### TRIBUTE OF ROOSEVELT

With Respect and Admiration—Nations to Pay War Debt Regularly

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 2.—The long honorable and peace-record has won Finland the respect and admiration of the people of this nation," said President Franklin D. Roosevelt yesterday. He is the only nation that has consistently met its war debt obligations to the United States. He has announced its intention to pay the next installment due December 15.

**KING TO BROADCAST**  
LONDON—King George will be heard in the usual Empire Christmas Day broadcast. Speakers from all parts of the Empire will participate as well as leaders of the fighting forces. The broadcast will start at 6:15 a.m. Pacific Standard Time and the King will go on the air about 7 a.m.

**BROKER GETS JAIL**  
VANCOUVER—Sidney Miller, Vancouver broker, was sentenced to eighteen months in jail Friday and was fined \$5000 with option of an additional nine months after conviction before Judge J. C. McIntosh on a charge of conspiring to defraud the public and shareholders of the Freehold Oil Corporation and Hargal Oils Limited.

**ARMSTRONG-AMBERS OFF**  
NEW YORK—The Henry Armstrong-Lou Ambers welterweight fight, scheduled for last night, was permanently called off because of Armstrong's ill health. Henceforth New York boxing Commission will not permit any one fighter to hold the title in more than one division.

**RED EXHIBIT ORDERED OUT**  
NEW YORK—Removal of the 15,000,000 Russian Exhibit from the World's Fair within ninety days is ordered.

### STORM TAKES FOUR PLANES

Germany Lost Machines in North Sea Yesterday—Crews Are Saved

BERLIN, Dec. 2:—Four German planes were lost yesterday on account of stormy weather. The crews were all saved.

**GERMAN LINER SCUTTLED**  
CAPE TOWN — The 9521-ton German liner Watussi was scuttled off Cape Point apparently to avoid capture. Announcement said she had been intercepted by South African bombers.

**ANTI-MINE MACHINE**  
LONDON—The British Admiralty has devised a machine which will explode magnetic mines under water. A machine has also been devised to draw the mines to the surface as a steel-hulled ship does.

**CANADIAN AIR FIGHTERS**  
LONDON—At least 1000 Canadians are now on service with the Royal Air Force in the European zone. A Canadian fighter squadron is being formed in France and will take its place immediately. Many Canadian aviators are in service with British defence units.

**CHAPLAINS NAMED**  
OTTAWA—Twenty-two Canadian Army chaplains have been named with the honorary rank of major. Fourteen are Anglicans, four United Church and two Presbyterians. These are in addition to Roman Catholic Chaplains.

### Canadians Are Safe Although Mines Blown Up

SUDBURY, Ont., Dec. 2: (CP)—Six hundred foreign refugees from Finland's Arctic Coast entering Norway after the Finnish invasion have included a number of Canadians. Among those were twelve employees of the International Nickel Co. and their families. The International Nickel Co. at Sudbury received word of the safety of its people although its mines are reported to have been blown up.

### French Senate Backs Daladier

Endorses Action of Chamber of Deputies in Extending Dictatorial Powers

PARIS, Dec. 2: (CP)—The French Senate yesterday approved the extension to Premier Edouard Daladier of decree powers for the duration of the war. The vote was 259 to 23. The measure had already cleared the major hurdle, gaining approval from the Chamber of Deputies.

### Fighting Dewey In Presidential Race

New York District Attorney Throws His Hat Into Ring for Republican Nomination

NEW YORK, Dec. 2: (CP)—Thomas Dewey, fighting district attorney, has formally entered the campaign for the republican presidential nomination. He has been offered and accepted the support of the New York state delegation at the national convention. Others being prominently mentioned for the Republican nomination are Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg of Michigan, Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio and Senator H. Styles Brydges of New Hampshire.

### Air Defences Very Strong

LONDON, Dec. 2: (CP)—The Air Ministry is well satisfied with the strength and capabilities of Great Britain's air defences as demonstrated under severe inspection. They were built to deal with wave after wave of enemy mass attacks and have proven particularly effective against the occasional raids which Nazi planes have so far indulged in. The strength of anti-aircraft batteries and the number of defence planes are being rapidly increased.

