Peace Terms Not Yet Signed

PLENIPOTENTIARIES RETURN TO GERMANY WITHOUT SIGNING UP

GERMANS NOT READY TO ACCEPT TERMS AND GET UNTIL SUNDAY FOR REPLY

Washington, Nov. 8.—Information reaching Washington through diplomatic channels today indicate that if German plenipotentiaries are not ready to accept immediately the surer terms offered, Marshal Foch will give them only until Sunday to sign, no effort at compromise or evasion from the Germans to be tolerated, they must take what the Allies and the United States ask for and lay down their arms or there will be the interruption of the great offensive which is destroying the German military machine.

London, Nov. 8.—The German proposal for an immediate national suspension of hostilities has been rejected by Marshal

FRENCH MAKE FURTHER BIG ADVANCES

Move Forward From Bethel, Captured Yesterday, and Take Liart, An Important Railway Junction.

Paris, Nov. 8.—The French troops resumed their advance along the whole front this morning, according to the reports issued by the War Office here. The French units have reached the important railroad junction of Liart, about twenty miles north of Bethel. They are now about fifty miles due east of St. Quentin, and are advancing rapidly, driving the German forces precipitately before them.

This swift advance eastwards and northwards is placing the whole of the German line to the north in jeopardy.

WELL KNOWN CITY EMPLOYEE DIES FROM INFLUENZA

Jack Morrison Was Well Known and Efficient Craftsman and His Passing Will Be Great Loss.

While the city was celebrating the signing of the armistice which brings about peace with Germany, last night one of the citizens was putting up his last great fight for life and was vanquished. Jack Morrison, known by everyone, respected and trusted by the whole community, passed away as a result of an attack of pneumonia following influenza. He was taken ill about a week ago and taken to the hospital, but on Monday he was removed to Mrs. Stephens' home, where he succumbed last night.

Mr. Morrison came here seven or eight years ago and in 1912 took a position in the telephone department and has been connected with it ever since as wire chief. Only at the last meeting of the Council the chairman of the Public Works Committee referred to the excellent work that had been done by Mr. Morrison and that the success of the utility was largely due to his efforts. This morning Alderman Dybbavn referred again to the loss the city suffered and stated that it would be impossible to fill the position as Morrison had done.

In the Tsimpean Lodge of the Masonic craft and as a member of the St. Andrew's Society and of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council the late civic employee was well known and highly valued as a member. He was one of those thorough workmen who do credit to the whole craft and on that account particularly his loss is to be deplored.

Mr. Morrison was born in Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia, about 39 years ago. His mother and sisters are at present living in Seattle and his brother Kenneth is on his way here to attend the funeral and is expected tomorrow morning.

REVOLT IN GERMANY IS SPREADING; PRACTICALLY ALL FLEET DISAFFECTED

London, November 8.—Practically all the German fleet has revolted, according to a despatch from The Hague. The rebellion in other parts of the country is spreading and it looks as if the whole of Germany will very soon be seething with revolt.

At Hamburg the soldiers have taken possession of the city. Amsterdam, Nov. 8.—The port of Hamburg is completely in the hands of revolutionists. London hears the cities of Bremen, Schwerin and Tilsit have joined the German revolt. Prince Henry of Prussia was pursued and fired on by marines when he left Kiel in an automobile carrying the red flag.

Copenhagen reports the greater part of the German navy with red flags hoisted, has left the harbor. Kiel is in possession of mutinous sailors. There are no guards on the German-Danish frontier.

London, Nov. 7.—Virtually all the German fleet has mutinied, says a Hague despatch. The men are complete masters at Kiel, Wilhelmshaven, Heligoland and Cuxhaven. The Kiel workers have joined the navy in the general strike.

DEVELOPING JEDWAY MINE

Machinery Going Over to Producers Mine Where 250-Foot Tunnel Will Be Driven.

