# BAKER AND SOWASH SENTENCED TO HANG

## AMUNDSEN PARTY ARRIVED BACK IN ONE PLANE BUT MISSED NORTH POLE

### Amundsen Party Arrived Back to Spitzbergen in One Plane from Within 100 Miles of Pole

Landed among heavy ice which believed responsible for loss of machine; were short of fuel

OSLO, June 19.—The entire Amundsen North Pole expedition arrived safe at Spitzbergen yesterday in one plane and was picked up by a fishing boat and conveyed to King's Bay. It is reported that the expedition reached within 100 miles of the pole but was forced to return owing to depletion of their fuel supply after landing amidst heavy ice, which is believed to have been responsible for the loss of one of the machines. It is stated that the explorer is likely to make a further attempt to reach the goal shortly.

### AIRPLANE TO TAKE RELIEF TO INDIANS

WORK COMMENCED ON LA ROSE TUNNEL AT ALICE ARM TUESDAY

Mine Partly Owned in Prince Rupert is Being Developed

Governor Parish of Alaska Authorizes Flight from Fairbanks

JUNEAU, June 19.—Governor Parish has authorized an airplane flight with a physician and supplies from Fairbanks to Koyukuk River region where numerous Indians are reported to be affected by a mysterious epidemic, which has resulted in unnumbered deaths.

### SEATTLE MAN AT ALICE ARM

H. J. Bowyer is Examining Key-stone Property With View to Possible Purchase

(Special to Daily News) ALICE ARM, June 19.—H. J. Bowyer of Seattle arrived in camp Monday, and is now making an examination of the Keystone property. Mr. Bowyer who is a mining man of wide experience, and at present operating in Stevens County, Washington, is looking over the property with a view to its probable purchase and operation. He is returning to Seattle this week, but expects to pay another visit here in about two weeks' time to look over the camp as a whole.

### BAKER CALLED GIVE EVIDENCE

VICTORIA PURCHASES AN ATHLETIC PARK

Case Against Cowper Held Over For Another Week Until Friday

VANCOUVER, June 19.—Following an intimation that F. L. Baker will be called as a witness in the preliminary hearing of the defamatory libel charge against J. S. Cowper, the hearing was adjourned this morning until next Friday at the request of Gordon Wismer, Cowper's counsel, who declared he had expected the article complained of to be introduced as evidence but did not expect Baker to be called. Under the circumstances he wished time to prepare his cross-examination.

HURRICANE SWEPT SOVIET PROVINCE

MOSCOW, June 19.—There were 28 persons killed and 130 houses destroyed by a hurricane which swept over the province of Altai.

### RICHARD SMITH DIES IN SOUTH

Son of Mary Ellen Developed Pleurisy and Passed Away in Hospital

VANCOUVER, June 19.—Richard W. Smith, aged 39, telegraph operator, son of Mary Ellen Smith, M.L.A., died yesterday at the General Hospital while surgeons were endeavoring to drain fluid from his lungs. He suffered from weak heart, said to have been brought on by living in the high altitude of Hazelton. When he arrived at Vancouver Sunday he had developed pleurisy after battling with a severe cold several weeks.

The late Mr. Smith had a stroke on the Yukon trail and was brought out by a dog team. After recovering to some extent at the Hazelton hospital he went to Prince George to join his wife and two children who live there. Besides the widow and children, Mr. Smith leaves a sister, Mrs. John Carr of Victoria, and four brothers.

### UNPRECEDENTED DAY FOR NEWS

Many Big Stories Came to a Head Yesterday With Machine-Like Rapidity

(Special to Daily News) VANCOUVER, June 19.—Newspapermen and the police had a day of tremendous activity yesterday unprecedented in years. News developed with machine-like rapidity from local sources and by telegraph. Emergency phones were kept steadily busy all morning and, just as the situation seemed to be easing off, a general fire alarm sounded from False Creek and fire engines, bound for the Arbutnott mill which was in flames, roared past the newspaper offices adding to the noise and bustle.

