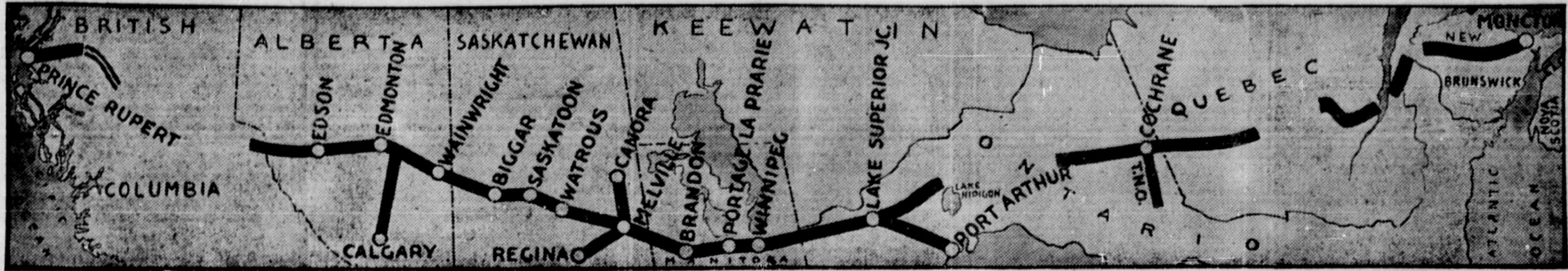


ROAD WILL POSITIVELY BE FINISHED NEXT YEAR

Only the other day General Superintendent, Mehan returned to Prince Rupert after a visit to the scene of active track laying operations a hundred and fifty miles up river. Twice recently he has taken a whirl up there in his special car, and each time his report has been one of progress. First it was the completion of the Kitselas tunnel, which enabled the steel to get through to the finished grade beyond as far as Hazelton. Then it was the finishing of the winter special tunnel which safeguards the track from snow slides at Mile 44. Now it is track laying first, foremost and all the time.

FOR DEFEAT OF HOME RULE

Constitutional Club Endorses Stand Taken by Ulster Against Home Rule—Six Hundred Australians Offer Assistance.

(Special to Daily News.) London, Feb. 3.—Addressing the Imperial and Constitutional Club last night, Sir Edward Carson declared the men of Ulster are in a fight to preserve the institution. They were filled with hope, they were ready for battle and longing for it and they were going to win. Following on, he said, the recent outburst of Imperial loyalty at the Canadian elections, it was hoped they would be able to do something for Ulster during the past few months had shown no mean contrast.

PRINCE RUPERT BOWLING RECORD

Well Known Local Bowler Believed to Have Broken All Previous Records at the Bowling Alley Last Night.

What is believed to be a world's record at bowling was established last evening at the bowling alleys when Joe Scott, the prominent young hardware man, rolled the phenomenal score of twenty-eight straight strikes without a miss. Out of three games played, two showed a perfect score of 300, while the third brought it to 822 out of a possible total of 900 points.

NEW HOSPITAL WING: TASK FOR THE BOARD

After Election of New Members Yesterday Matter Was Discussed—Mayor Dubious Regarding Financial Assistance From City

The New Board. President—D. G. Stewart. Vice President—O. H. Nelson. Managing Secretary—W. H. Wright. Committees. Executive Committee—D. G. Stewart, Mayor Newton and H. H. Clarke.

In the Police Court room yesterday afternoon the Hospital Board for 1912 was elected as above, and the President later announced the committees named.

At the session of the new board after the routine financial affairs reported on by the Finance committee and Managing Secretary had been attended to, there followed discussion of the proposed new wing, which is to be the principal undertaking of the new year.

Mayor Newton was dubious about the condition of the city finances to meet such a grant. He recalled his opposition in the old Council to the \$5,000 grant, stating that this had not been because he was unsympathetic with the hospital's needs, but because he thought there was so much other work to be done by the city in the way of plankways in out-

lying districts, etc. The problem was the same now, and with the hydro electric scheme to carry out, costing a lot of money, the city had to go warily with grants for other purposes. Without wishing unduly to alarm anyone, the Mayor mentioned that he had that very afternoon become aware of a serious financial problem ahead of the city, nothing to be alarmed about, but something serious which it would be unwise to divulge at present.

President Stewart decided that the whole board there present should wait as a committee on the Council on Monday night to ascertain what can be done in the way of a grant for the hospital fund. Alderman Clayton spoke in favor of a large grant if possible, and O. H. Nelson mentioned that it may be necessary for the board to assure Mr. Manson at Victoria that the city's \$10,000 is forthcoming before the dollar for dollar government grant can be secured.

