Slackers May Not Have Votes

VANCOUVER COUNCIL ASKS EXCLUDE ALL ALIEN ENEMIES FROM COUNTRY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, January 29.—A motion submitted to the City Council last night by Mayor Gale, calling for the expulsion of all alien enemies and for prohibition of immigration from enemy countries was unanimously passed. The resolution declared that Canada's doors would be closed for some time to all subjects or citizens of Germany and her allies in the recent world struggle. It was also resolved that the various municipalities of the province be requested to take similar action and the Provincial Government be requested to assist in order that at least the province of British Columbia may be freed of the menace that will, sooner or later, have a demoralizing effect upon the country and militate against the rehabilitation and repatriation of thousands of men who have suffered to make this country possible.

FORECAST OF WORK FOR THE LEGISLATURE

Understood that Settlers' Rights Law to be Re-enacted, Public Utilities Act Passed, and Other Measures.

Victoria, Jan. 29.—The government of British Columbia is going to battle with Ottawa over the settlers' question on Vancouver Island. Two years ago, the then new Liberal government declared open some thousands of acres of lands in the old Esquimalt and Nanaimo railway grant on Vancouver Island. A year later the Dominion disallowed the legislation. Pressure was brought on Ottawa from several quarters, among them a demand in the London Times for respect of vested rights. Today it is announced that the provincial government at the session opening next week will re-enact the legislation.

It is stated that during the year in which the enactment was in force, 200 applications for land from settlers were received. The only ones granted, however, were two to the Granby Mining Company, which opened up valuable coal properties. The disallowance left the Granby company in a curious position as a result of their expenditure of a million dollars on property the title of which was called into question.

EIGHT-HOUR DAY FOR FREIGHT HANDLERS

Local Offices to Be Open From 8 to 5:30 Following McAdoo Award.

Notice has been given by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway that the hours at the freight sheds here have been regulated to bring them into accord with the McAdoo award and the rulings of the Railway War Board. These provide that there shall be an eight-hour day for the employees and that after working 48 hours a week all other time shall be overtime.

Different hours are arranged at different places but here it is thought that from 8 to 5:30 will prove most convenient for the public.

CODFISH FROM ALEUTIAN ISLANDS SHOULD COME TO PORT OF PRINCE RUPERT

THAT IS OPINION OF J. P. BABCOCK WHO SAYS THAT FISHING MUST FOR YEARS BE THE CHIEF INDUSTRY OF THIS PLACE

That Prince Rupert must look to the fishing industry as her chief source of wealth is the opinion expressed by J. P. Babcock, Commissioner of Fisheries under the Provincial Government, who arrived this morning from Victoria. He says that there is a great future for the trawling business. He thinks that it will be bigger than those now in the business expect. This is the natural port for the fishing business, and the industry should be built up. It made the city of Gloucester and it will do the same for this place.

Aleutian Banks.

Mr. Babcock says he believes that the cod fisheries of the Aleutian Islands should be subsidiary to this place. As the local banks become depleted the fishermen will have to go farther for their fish and this is the natural market for everything in the north. At present the cod fisheries at the Aleutians are worked from San Francisco. Prince Rupert is fifteen hundred miles nearer and has all the natural advantages. Undoubtedly the cod fishing at the Aleutians should be done from this port.

Mr. Babcock is much interested in the fisheries of Prince Rupert because he was one of the chief advocates of allowing the American boats to use Canadian ports. This put Prince Rupert on the map as a fishing port and kept her alive during the lean years. For years the Provincial Governments asked the Dominion to open the ports but for a long time this was refused. Eventually, as a result of keeping at it, the desired result was obtained. The ruling meant everything to this coast.

Mr. Babcock is here only for two days. He expects to leave for Victoria tomorrow night.

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BRITISH MUST KEEP HER MEN TO FINISH JOB

One-Fourth of Army Required for Long Time to Make Victory Sure.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Jan. 29.—At a special meeting of the Cabinet yesterday urgent questions regarding demobilization were discussed. It is understood that the conferees reached the conclusion that there is no prospect for months to come of voluntary enlistment of sufficient men for the army of occupation and salvage of property in garrisoning Gibraltar and the crown colonies, to ensure the safety of the United Kingdom, to safeguard the results of the victory in Palestine, Mesopotamia and Turkey, and that hence it would be necessary to adopt some system of selection and place the men retained as nearly as possible in the same position as they would be in civil life with regard to pay and other conditions.

It is considered that for the purposes above stated, about one million men be equipped, which means roughly three out of every four men be demobilized and the fourth retained to "finish the job."

PROPOSE TO DISFRANCHISE THOSE WHO EVADED MILITARY SERVICES

Victoria, January 29.—According to an announcement by Premier Oliver an amendment to the Provincial Elections Act to be introduced into the Legislature at the forthcoming session will be designed to disfranchise all deserters in the Province. In other words all those males who came within the operation of the Military Service Act, who failed to get exemption at the hands of tribunals and who absented themselves from military duties against the law will lose the privilege of the ballot.

