EXPULSION AND EXCLUSION ALL ENEMY ALIENS, SAYS LLOYD GEORGE IN SPEECH DECLARING HIS POLICY

Would Have Crown Heads Responsible for the War Tried by an International Court. Winston Churchill states Britain will Demand Absolute Abolition of Conscription in Europe.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, December 6.—David Lloyd George, the British Premier, made a statement of his post war policy in an election campaign speech last night. In it he declares that the men responsible for the war cannot escape the consequences to themselves, simply because their heads had been crowned. He was emphatic in that they must be tried for their actions by a court constituted by international jurists.

Another plank in the platform of the British premier, which is of very considerable interest, is the expelling and the excluding of all enemy aliens for a long period from entrance within the British Empire. Lloyd George declared himself distinctly in favor of the expulsion and exclusion of all such alien enemy subjects.

NO MORE CONSCRIPTION IN EUROPE, BRITAIN TO DEMAND AT CONFERENCE

Dundee, December 6.—The British representatives to the Peace Conference, which will be shortly called to decide the terms of the peace of Europe, will demand the general and absolute abolition of conscription throughout all Europe. Winston Spencer Churchill made this announcement in an election speech here last night. This will apply to all neutral countries as well as to the belligerent nations.

WOMAN FAILED IN OPPOSITION TO MR. ASQUITH

Papers Were Irregular—T. P. O'Connor Elected Member of House of Commons By Acclamation.

HORATIO BOTTOMLEY IS AGAIN CANDIDATE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Dec. 6.—The second day of the British nominations, while not as strikingly interesting as the first still were followed closely by the British public, who quickly snapped up the newspapers containing the announcements as they appeared on the streets, both in London and the provincial towns. In local interest it overshadowed the prospects for the peace conference, the visit of President Wilson, or the announcements of Winston Churchill in Ireland.

Ex-Premier Asquith was to have been opposed by a woman, Mrs. Hope, as retaliation for his former attitude toward the suffrage movement. The lady's name was not put in nomination, however, yesterday, as her papers were found to be irregular, and were rejected by the returning officer.

Horatio Bottomley, editor of John Bull, who yesterday secured his discharge from the bankruptcy court, was nominated. He has been a member of the House of Commons for a long time.

Among those elected by acclamation were T. P. O'Connor, the veteran journalist, friend of Lloyd George and Irish statesman; Spencer Leigh Hughes and Kennedy Jones.

FRIENDLY APPROVAL

Buenos Ayres, Dec. 6.—The American Government has informed Peru that she may count upon the friendly approval of the United States in efforts to obtain a plebiscite in the provinces of Taena and Arica, provided for in the treaty of Ancon.

St. John, N. B., Dec. 6.—In an annual session here, the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance passed a strong resolution in favor of steps being taken at Ottawa to see that the war measure of Dominion prohibition be enlarged into direct prohibitory legislation at the next session of Parliament.

WILSON WILL ASK BRITAIN TO ABANDON SUPREMACY AND POOL NAVAL STRENGTH

WANTS ARMED CAMP SPIRIT REMOVED FROM THE WORLD AND INTERNATIONAL NAVY ESTABLISHED—IF PROPOSALS REFUSED STATES WILL GO AHEAD WITH BIG PROGRAM

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, December 6.—America's army and navy program will depend largely upon President Wilson's success or failure in securing the adoption of his plan of non-militarism while abroad. What he wants, as generally outlined, is to have Britain abandon her idea of unbridled sea supremacy. He wants her to pool her naval strength in an international navy. He opposes any idea of an American-British navy. At the same time he wants the armed camp spirit removed from the world with respect to army power.

If England refuses to hearken to his program as to naval armament, this Government will go ahead with the program destined to make the United States equal, and perhaps superior, to England on the seas. If England does agree to President Wilson's proposals it is likely that this Government will relax some of its plans for the future.



TROPICAL HURRICANE AT HAWAIIAN ISLANDS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Honolulu, Dec. 6.—The Island of Oahu, on which Honolulu is situated and adjacent islands are recovering from the worst tropical hurricane that ever visited the Hawaiian group. Thousands of trees on Oahu were blown down, the street car service was brought to a standstill, all wires were prostrated, and many wooden houses partly stripped. The sugar cane crop on the island of Oahu was said to have suffered \$250,000 damage. Reports have not been received from neighboring islands but it is believed the damage was proportionately heavy. The only loss of life reported was the drowning of a Japanese.

