

## ASK FOR HUNGARIAN KING

### COUNT CAROLYI WOULD MAKE SEPARATE PEACE WITH ALLIES

#### ALLIES MAY ACCEPT TERMS LAID DOWN BY PRESIDENT WILSON WITH OPTION OF EXTENDING THEIR SCOPE

Supreme War Council Already Had Matter Under Consideration; Terms of Armistice Would Mean Virtual Surrender by Germany; May Not Be Much Delay.

Washington, October 25.—Germany's plea for an armistice and peace now is before the Allied Governments, which are to determine whether they are disposed to accept President Wilson's principles of settlement to which Germany subscribes and in accord with the United States ask their military advisers and those of America to prepare terms for an armistice which virtually will mean surrender by Germany.

No one here today would undertake to forecast the probable time when the Allies will arrive at a decision on Germany's plea. It is known, however, that the Supreme War Council has already given the matter their most earnest consideration.

Certain utterances of Entente statesmen and of inspired official organs have led to the surmise here that, while accepting the terms laid down by President Wilson, there may be a disposition to inject new matters to meet the individual demand of certain nations and to propose new points based upon ever shifting conditions.

It is believed, however, that if such should prove the case, new points would probably be dealt with in connection with final peace negotiations and need not delay consideration of the form of the armistice.

#### DOLLY VARDEN RAILWAY BEING WELL PLASTERED

Nearly One Hundred Workmen Putting in Claims to Amount of \$75,000 or Thereabouts.

#### WORK SHUT DOWN AND MANY MEN STRANDED

Workmen are plastering the Dolly Varden Railway with liens. Nearly one hundred men have arrived here within the last few days from Alice Arm as a result of the closing down of work on the Dolly Varden line and they have arrived without their money which was not forthcoming and which they are now taking steps to recover.

The contract for the construction of the Dolly Varden Railway was let to the Taylor Engineering Company of Vancouver. Within the last three weeks the company has had difficulty in procuring payment on account of the contract, and checks and time checks to workmen to the amount of about \$75,000 have not been met. The men who have arrived here seem to be in doubt as to whether the construction was for the Dolly Varden Mines Co., or the Granby Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. They state that Granby officials have taken an active interest in the carrying on of the work. Rumor has it that the original intention was that the Granby Company should take over the Dolly Varden Railway and mines but that the deal has fallen through, temporarily at least, and in the meantime some of the men find themselves absolutely stranded.

Many of the men who were away out on the work held their checks until the work was closed, expecting to cash in when they left. The result is that they have in all anywhere from five hundred to a thousand unpaid checks on hand.

The men have applied to the Provincial Government for assistance to compel payment and it is understood that active steps are being taken to see the men paid. In the meantime to protect their own interests the men are filing liens on the railway.

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#### FOUR CASUALTIES

Few New Cases Admitted to Borden St. Hospital Since Yesterday Morning.

Since yesterday at noon, there have been several new cases of influenza and pneumonia admitted to the Borden Street Emergency Hospital. These, however, have mostly been received in time and a good recovery is to be expected.

During the same period there have been four deaths, of cases which were well advanced when brought to the hospital. The names of the four deceased are Johanson, Sjoberg, Luchivich and Carlson. All the other patients there were progressing favorably this morning.

### SUCCESS OF BRITISH EFFORT NEAR VALENCIENNES WILL ENDANGER THE GERMAN OISE-SERRE FRONT LINE

Washington, October 25.—The successful British operations on the Valenciennes front took on new importance to officers here today, in the light of the present situation.

Marshal Haig's armies are striking heavily at parts of the front German line of resistance and progress already has been made, it is thought by officers here. This will insure that the German retirement, both in Belgium and in France will have to be resumed without delay.

South of the new British wedge the French are keeping up a continuous pressure against the enemy along the Oise-Serre front, making it difficult for the German commanders to disengage their forces from this most exposed sector of the line. The success of the British effort, however, which is now assured, would compel a precipitate evacuation of the Oise-Serre salient, it is believed, for the communication system of that front would be threatened from the flank and rear.

### TWO IMPORTANT ADVANCES OF BRITISH AND FRENCH; 7,000 PRISONERS, 100 GUNS

#### ENEMY OVERCOME BETWEEN SAMBRE CANAL AND RIVER SCHELDT—FRENCH CROSS OISE RIVER OPPOSITE LANGCHAMPS AND MOVE FORWARD BETWEEN OISE AND SERRE

Paris, October 25.—French troops have crossed the Oise canal opposite Langchamps, according to the War Office announcement last night. They have also made an important advance between the Oise and Serre rivers.