BOLSHEVIKI CONSUL WAS NOT WANTED

Dr. Suretz Asked to Leave Denmark—Attack on British and Americans Failed.

Copenhagen, January 29.—Dr. Suretz, Bolsheviki representative in Denmark, left here yesterday with his legation staff at the request of the Danish Government. He was notified that his further presence was not desired.

Archangel, Jan. 29.—Bolsheviki forces failed in an attempt last night to drive the British and American troops from their positions at Tulgas on the Dvina river southeast of Archangel. Earlier the enemy had bombarded the positions with artillery. Prisoners said that a general attack had been planned, but the majority of the Bolshevists lost themselves in the woods.

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**Private Meetings
 Of City Council.**

The City Council is adopting the method of doing the business of the public in private. There is a general committee of the whole which does all business and then it is to be assumed that it will report at an open meeting when those who wish to express views will do so not for the forwarding of business but for the edification of the public. While we have no official information that that is the method to be adopted, there seems to be no other way if the real business is done behind closed doors.

There are arguments for and against the private committee meetings. There is hardly a City Council in the province that has not experimented with them and nearly always they have returned to the open meetings with full publicity on everything. The public argue that as it is their business that is being done it should be done in such a way that they may know all about it.

**Grave Dangers
 From Much Secrecy.**

There are grave dangers in secrecy. People are always suspicious of things that are done behind closed doors. When there is a graft to be pulled off it is not done in the open. There is always secrecy. Granted that there are some subjects that should be kept out of the press and away from the public, at any rate until the time for publication is ripe, the newspapers are always amenable to suggestions when there is a vital interest at stake.

There is no doubt that the mayor and members of the council in deciding to hold secret meetings are doing it in the interest of the public. They possibly feel that in the working out of new policies and in planning new schemes for betterment, they are discussed with greater freedom when they know their words will not be reported. There also may be the desire not to prejudice their case by springing it before it is properly digested. There can be little objection to that method if a fairly full report of the findings is given at an open meeting and copies of the report handed out for publication. At the same time there is danger, especially to the reputation of the aldermen themselves, in keeping the facts away from the public. It is easier to create suspicion than to get rid of it later.

**Experience of
 Other places.**

In Regina some years ago the Council decided to do their work in private and the newspaper managers put their heads together and decided not to report any of the proceedings unless full publicity was given. The result was that all secret meetings had to be abolished and everything done in the open.

In Victoria just now there is a committee of the whole council as the Streets Committee. Its meetings are, however, open to the press and to the public except on a few rare occasions when discussing city officials' salaries or other delicate subjects. Copies of all reports, bylaws, etc., are given to the press.

At Esquimalt the press representatives sit at the elbow of the reeve and all communications as they are read are handed to them to scrutinize and absolutely nothing is kept back. Sometimes, however, the reporters are asked to withhold something from publication, chiefly in connection with the floating of bonds and similar matters which might affect the credit of the municipality.

**Liberal Association
 To Hold Meeting.**

There is to be a meeting of the Liberal Association tonight. It is the annual meeting when officers will be elected for the coming year and when there will be an opportunity to discuss matters of general policy. On such an occasion it is desirable that there should be a large attendance of all who are interested in good government. It is very desirable that at any party meetings at which policies are framed or officers are chosen those who like to see the country well governed shall be present. This applies as much to Conservative as to Liberal. If the best citizens hold back from the party meetings they cannot expect the party representatives to be well chosen or the policies to be of the best.

There is likely to be a Dominion election within the year, possibly very soon. That makes it imperative that people begin to discuss the affairs of the country. These are days when the best men are needed and the best counsel should be secured in the party caucus as well as on the floor of the legislature or of the Dominion Parliament.

LOCAL MARKET PRICES RULE STILL STRONG

Apples and Oranges Tend to Go Higher—Onions Dear Here; Eggs Steady.

The coffee market is very strong, the price not having advanced since the war, except in one-pound tins, on account of the price of tins. The average price of coffee now in one-pound tins is 60c.

The egg market is still steady. The onion market is firming up for good onions. The retail price for onions in Vancouver is 12 lbs. for 25c, here it is 6 lbs. for 25c. The reason is that Okanagan onions are of a very inferior quality, and cost a great deal to ship, while the good onions are very expensive.

The apple market is fine—good apples will soon be \$4 per box. The price of oranges is advancing in the southern markets, but the market here has still quite a large amount of cheap stock on hand yet.

Lettuce is very scarce, wholesaling in Vancouver at \$6 per crate of 36 heads, and arriving here in a very poor condition at that. Lettuce is in the millionaire class at the present time.

The Viking Creamery butter is selling like hot-cakes. Cauliflower is off the market for the present, also Jap oranges.