The development of the mines on Gresham Island is likely to be of great importance to the city. Just now a shipment of machinery is being made to the Producers Mine at Jedway. It is in the city today and a compressing plant over the mine on the next boat. A power is being installed in the mine to reduce the cost of operation. A ten-inch water pipe will be laid to the mine. A 48-in. Kincaid waterwheel, similar to the ones handled by the Prince Rupert Engineering & Construction Co. of this city. This is the first of a number of other developments to be made in the area.

Mr. Cole has chosen in preference to all others. It is expected that the mine will be in operation in Vancouver.

Mr. Buckingham, who has been in the hospital here suffering from a broken hip since last year, is to have charge of the mine. He is an experienced manager and is connected with the mine through his company, which is at Jedway now working about fifteen men.

It is expected that the mine will be in operation in the near future. As the labor situation begins to clear following the ending of the war, considerable activity may be expected in that neighborhood.

WHAT CAN TAKE PLACE OF WAR?

Archbishop Du Vernet Asks for General Reconstruction in Social, Religious and Industrial World.

The following letter was received this morning from Archbishop Du Vernet:

Sir,—With the coming of peace we need to discover the moral equivalent of war. For over four years the war has furnished us with a cause larger than our selfish interests to which we have willingly devoted ourselves in a loyal spirit and in a practical manner, each doing something to further the great end. This has brought a certain amount of unity of purpose into all our lives and bound us together both as individuals and also as an empire and even as an alliance of many nations.

What in peace can take the place of this great unifying cause? What is to be the moral equivalent of war? Speaking ideally, it is the cause of righteousness founded upon the principle of mutual service.

Speaking practically, it is the cause of reconstruction in our economic and industrial world, especially in the way of bringing about a better relationship between capital and labor, the relationship of co-partnership in work and profit, and the granting as a right to every worker, the opportunity to live a clean and human life.

Reconstruction in the social and religious world, the bringing about of more true fellowship between all classes in the community, the inspiring of more loyalty to every cause which helps to bind us together in mutual service, the creation of a league of nations to maintain the peace of the world, the revival of a less selfish and more brotherly type of religion in our midst, a more earnest recognition of God as the Father of us all and the Spirit of Christ as the spirit of self-sacrifice for the good of others, and a practical drawing of the Churches together as one inspiring body.

In a word—the establishing upon earth of the Kingdom of Righteousness.

This is a cause—large enough to lift us out of our selfish interests—grand enough to evoke our heartfelt loyalty—wide enough to enlist all classes and nations—and high enough to raise humanity to the Throne of God.

It now appears that the announcement was premature or that the censor was suppressing what has really transpired. It is said that the threatened revolution in Germany will have to be handled with great care, may be the cause of the news from the armistice conference being withheld.

DAWN OF A NEW POLITICAL ERA SAYS RIGHT REV. BISHOP BUNOZ

"This is a day of exultation for us all. The flash that has brought us the glad tidings of the defeat of militarism, of the removal from our eyes of the ghastly spectre of war and of the declaration of a glorious peace has filled our hearts to the brim with unspeakable joy. We are entitled to every bit of it.

"This is a day of thanksgiving to God who has given victory to those who fought for the triumph of justice. And after this we must remember the brave soldiers who have given their lives for the freedom of their country. Their blood has not been shed in vain. Besides the first fruits of victory, which we enjoy now and we owe to them, their sublime sacrifice will remain for generations an inspiration of unselfish devotion to the welfare of the country for which they have died.

Which celebrate today something more than a common victory, we hail the dawn of a new political era, an era pregnant with golden potentialities both social and international. Their realization demand the good will and intelligent co-operation of all. The terrible ordeal we have just gone through must result in some permanent betterment of the human race."

PRINCE RUPERT RUSHES PAST HALF WAY MARK

Now Has \$166,700 Subscribed for District Towards the \$300,000 Needed to Complete Quota.

