#### Fearful Of War, Belgium And Holland Try To Stay Out; Two Monarchs Meet

LONDON, November 7.— An Exchange telegraph says that Germany has sent what amounts to an economic ultimatum to Belgium and Holland demanding commercial concessions under threat of military and economic pressure. Meantime both small neutral nations are intensely alarmed at military movements near the frontiers which they fear may mean German intention to invade them or draw them into the war. French troops have also been moving in an unexplained manner which it was thought might mean preparations to head off Germany should she decide on the invasion. Anti-aircraft fire was again heard around Leige today. Yesterday three German fighting planes flew over Belgium but were driven off by anti-aircraft fire and pursuit planes although one hovered over for some

King Leopold of Belgium arrived unexpectedly in The Hague Monday to visit with Queen Wilhelmina of Holland. The Belgian king was accompanied by his foreign minister. There was a lengthy conference until after midnight last night and there were further talks today before Leopold returned to Brussels for an extraordinary cabinet meeting. # EDITORIAIS

POSITION IN INDIA

The political position of India just now is a little difficult to understand. Most of the Indian princes have offered aid to the British government of men, material and money. These principalities have little to do with the rest of India.

The chief stickler to the main part of the country is the differences in religion. There is a large Mohamme dan population and there is a still larger Hindu group and these two cannot agree. From time to time in the past there have been clashes between the rivals and the British feel it their duty to see that no minority is injured by a majority. When a constitution is adopted providing for self-government it has to contain a provision protect ing the Mohammedan minority. The Hindus want a free hand to work these things out for themselves. Until the can get together and arrive at some understanding the British government is unable to grant them full Dominion rights.

#### INDIA MUST WAIT

How difficult is this question may be seen from the fact that Egypt, Arabia, Palestine, Syria, Turkey, Armenia and Iraq are largely Mohammedan countries and also the French and British North African colonies. The British attitude always has been that every man has a right to his own religion and that he should be protected in carrying out its dictates as long as doing so does not interfere with the rights of others. Because of the protection they have received, most of the Mohommedan countries are with Britain and France in the present struggle and nothing must be done to shake their faith in the British as protectors of their faith. India must wait until after the war for her constitution unless the factions can agree on a constitution even though doing so affects the support given by the Hindu population in the great struggle.
