Commissioner of Works Lansbury Finds Many Job Hunters in England

PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS

Sur Bathing in Hyde Park and Mixed Bathing in Serpentine Planned

LONDON, England, Oct. 19:-People seem to think I have hundreds of jobs to give away," declared Hon. George Lansbury, first commissioner of works. "They seem to think I am a great-hearted sort of fellow, who, now I have found a job myself, can find a job for them as well. That is not the way things are done at the office of works. It is a good thing, too, because, otherwise it would lead to a good deal of favoritism.

George Lansbury was addressing an audience of women at Bromley. which forms part of the vast eastend of London which he knows so well; where he has lived so long. Just now he is busy going all over the parks and other open spaces which belong to the crown, and for the care of which he is therefore responsible, to see how their amenities may be extended. He is talking of introducing sun bathing a Hyde Park, and mixed bathing in the Serpentine. It was the earlier Labor Government which was responsible for removal of the ban upon taxis being driven through Hyde Park. In some ways Mr. Lansbury is the most interesting inclusion in the present cabinet. His fierce independence, his impetuosity, and his plain manner of speech seemed to render it impossible that he could ever become a minister of the crown. But those who really know him are aware that a gentle, kindly spirit lies behind his plainness of utterance. Like many other man of the "say what I mean type" he is himself most sensitive to criticism. His devotion to the Church of England is considerable, and at Church Congresses he used often to keep a gathering of gaitered bishops and other dignitaries closely interested. He was at one time editor of the Daily Herald, and had an uneasy year once as chairman of the Labor Party.




