

## Rebellion Breaks Out In Many Parts of Germany

Has Been Taken by Armed Workmen; Three Warships Surrender at Hamburg; Ruhr District is Aflame with Bolshevism.

### They Are Preparing to Advance Their Armies

German Army of 100,000 Men with 77 Guns and Armed Automobiles Proclaim a Soviet Republic.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 LIN, March 20.—Essen surrendered this afternoon to workmen after violent fighting in which it is estimated persons were killed. It is reported that communists have occupied five railroad stations to the east of Berlin and that troops are being rushed to the scene in armored cars. The city of Berlin has not yet succeeded in emerging from the chaos which it was thrown when Dr. Wolfgang Kapp and his cabinet in their coup d'etat took over the Government a week ago. Although most of the army which formed the backbone of the revolt have left the city, disorders continued locally during Thursday and Friday. Many additional persons were both in killed and injured during this week.

## LORD MAYOR OF CORK IS SHOT DEAD

Murderer Escaped in Automobile After Escaping From Residence.

 LONDON, March 20.—The Lord Mayor of Cork was shot at one o'clock this morning. The revolver fired was by a masked person, whose identity is unknown. They entered his residence and after firing the shot escaped in an automobile.

## PEACE TREATY WITH HUNGARY

It is "Sentence of Death," Says Count Apponyi.

 PARIS, March 20.—The Hungarian Peace Treaty is a "sentence of death," Count Albert Apponyi, head of the Hungarian Peace Commission, declared. In analyzing the treaty, he declares that it takes away from Hungary two-thirds of her territory and population and gives them what is left, the defence of the frontiers, which are everywhere open to hostile invasion.

## DANIEL LEACHY MAKES APPEAL

R. L. Maitland Makes Application for Writ of Certiorari for His Release.

Magistrate McMordie has received notice that Daniel Leachy, through his solicitor, R. L. Maitland, of the law firm of Maitland & Maitland of Vancouver, is making appeal for a writ of certiorari setting aside the conviction of Magistrate McMordie sending Daniel Leachy to Okalla Farm for nine months for offering to sell and exposing for sale intoxicating liquor. Leachy was one of the accused in the local Duff sensation and pleaded not guilty, putting up a plausible story in the police court of his ignorance of the proceedings.

The appeal is based on the following reasons:  
 1. That no legal evidence was adduced as to the guilt of the accused.  
 2. That there was no evidence that the liquor alleged to have been sold was intoxicating.  
 3. That the information laid included the charge of two offences.  
 4. That the alleged liquor sale did not take place in the city of Prince Rupert and, therefore, Magistrate McMordie had no jurisdiction.  
 5. That there was no evidence to support the conviction and, therefore, the magistrate had no jurisdiction.  
 6. And such other grounds as appeared on the face of the proceedings.

## A POLICEMAN SHOT HIMSELF

Thomas H. Sharpe, C. P. R. Constable at Vancouver, put Bullet Through Own Head.

 VANCOUVER, March 20.—With no motive for the rash act other than possible ill health, the lifeless body of Thomas H. Sharpe, one of the best C. P. R. officers on the force, was found with a gaping bullet wound in his head in his room at Clifton House, on Granville St., at 7:15 Thursday night. It is believed that the fatal shot, which was discharged from a 38 calibre revolver, was fired early in the day, the body showing that death had taken place some hours previous to the time when it was found. Sharpe was one of the veteran members of the C. P. R. police.

## The German Militarists Wished to Prepare For Great War of Revenge

(Special to the Daily News via Government Telegraphs.)  
 BERNE, March 19.—Chancellor Bauer caused a sensation at yesterday's sitting of the German National Assembly at Stuttgart when he revealed the conditions presented to the Ebert Government by Dr. Wolfgang von Kapp and General von Luettwitz, when they entered Berlin last Saturday morning. "They wished to prepare for a war of revenge which would have plunged the country into another cataclysm," cried the chancellor. "Pitiless punishment must come to these offenders."

Philip Schiedemann, leader of the Majority Socialists; Herr Burjage, of the Centre Party; Herr Kron, of the German Nationalists, and Herr Becker of the People's party are unanimous in condemnation of the attempted revolution, according to advices received here.

LONDON, March 20.—Hundreds of persons have been killed in the mining districts of Germany in collisions between miners and troops, it is declared in reports from Germany received at Copenhagen the Central News' correspondent in that city telegraphs.

A telegram received from a big town in Germany states that fighting is proceeding in nearly all the thickly populated areas where soldiers and workers are opposed.

## MISSION TO U.S. IS COMPLETED

De Valera Intimates He Secured Reservation to Peace Treaty.

NEW YORK, Mar. 20.—Eamonn de Valera, "president of the Republic of Ireland," announced last night that the adoption by the United States of a reservation to the Peace Treaty approving the principle of self determination for the Irish people has fulfilled his mission to this country.

## U.S. Senate Rejects The Peace Treaty

Failed to Secure Two-Thirds Majority by Seven Votes; Twenty Democrats Voted Against.

 WASHINGTON, March 20.—The treaty of Versailles failed of ratification for the fourth time tonight and then the Senate voted to send it back to President Wilson with a notification that it has finally refused to advise and consent to its ratification. On the decisive roll call the vote stood 49 for its ratification, 35 against, the opposition numbering in its ranks 20 Democrats who were unwilling to see the treaty go through with the Republican reservations objected to by the president. Three Democrat irreconcilables, twelve Republicans and 21 Democrats voted for the ratification, but the division failed by seven votes of providing the two-thirds requisite to ratify.

