The true anarchist believes that, if it were not for the people who lead the rest astray, human nature would assert itself and there would 3 be no need of laws against evil doers. All people would ? do the right because it is right. There would be none to \$ lead them astray. Like Socialism it is idealistic and has \$ not worked out in practice. Unfortunately, there is too ? much of the old Adam in all of us to make Utopia possible. ? Most of us in Canada would rather take our chance on the present set-up with the possibility of gradual improvemen than be launched into an era of dictatorship where no man can call his soul his own and human life is of less val- \$ ue than among the aborigines of the most backward countries.

THE SOCIALISTS TOO

Then again there are the Socialists who share with the Communists the theories of Karl Marx. They declare themselves in favor of a community in which there will be no wealth, in which the state will own all the machinery of production and in which all will live on the fat of the \$ land. These are not the words they use but in a general \$ way it seems to convey the idea. There is no agreement as to how the condition is to be brought about but it is \$ declared by many that it can be done constitutionally while others count on a revolution to bring it about. Many University professors are Socialists but it was noticed that in Russia the intellectuals were among the first : to suffer when the Socialistic state was brought into being. Many of the educated men of the country were murdered in cold blood. The country is now ruled largely by the ignorant. We mention Russia because that is the only Country in the world where a real attempt has been made to put into practice Socialistic doctrines. We acknowled a Canadian Fish & Cold Storage ledge, too, that because the Russian experiment has failed, does not mean that Socialism cannot succeed eventually. We prefer to believe rather in a gradual improvement of 3 our present system, following out the evolutionary policy } in Sociology rather than the revolutionary.

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
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
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