London, October 25.—British troops have overcome the enemy along the whole front between the Sambre Canal and the Scheldt River and the advance is being continued, Field Marshal Haig reports from headquarters tonight. Since Wednesday the British have taken 7,000 prisoners and more than 100 guns.

With the American Army northwest of Verdun, October 25.—In a local attack east of the River Meuse the Americans advanced about half a mile on a front of about a mile and a half and as a result Bois Dully, De Poppy and Bois de Belly are within the American lines, as also is part of Bois de Wairville and Pylon Etraye.

### COUNT KAROLYI DEMANDS A SEPARATE PEACE AND KING OF HUNGARY IN BUDA PESTH

#### PREMIER WEKERLE AMID GREAT EXCITEMENT IN THE UNTERHAUS OPPOSES MOVE OF OPPOSITION AND SAYS CAN BE NO TALK OF SEPARATE PEACE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Amsterdam, October 25.—Advices received from Buda Pesth, says that in Unterhaus Wednesday, Count Karolyi, in moving a resolution in view of the independence of Hungary, demanded the resignation of the Wekerle cabinet and the formation of a coalition ministry.

The resolution also called for the conclusion of a separate peace, the dissolution of the alliance with Germany, the announcement to Germany of the independence of the South Slavonians and the proclamation of the choosing of a Hungarian king to reside in Buda Pesth.

Count Karolyi declared that if the demands were resisted he would take means to secure their realization.

Amid great excitement Dr. Wekerle, the premier, warmly replied that he would oppose by every means Count Karolyi's state of revolution and added that there could be no talk of a separate peace.

#### LEAVES LONG FAMILY AND FOLLOWS HUSBAND

Mrs. George Church Died Early This Morning at General Hospital—Formerly Lived at Port Essington.

The death took place this morning at the General Hospital of Mrs. George Church, of 131 Ninth Ave., East. She entered the hospital yesterday.

Mrs. Church was born in Victoria 39 years ago and lived with her husband and family for a long time at Port Essington and Haysport. She leaves a large family and one boy nineteen years of age is in the hospital from influenza. Mrs. Church's husband died a few days ago in the Borden Street Emergency Hospital, and was a fireman on the "Kelley." He originally came from Nova Scotia.

#### HUNS SOLICITOUS FOR WORKS OF ART

Take Them Away Carefully in Order to Return Them Undamaged to Owners After War.

London, October 25.—Valuable works of art belonging to museums and private owners in the regions of Cambrai, Douai and Valenciennes now in the hands of the Germans, will be returned undamaged to the owners after the war.

This announcement was made in Germany by the Government, according to a wireless message received here.

The works of art have, under the orders of the Supreme Command, been sent to a place of safety from destruction by bombardment, the message adds.

#### NOMINATIONS ARE MADE AT RED DEER

Nominations in the Red Deer bye-election to the legislature took place Monday. The candidates nominated were J. J. Gaetz, farmer, Liberal, and F. W. Galbraith, journalist, Unionist-Independent. There were about 150 names on Mr. Gaetz' nomination paper and about 25 on Mr. Galbraith's.

**Being Trained By Suffering Reverse.**

Perhaps it is well that the American troops should know something of what it means to suffer reverses. Apparently they met with stubborn resistance to the north of Verdun and had to retire before superior forces although they have come back with fine elasticity and are just as fresh and ready as ever.

There were days when the British and French and Belgians and Italians had their bad times. That was the sort of thing that showed the calibre of the men. They held on with splendid tenacity and were always ready to strike when the opportunity occurred.

Since that they have had their opportunities and have risen to the occasion. The help of the American troops has been splendid and together they have been able to do effective work.

**President Wilson's Clever Message.**

There can be no peace negotiations with the people who disregard treaties and speak of the record of solemn obligations as scraps of paper. President Wilson spoke in the only language which the Huns can understand when he announced that already two million Americans had left the shores of this continent to take part in the big fight. No other message would have any effect.

President Wilson has a happy way of doing things. Had Roosevelt been sending that message he would have included it as a threat in the official communication to the Kaiser. Wilson does it in a more effective manner. He ignores the Kaiser, in so far as the threat is concerned, but the announcement being made coincidental with the message to the Huns had the effect without the form of a threat. More than that it was shorn of all bombast and must have gone right home. There was not even a suggestion of what would follow. It was a statement of fact at an opportune moment.