### JEER NAME OF STALIN

Anti-Soviet Demonstrations in Sweden and Denmark—Windows in Copenhagen Legation Broken

COPENHAGEN, Dec. 2: (CP)—All windows in the Soviet legation here were smashed during the night. Nor was Denmark the only country in which there were anti-Soviet demonstrations. Last night in the first demonstration of Swedish sentiment since the Russian invasion of Finland over two thousand Swedes crowded before the Finnish Legation in Stockholm shouting "Long Live Finland." The name of Joseph Stalin brought jeers.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 2:—Plans for a repetition of the Golden Gate International Exposition next year are off definitely. The exposition is to be liquidated, it has been finally decided.

### GERMANS AWKWARD

Allowed Themselves to be Trapped Into Vulnerable Positions by French on Western Front

PARIS, Dec. 2: (CP)—Activity on the Western Front was still on a minor scale today, French tricking of German patrols into vulnerable positions where they were blasted by machine gun and rifle fire at close range being the feature of the fighting. South of Saarbruecken one fairly large German patrol advanced to within range of the French and was blasted with some hand to hand fighting.

Near Lissebourg a German raid was allowed to take a position and was then driven out with several killed and wounded. A French communique reported patrol encounters and reciprocal artillery exchanges with little activity in the air.

A French patrol penetrated deep into German territory around the Vosges and came back with valuable information, not losing a single man.

### MORE SHIPS SENT DOWN

Two More Germans Captured by British—Three Russian and One Britisher

LONDON, Dec. 2: (CP)—Two German ships, the 2185-ton steamship Elbek and the 215-ton trawler Sophie Busse, have been captured by British naval units and brought to an English port.

The destruction of three neutral and one British merchantman since yesterday raised to at least 171 the number of ships sunk in the war.

The latest victims are the Finnish steamship Mercator, the Britisher Dalryan, the Norwegian Realf and the Danish schooner Grethe.

The Realf, an 8,000 ton vessel, was actually sunk either by submarine or mine in the North Sea Thursday night. The crew of forty-four and ten others took to lifeboats and were picked up by an Italian ship. One is believed lost.

### Poles Hide Gems Of Czarist Days

Resting Place of Russian Crown Jewels Mystifies Europe

LONDON, Dec. 2: (CP)—One of Europe's many guessing games today concerns the whereabouts of the Russian crown jewels, the property of the Republic of Poland. The jewels have belonged to Poland since 1938 when a promise made by the Soviet government to return Polish national treasures was forfeit and the Poles retained the crown jewels, deposited with them in 1920 as security against return of their own riches. The Polish valuables had been seized by the Czarist regime in the various partitions of Poland. The Russian jewels were removed from Warsaw before the German invasion along with personal jewelry of the Polish nobility and their eventual haven is rumored to be in Britain or the United States.

### DISCIPLINE EVER

## Defenders Are Proving Match For Cruel Russian Hordes In Spite of Overwhelming Odds

### WAR IN FINLAND

Capital Moved From Helsinki—United States Embargo Against Russia

**HELSINGFORS EVACUATED**  
As a precautionary measure, the Finnish government today evacuated Helsinki for an undisclosed city. Exodus of civilian population continues.

**RUSSIA'S RECOGNITION**  
At Moscow Russia formally recognized the "people's" provisional regime which she proclaimed for Finland while scorning the embattled Finn's own government. Premier Molotov praised the Russian-approved group as a factor leading to "hope for a peaceful and satisfactory solution of the present crisis."

**MENACE TO GERMANY**  
The Russian invasion of Finland is seen by London officialdom as a direct menace to Germany through giving the Soviet control of the Gulf of Finland and cutting off the German trade route with Sweden.

**FRANCE'S STAND**  
While announcing that France was prepared to take a firm stand over the Russo-Finnish situation providing United States takes the lead by breaking off diplomatic relations or some such measure, Premier Edouard Daladier today officially declared France's neutrality in the matter which he said was a "Baltic issue," which concerned Germany above all.

