## Speech By Nazi Leader At Danzig

### COMPLETE BLACK-OUT

Climax of Great Britain's Aerial Manoeuvres—Two More Fatal Crashes Yesterday

LONDON, August 10: (CP)—Climax of Great Britain's great aerial manoeuvres, which have been going on since Monday, will be a black-out tonight covering half of England including London. The aerial manoeuvres are a prelude to a full dress rehearsal of the nation's armed forces. Sixty thousand men are taking part in the exercises which will continue until Friday night. Cloudy skies and drizzling rain today interfered with the manoeuvres.

The air manoeuvres were again marred yesterday with the disappearance of a five-man bomber over the North Sea and the flaming crash of another near Toller in Yorkshire.

### DIED HERE THIS MORN

Mr. Samuel Haudenschild Sr. Passes Away at Age of Eighty-Three After Long Suffering

Death came at the Prince Rupert General Hospital at 8:30 this morning to a well known pioneer woman of the district in the passing of Mrs. Alice Haudenschild of Terrace. Eighty-three years of age, Mrs. Haudenschild had been in declining health for years and the end came as a merciful release to long suffering. Two weeks ago, in critical condition and hope of recovery gone, she was brought to the hospital from Terrace.

Born in Switzerland, the late Mrs. Haudenschild came to the United States as a young bride sixty years ago. In 1910 she arrived in Prince Rupert with her husband and children and some eight or nine years later removed to Terrace where land was taken up in the Kitsumkalum Valley, the family home having since been there. Besides the aged widower, Samuel Haudenschild sr., Mrs. Haudenschild is survived by three daughters—Mrs. Sophia Ballinger of Prince Rupert, Mrs. Rose Wesch, Prince Rupert, and Mrs. Emma Coppersmith of Tacoma—and one son—Samuel Haudenschild jr. of Prince Rupert. There are also fourteen grandchildren and four great-grandchildren as well as a brother, Jack Bonner of Terrace. To the bereaved the sympathy of many friends will be extended.

Circumstances of Mrs. Haudenschild's passing are further saddened by the fact that her second eldest daughter, Mrs. Ida Oeichsl, passed away at Tacoma on Monday of this week after a prolonged illness, the funeral having taken place at Tacoma yesterday. The remains of Mrs. Haudenschild are now resting at the parlors of the B.C. Undertakers and tomorrow morning, accompanied by the children, will be taken by train to Terrace where interment will be made.

### SYNDICATE FOR ARSON

Plot Against Pacific Northwest Lumber Industry Seen as Result of Series of Big Fires

SEATTLE, Aug. 10: (CP)—A continuous sabotage plot by an organized "arson syndicate" against the lumber industry is seen as a result of the series of large sawmill fires which have been occurring of late. The latest was a \$150,000 sawmill fire in Seattle yesterday. This followed close on a \$275,000 mill fire at Centralia a few days ago and a \$220,000 fire at Chehalis.

### Cooler Weather On Prairie Now

Heat Wave Of Last Week Has, However, Taken Heavy Toll Of Crop

OTTAWA August 10: (CP)—The prolonged heat wave on the prairies has taken a heavy toll of the wheat crop, it was stated yesterday in the weekly Dominion report. Cooler weather and showers yesterday brought relief to some sections.

### Conservative Renominated

J. Barber M. P. Will Again Be Candidate For Fraser Valley

MISSION, August 10: (CP)—H. Barber, Conservative Member of Parliament for Fraser Valley for several years, was again nominated last night for re-election in the same riding at the next federal election.

### Mother General Of St. Anne On Inspection Tour

Mother General Mary Leopoldine of the Sisters of St. Anne from Montreal, in the course of a western tour of inspection of various hospitals and other institutions of the order, arrived in the city on the Princess Alice yesterday afternoon from Alaska and the Yukon, proceeding by train to Smithers to visit the hospital there before continuing East. The Mother General was accompanied by her secretary, Sister Mary Lewis.

### Ciano To Pay Germany Visit

Mittler Said To Be Wanting Advice Before Making Any Move In Regard To Danzig

ROME, August 10: (CP)—Italian Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano is leaving Rome tonight for Germany to confer with Chancellor Adolf Hitler. It is said that Hitler desires the advice of his axis partner before making any definite move in regard to the Danzig question.

Ciano will first confer at Salzburg near Berchtesgaden, Hitler's Bavarian mountain retreat, with Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop of Germany on questions of joint Italian-German concern. Informed diplomats express the belief that Ciano will advise against any action concerning Danzig which might lead to war.