VICTORY LOAN TOTAL IS AN IMMENSE SUM

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Toronto, Ont., Dec. 6.—There have been further reports made by the different provinces which bring the total for the second Victory Loan up to \$687,077,500, with 1,087,879 subscribers. The returns are not yet by any means complete, and the above total will without doubt be increased.

Among the travellers arriving in town last evening from the interior was J. Bostrom of Tatalaska Lake. Mr. Bostrom is one of the pioneer ranchers of the Lakes district between the Bulkley and Nechako Valleys.

TROUBLE GROWS BETWEEN PERU AND CHILI

Hostile Demonstration in Peruvian Capital—Other Consuls Take Peru's Interests In Chili.

BOUNDARY DISPUTE GROWS IN TENSION

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Santiago, Chili, Dec. 6.—The Chilean consulate at Callao, the port for Lima, reports that in Lima, the capital of Peru, there have been hostile demonstrations by the populace against Chili. The rupture of relations between the two countries is regarded as so imminent that the Bolivian consuls are already in charge of all Peruvian interests throughout Chili, except at Iquique and Antofagasta, where the French consuls have taken the interests of Peru under their care.

MUNITION WORK STOPS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—Within ten days' work upon contracts for munitions for the British and United States Governments placed in Canada by the Imperial Munitions Board, will have stopped.

ALL MILLS NOTIFIED STOP CUTTING SPRUCE

The Imperial Munitions Board has notified all the mills in the neighborhood that they are to stop cutting aeroplane spruce for a few months. There is nothing definite as to the termination of the contracts nor as to whether the work will be resumed, but the understanding is that arrangements will be made later for the manufacture of the logs which are now in the water and in the woods.

The amount of spruce which has been felled but which is not yet manufactured into lumber is variously estimated at from fifty to one hundred million feet on the Queen Charlotte Islands alone. This will have to be used before very long as it will quickly spoil.

ASKING GOVERNMENT TO LOOSEN ITS HOLD

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Atlantic City, N. J., Dec. 6.—It was apparent from action taken by many groups representing hundreds of industries and branches of business that strong appeals will be made to the Government to loosen the hold it took on business during the war emergency and resolutions in support of such measures will be reported at today's reconstruction congress which is being held under the initiative of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

NEW TRIAL ASKED

New York, Dec. 6.—A new trial for Thomas J. Mooney was demanded in resolutions adopted last night at a meeting held by Cooper Union under the auspices of the Central Federated Union to raise funds in his behalf.

SALMON WORTH \$8,000,000 IS FOR BRITAIN

Canada Food Board Denies that Canadian Government is Holding Up Stocks in This Province.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—The statement that the Government had purchased eight million dollars' worth of canned salmon in British Columbia, which is still on hand unsold, is wholly incorrect, according to the Canada Food Board. The purchase was made on behalf of the British Ministry of Food upon terms determined by the war purchasing commission. This salmon had all been shipped and the terms of payment have been complied with. There is still a small amount in dispute to be arranged as a matter of settlement. It was a purchase regarding which the Government of Canada had nothing to do, except as acting as an intermediary, there being a difference as to price between the purchasing agency and the salmon canners. British Columbia salmon canners wanted a price considerably higher than the Washington state prices, but the recommendations of the Canada Food Board providing for an adjustment were confirmed by the Dominion Government.

MANY CASUALTIES IN EXPLOSION AT POWDER FACTORY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Pompton Lakes, N. J., Dec. 6.—Eleven men were killed and 23 injured here late yesterday by four explosions which destroyed the detonator assembling building of the Dupont Cap Works. The force of the explosion shook the country-side for miles around. The fire which followed the explosions was confined to one unit and the property loss was slight.

GOVERNMENT HOUSING SCHEME DISCUSSED

Ottawa, Dec. 5.—In connection with the appropriating of \$25,000,000 for the improvement of housing conditions in Canada, in the order in council authorizing the transaction the Minister of Finance points out that at a conference recently held at Ottawa between Premiers and other members of Governments of the several provinces and representatives of the Dominion Government, one of the most important subjects of discussion was that of creating better housing conditions for the industrial population of large centres.