Yesterday it was prophesied that Prince Rupert would pass the half way mark of their quota today. They have done better. The total amount raised in the district up to last night was \$166,700 and there is great work going on today that should bring the totals to the \$200,000 mark or thereabouts. It is expected that the news of the great and victorious close of the war will loosen up some of the purse strings of those who have so far kept them tight. It makes it certain that this will be the last loan of the kind and therefore the last opportunity to get government securities on such favorable terms.

Port Simpson reports that they will increase their amount to \$5,000 before they finish. Messrs. Bainter and Walker are at Georgetown today making a canvass, and the work is going on well generally.

A wire received this morning from John Nelson of Vancouver, chairman of the Press Committee, emphasizes the fact that for the welfare of the Dominion it is necessary to have the loan fully subscribed. The boys have to be brought home and kept while overseas and it would be a shame to stint them in any good thing after the gallant work they have done.

NEW REGISTRAR GENERAL

The resignation of J. C. Gwynn, Registrar General of Titles, is announced. It is understood that Gwynn has accepted the position of liquidator for the Dominion Trust Co. Frank James Staepoole of Victoria, formerly of Nelson, is to be appointed Gwynn's successor.

NO OFFICIAL NEWS OF PEACE

Washington Reports That Up to 2 O'clock This Morning no Word Had Been Received.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, Nov. 8.—(8 a.m.) Other than that arrangements had been made to receive the German plenipotentiaries on the Allies' side of the French lines between 8 and 10 o'clock last night, no other official word has come through regarding the expected signing of the armistice.

At 2 a.m. Washington officials of the State and War Departments who were keeping all night vigil, still were without information indicating that German envoys had signed the peace terms.

MUCH IMPROVED

The situation at Anyox in connection with the epidemic of influenza is improving from day to day. There are very few new cases being reported now, and it seems that the upper hand has been obtained over the disease. To date there have been altogether forty-eight deaths from influenza and its accompanying developments.

One doctor and two nurses have been able to be spared from Anyox and have gone to Stewart to relieve the situation there. They left on the 5th of November, and their help would be very welcome.

Yesterday many women sat down and wept when they heard the news of the signing of the armistice. They did not all cry for joy. Some wept because in the getting of the peace there had been so many fine young lives snuffed out. Few people but took some time to realize exactly what was meant by the news. For so long the war had been with us that to take it away seemed like taking something from our lives which please heaven will never return.

There is today a feeling of relief at the thought that all the fighting is over and the splendid men who have fought for us are to return. When they come back they will receive a hearty welcome.

**Loan Must Be
 Fully Subscribed.**

In spite of the fact that the war is over there is much to be done and money is still needed. As a thank offering everyone should make an effort to purchase all the bonds they can. The money will all be needed.

Financial men who profess to know, declare that the price of money will drop in the near future. Interest rates will come down very considerably, and then it will be found that the people who have bought the last Victory Loan bonds will be making money. They will sell well above par on the stock market and will be a good investment. If there is no feeling of thankfulness nor of loyalty there at any rate will be a desire to get a good investment. That it will be, and for that reason the financial man will buy all he can. It was as an investment that a Winnipeg merchant purchased three million dollars' worth a few days ago and the life insurance company did the same. There will be no income tax to pay on the interest and that means a great deal.

**Public Service
 Aim in Business.**

It is noticeable how many visitors who have the business instinct look with favor on the prospects for Prince Rupert. They say that the time is not far distant when the city will have ten or fifteen thousand inhabitants and when that time comes everyone knows that she will carry herself forward. Boosting will be needed. The building up must be gradual. We cannot jump into prosperity all at once. Every town has its dull times and its season of prosperity. We are on the wave which is carrying us forward and with a unity of purpose on the part of the citizens we can reach a point where the going will be easier.

Public service is necessary in any city. Here in Prince Rupert report has it that there has not been quite so much effort to give real service as to grab all that is possible while the going is good. A business is not built up that way. The method to be adopted is to make every effort to serve the public, having that in mind all the time rather than the making of big profits. That is good business. That is the doctrine which the Rotary Club seeks to instil into its members and it works. It is not simply an ideal. It is practical business.

