The End of Strike is in Sight

STRIKE AT TACOMA OFFICIALLY CALLED OFF; MEN SEEM TO BE WEAKENING FAST AT SEATTLE

Street Car Lines were Operated Yesterday and Today will be Normal. There is Gradual Drifting Away of Unions from the Committee of Control.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Seattle, February 10.—Labor leaders asserted last night that when the general strike conference committee of union delegates assembled today they would renew the fight to have the sympathetic strike called off and a definite time fixed for its expiration. They were said to believe the strike would come to an end within 24 hours.

Street cars on all lines in Seattle operated on an almost normal basis yesterday and the traction company officials said the service would be one hundred per cent. normal before today is over.

Indications were, the city officials said, that the strike would be broken by the gradual drifting away of the unions from the committee controlling the strike.

Tacoma, Feb. 10.—The general strike in Tacoma has been officially called off by the general strike committee, effective at 11 a. m. today.

LIMIT IMMIGRATION OF FOREIGNERS UNTIL SOLDIERS PROVIDED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, B. C., Feb. 10.—The City Council in session with representatives of a number of public bodies and S. J. Crown, M. P., passed a resolution requesting the Dominion Government to take immediate steps to prohibit immigration to Canada of citizens of foreign extraction who are unskilled tradesmen, until such time as returned soldiers shall have first been satisfactorily dealt with and the future policy of repatriation promulgated.

At the meeting the Chinese Consul suggested a limitation of Chinese immigration and urged that in future the literacy test be imposed on immigrants, Chinese included.

OBJECT TO POLICE SEARCHING GRIPS AT TORONTO DEPOT

Court Proceedings Threatened for Damages Through Police Acting Beyond Their Authority.

Toronto, Feb. 10.—The City of Toronto is threatened with a number of suits for damages through the practice of the city police at the railroad depots of searching the grips and baggage of incoming passengers in an effort to apprehend those bringing liquor into the city, contrary to the Prohibition Act. It is said that the police have no authority to do this.

CONSCRIPTED TO THE LIMIT IN RUSSIA

London, Feb. 10.—The Bolshevik Government has decided that all persons in Russia, quite irrespective of their nationality, must serve in the Red army.

The fish arrivals yesterday were the Seattle with 48,000 lbs. and the Anna J. with 16,000 lbs. The King and Winge which arrived here Saturday afternoon had 45,000 lbs. of halibut. All sold at 14c.

MILITARY SERVICE EVADERS SURRENDER

Ottawa, Feb. 10.—The Government is taking cognizance of the fact that defaulters and deserters under the Military Service Act are escaping with fines of \$5 in places outside of Montreal and are giving themselves up to merciful magistrates in fairly large numbers.

DORIES OF KING AND WINGE CAUGHT IN A HOWLING GALE LOST IN A THICK SNOWSTORM

For Three Hours Capt. Miller Thought His Men gone Forever, but All Got Safely Aboard. Some Had Fingers Frozen and All were exhausted. One Man Had to Swim in Icy Waters and Was Hauled Out by Rope. Water Baled Out When Enormous Seas Came Overboard.

The halibut fishing boat King and Winge came near losing practically all her men and gear on the trip from which she arrived at the week end. It was one of the narrowest escapes, Captain Miller said, that ever he had known.

It happened off Yakutat. There was a southeast wind blowing with a rather heavy swell, but not too bad for fishing. The men all went off in their dories and had their lines down and had commenced drawing in their fish when suddenly without any notice whatever, the wind veered around to the northwest, it began to snow and a howling gale set in. One dory was secured but the others were lost in the thick snowstorm.

Thick Snow.

So wild was the wind that it threw the King and Winge over so that she was down to her sheer pole. The snow was so thick that it was impossible to see more than about five feet. For three hours this continued and Captain J. Miller, who commands the fine little craft, gave up all hope of ever seeing his men again. At last the snow stopped, however, and the wind abated and there were the men all safe in their boats. They had fought the gale well, most of them throwing overboard their fish in order to lighten the boats, and heading the dories well into the wind and riding the immense breakers.

But their troubles were not all over. There was a tremendous sea and the men were becoming exhausted from the cold and exertion. Had they not been inured to the sailor life of the north they never could have stood it through.

Tore Hole in Side.

The first boat to be reached got her painter fouled in the propeller of the ship with the result that the dory was wrecked, the wheel tearing a hole in her side and making her useless. There was no time to attend to her for the other men were out.

Had to Swim.

Another boat had held on to her load of fish. This was hoisted

out, but when about to haul her aboard the sea hit her end and turned her bottom up throwing the two men into the water. Tom McHugh hung on to the boat's painter and was pulled aboard but the other man had to swim for it. The ropes were covered with ice and his hand slipped off when he grabbed it, but he kept up and at last a rope was put around his arm and he was hauled aboard in an exhausted condition.

Fingers Frozen.

The captain and men are all full of the wonderful escape. One of the boats almost filled with water three times but was baled out, and all this in a howling gale in the midst of a thick snowstorm and with ice covering the ropes and the sides of the dories. Several of the men got their fingers frozen, but they are not minding that as long as they saved their lives.

Independent Lay.

The King and Winge is the largest of the fishing boats plying in northern waters. She is owned by the National Independent Fisheries, Ltd., of Seattle, who have fished her on what is known as the "company lay" until this year. (Continued on Page Six.)



MAY IS SOONEST PEACE TREATY CAN BE READY FOR SIGNING BY NATIONS

President Wilson Leaving Europe For United States This Week, At End of First Stage of Conference.