### Policeman And Wife Clubbed

VANCOUVER, Aug. 10: (CP)—Traffic Constable Jack Whelan and his wife were clubbed by a mysterious assailant while they slept early today but escaped serious injury. Whelan, cut over the eye, said that a man clad in white reached through the window and struck him and then his wife. The assailant escaped across a plank over the light well and disappeared. No motive is given.

### MORE GRITS FOR OTTAWA

So Predicts Pattullo—Cannot Be Democracy Without Party System

TORONTO, August 10: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo predicts that British Columbia will have increased Liberal representation at Ottawa after the next general election. "There is no logic in unholding democracy in one breath and attacking the party system in the next," Mr. Pattullo says.

### Saskatchewan Not In Favor Of Idea

Will Not Join In Sending Trade Delegation To Europe To Drum Up Trade For Prairie Provinces

REGINA, August 10: (CP)—The government of Saskatchewan will not associate itself with the proposal of Premier John Bracken of Manitoba to drum up business in European countries by sending a trade delegation abroad. Hon. J. G. Taggart, minister of agriculture, stated yesterday. The Bracken proposal seemed like a duplication of effort, Mr. Taggart said.

### Wife Of United States Attorney General Is Dead

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 10:—Mrs. Homer S. Cummings, wife of the Attorney General of the United States, passed away yesterday after a brief illness. She was one of the most popular hostesses in the National Capital. Mrs. Cummings was a staunch Democrat but she never took an active part in politics, saying that one member of the family was enough for that.

### Prairie Farmer Is Smoked Out

Mounted Police Officers Used Tear Gas When Faced By Man With Shotgun Near

YORKTON, Saskatchewan, Aug. 10: (CP)—Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers resorted to the use of tear gas yesterday to smoke out a farmer near here who greeted them with a shot gun and refused to come out when his arrest was sought in connection with an automobile accident.

### Canada Teachers In Annual Meet

Convention of Canadian Federation Is Now In Progress At Montreal

MONTREAL, August 10: (CP)—The annual convention of the Canadian Teachers' Federation is now in session here. The low and irregular salary situation in the prairie provinces is one of the matters that is being taken up.

### Still Warm In Southern B.C.

VANCOUVER, August 10: (CP)—High Temperatures continue throughout southern British Columbia. Yesterday 86 was recorded in Vancouver.

### JUGOSLAVIA IS NEUTRAL

Does Not Wish to Become Involved In Any European War—Italian Overtures Rebuffed

BELGRADE, Aug. 10: (CP)—In the face of Italian overtures for certain arrangements which would prove of advantage to Italy in the event of war, Yugoslavia declares her intention of maintaining strict neutrality even if it would have to use arms to do so. Yugoslavia has the support of Great Britain and France in this attitude. Italian demands for use of Jugoslav territory in wartime were reported authoritatively today to have been refused by Yugoslavia and orders were issued to speed up fortifications on the German frontier.

### ESKIMOS PUZZLED

Their Curiosity Aroused By Air Conditioned Vice-Regal Train

CHURCHILL, Manitoba, August 10:—Just prior to the departure of the vice-regal train from here which carried Lord and Lady Tweedsmuir south after a short visit to this port, the train was given a close inspection by a party of Eskimos. Of particular interest to them was the work of the Canadian National car service men filling the ice bunkers of the air conditioning equipment. The party of Eskimos was taken through the train and, when they emerged with perspiration pouring down their faces partly hidden by the heavy parkas, they chattered to one another excitedly as each piece of ice was safely stored away.

They laughed loudly and pointed at the ice and were completely puzzled. The white man's ways were beyond their understanding. To heat the car on the inside and put ice into it in large quantities on the outside was just too much. The white man sure must be all mixed up. Why did he not stop heating the moving igloos or stop putting ice into them? To do them both did not make sense in the Eskimo way of reasoning. They stood around for hours until the work was completed and finally went back to their boats. During the long winter nights they will tell their relatives and friends of the funny ways of the white man they saw with the moving igloos.

### MUSEUM BOARD HEARS REPORTS

The Museum Board at a meeting held in the City Hall last night received reports of a most encouraging nature. For the month of July there were 1365 visitors to the museum and in the month of June 462. The highest number attending in any one day was 210. The need of a new building was stressed as the accommodation in the present building was very limited, especially in view of the large number wishing to attend on boat days.

## Germany and Hitler To Stand Beside Free City In Event of War Coming

Cheering Throngs in Langer Market Place Hear Words and Cry: "One People! One Reich! One Reich!"