**Housing Conditions
 Should Be the Best.**

The influenza epidemic has drawn attention to the housing conditions in some parts of the city. They have not always been of the best. It is not knocking the city to say that they are decidedly bad in some quarters. That is part of the history of every new town. The way to improve is to have a rigid inspection and to see that the old shacks which are not improved and kept up to date are pulled down. In Victoria and Vancouver they are continually cleaning up. Every few months the City Council condemns certain buildings and they have to be destroyed. In their places spring up clean and sanitary places that are a credit to the city. The work is done gradually and systematically, beginning with the worst and moving steadily up. Something of that sort might well be done here. We cannot afford to allow people to live in insanitary surroundings because they become a menace to the rest of the community.

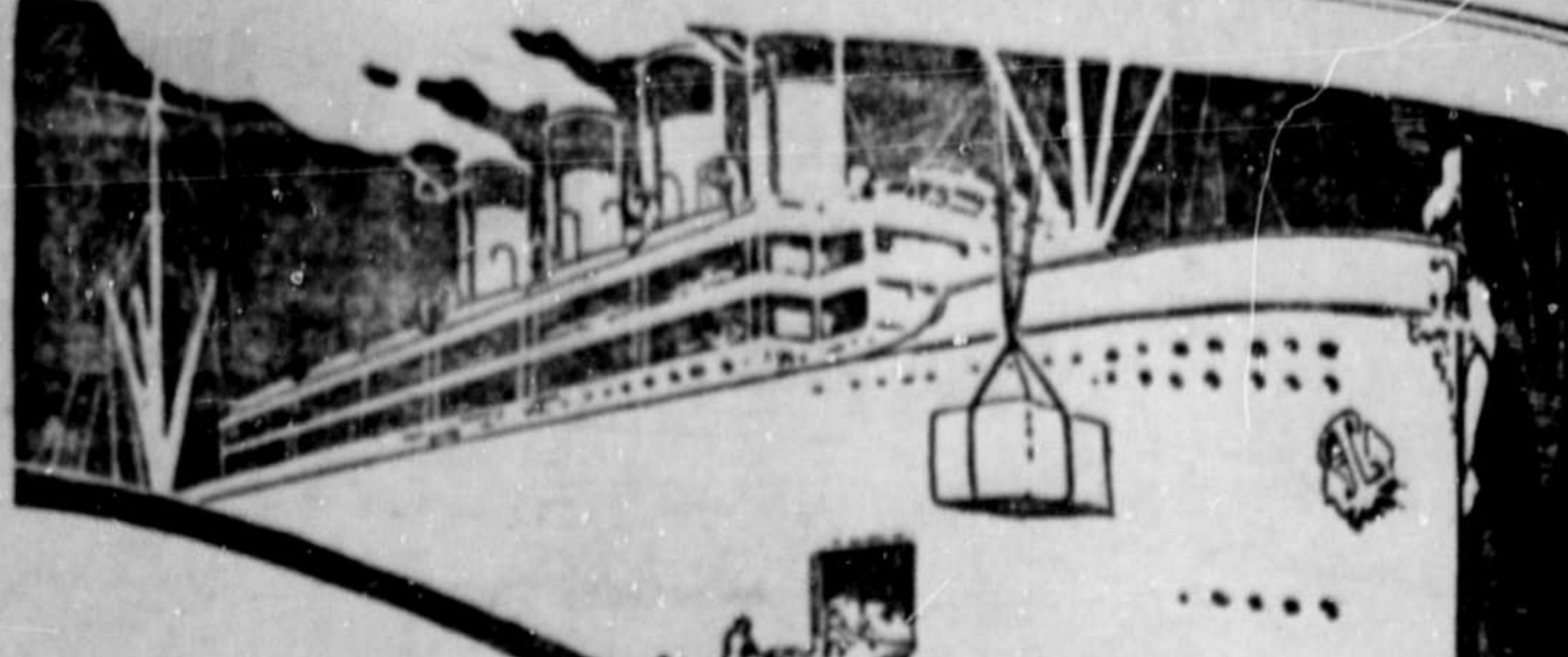

NOTICE

Military Service Act, 1917.

