FRANCE BACKS BRIAND IN REPARATIONS DEMAND BRITISH MINERS AND EMPLOYERS ARE NOW TRYING TO SOLVE DIFFICULTY

German Reparations will be Enforced May 1, says Briand by Occupation Ruhr District

BERLIN, April 26.—"In the event that the United States and France desire it, Germany is willing, according to her ability and capacity, to assume Allied obligations to us," says a clause in the proposals forwarded to Washington for transmission to the Allies.

With the exception of the clause including the "offer of two billion gold marks, the proposals are virtually the same as those forwarded to Washington for transmission to the Allies.

Germany in the reparations note also suggests an arbitration to fix the total sum of reparations.

PARIS, April 26.—Premier Briand told the Chamber of Deputies today that "if on May 1 no satisfactory proposals with suitable guarantees were not made by the German Government, the occupation of the Ruhr district would be ordered."

Chamber of Deputies has increased sum of eighty thousand francs to propose for the enforcement of the reparation demands.

Officers Gathered. April 26.—Allied officers gathered here today for the conference preparatory to the meeting of the supreme allied council on Saturday, which will finally Germany's latest proposals.

OTTAWA, April 26.—There was an increase in Canadian trade for the year ending March amounting to \$99,378,297 over previous year. This is accounted for by a large increase in imports. The exports fell about fifty millions. The total less amounted to \$2,450,000.

Trade for March shows a decrease compared with a year ago \$78,681,670, the decrease being chiefly in imports.

CITY OFFERS MUCH INTEREST MILL POWER VALOROUS CASE

Would Supply Pulp Mill With Both Customs and Police are Investigating Activities of Mystery Ship

The city council, on recommendation of the utilities committee, has decided to offer to the Prince Rupert Pulp & Paper Co. a supply of 500 horse power maximum demand at \$25 per horse power year for its proposed pulp mill and saw mill operations. A minimum payment of \$500 per month, whether the plant is in operation or not, is provided for and also the cancelling of the present agreement, which expires on March 8, 1922. The proposal is to be submitted to the company with the request that it be replied to within sixty days.

The offer by the city is made in reply to a request of the company for a supply of 600 horse power at a cost not exceeding \$27 per horse power year.

GERMANS WERE ALMOST MOBBED

Appeared Today in Bow Street When Soldiers' Evidence Was Given.

LONDON, April 26.—German lawyers were present today for the first time since 1914 in Bow Street when British soldiers, who were prisoners of war, gave evidence against German army officers accused of cruelty and atrocities.

The presence of the lawyers nearly precipitated a riot and constables had to rescue the Germans.

SHOOTING AT FERNIE

Constable and Slav in Hospital After Arresting Alleged Game Hog.

FERNIE, April 26.—Provincial Constable Hilton and Gumbo Melnik, a Slav, are both in the hospital suffering from gunshot wounds, the former in the chest and throat and the latter in the arm, fired, it is alleged, by Fred Mekosky when the first two were talking outside Melnik's house at Michel.

Melnik has given evidence against Mekosky who was charged with shooting game out of season. Mekosky was captured after an all night search and after being shot in the arm for resisting surrender.

FRANCE IS WITH BRIAND

Chamber of Deputies Votes Confidence in Government 424 to 29.

PARIS, April 26.—France is behind Premier Briand in connection with the German reparations demands. After hearing the statement of the Premier, the Chamber of Deputies expressed confidence in the Government on a vote of 424 to 29. This indicates the determination of the French people to insist on ruined homes being replaced.

BOND ISSUE FETCHES A GOOD PRICE

Minister of Finance Announces Disposal of Three Million Securities.

VICTORIA, April 26.—An issue of \$3,000,000 six per cent treasury bills was sold by the Provincial Government at 104.01. Finance Minister John Hart announced yesterday. The purchasers are a syndicate headed by the British-American Bond Corporation.

The money will be used, the minister says, for completing the construction work on the P.G.E. and other public works during the summer.

REGINA, April 26.—The Dominion Government refuses to provide funds to meet the interest on the Grand Trunk Pacific bonds guaranteed by the province of Saskatchewan on account of the uncertain status of the acquisition of the Grand Trunk Railway. The Provincial Government is meeting the interest.

OTTAWA, April 26.—The Grand Trunk Acquisition Bill was read a third time at midnight following a division.

UNIONIST MEMBER ASKS RESTORATION NATURAL RESOURCES

OTTAWA, April 26.—J. A. Campbell, Unionist member for Nelson riding, Manitoba, yesterday proposed the immediate restoration of the natural resources of the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Premier Meighen declared that this would be impossible on the terms set out by the western member and moved an amendment providing for favorable terms to all provinces on which Mr. Campbell withdrew his motion.



In the Letter Box

FINAL SHOT

Editor, Daily News:

In answer to Mr. Montgomery's letter, I and the most people claim that the geographical position of Ireland is the great stumbling block to separation.

What late states of Germany's are a menace to her now? If they were, whose funeral is that? Not Britain's surely.

Another thing, Mr. Montgomery, Britain is not to be scared by a bunch of cold-blooded murderers. Everybody knows that during the late war Sinn Feiners did all they could to help German submarines, and will again if they get the chance. Sinn Feiners are begging money in the United States and yet they (when in superior numbers) attacked American sailors in Cork during the late war. Ask Admiral Sims of the United States navy. There would be no reprisals if the Sinn Feiners would be satisfied with law abiding methods. British troops belong wherever they are.

North Movement

In 1915 the north of Ireland never set up a government in opposition to the laws of Britain. In that year, just before the war started, a Home Rule bill different to the present one was passed which Ulster would not accept.

New Ulster has or shortly will have her own parliament, but Ulster will never submit to Rome. Ulstermen, not being Irish, Mr. Montgomery, should tell that to the marines. Whether they are Scotch or Scotch they will not submit to Sinn Fein.

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