DANZIG, August 10: (CP)—Nazi Leader Albert Foerster, following his return from Germany where he conferred with Chancellor Adolf Hitler, told cheering throngs in Langer market place tonight that "Poland may rest assured" Germany and the German chancellor "are determined, in the event of war, to stand at our side." Foerster's speech was interrupted by cries of "One people! One Reich! One Fuehrer! We want to return to the Reich!"

### Caribou On Her Way Back Home

Imperial Airways Flying Boat Is Headed Eastward Across Atlantic On Return Trip Of Atlantic Mail Flight

BOUCHERVILLE, Quebec, August 10: (CP)—On her way back to England after her inaugural mail carrying flight across the Atlantic Ocean, the Imperial Airways flying boat Caribou arrived here last evening from New York and left today for Botwood, Newfoundland, and enroute to Southampton. The Caribou had no less than 26,000 letters on board.

### Makes Appeal For Peace In Orient

Former Chinese Premier Now In Association With Japan, Would End Conflict

CANTON, August 10: (CP)—Wang Ching Wai, former Premier of China and now associated with the Japanese, yesterday made a sweeping appeal for a peaceful settlement of the Sino-Japanese conflict. His plan would be along anti-communist lines with relaxation to a large extent of the Japanese military authority in China.

### Oregon Has Worst Forest Fire Now

Conflagration On Saddle Mountain Has Done Much Damage, Destroying Logging Camp and Big Timber Stands

PORTLAND, Oregon, August 10: (CP)—Most serious forest fire in the Pacific Northwest is one that is raging in the Saddle Mountain country of northern Oregon. It has already destroyed a large logging camp and millions of feet of virgin timber.

### American Legion Meets At Salem

SALEM, Oregon, August 10:—Thirty-five hundred ex-service men delegates are here for the annual convention of the Oregon department of the American Legion.

### Huge Whale Harpooned

Largest Mammal Ever Captured In Pacific Waters Weighs Seventy Tons

SAN FRANCISCO, August 10:—A seventy-ton whale, declared to be the largest ever harpooned in the waters of the Pacific, has been taken off the California coast by a whaling vessel, it was reported yesterday.

### SCHOONER SMASHED

Projected Cruise From Nova Scotia To West Indies and South America Comes To Grief

YARMOUTH, Nova Scotia, Aug. 10: (CP)—The sixteen-ton schooner Estey on which Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Mooney of Vancouver, Jack Kanelokos, navigator and Fred Home of Canso, Nova Scotia, planned to cruise the West Indies and South America was wrecked on rocks off Lobster Reef. The occupants reached shore in a dory but the schooner was splintered to matchwood.

### Governor General Descends In Mine

Went 1200 Feet Underground At Flin Flon Yesterday—On Way West Now

FLIN FLON, Manitoba, August 10: (CP)—The Governor General Lord Tweedsmuir and his party spent yesterday in this northern Manitoba mining camp. His Excellency donned mining togs and descended 1200 feet into the Hudson Bay mine. There was a reception at the skating rink. The vice-regal party is now on the way to Jasper Park where the week-end will be spent.