EMPLOYMENT OF MEN IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

The following Regulations, recently approved by the Governor General in Council, impose strict obligations upon every employer TO ASSURE HIMSELF THAT EACH OF HIS EMPLOYEES OF MILITARY AGE AND DESCRIPTION IS IN POSSESSION OF DOCUMENTS PROVING THAT HE IS NOT IN ANY WAY IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

An employer who is charged with having a defaulter in his employment must be able to prove THAT THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE EMPLOYEE IN QUESTION WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION at the time when the employee was taken into his employment, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction that the man was not in default under the Military Service Act. It should be clearly understood that the Canadian Registration Certificates given on June 22, 1918, at the time of general registration, in no way define the status of a man under the Military Service Act.

REGULATIONS.

"106. Every person who employs or retains in his service any man who has deserted or is absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force, or who is in default in the performance of any obligation or requirement for reporting or for military service, imposed upon him by the Act or Regulations, or any proclamation thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by a penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars, and of not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or by both such imprisonment and fine, unless such person prove that he made due inquiry and that THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR THE MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE MAN SO EMPLOYED OR RETAINED IN HIS SERVICE WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction by such inquiry and papers that the man was not a deserter or absent from the force without leave, or in default in respect of any of the

obligations or requirements aforesaid."

"106A. Every person who HARBOURS OR CONCEALS OR IN ANY WAY ASSISTS ANY MAN WHO IS A DESERTER OR ABSENT WITHOUT LEAVE FROM THE CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, or who is in default in the performance of any obligation or requirement for reporting or for military service imposed upon him by the Act or Regulations or any proclamation thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence punishable upon summary conviction by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by a penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars and of not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or by both such imprisonment and fine, unless such person prove that he was not aware and had no reasonable ground to suspect that the man so harboured, concealed, or assisted was a deserter or absent from the forces without leave or in default in respect of any of the obligations or requirements aforesaid."

BOOKLET TO DEAL WITH THE INTERIOR

Preparations Being Made to Open Lands For Settlement at Telkwa and Vanderhoof.

The Land Settlement Board is preparing to issue a descriptive pamphlet in connection with Land Settlement Areas No. 1 and 2, situated at Telkwa and Vanderhoof. And in a very short time thereafter such units of the land in question as are available for immediate occupation will be thrown open for settlement.

To deal with the necessary formality and at a time to be appointed in due course a representative of the Board will be located at Telkwa and Vanderhoof. It will be his duty to conduct prospective settlers over the lands and to accept applications.

To clear up any misunderstanding as to the functions of the Board it is intended to explain in the booklet in question that it does not administer the unalienated Crown lands of the province, such resting entirely with the Department of Lands, and those wishing information about pre-emptions or other Crown lands should address their inquiries to that department.

In an effort to create conditions that will facilitate the profitable occupation of the land, the Board is giving special attention to the settlement of unoccupied Crown-granted lands situated conveniently to transportation and markets.

Made possible by the amending legislation of last session, these lands are being gradually acquired by the Board and offered for sale to bona fide agricultural settlers on easy terms of payment and on reasonable conditions of occupation, improvement and cultivation. Proper qualifications and a willingness to assume the responsibilities of Canadian citizenship are, of course, required with all applications. Returned soldiers buying land from the Land Settlement Board, whether previously resident in British Columbia or not, are, however, entitled to make application to the Soldier Settlement Board of Canada for a loan under the provisions of the Soldiers' Settlement Act.

LEGISLATURE MAY MEET IN JANUARY

Premier Announces That Legislation Will Be Ready for Opening By That Time.

According to present tentative arrangement and the desire of Premier Oliver and the other members of his cabinet, the Legislature will be called together for the 1919 session as near as possible to the middle of January.

