews, the superintendent.

As will be remembered the firm supplying the machinery had suggested that one of their men should be present to take charge of the erection of the plant, but Mr. Matthews is of opinion that the work of erection can be per-

fectly well accomplished by local labor under his own supervision. It will take about three weeks or a month at least to erect the new unit and get it in running shape. Then the expert from the manufacturers can attend and pass the plant before it actually begins to do commercial supply work. Citizens generally are satisfied that the arrival of the machinery means more power in sight for Prince Rupert.

DIVER'S GOOD WORK IN PERIL

Slings Placed on Glen Rosa on Saturday—Second Descent Improbable—Diving Suit Split Just as Surface Was Reached.

It was impossible after all to raise the sunken Glen Rosa on Saturday afternoon as had been anticipated. Although very successful in his first descent to the wreck, when he fixed two slings at the bow and stern of the boat, Diver Evanson was unable to descend a second time and make the slings secure to his taste. He got wire cable connection established between the Glen Rosa and the wrecking scow above, and it was believed that if strain were put on the cable then the wreck would come up all right.

But Evanson wished to make his tackle absolutely fast before he gave the word to the winch men to haul away. He intended to go down a second time on Saturday and see to this, but when he reached the surface after having been down well over an hour it was found that the condition of the diving suit was too unsafe to warrant a second descent. In the sleeve just as Evanson got clear of the water there gaped a great slit, and other parts of the suit let the water in a great deal too freely for either comfort or safety.

Everyone who has had anything to do with the work on this lamentable wreck agrees that Diver Ole Evanson deserves immense credit for his splendid work. He has taken his life in his hands again and again in making descents into from seven to ten fathoms to work around a wreck fouled with a tangled deck load of lumber in a diving suit which has again and again shown itself leaky and terribly dangerous.

SHALL PRINCE RUPERT OR VANCOUVER GET THE PEACE RIVER COMMERCE?

That the Vancouver newspapers are straining every nerve, stretching every point, twirling and twisting every available geographical and other fact to support a meretricious argument that Vancouver is the natural and only seaport for the Peace River country, many of our readers have noticed and commented upon, as it seems to them that if the Vancouver people are making such a strenuous agitation to secure the commerce of the Peace River country, surely Prince Rupert people should be taking some steps in the way of argument or otherwise in the endeavor to prevent this commerce being stolen from them. It is wise, of course, to show that we are fully alive to the situation, but there is no apparent reason to ring up an emergency call or to get worked up about it. Prince Rupert is strong in her position. Vancouver is fighting a desperate chance. There is no reason for us to worry about it because by the time the Peace River country has any commerce worth going after the Grand Trunk Pacific's branch line will be tapping the immense coalfields in the Groundhog Mountain district and running spurs from this to the northward and eastward along the Peace River.

When a case is presented in a court the learned counsel for the defense generally first addresses himself to the arguments put up on the other side. Following this example it might prove interesting and probably instructive to dissect as briefly as possible the argument filed by Vancouver. Starting with the Vancouver Province of January 6th, we read:

"The management of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway has issued peremptory instructions to Messrs. Foley, Welch & Stewart, railway contractors, that the main line between Tete Jaune Cache, fifty miles west of Yellowhead Pass, and Fort George must be completed early next fall. The rapidity with which the 415-mile gap is to be finished has a direct bearing on construction to Vancouver, as the Grand Trunk Pacific has agreed to finish the main line before undertaking the construction of its proposed branch line from Fort George to this city."

In other words, before Vancouver can possibly have made connections with Fort George the main line of the railway will have reached Prince Rupert, the natural seaport, for the Peace River country.

In the Vancouver News-Advertiser of January 5th is a long report of a meeting of business men and of a resolution to be presented to Premier McBride praying for a railway to form a direct connection with the Peace River district, and the News-Advertiser says:

"Two of the main features (of the preamble) were that as there is very little timber of commercial value in the Peace River country it would open up a great market for British Columbia lumber, and that with the completion of the Panama Canal Vancouver would be the nearest and most direct seaport for the Peace River country."

There is no doubt about the Peace River country becoming a great market for British Columbia lumber, but that is no reason why it should be hauled all the way from Vancouver. There are untouchd forests of it north of here. But how in the name of the great Horn Spoon the completion of the Panama Canal can bring Vancouver nearer to the Peace River country, and what good it would do the Peace River settlers if it did, needs a very lucid explanation. One of the speakers, Mr. Frederic Buscombe (it is hoped that is the proper spelling), is quoted as saying at this meeting:

"The products of the great north should flow to the world through the ports of Vancouver, and through the ports of Vancouver should flow the supplies of the world for this country."