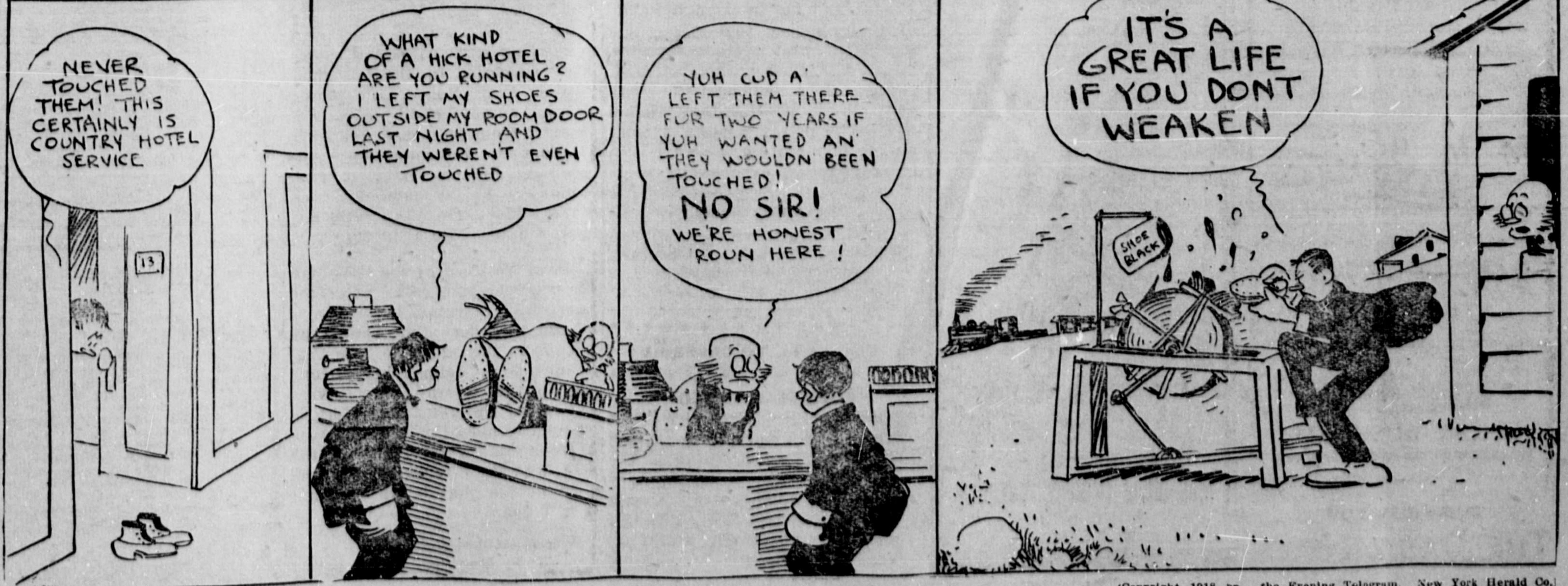

WORKMEN SAY THEY WILL STARVE IF NOT GIVEN MORE MONEY

Twenty Per Cent Increase Demanded in Winnipeg by the Various Trades; Bricklayers Ask 96c an Hour.

Winnipeg, Jan. 29.—Twenty per cent. increase in wages for union labor will be demanded by virtually every union in Winnipeg in the next two months, heads of local unions declare. "It is a case of increasing our wages, reducing the cost of living, or starving," Robert Sutherland, the business agent of the Carpenters' union, expressed it.

Representatives of all the building trades unions will meet members of the Builders' Exchange some time this week. Arrangements for the meeting were being made today by John Hooper, secretary of the exchange.

The workmen will make demands which are expected to amount to a straight 20 per cent. increase. This means that bricklayers who now get 80 cents an hour, will ask 96 cents.

COW AND BUOY

Curious Story of Way in Which Animal Was Deceived by Marine Guide.

To Cape Beale Lighthouse up the coast there was taken once a new lightkeeper, and with him went a cow, says the Daily Colonist. BRITAIN HAS MORE SHIPS AVAILABLE THAN EXPORT GOODS

President of British Board of Trade Speaks of Commerce and Trade Conditions.

London, Jan. 25. — (Reuter's). —Sir Albert Stanley, President of the Board of Trade, addressing the Huddersfield Chamber of Commerce last evening, said he would be much happier if he could see stronger indications of a restoration and development of trade in Great Britain. There was plenty of trade obtainable in the world. It was the deliberate policy of the Government that restrictions and control would be removed as rapidly as possible, but the restrictions upon exports must be maintained in respect to things vital to the interests of the Allied nations. The blockade also must be maintained until peace was secured.

Sir Albert said that there was more shipping available than cargoes and it was expected that this summer the world tonnage afloat would be equal to the pre-war tonnage. A very big slump in shipping rates might be anticipated.

He thought it was a fair suggestion that the Government should restrict imports until the manufactures were established once more on a peace footing. A ministry would shortly be established and experienced men already had been invited to join the board.

The Minister concluded by saying that strikes were the most difficult problem which must be faced and solved.

Christenson with 942; third, E. Davidson, ticket 492. The prizes were, a gramophone, oil painting, and five dollar gold piece respectively.