While no definite date can be announced, Mr. Oliver states that it would be advisable for all persons and public bodies in the province who may be desirous of making presentations to the Government involving legislation, to make them at the earliest possible moment so that such subject matter may be fully discussed in proper time.

It is the intention of the Cabinet to have as much as possible of the new legislation ready well before the House assembles, the course determined upon by the Premier towards the end of the 1918 session when bills—quite unavoidably delayed—came to the Legislative Chamber thick and fast.

The Premier has a distinct aversion to rush legislation, and in order to avoid it he urges prompt presentation of all non-executive matters which may entail legislative enactment.

MUST GET PERMISSION TO GO THROUGH STATES

Montreal, Nov. 7.—Under order issued by Secretary of State at Washington, effective November 11, 1918, all persons going from Canada to foreign destinations by way of the United States seaports must procure permission for embarking before leaving Canada, it is announced by the railways.

"Shipment of practically 4,500,000 feet of spruce and 1,500,000 feet of fir, making a total of 6,000,000 feet during the four weeks ending Sept. 28, was a notable performance."

Imperial Munitions Board, under whose direction this work is being done, is receiving advances of \$25,000,000 a month, made possible largely by the Victory Loan.

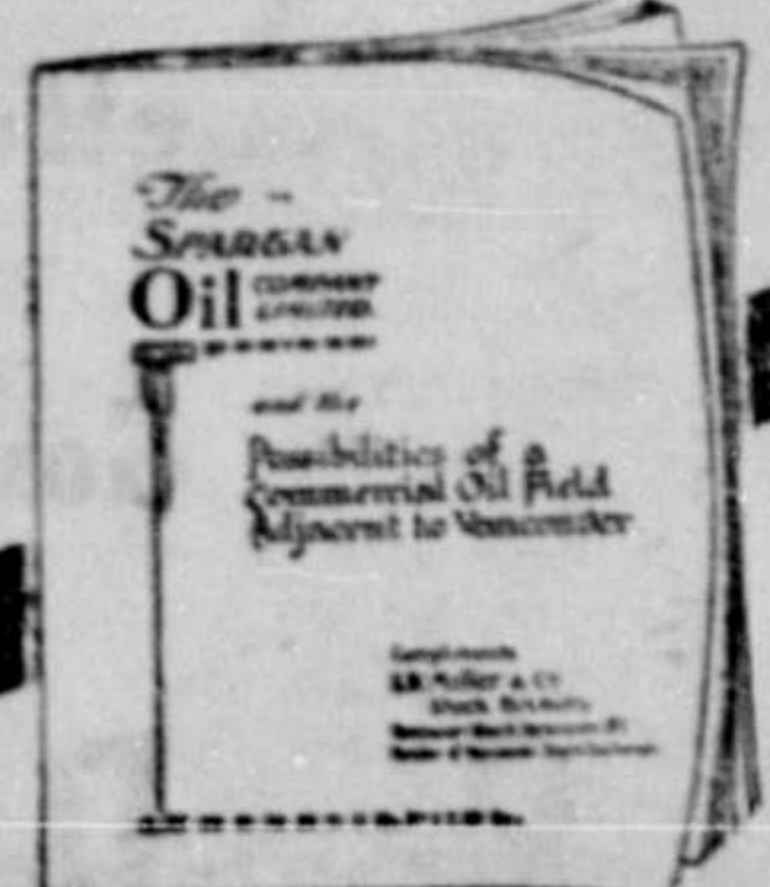

DEMONSTRATION TO CELEBRATE NEWS OF PEACE

Procession Through Streets With Effigy of Kaiser Hanging By the Neck.

It was a great impromptu celebration yesterday afternoon when the whole city turned out to show their appreciation of the good news carried by the wire to the effect that Germany had capitulated. It was a big demonstration although the joy was somewhat restrained on account of the sad circumstances which had darkened the lives of a good many recently. There was also the memory of those who had gone overseas never to return, which curbed somewhat the joy of the occasion.