News from Montreal announced the shipping of the new ambulance with both wheel and sleigh fittings. Arrangements have to be made for the housing and horsing of the vehicle. These are in the hands of a committee. It is understood that the city will provide accommodation for the ambulance near the fire hall.

Messrs. Stewart and Stuart were reappointed auditors for the board, very complimentary remarks being passed generally by the President and members of the Finance committee on the work of this firm in the past. It was proposed to grant life membership in the association to one member of the firm in recognition, and this matter is in committee.

AWFUL DROWNING. Four Officers and Ten Men Meet Death in Submarine

Portsmouth, Feb. 3.—It is now definitely known that fourteen men, including four officers, were on board and perished when submarine A-3 sank off the entrance to Spithead yesterday evening.

## UNDER WHICH FLAG NEXT?

It was not the Canadian flag, but the one which has "braved a thousand years, the battle and the breeze" Borden waved during the last election. Masquerading in its folds he marched to victory and the patriot Sir Wilfrid now sits on the opposition benches. No doubt Mr. Borden would like to wave the Canadian flag just now, but can he? Bourassa says he certainly cannot, and Bourassa declares that what HE says goes. Isn't that a nice how-dye-do?

It was only the other day the administration decided upon a new flag for the Canadian navy. This was an admission upon their part, possibly without consulting Bourassa, that there is a Canadian navy. But Mr. Bourassa declares in his newspaper, like the bad boy he is, that there isn't going to be no navy. No, he is going to wipe it off the slate and the map. He is going to move for the repeal of the naval bill enacted by the late Government. And he is not going to wait for the Borden Government to do it either, but will do it himself right away. The name of his newspaper is "Le Devoire," which being interpreted means The Duty.

Perhaps it is not strange that Bourassa and his followers should consider it their duty to wipe out the Canadian and all other flags but the one which represents the nationality from which they sprung. It may be that the "duty" to which the leader of the Nationalists has pledged himself, that of wiping out the navy, is merely for the purpose of wiping out the new naval flag. When the navy is wiped out the flag goes with it.

Next of course he will haul down the flag of Canada and in its place flaunt to the Canadian breeze a new device, in which a gory guillotine is surmounted by a gory-colored Liberty cap. All in the narrow path of patriotic duty. If he fails to convince Parliament it is their duty to wipe out the navy he will declare a general election. Then the great national question will be—"Under Which Flag."

## DARE-DEVIL DICK AND THE FEDERAL CABINET.

The Toronto Star has a breezy correspondent in the press gallery at Ottawa who reminds one in his style of Sir Henry Lucy. In fact he is a close literary emulator of that genial British stroller along the lobbies of the English Parliament House. "H. F. G.," whoever he may be, calls his gossipy screed "The Gallery Clock," while Sir Henry for many years run in the columns of Punch a weekly article under the caption of "Around the Clock, by One of the Hands." In a recent issue of the Star this correspondent from his little perch above the gallery clock boldly writes this of our Premier:

"Dare-Devil Dick did not risk his own hide in the recent election, but he delivered a solid British Columbia, and so the Tory Government has taken him to its bosom. He is sealed, so to speak, to the service. The spirit and the bride say come, but the Hon. Dick will not come until he gets the Department of Public Works. He wants that—no more, no less—and of course he can't have it until Monk steps out. When that happens Premier McBride may be coaxed out of his little British Columbia flower pot and then we shall see how big he really is."

Another very capable writer, Jack McConnell, of the Vancouver Saturday Sunset, who has the advantage not only of parliamentary experience as a writer but a thorough knowledge of the personality of Mr. McBride, takes up this subject and remarks that "Dick McBride would never stand the test of greatness and he knows it well." He goes on:

"He knows his limitations very well. Dick McBride is not big enough for British Columbia. The advancing standards of this province are leaving him behind. If you subtract the dramatic artist from Dick McBride what is left doesn't amount to much. He could never live up to his photographs."

He is either not big enough or too big for British Columbia. It is little enough and mean and narrow enough beyond expression for him to hold back from occupancy or use the government lots in Prince Rupert until hard-working citizens have made those lots immensely valuable; it is the act of a big, bloated and autocratic millionaire who, in his self-sufficiency, thinks he can say with the late Vanderbilt, "The public be d—d."