There is no earthly reason why they should, Mr. Buscombe, if they follow the natural law of the course of least resistance and take the quickest route. What competition can Vancouver make with a single company operating a fleet of steamers from Great Britain to Moncton, a railway from there crossing the continent to Prince Rupert, and a fleet of steamers from here by the shortest route to the Orient and around the globe to Great Britain? This is what Prince Rupert has to offer to the Peace River settlers in return for their trade.

Evidently those Vancouver editors are of the opinion that the opening of the Panama Canal will not only bring their port nearer to the equator, but also to the North Pole, for in the Vancouver Province of the 3rd instant one may read this little gem:

"When Vancouver is brought as near as it will be through the means of the Panama Canal, to the British manufactory, this city should become the distributing point for the whole interior country, almost to the eastern boundary of Alberta, and as far north as settlement can go. This is a simple business proposition. But the achievement of that result depends upon railway connection."

Of course it does. But it depends also upon the Panama Canal stopping at Vancouver and not making Prince Rupert a port of call, and upon the Grand Trunk Pacific transcontinental railway, with the vessels of that company circling the globe, being put completely out of business.

Every member of the Board of Trade should make it a point to attend the meeting of that body in the Police Court rooms tonight.

GREAT ACTIVITY IN MINING

From Summary of Review Made by "Canadian Finance."

There will be great activity throughout the entire Shocan district in 1912, and many new mines, as well as old producers, will be developed to their full capacity. Spokane capital, as in the early days, seems to be most conspicuous in this revival. In the Sheep Creek camp, which is the centre of the gold mining industry in the province, prospects are very promising, and the new mill for the Mother Lode Company will considerably augment returns when in working order.

In old Rossland camp there is every prospect of another rejuvenation in the developments at the low levels of the Le Roi mine, which was sold by the English shareholders to the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company of Trail. Rich ore has been struck here again, and it is expected to prove another case of a supposedly worked-out mine coming to life again stronger than ever.

In the Boundary camps there is the promise of renewed activity consequent upon the increased price of copper, and both the Granby and the British Columbia Copper Company will be in full blast again by the new year.

On the coast by far the most important event of 1912 will be the erection of a 2,000-ton daily capacity smelter at Hidden Creek, off Observatory Inlet, where the Granby Company has an immense proposition, which is likely to be their most important holding. In the Portland Canal district everything depends upon the Red Cliff mine, which is steadily opening up ore, and is now arranging with its English shareholders to furnish all the necessary funds for development and erection of smelter.