The celebration formed on Third Avenue and was led by the returned soldiers who were cheered as they marched. The automobiles followed, gay with bunting, and especially with the Union Jack which was flying everywhere.

From the rear of one of the cars was an effigy of the Kaiser hanging by the neck. On reaching the front of the Prince Rupert Hotel the effigy was hanged to the telephone pole and set on fire and burned amid cheers.

From the balcony of the hotel short addresses were given by the Mayor, Bishop Bunoz, Rev. Canon Rix, Rev. Dr. Grant and Rev. W. S. A. Crux, all of whom spoke of the joy of the occasion, of the sacrifices which had been made and of the splendid work of the soldiers who went overseas, with especial mention of those from Prince Rupert.

The doxology and the national anthem was sung and cheers were given for Lloyd George and President Wilson after which the gathering dispersed.

WORLD'S TONNAGE IS INCREASING

London, Nov. 7.—The Admiralty announces that the output of world tonnage in the last quarter exceeded the losses from all causes by nearly half a million gross tons.

The United Kingdom built new shipping to the amount of 411,395 tons and the other allies and neutrals 972,745 tons.

The tonnage of merchant vessels completed in the United Kingdom and entered into service in October was 136,100.

ORDER-IN-COUNCIL IS PASSED RE WAR BONUS FOR CIVIL SERVANTS

Not Yet Signed by Governor-General, and Full Terms or Order Not Yet Made Public.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—The Cabinet Council has passed an order-in-council respecting war bonus for civil servants, but what the terms of the order are and the amount granted will not be announced until after it has been approved by the Governor-General. It is generally regarded here as unlikely that an order-in-council will grant the full bonus of \$350 to all. Most probably the bonus will be on a sliding scale, with the maximum bonus to those with dependants and getting the smallest salary. One report has it that the maximum will be \$250, which will go to married men with dependants getting less than \$1,800 a year. For this there is no official confirmation.

IMMENSE BOOTY IS TAKEN BY ITALY IN LAST GREAT FIGHT

Italian Army Headquarters.—The value of the material captured in the last great victory over Austria is estimated will reach five billion dollars. The booty includes 200,000 horses and 6,000 guns. By a rough count it is estimated that about a million Austrian prisoners are now in the hands of the Italians.

INFLUENZA UNCHECKED IN CITY OF EDMONTON

Arrivals from Edmonton on the train last night brought word that on Monday the influenza was still unchecked in that city. The mayor had just issued a statement saying that there was no lessening in the severity of the attack. During Sunday and Monday there were 194 new cases reported, against 201 for the corresponding days of the week before. From these figures it is clear that, so far as Edmonton is concerned, there is no let up. What is true of Edmonton is said to be also true of other towns in Alberta.

PRESENT TO U.S.

London, Nov. 7.—In order to show appreciation of the part the United States has taken in the war, a mission is now on its way to Washington bearing gifts for President Wilson, the American Congress and the City of New York. These consist of rare and original codices of Christopher Columbus, Amerigo Vespucci and Giovanni de Verrazano, early discoverers and explorers of North America.

INFLUENZA REPORTS

Winnipeg, Nov. 7.—The influenza is interfering with shipping on the Great Lakes owing to announcements by the crews that many ships were victims of the disease. In Eastern Canada the same meetings is being gradually raised.

Toronto.—The worst is over in this city and things are fast assuming a normal condition.

YOUNG HERO DIES

Winnipeg, Nov. 7.—Lieut. Alan McLeod, V. C., Manitoba's idolized young hero, died last night of influenza. Only 19 years of age he was the youngest V. C. on record. He won the decoration by performing marvellous feats in the air when his aeroplane was falling.

The White Lunch has been reopened for business.

O. Besner was among the passengers sailing for Vancouver last evening.

S. Bishoprick, of the Seal Cove sawmill, sailed last evening for Vancouver.

Mr. and Mrs. E. R. McCormick of Queen Charlotte City left town last evening for Vancouver.