**MORAL EMBARGO INVOKED**  
President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States today invoked a moral embargo against the export of anything in the way of war materials to Soviet Russia in view of that country's ruthless bombing of Finland's civilian population. This action on the part of President Roosevelt followed a statement by Premier Foreign-Commissar Molotov of Russia that an appeal of the President to Russia to refrain from the barbarism of bombing civilians was "pointless" because Russia was not bombing civilians and did not intend to do so, directing its attack only against military objectives.

### Fathers Are Demobilized

PARIS, Dec. 2: (CP)—Premier Edouard Daladier announced today that all fathers of two or more children who have been mobilized will be released and sent back home. Hundreds of thousands of men will eventually be affected.

### LING WINS TRIP

Ling the Tailor was the winner of a trip to Vancouver or cash option in the Red Cross drawing at last night's dance. The lucky ticket was sold by Dong Sing.

### Have Succeeded in Driving Red Invaders Back at Many Points, Taking Numerous Demoralized Prisoners And Much Poorly Built Fighting Equipment

Despite the tremendous Russian drive by land, sea and air and although there appears to be overwhelming odds, in numbers at least, against them, valiant Finland continues to strike back at the massed attack of the Soviet. A great measure of success, too, is rewarding the defensive move against the aggression which has aroused protest from the entire civilized world. Yesterday the Finns were reported to have taken twelve hundred or more prisoners and thirty-six tanks from the Russians in the land fighting. They claimed to have brought down sixteen Soviet bombing planes and to have sunk the 8500-ton Russian warship Kir-off with five hundred of crew. The Russians, on the other hand, made claims of successes in widespread parts of the territory of their little neighbor.

### AIR RAIDS POSSIBLE

Premier Edouard Daladier Warns French People To Be Ready For Bombardment

PARIS, Dec. 2: (CP)—Premier Edouard Daladier yesterday warned the French people that, while mass air attacks by Germany upon France have not yet been engaged in, it is possible that they may be launched at any time and he advised the people to continue to be prepared for them. Yesterday German reconnaissance planes flew deep into northeastern France but dropped no bombs.

Finland's new government, headed by Risto Ryti, fifty-year-old president of the Bank of Finland, has pledged itself to fight to the last ditch in defence of the country's independence. "We fight with stout hearts and a clear conscience," declared Ryti. "We will not barter our independence or bargain away our right to self-government."

Premier-Foreign Commissar V. M. Molotov says that the new government of Finland is not acceptable to the Soviet. It does not improve matters between Russia and Finland.

**Finnish Victories**  
Independent reports from Copenhagen and other Baltic countries today indicated further marked successes by the Finns over the Russians. A surprise counter-attack on the Arctic coast had resulted, according to civilian refugees from Finland at Kirkenes, Norway, in the recapture of the mining port of Petsamo, the Finns easily driving out the Russians who were reported to be "exhausted, badly equipped and poorly nourished."

They were finding it impossible to carry on against the efficient defensive measures of the Finns. Earlier the city was reported in the hands of Russian troops who had parachuted to earth. British-owned nickel mines in that area were reported to have been blown up by Finnish troops to prevent Russian capture.

Refugees also declared that the Finns had defeated the Russians in a battle fifty miles north of Salmijarvi, site of valuable mines of the International Nickel Co. They said that the Russians had left 150 killed on the battlefield.

On the Isthmus of Karelia to the southeast, one of the principal Soviet objectives in its Finnish invasion, Finland's aircraft and light artillery were reported today to be inflicting severe losses upon the Russians. Numerous positions were being recaptured by the Finns. Tanks and other Russian equipment are found to have been poorly built and easy to put out of action while the morale of the Red forces is said to be very poor under the stress.

Finland's "Maginot Line" is proving a stout defence, military observers report, and naval defences are being found by the Russians to be well-nigh impregnable.

An example of the efficiency and valor of the Finnish fighting forces is that of one young Finnish air force pilot who is reported to have shot down no less than six Soviet planes since the war began. The chief of Finnish general staff, General von Mannerheim, in Canada.