**Boys are Still Over There Fighting.**

When the fine young Canadians went away there was great enthusiasm and everyone was anxious to show appreciation of their loyalty by sending them parcels of tobacco, candies and other suitable supplies. It is over four years since they went away. Some have "gone west," while others have taken their places. Enthusiasm has waned somewhat and there is not that intense eagerness to remember the boys "over there."

Christmas will be here soon and the men will look for their mail and wonder if the people at home have forgotten them. Last year they did that and the parcels arrived weeks after they were due. To make sure of the parcels getting there on time they should be sent early. The postmaster suggests on or before November 9, but even earlier than that is proper if the men are far removed from the centre of things.

Messages from the front seem to intimate that the boys fancy the people at home are not backing them up as they should. This coming Christmas will be a good time to rid their minds of any such idea. Prince Rupert will do great things when it comes to buying Victory Bonds and this smaller thing must not be neglected.

**Team Work Needed for Few Days**

While the people of Prince Rupert, in common with the people in almost every part of the world, are being sorely tried just now it must not be forgotten that the men at the front have been in much more difficult situations than confront us and they have come through with colors flying.

With courage we must all face the issue and keep cheerful. By helping our neighbors we can best help ourselves. Team work and community work is the order of the day.

It must not be forgotten that in spite of our difficulties here it will be necessary for us to continue our preparations for providing money for the men at the front. Victory bonds will be on sale commencing October 28 and we shall all have to do our best when the sale opens, even though we have needs of our own to supply.



## \$1,200,000,000 IN WAR ORDERS HAVE BEEN PLACED IN CANADA

VICTORY LOAN HAS MADE POSSIBLE A GREAT STIMULUS TO INDUSTRY—HALF BILLION MORE ORDERS FOR NEXT YEAR THROUGH THE MUNITIONS BOARD

The Imperial Munitions Board has placed \$1,200,000,000 of war orders in Canada to date. As a result of this huge outlay of money business activity throughout the Dominion has reached a climax during the year 1918, and the whole people are getting the benefit. To enable the Board to place such a volume of business it is receiving advances from the Dominion Treasury amounting to \$25,000,000 a month, and this has been possible because the people subscribed ample funds for all war purposes through the 1917 Victory Loan.

For the coming year orders amounting to \$500,000,000 are to be placed. They will go to manufacturers and sundry other interests in the Dominion and will have to be financed to a considerable extent out of the proceeds of the forthcoming Victory Loan.

### Over 300,000 Employed.

A few figures will help to an understanding of the manifold activities of the Imperial Munitions Board. From 250,000 to 300,000 persons are at present engaged on war contracts, while another 50,000 are handling supplies. The Board has placed orders with over 1,000 contractors and at present 400 manufacturers are in contractual relations with the Board. Over 60 million shells have been produced, as well as 60 million copper bands, over 45 million cartridge cases, 30 million fuses, 65 million pounds of powder and 50 million pounds of high explosives. Over 1,800,000 tons of steel have been used in the production of war materials, of which 1,450,000 tons have been produced in Canada.

### Air Force Expenditures.

The Board has built, equipped and operated seven national plants on which over \$15,000,000 has been spent. It has built up an airplane manufacturing industry in Canada. Nearly \$6,000,000 has been spent on buildings for the Royal Air Force in Canada. The monthly expenditure for equipment and maintenance amounts to \$1,360,000, and the expense of the aviation service, outside of rations and medical services, amounts to \$30,000,000 up to the present. The Toronto plant has built many airplanes and the output of high grade engines is expected to reach hundreds during the next nine months.

The Board has established immense plants in British Columbia to procure spruce and fir for the airplane industry both at home and in Great Britain and has contracted for 250,000,000 feet of those woods. In shipbuilding it has given an impetus that means much to the future of Canada. Ninety ships are being constructed for the Board at a value of \$66,000,000, and the steel industry is being augmented to provide for the needs of the shipyards.

### Manufacturers on War Basis.

Eighty-five per cent of the manufacturers are operating on a war basis. Canada's trade returns show the stupendous strides our business activities have taken since the war began, largely through the ability of the Government to finance some of the purchases of the Imperial Government. In 1913 our exports of manufactures amounted to \$43,692,708; last year they jumped to \$636,000,000.

This is but an outline of the work of the Imperial Munitions Board. The work will go on if we are able to make advances as we have in the past.

## ALBERTA TRAVELLERS MUST WEAR MASKS

The provincial minister of health of Alberta, Hon. A. G. MacKay, has signed an order which will greatly widen the regulations with regard to the fighting of influenza in that province.