Miss Alice Moncoeur left last evening for Vancouver on a short vacation to recuperate after her recent illness.

Horace J. Bradbury was among the passengers on board the Prince George last evening sailing for Vancouver.

Hal Peck, who was called hither by the serious illness of his son Lorne, returned last evening to Vancouver.

J. W. and J. E. Stewart, of Stewart, left last evening for Victoria after spending the summer at the Portland Canal city.

W. H. Smith, of the Canadian Explosives, Ltd., sailed last evening for Victoria, where Mrs. Smith preceded him several weeks ago.

J. A. W. Bell, of the Emerisan Lumber Co., who has been in town for the past week or two, sailed again last evening for Vancouver.

Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Maguire and their daughter, Mrs. D. B. Morkill, arrived in the city last evening from Hazelton, and are making their home here.

The body of John K. Muir of Hazelton arrived in town last evening and was shipped to Nanaimo for interment. The deceased was operator of the government telegraphs in the interior.

W. C. C. Orchard has received reassuring news of his family who are all sick in Edmonton with influenza. His son Fred is doing well now, and Mrs. and Miss Orchard will be around again soon. Fred Orchard is specialty agent in Edmonton for the firm of W. H. Malkin & Co., Vancouver.

The condition of the patients at the Borden Street Hospital continues to be satisfactory. One was discharged yesterday and many more will be ready for going home tomorrow. By the beginning of the week, it is expected that there will be but one or two of the more serious cases left.

This morning a Hazelton Indian, who had been working on the Kaien section, was brought into the Salvation Army barracks suffering from influenza. All the other patients there have been discharged and had it not been for this case arising, the citadel would have been closed as a hospital today.

The remains of the three-year-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Taper, of Pacific, were brought to town on last night's train for burial. The funeral will take place tomorrow from the chapel of the B. C. Undertakers, and the services will be conducted by the Rev. Canon Rix. Mr. Taper is locomotive foreman at Pacific.

Provincial Constable Logan has gone to Alice Arm to investigate the theft of quantities of provisions belonging to the Taylor Engineering Co., who were building the railroad there. They had it practically completed when they were compelled to assign, and the men quit work. Large quantities of foodstuffs had been left at the various camps along the line, and no one is in charge, the camps being deserted. Large quantities of flour, etc., and other perishable commodities are in danger of being destroyed for lack of proper protection from the elements and from marauding wolves, etc. The company have been communicated with in this respect.

PRINCE GEORGE

The influenza at this point has abated considerably but there are still a number of cases serious. Several members of the city staff who have been laid up are back at work, but there have been a number of deaths, including that of little Jack Lockyer, a daughter of Mrs. N. C. Jorgensen.

The death rate has been particularly heavy among the Indians, several deaths in the local tribe having occurred during the past few days. Among the victims are Louis, chief of the Fort George band, and Joseph Qua, sub-chief, and his son and daughter. Louis has been in poor health for some years and fell an easy victim. The death of the Qua family was particularly sad. The father, son and daughter had left the Indian village to escape the possible contracting of the disease and were camping up the Fraser a few miles from the village. Nothing having been heard of them for some days, a search was instituted and their dead bodies were discovered in the tent.

The thirteen-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Hunt of Aleza Lake, was accidentally killed in a shooting accident a few days ago. He pulled a .22 rifle towards him in a boat, taking it by the muzzle and it went off, the bullet entering his side and coming out at the breast and killing him almost instantly.

Carl Johnson, of Evelyn, has been arrested and brought here by the Dominion police for evading military service.

"Have been called for military service. What steps shall I take?" wired a Prince George brakeman to the G. T. P. headquarters a couple of days ago. Promptly came back the reply: "Take military steps."—Prince George Citizen.

Messrs. A. E. Munn and J. M. Dempsey, who are operating logging camps on Cumshewa Inlet, left last evening for Vancouver.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptory claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$50 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons holding and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.
