

### United States Again Joins Council of Ambassadors in Europe; Germany Weakens

**PARIS, May 9.**—American representation at the Allied conference was resumed today when Hugh C. Wallace, American ambassador, took a seat at the session of the Council of Ambassadors here. This strengthens the hands of the Allies in dealing with German, Silesian and other questions which are to the fore in Europe today.

**BERLIN, May 9.**—The sentiment in German political circles is now drifting toward agreeing to the allied terms. It is believed a parliamentary coalition will be formed which will accept the allied ultimatum. This coalition is to be constituted within the next twenty-four hours.

**IRLAND STILL SEETHES WITH UNREST; DILLON IS ADVISING AGAINST VOTING**

**UBLIN, May 9.**—John Dillon urges Southern Ireland Nationalists not to participate in the forthcoming elections. He says it is impossible to reach an agreement similar to that which binds Republicans and Nationalists of Ulster.

**ELFANT, May 9.**—A two-hour engagement between crown forces and an ambushing party took place in the Knapp mountains. The ambushers were dislodged and one killed, one captured and one soldier wounded. Ammunition and supplies were seized nearby.

**BLIN, May 9.**—Two police officers were killed and two wounded, many civilians trampled in stampede from church when an attempt took place outside.

**BRK, May 9.**—Constable John G. Wiseman, an American, was arrested here this morning. He is to be sent to Rupert charged with obtaining \$550 from M. M. Stephens under false pretenses.

**UGHTY GETS SIX YEARS ON THEFT CHARGE**

**MONTO, May 9.**—John G. Ambrose Small, the theatrical magnate and millionaire, found guilty of stealing \$300 worth of Victory Bonds from his employer, has been sentenced to six years in the penitentiary.

The crown is dropping, for the moment, the charge against him of conspiring to kidnap.

**J. H. Burrough, Local G. B. U. Secretary, Says Attempt Will Be Made to Resist.**

**J. H. Burrough, secretary of the Local Central Labor Council, was advised today that the Premier Gold Mining Co. at Stewart had announced a cut in the wages at the mine to \$4 for inside men and \$3.50 outside. This is exclusive of board, which will have to be paid out of the wages.**

### London Heartily Welcomes The Japanese Crown Prince

**LONDON, May 9.**—The capital of the British Empire today accorded Prince Hirohito, heir to the Japanese throne, a tumultuous welcome on his arrival here for a three weeks' visit to England.

Full honors of state were extended to the prince, these being the first such honors for a visiting foreign dignitary since 1914.

The weather was ideal for the occasion. The Japanese prince was accompanied by the Prince of Wales from Portsmouth on a special train and met at Victoria station by King George, the Duke of Connaught and the Duke of York. A brilliant suite of British officialdom was in attendance and stood at attention while the bands played the Japanese national anthem.

Seated beside King George in a state carriage, the Crown Prince was driven off through the streets cordoned by troops and lined with cheering multitudes to Buckingham Palace.

### PREMIERS INVITED TO OPENING SOUTH IRISH PARLIAMENT

**Sir James Craig, Ulster Leader, Makes Announcement to This Effect**

**LONDON, May 9.**—Sir James Craig, the Ulster leader, has announced that official invitations will be extended to the premiers of all the British dominions to be present at Belfast on the opening of the new parliament of Northern Ireland.

**ATLANTIC CITY, May 9.**—Jack Dempsey today began training for the Carpenter bout on July 2 with road work and light gymnasium training. This will occupy the first week of his schedule.

### DISORDERS IN PARIS ON JOAN OF ARC DAY CAUSED BY COMMUNISTS

**PARIS, May 9.**—Joan of Arc Day saw disorders in Paris. Fourteen policemen and 23 communists were wounded when the communists tried to enter Paris gates protesting against the celebration and yelling "down with war."

### PERMITS COAL TO LAND IN IRELAND

**DUBLIN, May 9.**—Irish and British railwaymen have decided to permit the landing of foreign coal shipped to Ireland only.

### Brief Ceremony at Ship Launching on Thursday next

About 700 invitations have been issued for the launching ceremony of the "Canadian Scottish" to be held at the Wallace shipyard next Thursday afternoon. For the occasion the yards will be thrown open to the general public and the invitation card will not be necessary for admission, it being more in the nature of a souvenir. The card, itself, has been artistically printed and its upper left hand corner bears a tartan plaid of real cloth.

For the launching party a platform is to be erected and on this Mrs. Peck, the sponsor, and officials and others will stand. After the launching the party will go to the general offices where the usual presentation to the sponsor will be made. The whole ceremony including launching and presentation will be over in fifteen or twenty minutes.

After she leaves the ways the "Canadian Scottish" will be picked up by the Lorne and towed to the dock where the work of fitting will be done. It should be but a matter of half an hour's time after her launching when the ship will be tied up.

### JOCKEY GETS 3,000 FOR WINNING RACE


**Man Who Rode "Behave Yourself" Given Cash by Owner of Horse**

## LOCAL DRUG ADDICTS GET CHANCE CURE TOLMIE IS TO OPEN THE FAIR

Joe and Frank Bennett, the two brothers addicted to the use of drugs last year, spent several periods in the local jail, gave themselves up for treatment in the campaign against the drug traffic that is being conducted by Vancouver Sun in Vancouver.

The brothers earnestly requested to be allowed an opportunity of taking proper medical treatment. They stated that they had been addicted to the use of various drugs, such as cocaine, morphine and heroin, for the past twelve years and the pernicious habit was the direct cause of their having to serve several terms of imprisonment.

Physicians immediately filled out the necessary papers for admission to Esquimalt and both appeared grateful for the opportunity, stating that it was the first real chance they had had.

