

N THESE critical and anxious times, with the world torn by idealogical conflict and even the basic principles of our Christian faith challenged both externally and internally, it may be difficult to settle down to the true and happy spirit of the season, even though it may be more important than ever that we should do so.

Peace and goodwill are the prime principles of Christmas as prescribed from the first observance of the great festival but how tenuous today do we find our grasp upon these so greatly to be desired attributes! However, if we despair, we shall be lost, so why despair? That is the last thing we should do.

Who can deny that the world and its people today lack a real appreciation of the Christian principles and need a new acceptance of the things that are good and right, just and fair, the things that keep us within bounds man between man, living in consideration and respect of the rights and privileges of others instead of in the mundane hiatus of personal edification and aggrandizement, pleasure and acquisition?

Alas, we have been crowding Christ out of Christmas by our materialism, our commercialization, the giving and receiving of gifts and the feasting. Too forgetful have we been of the verities and virtues of the Christian faith of which this Christmas Day is the festival, given over, we think, too much, especially of more recent years, to thoughts and acts other than those of the original inspiration.

In our pre-Christmas reading, we have run racross some thoughts entitled Christmas and Light. We consider them worthy of repetition in this our Christmas editorial and recommend them to the consideration of our readers:



> "Sixty per cent of our clients are women, and about 40 per cent are men," she said. "This is because there are more women than men, and also because women are more marriageminded. They take it more seriously. It is the men who are most interested in superficial romance."

> Who goes to a marriage broker? Well, they don't usually announce it, but-

"Parents with 18-year-old daughters or sons in college come to us. So do people right up into the 70s and 80s. We've had widowed clients looking forward to a third or fouth marriage. They're sold on the marital status.

"But mostly they are women in their late 20s or early 30s, and men in their early or late 30s. Usually they have become weary of frivolous dates, the ratrace of ordinary social gatherings. They want help in finding someone with their own tastes in life."

The rates of marriage brokers vary. In New York they contract to arrange 10 appointments between people of similar background for a set fee. In other sections they limit their services to a period of time-such as three months-after which a new contract must be made.

The fees? They average: girls from 20 to 30-\$100; from 30 to 40-\$150; from 40 years up-\$200. Men the lucky creatures, only have to pay a flat \$50. That

shows who is looking for whom. The most common complaint made by a woman client after

her first arranged date: "Do you really think its worth while going through all this just to get a husband?"

But Miss Wilder says the marriage brokers have a high batting average. "About eight out of every 10

people who come to us get married," she said. "The other two are probably adventurers. We make an honest effort to check our clients, but sometimes fortune hunters do creep in.

"But the fortune hunters are among the men. The women are looking for more than money in marriage."

That's what the lady says, and she's looking for the right man herself.

"Any woman who claims she isn't is a downright liar," said Miss Wilder.


