## BRITISH PENETRATE GERMAN TRENCHES

### GERMANS CONTROLLED CONSTANTINE -- GERARD HAILED AS DOVE OF PEACE

#### BRITISH ENTER HUN TRENCHES ON WEST FRONT

Patrols Seized and Dug-outs Destroyed—Many Prisoners are Taken—French Airmen Very Busy.

(Special to The Daily News.)

British Front in France, Jan. 8. The British seized hostile patrols which attempted to raid their lines and raided the German positions in return. The British troops penetrated the enemy trench system and destroyed several dug-outs and captured many prisoners. Along various parts of the line the Germans sent out attacking forces but all were repelled with heavy losses.

#### French Air Gains.

Paris, January 8.—Along the French portion of the western front, our aviators bombarded the German aviation fields; railway stations, barracks, trenches and storehouses, doing considerable damage at various points.

#### Rome Conference Over.

Rome, Jan. 8.—The Entente conference here is completed and in honor of the occasion the Italian government declared Saturday a holiday.

#### Belgian Deportations.

Paris, Jan. 8.—Eminent French and Belgian officials have assembled here to protest against the distress arising from the deportation of Belgians to Germany. President Poincaré is represented by M. Alboit.

#### PREMIER BREWSTER LEAVES FOR OTTAWA

Victoria, January 5.—Premier Brewster left for Ottawa this evening to attend a conference with Sir Robert Borden and various provincial premiers with regard to economic war measures. Prof. Shortt, who has been in Victoria conferring with the cabinet in regard to the formation of a civil service commission, accompanied the Premier east. Hon. John Oliver is acting premier.

#### GOVERNMENT'S MANY LIFE-SAVING SCHEMES

Ottawa, January 2.—One by one the Borden government's schemes to postpone the day of judgment fade away and die. It is a foregone conclusion with the warmest friends of the party that when the country it goes up against defeat. Consequently there is always a plot afoot to keep it alive by artificial respiration or disguise it and pass it off as something else, or one way and another to give it a few months more of office. Its friends, the profiteers, would hate to see it go out before they have leeches the last dollar out of the war and the necessities of the people.

Lately there have been plots to change its name, call it a coalition or a national government, but leave it the same old two-and-sixpence—that is to say, a government by the interests and, therefore, against the interests of the ultimate consumer. The coalition, so far as one can gather from the vague data on hand, had as its object a seventy to thirty partnership, in which Sir Wilfrid Laurier and a humble minority would be allowed to read the newspapers at cabinet meetings, while the seventy per cent senior Tory partner did the business. Outside of that it was a plan to moderate the Borden government's doom by tempering its past with the Liberal party's future.

The coalition plan got short shrift from about seventy-five per cent of the Conservative newspapers. All the newspapers the Hon. Robert Rogers has a finger in were unanimously against it. The genial Bob seemed to think that the Borden government was bad enough and that a coalition would only make it worse by making it half as wise and twice as irritable. And there was something in that. The Borden government is in no position to divide its wisdom by two. Two into

Paris, Jan. 8.—M. Diomede, former Minister of Finance in the Greek government, declared today that Major Von Falkenhayn, one of the military attaches at the German Embassy at Athens, has directed the operations of the Greek General Staff since the commencement of the war. The ex-minister declares that King Constantine has 75,000 men immediately ready to fight against the Allies when instructions are issued from Germany.

#### BERLIN HAILS GERARD AS THE DOVE OF PEACE

Banquet Tendered American Representative on Returning to Berlin—Leak Denied at Washington.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, Jan. 8.—American Ambassador Gerard is hailed throughout Germany as the dove of peace. High German officials gave a banquet here on Saturday in honor of the American Ambassador and marking his return to Berlin from Washington.

Responding to an address, Mr. Gerard said that never since the beginning of the war have relations between Germany and the United States been so cordial as they are now. "I have brought back to Berlin the olive branch of peace from President Wilson and I am personally convinced that, while Germany's fate is directed by the present departmental representatives, relations between the two countries are running no risks of a rupture in their relationship."

ISLANDS NOTES

Dr. E. H. Holden arrived at Massett a short time ago and is in charge of the Massett hospital. He served with the British forces in Mesopotamia and on the western front.

Rev. A. E. Price succeeds Rev. W. Carey, as Anglican Missionary on the Queen Charlotte Islands. Rev. Carey is now at Houston, on the line of the G. T. P.

Mr. and Mrs. Carter, who resided on Queen Charlotte Islands for some years, left for Rivers Inlet on the last steamer. Mr. Carter is occupying a position in the fisheries service.

C. M. Wilson, formerly of Delkatta, is now a resident of Chicago, where he is engaged in a very interesting lawsuit over property. Mr. Wilson was one of the first residents of Prince Rupert, and is well known to many old timers.

SHIPMASTERS THANK MAYOR M'CAFFERY

At a well attended meeting of the Prince Rupert branch of the Vancouver Shipmasters' and Officers' Association, held in the association rooms on Friday evening, the following officers for the year were elected: Hon. President, Captain E. McCoskrie; Hon. Vice-President, Captain E. Gilmour; President, Capt. J. Mulligan; Vice-Pres., Capt. D. Candow; Secy.-Treas., Capt. J. McGee; Executive, Captains J. Erickson, H. Provost, C. Tikkas, E. Evendsen and J. Batt.

Amongst the various matters discussed at the meeting, and one which gave great satisfaction to all, was the fact that the Emerson Company has decided to erect both a sawmill and a shingle mill on the shores of Tuck's Inlet. This, it was felt, would be a benefit to the certified nautical profession resident in Prince Rupert.

The secretary was instructed to write to Mayor McCaffery and thank him for what he had done for the port and city of Prince Rupert during the year and the several members of his council who had assisted him in the same. During the year nine new members had been enrolled and one member had his name transferred from the head office of the association to Prince Rupert. The meeting closed with a vote of thanks to the secretary for the able manner in which he attended to the interests of the members and for the sound condition in which the association finds itself at the present time.

SLIGHT FIRE

The fire brigade was called out yesterday afternoon to the Norfolk Rooms where a mattress and some bedding had caught fire. The men threw the burning material out of the window and the trouble was soon over.

ATTENTION RATEPAYERS!

A bylaw to maintain a reserve to ensure prompt payment of instalments on our debt is to be voted on by you on the 11th January.

We submit the following reasons in favor of said bylaw:—

(1) The reserve fund has already been established this year, and has in practice been shown a great success.

(2) There always has been, and always will be, a shortage in collection of special rates for local improvement and other by-laws, which shortage has heretofore been made good from general revenue, but to do this the City has often been required to borrow from the bank, and always to place in the yearly estimates a sum to meet this shortage. With the reserve established we will neither have to borrow nor estimate.

(3) Instead of borrowing from the bank at six (6) per cent our reserve will receive the benefit of delinquent interest, and will pay to general fund six (6) per cent per annum on the whole amount of such reserve, and this will in fact reduce taxation to the extent of nearly Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00).

(4) The scheme has been heartily endorsed by Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor, General-Manager of the Bank of Montreal, also by the largest bond houses in Canada, as well as the Bond Dealers' Association of Canada.

(5) We believe that the establishment of this reserve will materially increase the selling price of any bonds we may hereafter issue, and will have a far-reaching effect in the general financing of the City in the future.

(6) The City Treasurer will be happy to show to any ratepayer detailed reports and full explanation of the whole matter, and also the letters of commendation received.

(7) Clearly remember not one dollar of this reserve will be raised by extra taxation.