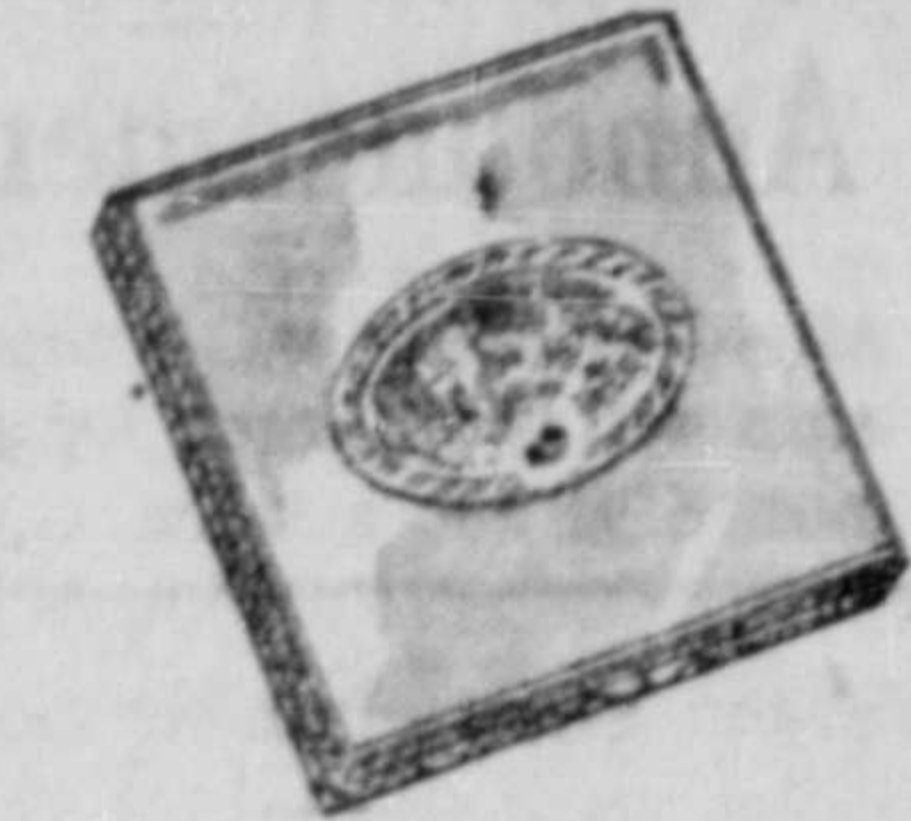

# Waterfront Whiffs

## New Fish Smoking Equipment at Cold Storage Plant Now in Operation—Herring Run So Far This Season Is Spotty

New smoke house facilities for the curing of fish are now in operation at the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. at Prince Rupert. The new facilities include the most up-to-date equipment for the processing of fish by smoking methods and will insure a further improved product. The installation includes modern methods devised by the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station in the course of its work along this line.

Although a few scattered catches have been made, the herring run during the past week in Prince Rupert Harbor proved somewhat spotty but an early improvement is anticipated. The very late arrival of winter weather conditions and the exceptionally mild weather for this time of year it is thought has had something to do with the condition. The fish are in the harbor but are swimming deep and difficult to catch. The sealing and packing fleets for the Tucks Inlet, Port Edward and other reduction

plants are remaining poised for action. Commander G. Borrie R.N.R. arrived in Prince Rupert on the Princess Adelaide last night from Esquimalt to take over the post of naval officer in charge at Prince Rupert in place of Commander C. D. Donald R. C. N. who, after having been here for several weeks, is returning to Esquimalt. Lieut. Orme Stuart has been appointed to further staff duties with the navy at Prince Rupert and henceforth will be devoting all his time to that work.

Capt. Walter Gosse arrived in the city on the Princess Adelaide last night to take over duty as pilot in connection with the local naval examination service. He relieves Capt. A. W. Ogden who left last night by the Princess Adelaide on his return to Vancouver after having been here for the past few weeks.

