## WINNIPEG POLICE DISMISSED FOR INSUBORDINATION AND MISCONDUCT; CARS TO OPERATE

**Many Strikers Return to Work at Prairie Capital; Telegraphers Return to Their Jobs and City is Well Protected by Volunteer Police both Foot and Mounted.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Winnipeg, June 10.—The Winnipeg police force has been dismissed as a result of their attitude toward the strike. They were given an ultimatum yesterday that they would be dismissed at three o'clock, and this was followed by action on the part of the authorities. It is charged that the men refused to accept the ultimatum and by continuous acts of insubordination and misconduct made reorganization absolutely imperative.  
Any constables who are willing to sign the new agreement will be reinstated immediately. The police say they never supported the sympathetic strike and the issue is one of their own. Winnipeg is well protected by special mounted and foot police. It is expected that the street cars will be running tomorrow afternoon, according to information given out at the city hall and following last night's meeting of the city council.  
Many strikers are returning to work individually. Seventeen operators on the G. N. W. Telegraph system are back on their jobs.  
Moosejaw, June 10.—The Moose Jaw street car men struck yesterday for shorter hours and better pay. It is a local quarrel and the strike is sanctioned by the international union.

## COURT TO TRY THE WAR INSTIGATORS

## GENERAL STRIKE CALLED BY TRADES COUNCIL AT MEETING HELD LAST NIGHT

**SEVERAL UNIONS REFUSE TO COMPLY WITH ORDER; SEPARATION IN LABOR FOLD—THERE IS NO DISPUTE WITH EMPLOYERS HERE**

At a meeting held last evening, the Union men decided to call a general strike in Prince Rupert, commencing at 6 o'clock to-night. Of the unions involved the B. C. Loggers, the Longshoremen and the railway workers are already out and four unions, the Retail Clerks, Electrical Workers, Typographical Union and the Carpenters, have decided not to come out. Calculating from the details of the vote taken on Sunday, it will thus be seen that the general strike will bring out some two hundred more men.

There are several hundred other workmen in the city who do not belong to any union and it is not expected that they will be affected by the strike order.

R. T. J. Rose of the Trades and Labor Council, when giving out the information this morning, stated that this general strike was called in sympathy with the metal workers at Winnipeg, who were on strike for recognition of "collective bargaining" by the employers there. The men have no dispute with any of the employers in this city.

Mr. Rose was indignant with the four unions who, not having any grievance locally, would not come out on strike at the call of the strike committee. The case was not so bad against the Retail Clerks, whom he nicknamed the "Profiteers," because they had been against the strike from the beginning, but he expressed his dislike for the action of two of the other unions, who first had expressed themselves in favor of the strike, but when it was put up to them refused to come out. Mr. Rose was of the opinion that this action would cause a separation in the labor fold.

## FIVE UNIONS REFUSE TO OBEY STRIKE ORDER

**Engineers and Carpenters Met Last Night and Decided to Continue to Work.**

The engineers in the city met last evening and after discussing the strike situation decided that they would not be justified in coming out on strike on the call of the strike committee. According to their union rules a vote of their whole union would have to be taken before they could strike, with the permission of their international. This makes the fifth union whose members refuse to obey the orders of the local strike committee.

**Carpenters.**  
At a special meeting of the Carpenters, held in the Sons of Canada Hall last night, at which about fifty members were present, the following resolution passed unanimously: "That we do not participate in the sympathetic strike, but we give our financial assistance to the striking workers, and stand ready at any time, should further developments warrant, to lay down our tools also."  
The unions which will not strike are carpenters, engineers, retail clerks, electricians and typos.

## HUNGARY HAS MORE TROUBLE

**Revolt Against Bolshevik Regime in Western Part of Country.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Vienna, June 10.—A serious revolt against the Bolshevik regime started by a Hussar regiment is reported from western Hungary. Counter revolutionary movements are reported from other parts of the country by farmers and members of the working classes who refuse to recognize Bolshevism. The new Hungarian minister has opened negotiations with the Vienna Socialists regarding the transformation of the Buda Pesth Government.  
Stockholm, June 10.—Estonian forces clashed with the German Landwehr troops in the region of Riga where Lettish troops also have been in sections fighting with the Germans, according to an official statement issued at Estonian headquarters.

## MONEY COMING FOR SOLDIERS' HOUSING PLAN

**Agreement With the Provincial Government Sanctioned Last Night by City Council.**

At the meeting of the City Council last night the mayor and city clerk were authorized to sign the agreement with the provincial government under which the city gets \$50,000 of the Dominion Government grant towards improving housing.  
Under the plan returned soldiers get the first opportunity to secure the money, and already applications for more than the amount available have been received. It is expected that some of the cash will be available almost immediately even though the Dominion Government has not yet paid it over to the province.  
Under the scheme the principal and interest at 5 per cent. is guaranteed by the city with the exception of \$300 which is taken off the final payment in case of returned soldiers as a donation from the provincial government.