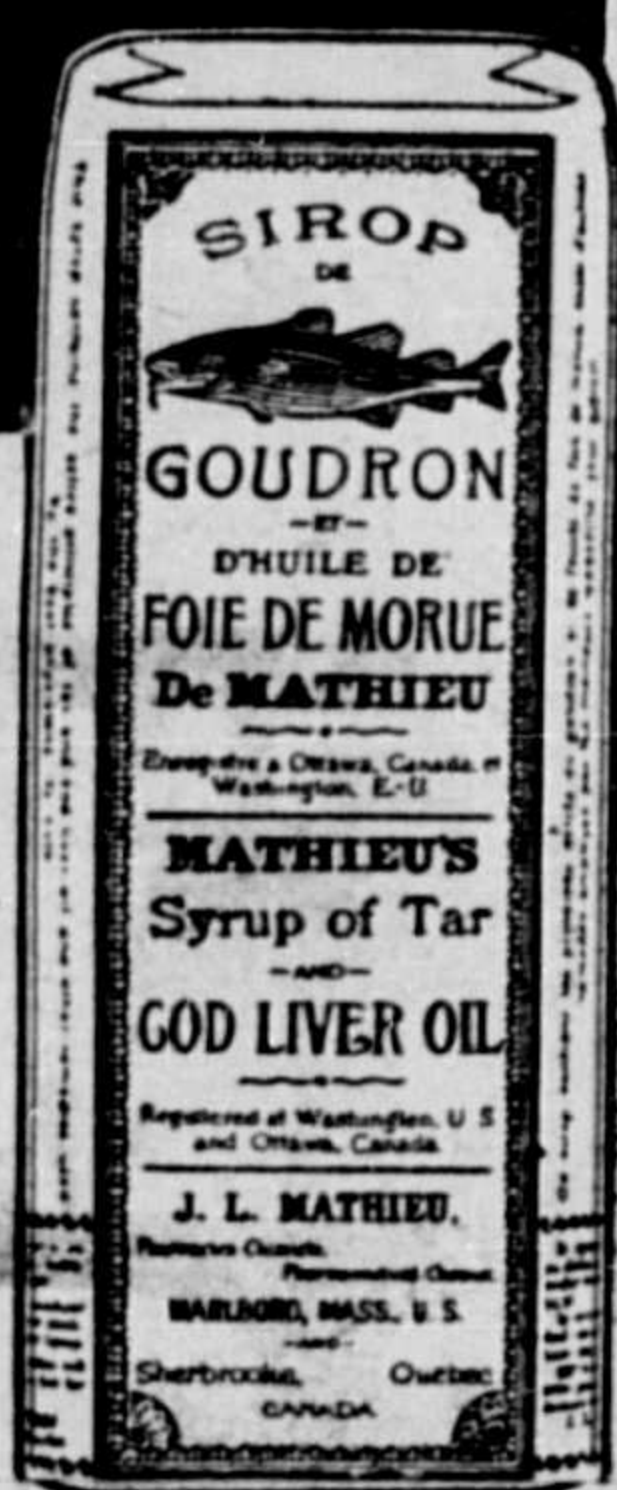

The same steamer will carry the lantern for the lighthouse from Prince Rupert to the spot. Construction is soon to commence, and R. Killen, superintendent of this work for the coast, expects to have the light shining early in June.

TO CHECKMATE GRAND TRUNK

Report That C. P. R. Is to Purchase Allan Line of Steamers.
Portland, Me., Jan. 29.—A report is current here that the Canadian Pacific Railroad has planned to checkmate the efforts of the Grand Trunk to enter Boston by gaining control of the Allan line of trans-Atlantic steamships and by building a new line of railroad to connect with its present line at Newport, Vermont, and to run directly into Boston. The report had it that the Canadian Pacific had purchased a controlling interest in the Allan line.

Armstrong, general manager of the United Wireless Telegraph Company, who is at present in New York, that, effective February 1, every vessel on the Pacific coast equipped with wireless would be furnished with daily news bulletins. At 2 o'clock each morning the news of the world will be flashed from Seattle, Astoria, Los Angeles and San Francisco stations of the United Wireless Company, mimeographed by the wireless operators and made ready for distribution by breakfast time.

The news bulletins are to appear in the back of a publication to be known as the Pacific Aerogram, which will contain articles of fiction and stories of the sea. Passengers on the big Atlantic liners have been supplied with daily newspapers printed on board. Furnishing of news to vessels on this coast has never been attempted in an extensive way.

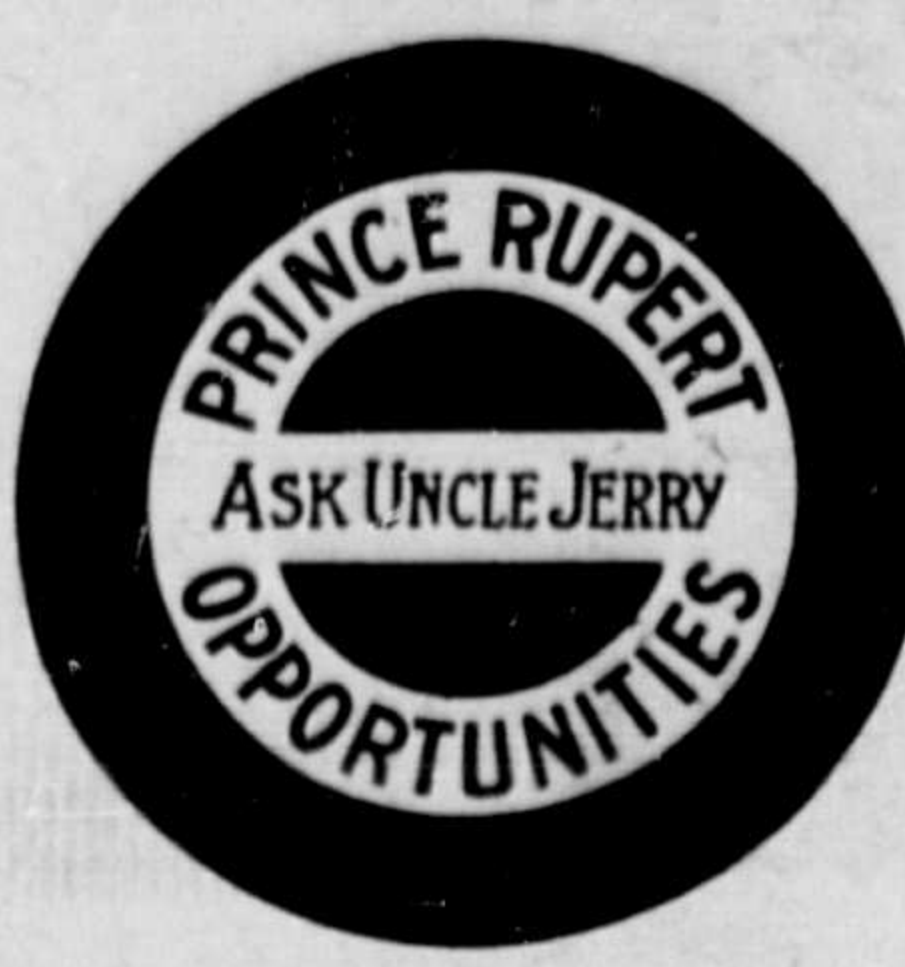