"Twelve Named in Abduction of Wong," "La Follette Dead," "Amundsen Returns Safely to Spitzbergen," "Canon Ball Baker and Sowash Take Stand in Fight for Liberty," "175 Warrants Issued in Sydney Strike," were only a few of the heavy headlines handled.


Hurstwood Won Hardwick Stakes at Ascot While Compiler Won Wokingham Stakes

### RIOTERS KILLED IN CHILIAN UPRISING

Government Using Artillery to Expel Rebels From Positions

SANTIAGO, Chile, June 19.—Fifty-nine rioters were killed in a recent uprising in the northern provinces of Chile, according to latest estimates. The number injured is unknown. The government is using artillery to expel rioters from their positions.

Ernest Stacey was sentenced to thirty days in jail by Magistrate McGlymont this morning. He was found guilty of the theft of a rain coat from the Loggers Club. The coat was the property of Harris Levine.

VICTORIA, June 19.—Owen B. Baker and Harry Sowash were both found guilty this morning of the murder of Captain W. J. Gillis and his son near Sidney Island on September 15 last and were sentenced to be hanged on September 4.

Following the submission of evidence on both sides and the addresses of counsel, Mr. Justice Morrison, the presiding judge, summed up and the jury retired this morning at 11:15. An hour later they returned with the verdict of "guilty."

### Railway Freight Rates Bill Passes Commons and Goes to Senate

Gives Railway Commissioners free hand in revising rates except eastbound on flour and grain

OTTAWA, June 19.—A bill amending the Railway Act so as to clear the way for equalization of freight rates throughout the Dominion by the Board of Railway Commissioners, passed the House of Commons last night.

No division was taken on the third reading. Two amendments both from the Progressive Party while the bill was in committee stage, met defeat.

The bill now goes to the Senate.

### NOMINATIONS NOVA SCOTIA

Ninety-Six Nominated in Blue-nose Province and Elections June 25.

HALIFAX, June 19.—Nova Scotia electors nominated 96 candidates to contest the provincial elections on June 25 when the Government of the province which has been Liberal for 43 years, will go to the people for a fresh mandate after concluding the statutory term of five years in office.

There seems to be some doubt as to whether the present Government will be returned. The coal strike is causing a good deal of unrest and there has been dissatisfaction with the Government expressed in Halifax and other centres.

Halifax is to be well contested there being six Liberal candidates, six Conservatives and six labor offering themselves. Labor candidates are also contesting Cape Breton centre and Cape Breton East.

### AUSTRALIAN TRADE TREATY

Legislation Giving Effect to Agreement Will be Passed This Session

OTTAWA, June 19.—A bill to give effect to a trade agreement between Canada and Australia will be considered by parliament before adjournment. At the close of the session yesterday Premier Mackenzie King told the House of Commons that an agreement had been successfully concluded and that a resolution would be introduced today embodying the terms of the agreement.

## BIG CATHOLIC PARTY VISITS PRINCE RUPERT

Princess Louise Here With 150  
'Frisco K.C.'s and  
Ladies

Included among the 290 tourist passengers who were here this morning on their way to Alaska aboard the C.P.R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Arthur Slater, were 150 members of the San Francisco Council, Knights of Columbus, and their ladies. A program of entertainment had been arranged by the local council for the visitors but the fact that the steamer was in port earlier than had been expected from 6.30 to 8.30 — together with the unfavorable weather made it necessary to eliminate this. However, the party was met by A. Q. Gillies, grand knight, and other members of the local council and the opportunity was afforded some of the visitors to see around the city.

The party will be back here next Wednesday afternoon and arrangements are being made for a baseball game to take place then between a team of members of the excursion and a local picked team. Charles Graham, owner of the Seals, San Francisco professional baseball team, who is one of the party, is organizing the visiting team and Fred Henning will get up the Prince Rupert team.

At the head of the San Francisco party is David F. Supple, supreme warden of the Knights of Columbus in California, and the trip is in charge of H. T. Dupont, as chairman of the voyage. Wedding Took Place Last Evening of Miss Tyra Linnea Anderson and John Bergman