The city agrees to pay union wages on the work, and to insist that all contractors do the same; that returned soldiers be employed as far as possible; that the dwellings be insured and that no profits be made by the city but that one half of one per cent. be allowed for cost of administration.  
Those getting the money must reside in the houses for ten years or pass them over to other soldiers, but no one with an income over \$3,000 a year is eligible for a loan.  
Mayor McClymont said that no 25 foot lots should be used under this scheme. The soldiers seemed to wish for sites in Section 2 and in case the houses were built there arrangements for septic tanks would have to be made. They must decide whether the city would build the houses or advance the money to private parties. They might get another \$25,000 from the fund.

## WILL INVESTIGATE PRICES CHARGED BY THE MERCHANTS

Information has been given out locally that the government is entering upon a scheme whereby a survey of the profits obtained by retail merchants may be computed. This action has been undertaken owing to complaints laid at various times. Through the Retail Merchants' Association delegates will be appointed who will make inquiries for themselves as to the actual amount of money made in the turn over by the various storekeepers. The actual buying price will be obtained and compared with what is charged to the consumer and then the report forwarded to Ottawa.  
The delegates who have already been appointed here are J. G. Frizzell, T. McMeekin and E. R. Tabrum.

## SEVERE STEPS STOP AGITATORS

**C. C. Ballantyne in Speech Says Will Deal With Those Who Advocate Destruction of Authority.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Montreal, June 10.—Severe steps to put a stop to the activities of those who advocate the destruction of constituted authority and law and order are to be taken by the Federal Government, declared Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine and Fisheries and Naval Affairs, in addressing the Verdun Council of the Imperial Order of the Sons of the Empire at Verdun City Hall Saturday.  
The Government recognizes that the movement is very largely of a revolutionary character and must be suppressed.

## EXCEPTION TO WHITE BUDGET

**Opposition Asking for Free Trade on Food Products and Development of Resources**

**Committee Appointed by the City Council to Get Specific Information.**

The council was inclined to doubt the authenticity of the cases cited, but after some discussion the committee was appointed to secure specific information. The motion appointing them was moved by Alderman McMeekin and seconded by Alderman Currie.

## FISH SOLD AND SENT AWAY TO KETCHIKAN

A few boats arrived yesterday and sold their catches at the local exchange. The Reliance, 10,000 lbs. was bought by the Atlin Fisheries to be delivered at Ketchikan at 10.2 cents and 6 cents per pound. The Niagara, with 5,000 lbs. was bought by the Pacific Fisheries and also left for Ketchikan to unload there. The selling price was 10.1 and 6 cents. The Haysport with 18,000 lbs. arrived yesterday, but did not sell.  
Today's arrivals are the Gjoa, 14,000 lbs., the Satsuma 5,500 lbs., and the Norma with 4,000 pounds.  
Many of the boats which have been tied up lately on account of the strike are again being outfitted and are leaving for the banks. The fishermen are hopeful that they will be easily able to sell all the fish that can be brought in.