Announcement is made by the Department of Marine of the establishment of new lights on Kiwash Island off Namu harbor, Fitzhugh Sound; on Graholm Island, Spiller Channel, and Red Cliff Point, Princess Royal Island, Graham Reach. All three are flashing white acetylene lights unwatched.

Two coastal liners were in port last evening on their regular weekly calls. C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. Henry Anderson, arrived at 5:45 and sailed at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived at 8:30 p.m. and sailed at 10:30 on her return south. The Prince John, Capt. Neil McLean, also sailed at 10:30 p.m. for Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands.

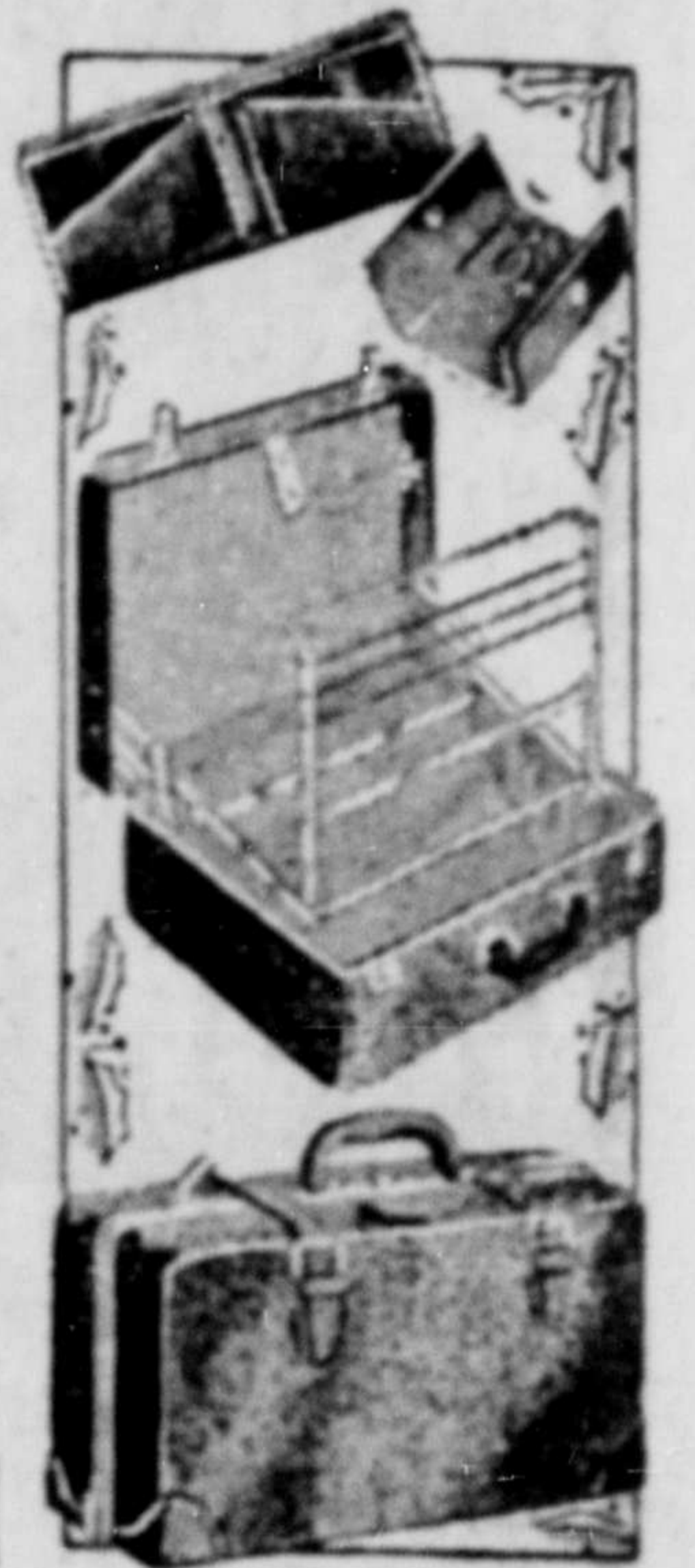
