### ANOTHER AIR RAID BY NAZIS ON ROYAL NAVY; SCAPA FLOW IS VISITED

One German Bomber Reported Brought Down - Iron Duke Hit But Not Badly Damaged-Details of Firth of Forth Engagement

ORKNEY ISLANDS RAIDED LONDON, October 17: (CP)—The Admiralty tonight disclosed that a second air attack of the day had been carried out over the Orkney Islands, location of the Scapa Flow naval base, shortly after noon today between 12:30 and 2:30. Two formations of Nazi raiders, six planes in one and four in the other, made the second attack which followed the earlier raid in which the Iron Duke was damaged. One German plane was reported destroyed in the second raid, no damage being done by the attackers.

LONDON, October 17.—Another British naval base was visited today by German bombers, the objective being Scapa Flow. The training ship Iron Duke was damaged. One of four Nazi raiders was reported to have been brought down. No British casualties were reported.

### War In Earnest Is Beginning On Western Front; Hitler To Abandon All Restraint Now?

PARIS, October 17.—The opinion is now held some observers of the international situation that hancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany has abandoned ins "peace offensive" and is about to embark upon a new campaign of aggression with no consideration of the rights of smaller nations.

Der Fuehrer's plan is evidently to bring heavy pressure to bear upon the Maginot Line against france and at the same time push over Holland and probably through Belgium in order to provide himself with an aerial spring board into England.

Thirty Nazi divisions are now reported concentrated on the frontiers of Holland, Belgium and Luxembourg with at least thirty-five opposite the Maginot Line.

The provincial government pays the teacher between three and four hundred dollars, it being left to the school district to supplement this if it wishes but only 55 districts out of 197 do this and the amounts they pay are small. We have always looked upon Quebec as the backward province in the matter of education but there \$46.05 per nunil is spent whereas only \$31.55 is paid in Prince Edward Island and the only province coming lower than it is New Brunswick with \$29.86 about which the Federation may tell us in future bulletins.

We realize that we are giving only one side of this question and that there may be circumstances about which we are not informed. We are relying on the report of the teachers themselves. However, we can see no excuse for any part of Canada treating its teachers in the manner stated in the circular.