The order providing that all persons travelling on street cars or trains in the province will be compelled to wear masks as described by the provincial board of health. These may be obtained from the railways for five cents each.

London, October 24.—The British Wireless Press says that the entire Ukrainian Ministry has resigned.

## Just Camouflage

Women have attained to the peak of their ambition. They now have the right to take part in the proceedings of the mother of parliaments. Some old fashioned women will still prefer to be mothers of men.

With two million bright young Germans urging them on, the Germans should be easily persuaded to return to their own country.

Nothing but surrender for the Kaiser, but better terms for the people if they will cast off the Hohenzollern yoke. That was the message which the Kaiser did not like yesterday. The difficulty with Wilson is that he has no respect for the Lord's Anointed.

The press reports yesterday stated that women might sit in parliament but made no mention of their being allowed to speak in parliament. Possibly the scribe at the other end of the wire was a married man.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with the first, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Insurable areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSHIP PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

**SPEED OF GAME BIRDS IN FLYING**

**Ducks and Geese Are Fastest With Canvasback Leading and Teal Next.**

The speed of game birds is a subject which will always provoke interest and animated discussion among those sportsmen who are devotees of the scattergun, and the various estimates of a body of gunners are apt to vary very greatly. The man who fires a charge of number sevens or sixes behind the retreating form of an old cock blue grouse, as he darts like a bullet from the top of a rock bluff, to disappear in the depths of the tall timbers below, is willing to swear that the old hooter was doing nothing less than 100 miles an hour, and the man who distributes ounce after ounce of lead more or less in the direction of twisting and turning snipe as they flit in zig-zag career over a marsh, would find it hard to believe that the snipe is the slower of the birds at which he tries his skill.

**Very Deceptive.**

There is no doubt that the speed of birds is very deceptive, more especially that of the larger kinds, which appear to be moving at a much slower rate than they really are, owing to their size. The following table of relative speeds has been prepared by the statistics crank and may throw light on some of those misses which the gunner finds it hard to explain. It will be noted that among the birds listed the snipe is given the slowest speed, while the old honker, who appears to be travelling so leisurely on those all too rare occasions when he by some miscalculation comes within range of the sportsman's gun, looking as big as a house and impossible to miss, is usually moving so very much faster than he appears to be that the charge of shot, which is blamed for not penetrating his dense plumage, is probably penetrating the atmosphere some distance in the rear of the grand old bird.

**Ducks.**

The canvasback is given pride of place as the speediest traveller and, curiously enough, the mallard, ruffed grouse and the quail are bracketed equal in point of ability to hasten out of range.

It may be said that, if ducks are scared, they are able to reach their maximum speed at will, and this sprinting flight is usually what the gunner has to make allowance for. On the other hand, many wild fowl are jumped and killed while hovering over decoys and moving slowly, and birds like snipe and quail are often shot before they have attained full speed. Here is the table of comparative speeds alluded to:



J. E. Umbach, surveyor-general for the Provincial Government, sailed last evening for Victoria, after visiting the land settlement areas in the Bulkley Valley.

Pat Daly, of Stewart, who has been in town for the last few days, sailed last evening for Vancouver. He is one of the old timers of the north country.

Black Jack McDonnell's Hotel at New Hazelton is being used as an emergency hospital to take care of the flu cases. Black Jack himself is one of the patients.

Miss Agnes Grant, of the Forestry Department here, returned to the city last evening from her home at Hazelton, where she has been spending the last few days.

Many people were pleased to see Ben Self again on the street yesterday after a somewhat severe attack of influenza. J. C. Gavigan was also out again attending to business.

The S. S. Prince Rupert which went north to Skagway to fetch a number of passengers who were stranded on their way out from Dawson has reached Vancouver and is expected to arrive here tomorrow as usual.

On account of the ravages of the influenza epidemic, the Seal Cove sawmill has been obliged to close down. Not sufficient men are available to carry on, and until they get better and are fit for work again, the mill will stay closed.

The Dominion Government has decided not to postpone the Victory Loan campaign which will commence on Tuesday of next week. Little is being done locally however on account of the influenza epidemic. By next week things may look different.

It having come to the knowledge of the city health department that many people have been ill and unable to call in friends or neighbors it is requested that anyone knowing of such cases will at once notify the police or the City Hall authorities so that investigation may be made. Even rumors will be investigated.

There is also one other child. As in another similar case influenza was well developed before she entered the hospital on October 23.