## LIBERAL "SUN" TO RISE IN VANCOUVER.

Vancouver will soon have a new morning journal of Liberal politics which will be called the "Morning Sun." The exigencies of the weather have retarded operations on the new building and have delayed shipments of machinery. A few days ago it was expected that publication would begin next Monday, but a further delay was occasioned by the non-arrival of linotypes, and the date had to be set forward another week. All the plant and equipment except the linotypes are now installed and in full working order and the newspaper is now expected to make its bow to the public on February 12th.

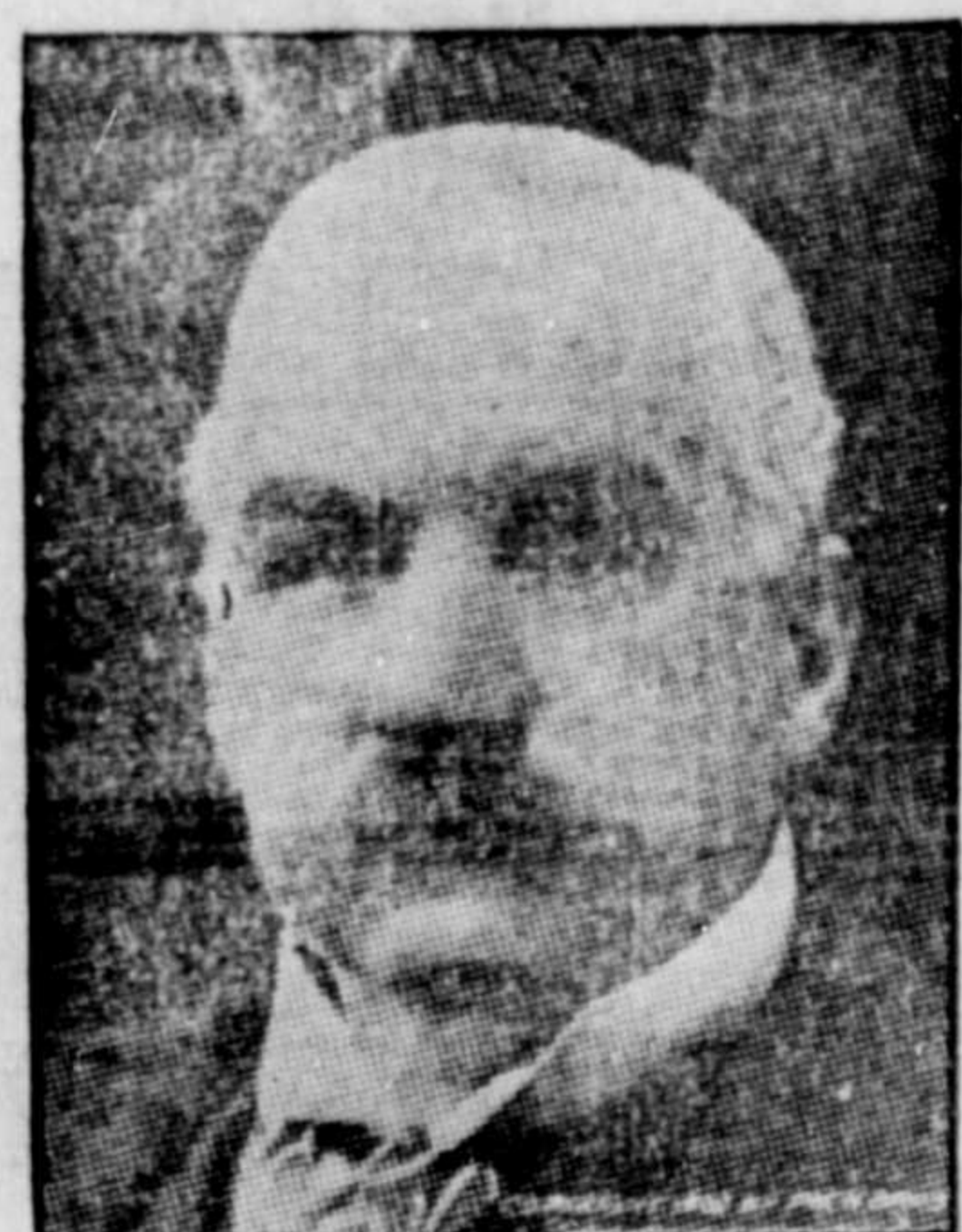

Dollar Two Bits a Ton for Freight—Dollar Four Bits for Passengers—Railroad Owned Steamships Double if Bill Passes.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Washington, Feb. 1.—American ships would use the Panama Canal free of cost, while foreign vessels would pay a charge not exceeding \$1.25 a ton under the terms of a bill introduced by Senator Bradley of Kentucky. If an American ship, however, is owned by a railroad company, and is operated to offset the expected reduction in cost of freight transportation, it will pay double the foreign rate.

