CONTRAST PRINCE RUPERT WEATHER WITH GAY PAREE'S

PRINCE RUPERT TODAY; THE WEATHER WE HAVE

SUNSHINE AND BLUE SKIES—CITIZENS ABOUT WITHOUT OVERCOATS—TEMPERATURE LIKE SUMMER—FIRST CANOE TRIPPERS OF SEASON GO PICNICKING ACROSS HARBOR.

PARIS THE OTHER DAY; THE WEATHER THEY HAD

DEVASTATING STORMS—WIND THAT BLEW A LIVING GALE, OVERTHROWING STORES, WRECKING BUILDINGS, INJURING CITIZENS—RAIN IN TARENTS DELUGING THE STREETS.

Paris or Prince Rupert? Which would you rather live in? Just glance over the following extracts from the Herald, English paper published in Paris.

"Rain in torrents which at intervals yesterday drenched the streets of Paris was driven into the faces of pedestrians by a northwestern gale blowing at a speed of seventy-four kilometres, or for six miles, an hour. The severity of the gale in the channel may be gauged from the fact that the steamship Kaiserin Auguste Victoria, from New York, suffered a delay of five hours in reaching her pier at Cherbourg."

Fancy the steamer Prince Rupert being delayed five hours in reaching her berth in Prince Rupert harbor! But next day in Paris was worse.

"The severe gale which swept over Paris and vicinity on Wednesday continued yesterday with redoubled violence, and numerous accidents due to the wind were reported. Walking in the streets of the city was a difficult matter, and in the more open spaces in the suburbs the gusts of wind brought pedestrians to a complete standstill. So strong was the wind in the western sub-

urbs that a number of trees were blown down, notably at Versailles.

"The gale was accompanied by heavy rain, which turned the streets into veritable rivers. People were unable to protect themselves with their umbrellas, for the wind caught them and turned them inside out. On the boulevards the stall-keepers in the majority of cases shut up their stalls and abandoned all attempt to do any trade. In the avenue des Gobelins one stall was blown away by the wind. It was carried across the electric tramway line, and a tram dashed into it, one of the passengers being badly cut by broken glass.

"About 3 o'clock in the afternoon the wind blew down the scaffolding of a house under construction in the boulevard Victor. The bricklayers who were working on the scaffolding were dashed to the ground and four of them were seriously injured."

"We have had three days of this kind of weather in Gay Paree." Mr. Mortimer's client adds the laconic comment scribbled on the cutting.

BIG BATTLE OVER "CLAUSE SIX"

Business Men Petition Council to Fulfill By-law Pledge Affecting Hydro-Electric Labor

DAY LABOR HAS IT TO SHAWATLANS

Chairman Morrissey Strong for Contract System Across the Sea Passage and Has Mayor and Clayton With Him—Montgomery and Maitland, Day-Labor Champions, Meet All Comers—Still Undecided Beyond Lower Lake

Decision that the section of the hydro electric construction work from Acropolis Hill to Shawatlans Lake be done by day labor was arrived at by the City Council last night after a troubled session. Discussion of the rest of the problem contained in clause 6 of Alderman Morrissey's report is deferred. This decision of the Council is so far all the reply given to the petition presented by representative business men last night demanding that the present council make good the pledge of the past council, and have the work done by day labor, competitive station work and contract system, as set forth in the bylaw sanctioned by vote of the people.

"CLAUSE SIX." The Point in Morrissey's Report Where the Pinch Came in Last Night.

(6) That the total construction and transportation of material east of Shawatlans Narrows be performed under the open contract system, either in one blanket contract or in subdivided sections, as your Council and City Engineer may advise, always with a view to financial economy and guaranteed durability.

The Opposition Amendment. Clause 6. Adopt day labor or divide the work into sections for station gangs.

The members of the deputation were content to leave the argument for the petition brief and direct as Mr. Patmore put it, viz., that the present council is considered by the practitioners bound by the pledge of the last council, and that if necessary the question should go again to the people. "Meanwhile," said Mr. Patmore, "it may be necessary to take steps to prevent the ratification of the bylaw in the House at Victoria."