Paris, Feb. 10.—The Peace Treaty will not be signed before the middle of May, according to present estimates of the progress of the Conference. President Wilson will leave European waters on Wednesday, after the first presidential foreign visit in the history of the United States. The departure of the President marks the completion of the first stage of the peace negotiations.

PRICE OF BREAD TAKES A TUMBLE

Toronto, February 10.—Bread has taken a second tumble in price within the last three days. It now can be bought for nine cents a loaf, or 12 tickets for \$1, which brings it down to 8½ cents, as compared with eleven cents charged last week for a pound and a half loaf. This is a reduction of about 22½ per cent.

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RAILWAYMEN ASKED TO CONSIDER DUTY AS CITIZENS OF STATE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Feb. 10.—At a big meeting of railwaymen held in Euston Theatre yesterday James Henry Thomas, Labor member of Parliament and secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, made a strong appeal to laborers to keep the labor movement on a constitutional basis.

Was it in the Union's powers, he said, to say to the state: "Unless you do this we will paralyze commerce." Workmen, however, Mr. Thomas added, had to consider that their duty to citizenship had a stronger claim than sectional interest and that they must always make their sectional claims consistent with their duty as citizens.

Tariff Controversy Very Important.

Developments in the tariff controversy are broadening the scope of interest and adding emphasis to the importance of immediate action at Ottawa, says the Financial Post. The demand that something be done is backed by an increasing volume of public opinion. The idea of the Government that the issue might be evaded during the coming session, that sleeping political canines might be left in repose during the reconstruction period, is proving untenable. The interests of the manufacturer, of the worker and of the farmer demand that the whole national policy in regard to revenues and protection be considered in relation to the problems to be solved and that the tariff be revised on a scientific basis.

While the stand of the manufacturers is one in which they are fully justified, it is, however, questionable if they have taken the best method of expressing that justification. There is an evident effort to convince the public that the maintenance of the tariff is in the interests of the public only. Why should they not argue straight from their shoulder that it is in their own interest—which everyone, of course, understands—and that their interests are also the interests of the public? If the tariff cannot be justified from this standpoint it cannot be justified from any standpoint.

If Not Justified, Should Be Changed.

The manufacturers should emphasize the important part they are playing in national development and national prosperity. They are building up business and industrial centres which provide employment for labor and markets for farm products, they are paying heavy taxes towards the expenses of the country, they are so treating raw materials that they reach the consumer in a state which means the highest margin of profit to Canada. If the protection which permits them to do this is not justified in actual benefits to the people then it is time for a change. But for forty years the people have shown by their votes, and Government leaders of both sides of politics have been convinced, that a protective policy is desirable.

What is more, the policy of protection has been responsible for the investment in industry of millions of the savings of the people. Today there are millions more available and American and British capital is also showing a willingness to come in. But industrial progress is held up by the conflicting interests and the present agitation. The Financial Post believes that it is the duty of Sir Thomas White, as Minister of Finance, to call together the various interests to discuss the whole matter, the outcome of which, we are convinced, would be the appointment of the commission of experts to represent industry, agriculture and labor, which we have so long advocated.

Reciprocity Best Policy.

The News does not favor the pulling down of all barriers against the rest of the world as yet. We do advocate, however, that the widest possible scheme of reciprocity with the United States shall be allowed. The people of the West have been too long exploited for the benefit of the manufacturers of the East. The open door to the south would prove the salvation of this country.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.
Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.
PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.
TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.
Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

NAVY LEAGUE WANTS FLEET FOR DOMINION

Large Sum to be Spent in Helping Sailors and Dependents Funds Permitting.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

Victoria, B. C., Feb. 10.—The Dominion Convention of the Navy League of Canada went on record that the Navy League of Canada is in favor of a naval policy for Canada which will have regard to the needs of the entire British Empire and in deciding upon such a policy the political exigencies should be disregarded and the opinion of the most eminent naval strategists alone considered. The fundamental idea shall be empire naval defence and that the fleet union may be either acquired or built and that the Dominion shall retain control of their ships and that there shall be complete standardization of the personnel, ships and equipment, and that the whole shall be of the best, and that in times of war all fleets shall be under one supreme command.

The sum of \$900,000 will be sent to England in connection with the work among sailors and their dependents. Grants will be made to dependents of seamen in Canada on the same basis as men in the Canadian Navy. The League will continue paying these until such time as the Merchant Seamen's Pension Act is enacted in Canada, funds permitting.

DORIES OF KING AND WINGE LOST IN A THICK SNOWSTORM

Now she is on the "independent lay" by which the owners get one-fifth of the entire catch and then the men share the rest after paying the operating expenses. Formerly she took her catch to Seattle or landed it at Juneau and had it forwarded by the line steamers to that port. Now she will sell her catch wherever is thought advisable and Captain Miller expects to be here often as he says this is the natural market for the fish.

Rescued Stefansson.

The King and Winge is the boat that rescued Stefansson in 1914 from Barren Island. She was then in command of Capt. Johnson and was on her first voyage. The boat has been shown in the movies all over the world and books have been written about her. She is larger than any other fishing boat in northern waters, her tonnage being 140 gross or 97 net. She carries eight dories and nineteen men.

On the trip from which she has just arrived she brought in nearly fifty thousand pounds of fish, but her capacity is something like 180,000 lbs. Her fish were not sold yesterday, but are expected to be taken today and she will then get away immediately for the fishing grounds.

Robert Rogers and Lt.-Col. A. G. Fonseca, therefore, be it unanimously resolved that we will kill it."

Comrade Loosley declared his intention of resigning forthwith the secretaryship of the League, of returning to each member their subscriptions and of destroying the membership roll.

The Veterans were warned to keep clear of politics and party politicians.