Senator Bradley's bill provides that all laws and executive orders now in force in Panama should continue until amended or repealed, and that the President should operate the canal through the chief of engineers of the army. The charge for carrying passengers through the canal would not exceed \$1.50 per passenger.

PUNISHED BY PICTURE SHOW

Gaekwar of Baroda's Rudeness to King and Queen Is Revealed Everywhere by Cinematograph and Hissed Motly in Britain.

Moving pictures are contributing their share to the punishment in store for the Gaekwar of Baroda in connection with his insulting behavior to King George and Queen Mary at the Durbar. For the cinematograph has reproduced, with the utmost fidelity, every phase of his rudeness on that occasion, his curt nod to the King, his deliberate refusal to bow to the Queen, his swinging a light cane in his hand when approaching the throne, and his turning his back deliberately on his suzerain, instead of backing out of his presence, as did the Viceroy and all the vassal rulers of India.

Each time that the Gaekwar is thus shown in the moving picture exhibitions in Great Britain his appearance calls forth a storm of hisses and other tokens of popular disapproval. These picture shows are being also exhibited at almost infinitesimal prices of admission throughout the length and breadth of the Indian Empire, where the Gaekwar's rudeness is thus becoming known. Conse-

quently the British Government cannot afford to allow the matter to go unpunished.

That his rudeness to the King and Queen was the result of nervousness, put forward by him as an excuse in his letter of abject apology, is disproved by the cinematograph pictures. It is also demonstrated by a piece of studied insolence toward the Viceroy, Lord Hardinge, a little earlier in the proceedings, which has been made much of in private letters from India, though not in print. It seems that when Lord Hardinge, about a quarter of an hour before the arrival of the King and Queen, drove into the arena in state, all the great vassal rulers of India assembled there rose and remained standing until the Viceroy had taken his seat. There was but one exception, namely, the Gaekwar of Baroda, who, although occupying a front seat, refrained from rising, and instead ostentatiously stretched out his legs in the most lounging and negligent manner.

Public debate is to be held in the McIntyre hall on Tuesday next at 8 p. m., under the auspices of the Anglican Club. The subject for discussion is: "It is resolved that there should be an educational qualification for voters."

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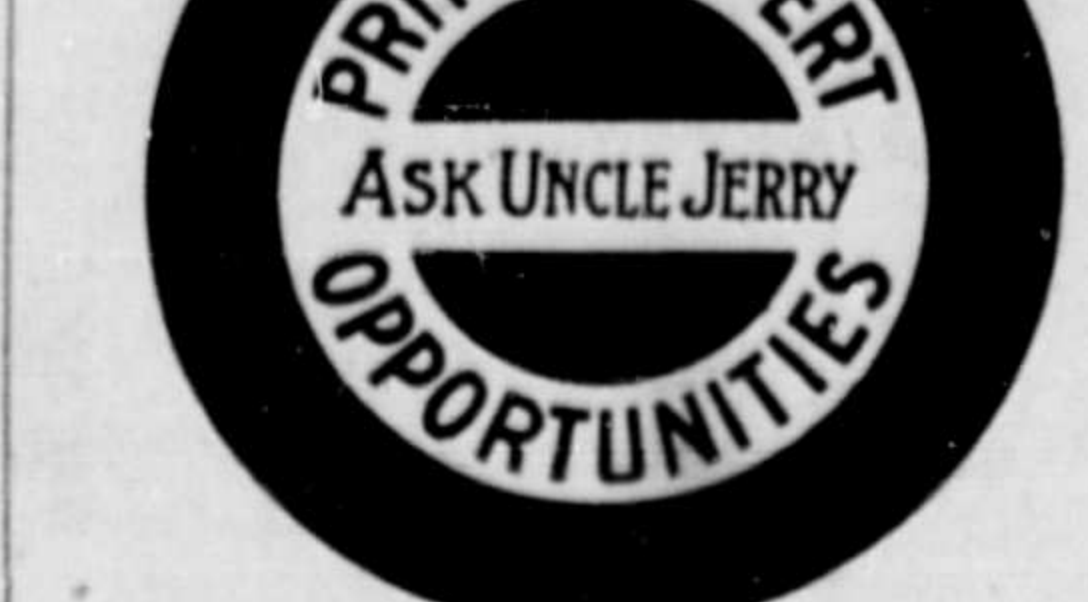