Mr. Hobin represented the Board of Trade in unanimous support of the petition.

Mayor Newton was in favor of fulfilling the pledge, and having all backfilling on the pipe line done by day labor, trenching by competitive station work, and the large portions of the work by contract. He hoped the council would assent to this. "This was an issue fought out at the election in January," said Ald. Montgomery. "If the citizens had wanted the work done in the old method by contract, you, Mr. Mayor, would not be sitting there tonight. The citizens would have returned Jack Hilditch."

Referring to the hydro-electric clause in his published platform, the mayor in a lengthy explanatory speech seemed to suggest that because he had been returned on this platform, the public who returned the aldermen composing his council expected to see the work done his way.

This Ald. Montgomery resented. "You tried to get up a platform and failed," he said. "You cannot hold that plank in your platform as a club over the heads of the rest of us aldermen."

The Mayor tried to explain that he did not mean to do anything of the kind, but he fancied the council might see the matter as he saw it.

Up rose Ald. Douglas on the war path. "Are we a kindergarten?"

MANSON TWTITTED ABOUT LAST ELECTION

Parker Williams' Insinuation That Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company Held Up City of Prince Rupert With a Gun

Parker Williams states in Legislature that ex-Mayor Manson was hopelessly repudiated by the people of Prince Rupert. Mr. Manson says this is incorrect and Mr. Williams retorts that it was nevertheless true that Manson's candidate for mayorality received very few votes.

When the bill to validate this city's agreement with the railway company as to taxation to be paid by the company to the city came up for second reading in the Legislature, Parker Williams of Ladysmith spoke in opposition. A brief summary of his remarks was received by wire and published at the time. The following is a more complete account from the columns of the News-Advertiser:

In connection with Prince Rupert itself it was rather surprising to see a bill of this kind brought down so soon. Here was a city that had started on government land without any of the complications that must be faced by cities that grew up of them-

selves, as it were. Notwithstanding this, after this city had only been in existence for two or three years, they found it coming back to the House virtually to seek relief. The bill indeed should have been styled "A bill to relieve the city of Prince Rupert."

A few years ago the Government made an agreement by which the Grand Trunk Pacific was to erect certain buildings at Prince Rupert, and now here was another bill to the same effect showing that there was no effectiveness in the first bargain. Again it seemed to him that the Grand Trunk Pacific was getting off altogether too cheaply in the way of taxation. The Premier had said that the Government's holdings in Prince Rupert were worth \$13,000,000. They owned a quarter of the townsite and the G. T. P. the other three-quarters, so since the G. T. P. owned three times as much as the Government their property should be worth \$39,000,000.

It showed the helpless position the city was placed in when it

accepted a taxation of \$15,000 a year on \$39,000,000. It was claimed that the bill had been endorsed by the people of Prince Rupert. Well, a man sometimes complied with another man's demand when he placed a gun at his head and told him to hold up his hands.

To show that it was not so favorably regarded he might remark that the gentleman who represented Prince Rupert in the House, who was a former mayor of the city, and had spoken in favor of this agreement, had been hopelessly repudiated by the people of Prince Rupert only a few weeks ago.

Mr. Manson: That is incorrect. Mr. Williams said the gentleman was entitled to deny it if he wished, but it was nevertheless true that his candidate for the mayorality of Prince Rupert had received very few votes and was badly defeated. While it would be useless for him to vote against the bill, he hoped that his action would not be regarded as an endorsement.

HOME RULE BILL AT LAST PRESENTED TO PARLIAMENT

IRELAND TO RECEIVE SUBSIDY OF TEN MILLIONS A YEAR—THE REPRESENTATION IN IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT TO BE GREATLY DIMINISHED.

(Special to Daily News.) London, Feb. 2.—The Daily Chronicle this morning publishes the progress of the Home Rule bill. It provides for an Irish parliament, which is given full control of the province and of excise, and provision is made for a continuance of complete free trade between England and Ireland.

