Britain Pleased at Prospect Of Trade Renewal with Russia

Much Grain Ready for Export from That Country Will be Exported Through Large Co-operative Societies.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, January 18.—The British Department of Overseas Trade has drawn up plans insuring trade with Russia, which involves £25,000,000 to cover cargoes going and coming.

George H. Roberts, food controller, says there are 1,000,000 bushels of wheat in Russia awaiting export.

It is expected that the decision of the Allies to resume trade relations with Russia will be popular in England. Transport and finance are problems requiring solution but the Soviet Government is believed to have great sums in gold belonging to the old government of the Czar.

Comment Favorable.

LONDON, Jan. 19.—Comment is general on the proposal to resume trade with Russia, even anti-Bolshevik papers support it. Representatives of the Russian co-operative associations, through which the exchange of goods is to be made, will receive official notification at an early date. These co-operative organizations in recent years have become the chief medium for the distribution of goods to the Russian peasantry and ten of them have representatives in London. These ten are intending to distribute to 30,000,000 people.

The agent of one of these associations said that his latest advice stated that his organization alone had for export 40,000 tons of flax which would be worth about \$60,000,000.

The opening up of trade with Russia is expected to make a change in the price the world pays for flax and other grains.

THREE MILLION DOLLARS' WORTH LIQUOR SEIZED

Two Barge Loads for Cuban Steamer Captured in East River, New York.

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—More than \$3,000,000 worth of liquor has been seized here since prohibition came into force. A large part of this was taken from two barges which were loading into a steamer for Cuba in the East River.

INFLUENZA AT CHICAGO

One Thousand New Cases Reported to Health Officer in 24 Hours.

CHICAGO, Jan. 19.—In 24 hours preceding midnight 1,000 new cases of influenza were reported to the medical health officer. Every precaution is being taken to prevent the spread of the disease.

NEW BUILDINGS TO BE ERECTED AT DIGBY DEPOT

Names of New Officials for New Marine District—Captain Saunders Returns From South.

Captain Saunders, superintendent of the Northern B. C. Marine District, returned on the Princess Beatrice last night from a trip to Victoria. He brought with him word of the intention to erect dwellings for the officials and men of the newly established district headquarters. Although the department of Marine and Fisheries has decided to build new dwellings, definite plans have not yet been arranged. Plans for laying out the grounds for the dwellings will be made at once.

There are at present 12 members on the staff at Digby Island and six new officials are coming from Victoria to augment this. The names of the new officials are W. L. Stanford, superintendent of lights and construction; R. Nicholson, fog alarm engineer; H. McKenzie, gas buoy inspector; R. Erskine and Mr. La Fortune, clerks. MUCH COMMENT ON SIMS' STATEMENTS

Source of Instructions Regarding British Not Yet Made Known.

WASHINGTON, January 19.—Sensational comments have followed a statement of Rear Admiral Sims to the effect that he had been told by a high American official not to let the British pull the wool over his eyes and that the United States would soon fight the British as the Germans. So far the sources of his instructions has not yet been made known, although several prominent naval officials have denied that they made the statements.

12 CUNARDERS TO BE BUILT

Four to be 600 Feet Long with 73-ft. Beam.

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Twelve new Cunarders are to be built. Six of the new boats will be to replace vessels sunk during the war and four for those lost in other ways. Four of them will be 600 feet long with 73-ft. beam and 45 ft. deep.

LONDON, Jan. 19.—Six ministers of labor have gone to study conditions in Ireland.

Airplane Race Planned New York to Nome With Stop at Hazelton, B.C.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, January 19.—The Army Air Service in planning an airplane route from Mineola, New York, to Nome, Alaska, making a race course of 4,800 miles to be covered some time in the future.

According to the present plans of the department, the international boundary would be crossed at Minot, North Dakota, and the fliers would then proceed diagonally to Hazelton where they would turn to the north to White Horse, and, crossing the Alaska boundary at Fort Egbert would fly direct to Nome.

The route is the most ambitious yet proposed as it crosses a very rough and wild country and several mountain ranges.

RADICALS REACH RUSSIAN BORDER

Hostilities Will Cease While They Are Taken Across Bridge Into Soviet Territory.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

HANGO, Finland, Jan. 19.—The 249 radicals deported from the United States who reached Vigrod station before crossing the Russian border; yesterday, are in a special train guarded by fifty Finnish White Guards.

The Soviet Government has assured the Immigration and Finnish authorities that they will cease hostilities to permit the deported Reds to cross the bridge at the border.

The party is going to Petrograd.