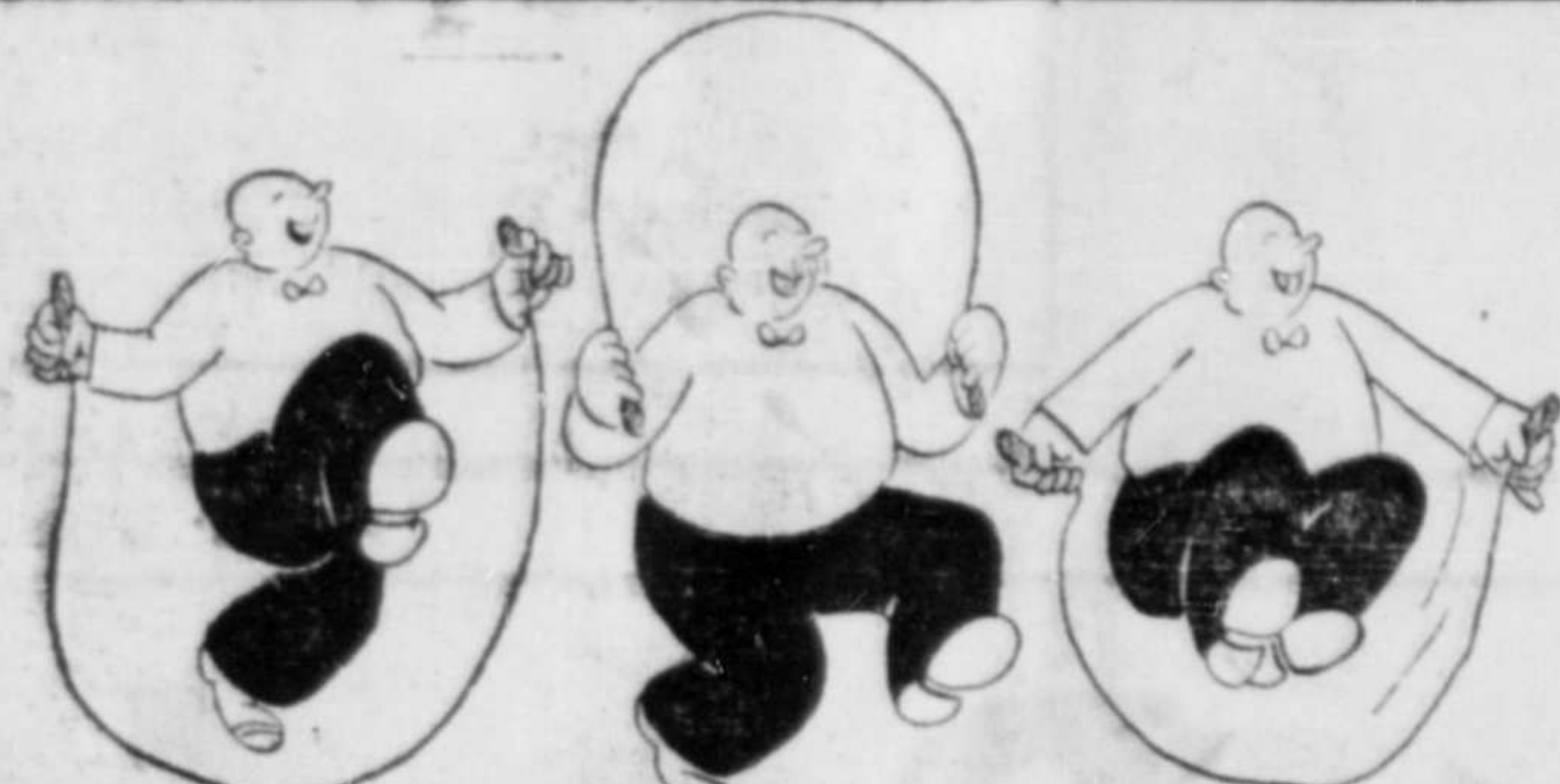
### YANKS AND REDS WIN

New York Leadership Is, However, Reduced By Boston Taking Double-Header

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 10: (CP)—The three game losing streak of the New York Yankees ended yesterday when they defeated Washington Senators 13 to 8 in a free-hitting contest. The margin of Yankee leadership was, however, pared to six-and-a-half games as a result of the running up Boston Red Sox taking a double-header victory from the Philadelphia Athletics.

In the National League, the league-leading Cincinnati Reds also resumed their winning ways by taking both ends of a double-header from Chicago Cubs to increase their margin to eight full games over St. Louis Cardinals who won from Pittsburgh Pirates. # EDITORIALS

## THE SWAN SONG

A number of newspapers are singing the swan song of Charles A. Dunning, until a few days ago minister of finance in the Mackenzie King government and still nominally holding that position. He has gone to England on holiday to try to recover the health which he lost in the service of his country.

Some very kind things are being said about Mr. Dunning, it being considered that he is finished, so far as politics is concerned. Here is what Bruce Hutchison says of him:

"Above all, Dunning was a lovable man in politics, the most popular figure in Ottawa, liked as well among Conservatives as Liberals, for once you sat down with him and talked to him, you couldn't dislike him, even if you were a Communist. There was a vitality about him, the way he grinned, the way his frown would turn to a smile, the extraordinary youthfulness of him, a sense of force and vigor and a kind of friendliness that came out of those prairie farms, those country meetings."

MEET DIFFICULTIES SQUARELY  
The way to make progress is

to meet our difficulties squarely, study conditions, and never worry about who is responsible for the present situation. We all think it is Hitler who is making the trouble but it may be ourselves who created a condition which gave Hitler his chance. At any rate it matters little who is responsible unless we are prepared to do something about it. Even if it was Chamberlain who was the source of recent jitters, we might as well keep quiet, meet the situation as we find it and do our best right here and now.

## AGE OF MECHANICS

The tragedy of the lack of work for people who ordinarily work in the harvest fields is more and more accentuated each year. In the old days it cost the average farmer to harvest an acre of wheat somewhere around two dollars. Today by the use of the combine he can do the same work for 26c an acre and all the men who formerly made a living from stooking and pitching sheaves and threshing are no longer needed. Half of the fun of farming is lost but the cost is that much less. So we get more men on relief.
