

Liberals Are Swept Into Power; Rout Of Duplessis Decisive

Premier Himself Re-Elected But Few Members of His Ministry Survive-Godbout Will Be New Premier With Large Legislative Following

QUEBEC, October 26: (CP)-Hon. Adelard Godbout and his Liberal party scored a landslide victory in Wednesday's provincial election in Quebec, Premier Duplessis' government being swept out of office. Latest returns show 67 Liberals elected, 15 Union Nationale, one Independent and one Nationalist. Duplessis retained his seat

in Three Rivers but six of his ministers were defeated. Mayor Camillon Houde of Montreal was the only independent elected. Paul EVERYBODY Gouin, Action Liberale leader, was defeated with all 56 candidates of his group.

Soon after the polls closed a Liberal victory was conceded, results as they kept coming in steadily piling up the lead to make the Liberal victory more complete than was the party's overthrow three years ago.

Premier Duplessis retained his ment in Three Rivers but only three of his cabinet ministers will return with him to the Legislature.

Godbout, former Premier and farmer from the south side of the St. Lawrence River, was elected in minister of municipal affairs.

There are a total of eighty-six sents in the Quebec Legislature and, with the Liberals winning sixty-seven already, only nineteen, at the outside, are left for the Opposition. The Unione Nationale representation is reduced from seventy-one to the fifteen seats.

LIKE LAMBS TO THE SLAUGHTER

So monstrously misrepresentative of the obvious facts they are that we find ourselves fearful of imposing upon the intelligence of our readers in even commenting upon such lying speeches as that which German Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribberttrop delivered at Danzio' Tuesday in the effort to justify the German cause in the present war. Ribbentrop was "speaking to the world." Who in the world could possibly believe him when he so blandly repeated the charge of his nefarious chieftain Hitler that Creat Britain started this war is beyond us. The fact of the matter probably is that nobody believes the lies excent some poor deluded German neonle themselves Most likely the most of them do not believe them but have to swallow what the insane Fuehrer and his unscrupulou colleagues give out.

We feel sorry indeed that such fine people as the most of the Germans really are should once again have to be sacrificed for the mad ambitions of their fanatical leaders. This time it is their doom. Ribbentrop surely promised them that Tuesday when he said it would be a "fight to the finish." And they cheered, poor misguided fools!

Fortunately, the conscience of Britains is clear. Notwithstanding the lies of such as Hitler, Goering, Ribbentrop and Goehhels, the cruel fate that is in store for the Germans, if they insist in delaying the surrender of the base principles of their leaders, rests entirely upon themselves. Great Britain was forced at long last into a conflict which she abhorred and which she dreaded. Now that she is in it, she will stay until her arms have conquered as it becomes daily more apparent they will.

THE ASTUTE STALIN

If any one had thought that Soviet Russia had any intention of jumping into the war actively on Germany's side, Stalin's action in referring direct to the United States the case of the City of Flint, seized by a German warship and taken to a Russian port, should dispel the idea. Whatever forces the future may present for democracy and civilization to combat, there appears good reason to anticipate that Hitler and his Nazism will soon be definitely disposed of.