Russell Must Go To Penitentiary Says Court of Appeal

Refuses Application to Set Aside Conviction of Strike Leader at Winnipeg This Morning.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WINNIPEG, January 19.—The Court of Appeal today dismissed an application to set aside the conviction of R. B. Russell, the strike leader, sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for seditious conspiracy.

This morning's decision was rendered verbally and was unanimous, but written reasons will be delivered.

At a mass meeting in the Strand Theatre last evening the labor men passed a resolution calling for a Dominion-wide convention of labor men to discuss the rights of organized labor to strike, in case the Appeal Court refused to set aside Russell's conviction.

An intimation had been given in labor circles previously that if the judgment went against Russell and was not unanimous, an appeal would be taken to the Supreme Court of Canada. As it was unanimous it is assumed that no further legal action will be taken.

MUCH FISH ON FOUR ARRIVALS

Boats Moving Southward Will Mean More Landing Their Catches Here.

QUARTER MILLION LBS. LAND—11 CARLOADS

Sheathed with coats of ice, four of the large halibut boats arrived from the Kakat banks yesterday morning after having made a hard passage against a strong sou'easter on their way to Prince Rupert. The decks had to be cleared of the quickly forming ice twice a day to keep the machinery and equipment from freezing tight. Advantage was taken of the fine weather about fifteen days ago and the catches were made at that time. Before then the boats had been tied up on account of bad weather.

A number more of the larger boats will be in during the next fortnight and also local waterfront men expect the smaller ones will be arriving before long. Fish is now being caught off the west coast of the Queen Charlottes and this is where the small boats make their harvests with a comparatively short voyage to this port for sale. Besides these there were a number of large boats which left Seattle last week. They will fish on the way north and will land their catches here before proceeding to the regular banks. Many of these boats will fish in Hecate Straits and off the Queen Charlottes instead of going to the Kakat grounds as the season is opening on the local banks.

The boats arriving yesterday were the Alton with 60,000 lbs., which she sold to the Cold Storage at 14.9c and 11c; the Scandia, 85,000 lbs., sold to the Pacific Fisheries and Booth at 15.2c and 12c; Tyee, 45,000 lbs. for the New England Fisheries; Seattle, 90,000 lbs., sold to the Pacific Sea Products at 14.5 and 11c.

Only two carloads were shipped east last week, but this morning a fish special of 11 cars pulled out at noon.

INFLUENZA SWEEPS ACROSS POLAND AND HUNDREDS ARE DYING

PARIS, Jan. 19.—Red Cross representatives here state that influenza is sweeping across Poland and that hundreds are dying daily. In Warsaw alone mortality is very great and many other centres are almost as bad.

BISHOP ASKS POPE INTERVENE FOR CRIMINALS

Dutch Government Will Try to Induce Ex-Kaiser to Give Himself Up.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

BERLIN, Jan. 19.—A convention of German bishops is to be held shortly when a petition will be made to the Pope to request the Entente to refrain from demanding extradition of persons charged with war crimes.

Some of the bishops have already issued proclamations urging refusal to accede to the surrender of persons so charged on the ground that the threat is leading to suicide.

It is understood that the Dutch Government is going to endeavor to induce the former German Emperor to give himself up to the Allies.

THE HAGUE, Jan. 19.—The Dutch Premier and Foreign Minister had a long conference, presumably over the demand for the surrender of the ex-Kaiser. The German naval attaché also had a conference with the Home Secretary, presumably over the same matter.

SOLVE ADVERSE U. S. EXCHANGE

MONTREAL, Jan. 19.—W. S. Ballantyne, local British Commissioner, advocates making Canadians agents for all British firms in the United States, replacing American jobbing houses and thus helping to adjust adverse rates of exportation.

Hinton Would Be Popular Manager.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade on Friday evening M. P. McCaffery expressed the hope that W. P. Hinton, vice-president and general manager of the G. T. P., would be appointed manager under the new regime. Practically all Prince Rupert people will agree with him that it would be a great thing for a man who is in touch with the situation here to be in control. Mr. Hinton has shown himself to be an efficient and popular official and none will rejoice more than the people of Prince Rupert if he is chosen to guide the destinies of the railway under conditions that will give him an opportunity to carry out his plans of improvement and of efficient administration.

Public Library Important Matter.

Now that the elections are over and aldermen are about to consider the policies for the coming year, it is to be hoped that they will not forget the need of a public library for this city. It is necessary to take the matter up soon because there will have to be a sum put in the estimates for the year, to provide for the salary of the librarian, which is the chief expense in connection with the project.

In a place where there are not many amusements, and where there are few means of intellectual development, it is necessary that books be available for the use of the citizens. These need to be educational and recreational.

There are so many needs in a new place that it is sometimes difficult to secure support for all. The library is very important, however and the time is opportune for establishing it.

President of France Different From States.