### YOUTHS ARRESTED ON THEFT CHARGES

Three Lads Faced Magistrate McMordie in Police Court This Morning.

Wilfrid Beaupre, aged 15, Ed. Portelance, 10, and Ned Byrne, 13, were arraigned in the police court this morning charged with breaking and entering and stealing, and were remanded until tomorrow morning.

Two thefts are alleged to have been perpetrated by these lads, one from Eric Rosang's shed at the new court house site, and the other from the municipal waterworks shed at the same place. The first theft was committed last Friday and 100 feet of fuse, a box of detonators and some wire was taken. Similar articles were removed from the city shed. The property in the

former case has all been recovered having been found in one of the tunnels at Market Square. Constables Logan and Howe made the arrests.

Sam Oleson Made \$466.74 in Four Days from Sale of 100 Springs

Sam Oleson, a salmon fisherman with a small trolling boat, brought in a fine lot of spring salmon yesterday which averaged over 29 lbs. to the fish, the whole catch of 100 salmon weighing 2,919 lbs. For these he was paid 16c. a pound, or a lump sum of \$466.74 for four days work, an average of \$116.68 a day for the time he was out.

### SERVING TO SAVE.

ALTHOUGH we, as a people, are not so devoted to our stomachs as are some other nations, nevertheless, we like to be considered good providers, and are satisfied only with plentifully supplied tables.

There are many times when they are overburdened with good things, while sometimes, the details are given too little attention.

In this we differ greatly from our friends on the other side of the water. There, it is not considered good form to have too many varieties at a time, but however few the articles may be, are chosen in keeping with the preparation, and serving, to be sure of success.

When the meal is over, the dishes are washed, and the table is set for dessert.

Chicken must have red currant jelly.


This will not color the syrup, but will remove the mouldy taste and make your syrup taste like new.

# BUSINESS MEN COMING NORTH

Fifty to Make Trip from Victoria,  
Remainder from Vancouver

In connection with the proposed visit of business men from the south next month, W. E. Payne, secretary of the Vancouver Board of Trade, who was recently in Victoria, explained the arrangements at a Board of Trade luncheon. He said that in the past practically every section of the province had been covered by Board of Trade tours and all these trips had been of a business-getting nature. The tour to Northern B.C., he said, would have pleasure as its only objective, although an opportunity would be afforded to become acquainted with interior business men who were members of the party.

It is expected that about 300 persons will make the trip. The steamer Prince George has been chartered for the week commencing June 7 and ending June 15, and calls will be made at Prince Rupert, Ocean Falls, Surf Inlet, Swanson Bay, and perhaps the Queen Charlotte Islands.

## WHIPPING POST IS SUGGESTED BY JUDGE

NEW YORK, May 9.—Revival of the whipping post for criminals was advocated in Brooklyn by Supreme Court Justice Fawcett in sentencing a highwayman to a term of imprisonment of from 10 to 20 years. "Shorter sentences and the generous use of the lash would rid the community of hardened criminals," said the court. "The prison with its moving pictures, theatricals and other forms of entertainment is not considered punishment by many prisoners. The time has come when judicious use of the lash would meet a long-felt want in making our streets and parks safe and in protecting the lives and property of our people."

## SEA MONSTER

Enormous Fish Taken Off AL-  
lantic City, Weighed Over  
Two Tons

ATLANTIC CITY, May 9.—Old sea dogs whose chief pastime is to spin yarns of gigantic fish they have landed took two looks and then threw up their hands when Cap'n Clarence Starn's craft docked at this port, with a black sea monster weighing more than two tons that was caught in a mackerel net 60 miles off the coast. The fish which is only 29 feet long was hauled aboard with a tackle after putting up a stiff fight in which the sea was whipped into foam. None of the sea veterans could name its species.

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

## BOLSHEVIKS USE POLITICAL METHODS WITH WORKINGMEN

TERIJKI, Finland, May 4.—Copies of Bolshevik posters designed to quiet the strikers of Petrograd during the recent revolution at Kronstadt which have been brought across the border here, show the Communists turned to soft words in their effort to win over the workingmen.

Previous posters were couched in words of command, but these were addressed to "Dear Comrades" and were full of promises. One of them reads:

"Dear Comrade: We offer you the following seven concessions:

"Eighteen million pounds (or 36,07 pounds each) of coal have been ordered from abroad.

"Non-party representation will be allowed on the grain trade commissions.

"Preparations for city vegetable gardens are under way.

"Country workers will be dismissed and sent home from Petrograd because of the short rations."

"Cheek" detachments on the railways are ordered to exempt workingmen. (The "cheek" detachments were communist guards who seized any produce brought from the country into Petrograd).

"Sixty new trains will be operated to the suburbs for workingmen.

"Unlimited requisition of grain will be replaced by the definite quota system.

"Hunger only becomes greater through revolution."

## Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

But parties of not more than four may agree for adjacent pre-emptive areas with joint residence, but such making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$100 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than two years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of illness, etc., be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to value of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 10 years. Improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may receive another pre-emption if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding \$40 acres may be leased.

Mill, factory or similar places on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Native hay meadows, inaccessible by existing roads, may be purchased conditional upon construction of road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which a homestead or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

Fee relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 28, 1918. These are to be paid for 10 years.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions. Individuals agreements to purchase town or city lots will be made by members of Allied Forces, or dependents acquired direct or indirect, remitted from entitlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from persons who have not completed purchase, involving forfeiture on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, the price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole areas. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING ACT.

For systematic development of livestock industry, provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for establishment of ranges—others may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers up to one head.