Ireland is to receive for fifteen years an annual imperial subsidy of \$10,000,000, after which she is to make contributions to the imperial expenditure, based on a percentage of revenues.

The Irish parliament will consist of two houses, a legislative council of fifty members and a legislative assembly of 103 members, the council to have a suspensory vote on legislation. In the event of disagreement be-

tween the two houses, after the second rejection of a bill by the council, it is to be submitted to the two houses, deliberating and voting together, and adopted or rejected according to the decision of the majority.

Ireland is to continue to be represented in the Imperial Parliament, but in greatly diminished numbers.

The Irish parliament is to have no control with respect to the navy, army or militia, with the foreign policy, the coinage, the military camps or coast lighting, and will be forbidden to establish or endow any religious institution.

According to the forecast, it is understood that the Irish constabulary will be controlled by the imperial authorities for twelve years.

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GROUNDHOG MOUNTAIN

Coal Fields Cover Large Area—Attracting Considerable Attention.

Reports which have been made by Campbell-Johnson and other mining engineers upon the coal fields of Groundhog coal basin are calculated to excite considerable attention. The location of these measures is about 150 miles north of Hazelton at the head of the Skeena River and about 90 miles from fillwater at Stewart, the head of Portland Canal. The area comprised is about 70 miles in length and 30 miles in width and it is estimated that the whole of this territory is underlain with coal of anthracite quality. Mr. G. S. Mallock, of the geological survey, who spent the whole of last summer in making an examination of this field, states that the formation has a thickness of about 3,000 feet and contains coal in commercial quantities near the top and bottom only, the intermediate beds containing thin seams. The upper section of the beds contains seven seams of a thickness varying from 2 feet to 6 feet, and as far as is at present known is limited to an area of about 20 square miles. The lower section contains at least three seams from 4 to 6 feet thick, and extends over most of the area occupied by the coal measures. It is evident from these facts that the development of a big coal field here is merely a question of time and transportation, and makes intelligible the desire of Sir Donald Mann to push the present Portland Canal short line through to the Groundhog basin.—Vancouver World.

ten council?" he asked, that the public should come in and dictate to us how we are to carry on the work of the city?"

Condemning competitive station work and upholding the banner of day labor, Ald. Maitland charged into the fray. Responsibility should rest with the city engineer, he said. Let the engineer fix prices and have the work done by straight station work or days labor.

Blow for blow in argument Ald. Morrissey battled in defence of Clause Six. He pictured the great expense of the city's having to buy plant to do the work by day labor. Transportation was a heavy problem. The credit of the city demanded that this money should be wisely expended.

Ald. Maitland contended that the city should have purchased the plant, teams, scows, and launches long ago. He would assure the public and the petitioner that day labor was more economical than contract system.

Ald. Bullock-Webster expressed himself in favor of day labor. He did not agree with the mayor that it was proper for the aldermen to follow the mayoral lead of necessity because of their election with him.

The Mayor: "It seemed to me that endorsement of me meant endorsement of my platform."

To a question by Alderman Montgomery regarding the finance, the Mayor replied that the bank manager had stated that the bank did not care which system was adopted, only it would be easier to know just how much money was wanted if the work were done by contract.

Again Alderman Morrissey rose to defend clause six.

"Let him talk," said Alderman Maitland as Alderman Douglas interrupted. "We can hold him down." Alderman Morrissey reiterated his arguments declaring he would stand up strongly for the welfare of the property owners, the business men who were building up the city, and would have to pay for this work in the long run.

Alderman Maitland began another impassioned speech.

"Shut up," said a voice from the back.

"Go out if you don't like it," said Alderman Maitland. "We never asked you to come here."

"Order, order," pleaded the Mayor.

After some parley by aldermen, Engineer Mason, in charge of the hydro electric work, was asked to give some technical information to Alderman Montgomery on the laying of the pipe across Shawatlans Passage, and the Mayor asked further questions. Mr. Mason's replies briefly were that it will cost \$4,000 to lay the submarine water pipe, that he does not deem it advisable to sublet the work across the passage and
