HITLER TIGHTENS ON CZECHS PRAGUE, June 14:- Adolph Hitler Tuesday night sent the hief of his dreaded Gestapo secret police, Heirich Himmler, to Prague after a disclosure of the recent murders of six persons. Himmler arrived unannounced with German Minister of Justice Franz Guertner as Nazi authorities mapped a campaign to suppress a wide wave Hungertord of discontent which is marked by sporadic violence and killings. A new and mysterious element is spreading resistance against Nazi influence.

FLYING TO POLAND WARSAW, June 14:-Soldiers are fleeing across the frontier into Poland today by the hundreds, bringing reports of Nazi oppression of the Czech people and rumors of an impending German military occupation of Slovakia. More than four thousand officers, non-commissioned officers and men have succeeded in reaching Polish soil in recent days, it was revealed. TIENTSIN, June 14: (CP)-Rejecting British mediation attempts, Japanese officers indicated Tientsin dispute cannot now be settled merely by relinquishing four Chinese as originally demanded. They declared they will not cease present measures until the British reverse policy and afford us complete co-operation.

MOUNTAIN PARK

It has been suggested to the Daily News that the Provincial government should set aside the top of Mount Oldfield as a provincial park to be known possibly as Kaien Park and that the government should build a road to its summit. This, it is claimed, would make of it a major resort for the city during the summer months, a place that all tourists would wish to visit.

As it is, the land is the property of the provincial government and presumably could not be used for anything but park purposes. Possibly the federal government might agree to accept it and build the road to the summit. The whole matter is worth considering. Possibly a road to the top of the mountain would prove more valuable to Prince Rupert as a quick asset than anything we have tried.

SAVING THE WORLD

Yesterday, when sitting at his desk, the editor was confronted all at once by a number of methods of saving the world. A copy of the War Cry was on the desk, being the representative of a plan by which every man must declare himself to be a sinner and ask for salvation. There also on the desk, was a report of a meeting of advocates of technocracy, as a method of saving the world through expert engineers. On the same desk was the outline of another method of world salvation through "World Unity," advocated by Charles Davis, formerly an Englishman now residing at Cape Cod, Massachussetts, who for some time past has been sending out propaganda for his scheme. Only a day or two ago a nicely bound book called "Essentialism" arrived on the desk but so far the essential fact about it has not been discovered. Seldom a day passes that someone does not propound a scheme for world salvation. One day it is socialism, another it is communism, another it is national socialism, which is totally different from the other kind of socialism. Then, of course, there is fascism and the Nazi scheme of world salvation from which the Jews are to be banished, possibly to Mars. Some of the plans call for salvation through spectacular divine aid and sometimes through getting rid of the divine idea. Sometimes there seems to be a combination of both as in the British Israel theory. It keeps a person very busy dodging the persons who have designs on his soul or his body for, if he would keep his peace of mind, he must dodge them.

THE MEN THAT NOBODY WANTS

There are today a great many people without a country, people whom nobody seems to want. Most of them were born in Germany, Austria or Czechoslovakia but they are not wanted in those countries where only concentration camps await them. Canada has plenty of land but even Canada does not want these people, even though they may bring money with them. It is a terrible thing to be without a country.
