



When the railways reported that they did not consider the time ripe for building a Pacific outlet to the Peace Secretary of River they were looking at it from the cold business point of view. They are already getting the business from the Peace country and charging the farmers for carrying their grain. The rates they charge take pretty much all the farmers earn but the rate is justified because of the roundabout route taken.

From the point of view of the gov- der of Moose here for twenty ernment it should be good business to open up the rich country in Northern British Columbia and to open up as much of it as possible.

The suggested Obed route is not a western outlet. It is simply a small cut-off that would open up no new country and would not be of any benefit to British Columbia. All it would do would be to make a slightly better outlet from the Alberta section of the Peace River country.

If the government of Canada decides to undertake the work it should do so in a permanent manner, building a road that will serve British Columbia as well as Alberta. It seems as if the railways turning down the project

paved the way for the government to undertake it. The railways had the first chance. Now that they have failed the government would be quite justified in going ahead.

Report on Local Conditions Given In Government Publication

Of 799 out of 895 children in the public schools of Prince Rupert who were given medical examination during the 1930-31 school year, 256 were found to have malnutrition condition, according to the annual report of the Provincial Board of Health which has just come to hand. There were three with mental deficiency, 59 with defective vision, 78 with defective hearing, 176 with defective nasal breathing, 42 with adenoids, 359 with enlarged tonsils, 298 with defective teeth, 367 with enlarged glands and 37 with goitre. There were a few nervous cases such as bronchitis, cardiac, pulmonary, anaemia, scoliosis, orthopedic and acne in isolated instances. Mumps, chicken-pox and whooping cough were the acute fevers which occurred during the

The examining doctors reported he condition of all school buildings as regards crowding, heating, ventilation and cleanliness as being good.

Of 204 pupils in the local High School 194 were evamined.
