Higher Court Upholds P.R. Creditors GOVERNMENT LOSES CASE AGAINST PRINCE RUPERT SHIPYARD LIQUIDATOR

Premier W.F. Massey of New Zealand Urges Better Naval Defence on Pacific Ocean

VICTORIA, May 6.—Premier Massey of New Zealand who came here from the south on the steamer Niagara, urges the government to strengthen naval defence by all the dominions of the Pacific ocean.

Mr. Massey said he had no objection to the renewal of the Anglo-Japanese treaty, provided the dominions were allowed the right to choose who should become citizens of the dominions. He thought a constitution for the British Empire was needed.

The New Zealand premier said New Zealand would not make any attempt to relieve the colony of the mandates given in connection with the government of the Pacific islands, including Samoa. He was very pronounced on this point.

Dealing with the matter of inter-Imperial trade, Mr. Massey said his country would like to have greater trade with Canada. New Zealand offered a reciprocity law, the adoption of which would tend toward closer relations.

GERMANS FIGHT BRITISH SIDE IN UPPER SILESIA

OPPELN, Upper Silesia, May 6.—Three thousand Germans have been mobilized and are fighting with the Allies to oppose the insurgents, who are gradually getting the upper hand in the Silesia fighting.

MAY SETTLE TROUBLE IN OLD IRELAND

Many Hopeful Regarding the Outcome of Conference at Dublin.

DUBLIN, May 6.—It is believed the conference of De Valera, leader of the Irish republicans, with the new viceroy and Sir James Craig, the Ulster leader, may result in an agreement of some kind in regard to a new Irish internal policy between the north and the south. It is believed now that all are anxious to find ground for common action before the elections.

GERMAN CABINET IS CARRYING ON IN THE MEANTIME--REQUEST

BERLIN, May 5.—Chancellor Fehrenbach and his cabinet, which tendered its resignation on Wednesday night, is continuing to function in compliance with President Ebert's request that they remain in office until a new ministry has been formed.

NEARLY TWO MILLION PEOPLE OUT OF WORK THROUGHOUT BRITAIN

LONDON, May 6.—There are nearly two million people out of work in Britain, according to the figures prepared by the labor department of the Board of Trade.

BISHOPS VISIT PRESBYTERIANS

Archbishop Du Vernet Urges Closer Co-operation Between the Churches.

VANCOUVER, May 6.—The House of Bishops of the Anglican Church of British Columbia yesterday visited the Presbyterian synod which is in session here and presented to them the Lambeth appeal on Church unity.

Archbishop Du Vernet of Caledonia diocese outlined the purpose of the visit, which it was declared was to make further attempts along the line of closer co-operation between the two churches.

Creditors Win Out vs. Government in Shipyards Case

VICTORIA, May 6.—The Court of Appeals this morning dismissed the appeal of the Dominion Government against the ruling of Mr. Justice Murphy in the case of Rex versus Hodges. By this decision the creditors of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. remain in possession of the materials and fittings in the yard valued altogether at \$213,000. In addition to this Liquidator Hodges will have power to rent the plant and sell it after the ships have been completed. In this way the creditors are amply protected and Hodges thinks they will receive one hundred cents on the dollar when everything is settled up.

The ships on which the government held a lien go to the Government.

Ten Refrigerators Short for Fish Arrivals Which Offered for Sale Today

There is a shortage of no less than ten refrigerator cars at the fish exchange today for the arrivals listed for sale at this port. There were but four cars available this morning and these are being filled with fish already bought. This afternoon the bidders are handling 225,000 pounds of halibut for which there are no cars. This quantity of fish represents the catches of 22 boats, many of which, it is expected, will be forced out of the port on account of the deplorable condition of affairs that is prevailing and for the past few days has been steadily becoming worse.

ONTARIO MAYOR CLEANS ENTIRE POLICE FORCE UP

Mayor Ferguson, of North Bay, Alleges General Inefficiency

NORTH BAY, Ont., May 6.—Mayor Ferguson has suspended the entire police force with the exception of one officer, alleging general inefficiency.

Winsby Asks Co-operation in Carrying Out Provisions of Moderation Liquor Act

"We want the people to work with us and help make the moderation law a success," said Colonel Winsby at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday. "The people voted for the law, it is theirs, and we want them to get behind it and help keep the spirit of moderation. If this law fails it is very likely the province will go bone dry, as people call it."

"As soon as the system is under way we intend to go strong on control," the speaker said. "We expect that the municipal police will co-operate in this work but we shall also have men of our own to assist and should it become necessary we shall take over the administration of the act from the municipalities and charge on the cost to them."

No Bootlegging

The colonel said he understood that at the present time bootlegging was rampant. It was difficult to tell in which part of the country it was worst. It seemed to be general throughout the province. When the act came into operation it was the intention to get rid of the bootleggers and enforce the law to the utmost.

The board will arrange for delivery of ale and stout and other kinds of beer, in this city they would probably ship it to the central warehouse and distribute from there to the consumers. Some heavy importing had been done recently but very soon all remaining stocks would be sealed. This was the only way they could keep track of them. In the large cities the orders for beer would probably be delivered direct from the brewery, although the orders would be taken at offices provided for that purpose in the same way as for liquors.

Plenty of Liquor

"We have a quantity of liquor on hand," declared the speaker, "and there is more on the way so that when we open for business there will be plenty to keep going for some time to come. We shall bring in wine and champagne and sell it at about the same prices that were formerly paid."

"It will be our chief aim to keep the liquor out of public places," continued Col. Winsby. "If liquor were sold over the counter much of it would be consumed on the street and in public places. This we shall try to prevent. The aim will be to try to avoid drunkenness. We want the people to assist us in every possible way."

Bone Dry Fallacy

Colonel Winsby went on to say he did not believe any country was really bone dry. No one could say the United States was really bone dry. Prohibition paved the way for the greatest bane of all, the bootlegger. The board was out to make a success of this measure if possible. Many thought they were trying to do the impossible. The whole continent was watching to see if they would make a success of the business. He asked them not to knock because of mistakes. They were bound to make mistakes, but they would be ready to remedy them.

Fishermen's Supply

In answer to questions Colonel Winsby said fishermen or others would be able to purchase liquor delivered to their boats as their boats were their homes, in many cases, temporarily at any rate. Those living in hotel rooms could also have liquor sent to them as provided in the Act. There would be a limit to the buying power, but he was not prepared to say what that limit would be. C.P.R. GETS BIG GERMAN STEAMERS

LONDON, May 6.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Co. has purchased two big steamers which formerly belonged to Germany, the Kaiserin Augusta Victoria, 25,000 tons, and Prinz Friedrich Wilhelm, 17,000 tons.

MONTREAL, May 6.—The steamers purchased by the C.P.R. will be renamed. The Kaiserin Augusta will be the Empress of Scotland and the Prinz Frederick, the Empress of China. They will go on the Pacific run between Vancouver and Hong Kong, calling at Japanese and Chinese ports.