## CANNOT EXAMINE MR. JUSTICE ORDE

## LOW PRICE FOR CANNED FISH

H. O. Bell-Irving Warns Packers That British Government Control Prices of Product.

 VANCOUVER, March 20.—H. O. Bell-Irving has cabled from England a warning to packers advising curtailment of packing cheaper grades of salmon during the coming season. He says that the Government control of prices in the United Kingdom has set a low figure on canned fish and that B. C. products cannot compete with the huge accumulation of war stocks carried in Great Britain. W. D. Burlis, secretary of the B. C. Canners Association, in an interview here, said he considered the low price fixed by the English Board of Control was only temporary and a palliative measure to propitiate the popular outcry against the living costs and that the normal condition will be regained when the English stocks have been all allocated.

## LUMBER PRICES TO REMAIN HIGH

Dominion Government can see no Way of Interfering to Bring Prices Down.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 OTTAWA, March 19.—That the Dominion Government, while anxious to seriously consider any suggestion that might help the situation, is practically helpless in the matter of bringing prices of lumber down, was indicated yesterday afternoon, following a conference between a score or more of western members and Sir George E. Foster, acting prime minister.

Several suggestions of very minor importance were discussed but none of them are believed feasible, the only one that might have been taken up was that the Government assist the smaller mills to increase their output, but it was pointed out that all such mills by this time might have laid out their logging plans and would not be in a position to increase their capacity at least for another twelve months.

TORONTO, March 20.—Prominent lumber men state that lumber prices, even if the cost of production were to decrease at once, would not come down until 1922.

## WALKER THREW FRISCO SWEDE

Wrestled for 81 Minutes at Vancouver—Olsen Secured One Fall.

 VANCOUVER, March 20.—Geo. Walker, the noted wrestler, obtained further honors when last evening he forced Charles Olsen, the big Swede of San Francisco, to concede him the victory after 81 minutes and 45 seconds of gruelling work on the mat. The bout closed when Walker caught Olsen with a flying mare which landed the visitor heavily on his head. The force was such that Olsen was unable to continue and he conceded the bout to the Canadian light heavyweight champion. Although he lost out in the end, Olsen also obtained a fall, this being by means of a painful combination of double leg scissors wrist and hammerlock, which he obtained at the end of 43 minutes of stiff wrestling.

**Sport Briefs**

Having nothing to say, as usual, about fight matters, Tex Rickard, rumored dark horse in the race after the Dempsey-Carpenter fight, is back in New York after a western trip and a jaunt to the Pacific coast. "Yes, I did see Kearns and Dempsey, but it was a social call I made. My trip to California was a pleasure trip to the west," he said. Gossip in New York has it that Rickard has the fight cinched but is withholding announcement until the charges against Dempsey have been heard.

The flu has just about ceased to be a topic of interest, having apparently abated after having done its worst, but, with its passing, another, though less serious, epidemic has started to take hold on a very large percentage of the local population. It is an epidemic which recurs every spring and, as soon as the grip of winter begins to loosen and old King Sol begins to reassert his power, this epidemic begins to get in its work, and those who are seized with it take it regularly every year while every year it may safely be said that some new subjects come under its power. As hinted, the epidemic is not often very dangerous and seldom fatal, it is merely the spring fishing fever, which attacks the devotees of the rod in most cases just as soon as the sunny weather, such as Prince Rupertites have been enjoying recently, revivifies the germ in their blood which impels them to go a-fishing.

Although the trout fishermen have to wait, if they would remain law abiding citizens, until March 26 before going in pursuit of their favorite quarry, the salmon fishermen can sally forth at any time of the year. Sport may vary in its excellence but there is always a good chance of a spring salmon in the winter months and for fighting qualities they can beat anything caught in the summer or autumn. Steel-head fishing goes out next Thursday and the following Saturday should see a great exodus of the numerous followers of the immortal Izaak being them from town to the nearby streams and lakes where the spotted beauties are to be found. Judging from the very moderate rainfall of the past winter and the small snow-fall in the hills, the streams are likely to be in good condition for fly fishing rather earlier than usual.

"Babe" Ruth has challenged the supremacy of Ty Cobb as baseball's biggest drawing card this year and it will be interesting to see how Cobb responds. There was a day when Cobb might have met the challenge with an unstopable rush, but Ty is no longer a budding youth. This will mark his fifteenth campaign and fifteen seasons at the pace he started setting back in 1905 and 1906 are quite a spell. Cobb is eight or nine years older than Ruth and those eight or nine years are no light barriers. Ruth starts the season as baseball's leading card. Only his inability to slather the ball out of the lot will remove his tilted crown.

Jack Johnson's surrender to the United States authorities terminates a long period of wandering through foreign climes. The former, heavyweight champion, convicted under the Mann Act, slipped out of Chicago nearly seven years ago, forfeiting his bail and escaping to Canada. His travels brought him through most of the European and Latin American countries. He appeared in vaudeville in English music halls, fought bulls in Spain and Mexico, lost the heavyweight title to Jess Willard in Havana and took part in over a hundred fights. When the war broke out he and his white wife were in Moscow but got out on the last train leaving for the west. They passed through Poland and Germany and reached Paris. Later, Johnson went to England and then to Buenos Ayres. From there he went to Spain where he spent some time before going to Mexico where he decided to give himself up.