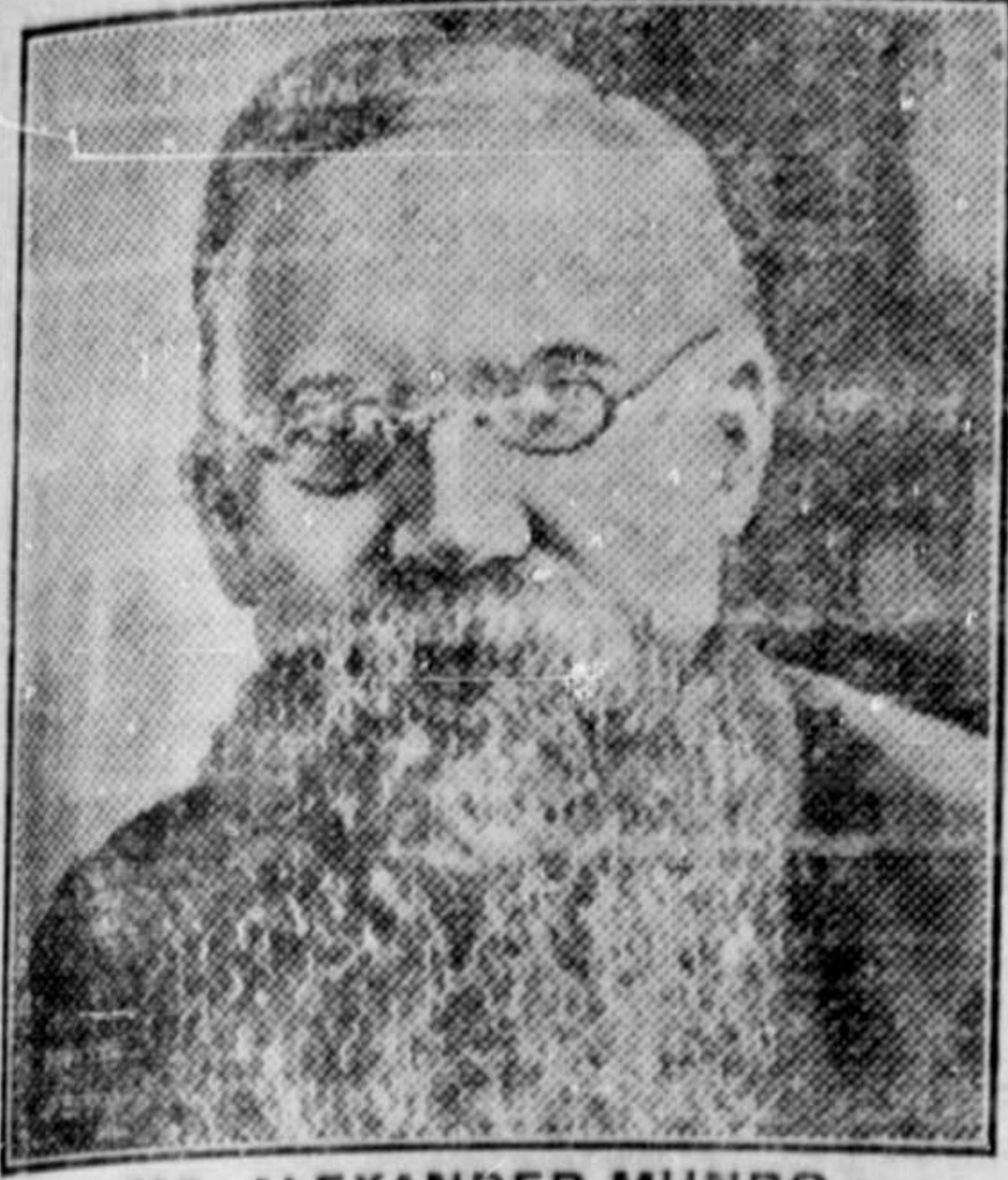

## MANY BUILDING; FAIRLY BUSY

Local Permits Amounted to \$47,200 for the Month—June Started.

There has been considerable activity in building during the past month and permits have been issued to the extent of \$47,200. Greater activity is expected during the month of June as the spell of fine weather will be a decided incentive to prospective owners. Then too, many have been held back by the extraordinary conditions in labor circles at the present time and have been unwilling to get started for fear operations should be compelled to cease on account of the lack of supplies, etc.

## SWIMMING CLUB GETS FURTHER DONATION

Sum of \$300 Additional Granted Them by the Council, Making \$600 in All.

On the recommendation of the Finance Committee it was decided by the City Council last night to grant another \$300 to the Swimming Club in addition to \$300 already given them. The provincial government is also giving \$300.

Alderman Rochester told the council that \$1,000 had already been spent and the bathing place had been much improved. The children had a place where they could bathe on the sand and there were numerous other improvements. He took great pleasure in moving that the report be adopted.

Alderman Kirkpatrick spoke of the great improvements that had been made and of the grand place the children now had in which to bathe.

## CITY WILL HAVE AN EARLY CLOSING BYLAW FOR DRINK VENDORS

At the meeting of the City Council last night it was decided to introduce a bylaw to control the hours of closing bars, pool-rooms, cabarets and other places where drinks are being sold.

The matter came up on a letter being read from the police commission asking that the hour of twelve be set for the closing of such places. Several aldermen thought eleven would be plenty late enough. It was finally decided to accede to the request to set a closing hour, but to deal with it in detail when the bylaw came up for consideration.

## NEW BOOK ON WAR BY CANADIAN WRITER

The John C. Winston Co., Ltd., of Toronto, announce the early publication of "Canada's Sons and Great Britain in the World War" by Colonel George G. Nasmith, C. M. G., M. A., Ph. D., D. Sc., who served with the Canadian Expeditionary Force in France and Belgium, with an introduction by General Sir Arthur Currie, Commander-in-Chief of the Canadian Corps. A great portion of the book is compiled from notes made on the battlefield by Col. Nasmith, and the descriptions of the various engagements, written by an eyewitness, have an intimate appeal that no amount of long distance reporting could convey.

He went overseas with the Canadian forces in the world war and was in the thick of the fighting in the first gas attack of the Germans at Ypres and in many subsequent engagements. It was he who first reported the nature of the poison gas used by the Germans in 1915, and suggested the use of the protective masks. He first suggested the use of chlorine for purifying water for an army in the field (1909). The mobile filter now used by the British army is the result of his suggestions. Besides many technical papers, Colonel Nasmith published "On the Fringe of the Great Fight" in 1918. This new book, which the Toronto publishers have scheduled, will cover the entire scope of the war. It is the purpose of the publishers to copy-right and manufacture the book in Canada.
