LONDON, Dec. 2: (CP)-Two German ships, the 2185-ton steamship Eilbek and the 215-ton trawler Sophie Busse, have been captured by British naval units and brought to an English port.

The destruction of three neutral and one British merchantman since vesterday raised to at least 171 the number of ships sunk in the

war. The latest victims are the Finnish steamship Mercator, the Britisher Dalyran, the Norwegian Realf and the Danish schooner Grethe. The Realf. an 8,000 ton vessel. was actually sunk either by submarine or mine in the North Sea Thursday night. The crew of fortyfour and ten others took to lifeboats and were picked up by an Italian ship. One is believed lost.