The Minister points out that, owing to practical cessation of building operations during the war, there is at present a great scarcity of housing accommodation in most of the cities, and this condition will become intensified with the return of soldiers from overseas and their re-establishment with their families in civil life and occupation.

SHIPPING CHANGES

Ottawa, Dec. 5.—Effective today, the British Ministry of Shipping is giving regular steamship lines 10 per cent. of the December space for private shipments.

DEVELOPMENT ALONG GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC

Removal of Lumber Embargo Stimulates Business; Coal Being Shipped Here From Telkwa.

That the lumber mills along the line will benefit from the recent United States order removing the embargo on Canadian lumber is the word brought by H. McCall, general superintendent of the western division of the G. T. P., who is home after a tour of inspection. He says that several of the mills along the line are already getting orders and commencing to ship and the result will be that there will be increased activity and more business for the railroad.

Mr. McCall also reports that the Telkwa coal mine is now shipping a car load a day to Prince Rupert and will continue to do so all winter. The siding was completed some time ago and the bunkers built and the coal is now coming here. It is said to be very good coal.

Mr. McCall was away for about two weeks.

PLENTY OF LABOR AT THE ANYOX MINE

Supt. Campbell Says That Many Loggers and Others Are Coming In From Woods and Supplying Demand.

E. E. Campbell, superintendent of the mine at Anyox, and O. B. Smith, general superintendent of the Granby mining operations, arrived here yesterday from Ketchikan and expect to remain until tomorrow night when they will return to Anyox.

Speaking of conditions at Anyox, Mr. Campbell said that they, like all other communities, were hard hit by the influenza, but conditions were again back to normal. Work was now going on much as usual, except that labor conditions had changed. Loggers and others were flocking in from the woods and they now had all the labor they wanted.

Asked as to the prospect of the Ecstall River property being opened up Mr. Campbell said he knew nothing about it except that they had been boring there all summer and that the work had shut down for the winter. He supposed the work would proceed in the spring.

Mr. Campbell spoke of the splendid work that the people of Anyox had done for the Victory Loan. Only a small part of the large sum had been subscribed by the company, the people themselves taking the bonds freely and without the holding of any public meetings.

PRINCE JOHN ARRIVES FROM MORESBY ISLAND

Bringing word that the mills at Moresby Island and most of the logging camps had shut down and with a full passenger list of loggers and others, the Prince John arrived in port yesterday morning early. She also brought a hold full of canned salmon, there being 6,000 cases from Skidegate and 4,000 cases from Aliford Bay. After discharging them and loading up again the steamer left early this morning for Masset Inlet points.

Among the passengers arriving yesterday was Mr. Loller from Ali Inlet, W. Rennie from Lockport, J. M. O'Brien from Thurston Harbor and Mr. McLennan of Skidegate.

Among the logging camps that seemed to be still operating were Kelly's camp and the North Pacific Logging Co.

SALMON EGGS ARE TAKEN IN ALASKA

Effort Made to Establish Humpbacks at Puget Sound and Coast of Maine.

The Bureau of Fisheries, Department of Commerce of the U. S. Government announces that a very successful collection of sockeye salmon eggs was made at the close of the spawning season in Alaska for the Afognak station, the total amounting to 54,681,000, which constitutes the largest take of that species since the Katmai eruption in 1912, and seems to indicate the complete recovery of the stream from the disastrous effects of that occurrence.

In view of the encouraging situation, commercial fishing for sockeyes by the natives, which has been prohibited for a number of years, was resumed on a limited scale during the summer. Humpback eggs to the number of 8,697,000 were also secured, and in continuation of the Bureau's efforts to establish a run of this species in Puget Sound during the "off" year, 5,750,000 of them were sent down from Afognak and divided between the Birdview and the Hoods Canal, Washington, hatcheries. With them came 25,800,000 sockeye eggs, of which 20,700,000 were reshipped from Seattle to Canadian hatcheries on the Fraser River. The remainder will be developed at the Quinalt station, in an effort to build up the depleted run of fish in streams of that region.

Though not unusually large, the take of eggs at Yes Bay was satisfactory, the total for the season comprising 48,665,000 sockeye and 1,365,900 humpbacks. Most of the eggs of the latter species will be shipped to the Maine stations, in continuation of the effort to establish the humpback in Atlantic waters.
