### SPORT CHAT

With the breaking up of the three-way tie which had existed with Montreal Canadiens and Boston Bruins, Toronto Maple Leafs went into exclusive leadership of the National Hockey League again by winning a three to nothing victory over the Canadiens at the Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto Saturday night. It was the fourth shut-out of the season for Goalie Turk Broda who did a fine job under heavy fire and was declared the star of the ice for the evening. The Boston Bruins and the Canadiens had a chance to get back in to the lead with the idle Leafs Sunday but both failed by narrow margins, the Bruins being defeated 3 to 2 by the New York Rangers while the Flying Frenchmen dropped the decision to the Chicago Black Hawks by similar count. The Rangers and Black Hawks remain tied in fourth place. Oddly enough, the third game Sunday evening also ended in a three to two score, the New York Americans defeating Detroit Red Wings to creep within one game of the Detroiters in sixth place. In tonight's National Hockey League fixtures Chicago plays Americans at New York and Detroit play Boston at Boston.

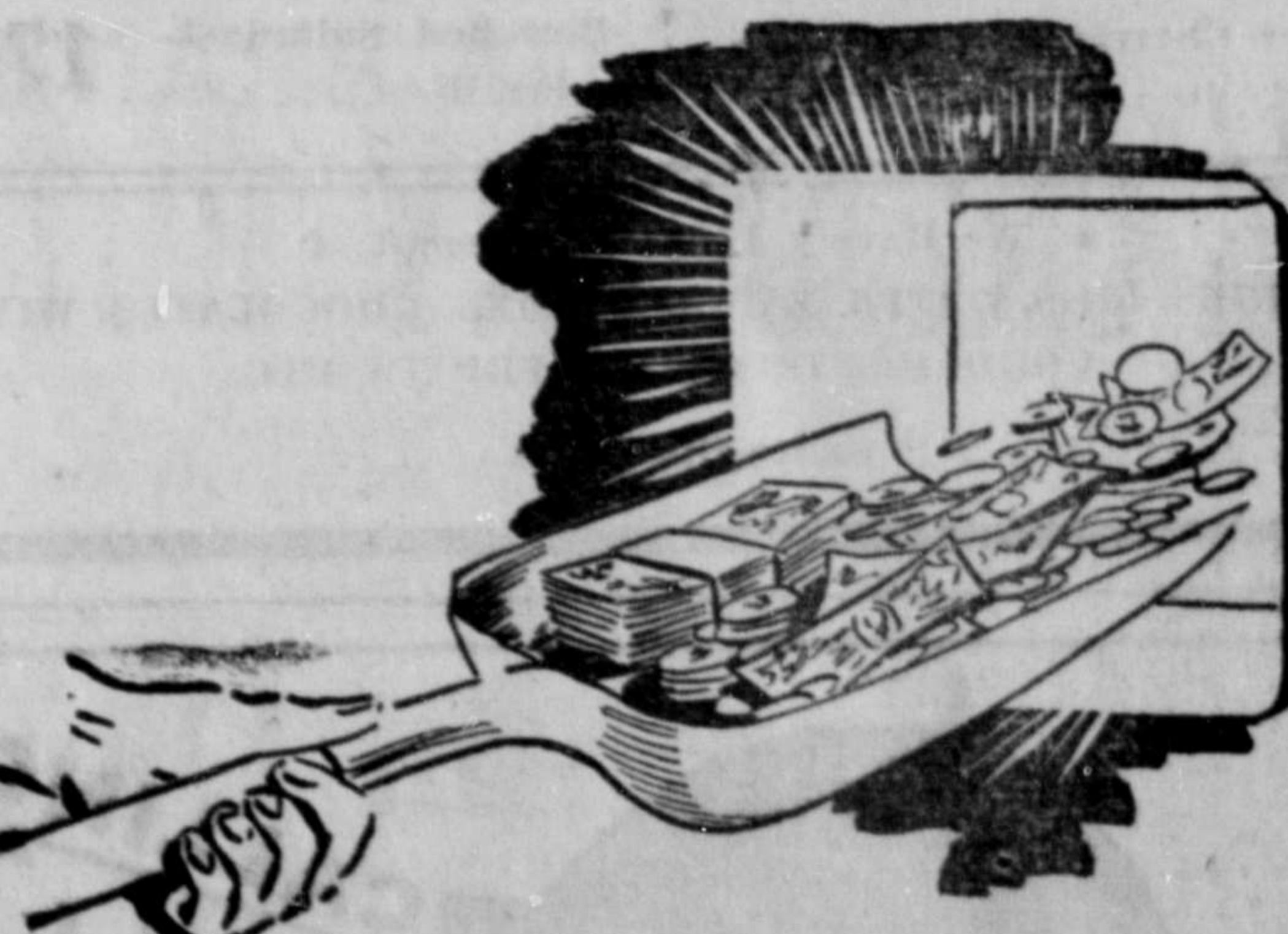