The election of president for France makes it interesting to note his mode of election and powers. Unlike the president of the United States he is elected by a majority vote of the National Assembly of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies in joint session. He holds office for seven years and as the chief executive he appoints to all military and civil posts and has the individual right of pardon and is removable only on a charge of treason.

Deschanel will select a cabinet from the two chambers but may if he wishes select ministers who are not in either house. He should choose a general for minister of war, an admiral as minister of marine and a civilian as minister of foreign affairs. He cannot declare war without the approval of both chambers, but he can make treaties, although treaties which affect the area of France or French colonies must be approved by the legislature. Every act of the president has to be countersigned by a minister. With the consent of the Senate he can dissolve the Chamber of Deputies.

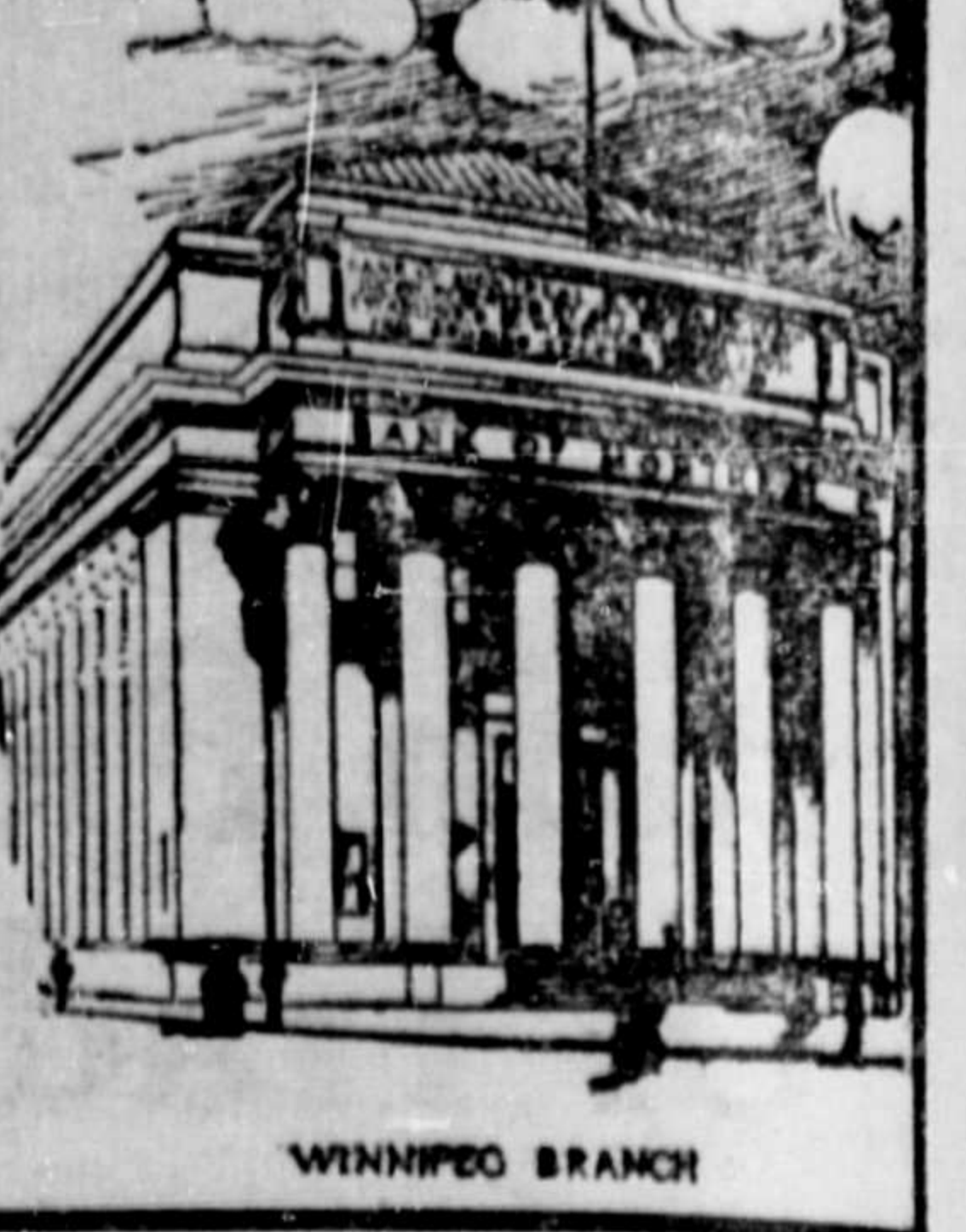

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$800 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years, is required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements, road and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased on condition of construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from installment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1910, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may forth Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
