Russia And Turkey Are Joining Up

DICTATORS OPPOSE PLAN OF PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT TO INSURE WORLD PEACE

Decided "No" is, Apparently, Answer of Hitler and Mussolini to Question About Foregoing of Invasion

LONDON, April 17: (CP)—"No," in no uncertain terms, will, it appears, be the answer of the dictators of Germany and Italy to the proposal of President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States for a cessation of aggression and period of at least ten years of peace in Europe.

Instead of consenting to co-operate in peace measures for the world, the press of the countries, believed to be officially inspired, attacks President Roosevelt and, by inference at least, suggests ulterior motives to his proposal. All they see or profess to see is an endeavour to encircle the aggressors and deny their just rights and claims.

Pending direct statements, the Berlin press continues stern criticism and indicates in no unambiguous terms that the attitude of Hitler of Germany is negative and that he intends to reject Roosevelt's proposal to act as an intermediary with a view to reaching agreements among the nations which would result in a guarantee of world peace for a period of at least ten years. The inference of Roosevelt that Germany and Italy are the only two nations to hope with intentions of aggression is resented.

Chancellor Hitler today summoned the Reichstag for April 28 to discuss the proposal. He is expected to announce that he will not accept Roosevelt's proposal. He is expected to announce that he will not accept Roosevelt's proposal.

The proposal of the President had been that Germany and Italy undertake not to invade any independent country in Europe and some in Asia. Every country in Europe was named in the guarantee against invasion except, of course, Germany and Italy and countries which they were not already taken over.

Congressional Approval
 WASHINGTON, D.C., April 17:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt's European peace plan received a measure of approval in congressional comment on Saturday although, as was to be expected, there was certain criticism. Senator John D. Bankhead was one of those who expressed himself in full approval of the President's course.

Senator Hiram Johnson of California said it is good publicity but that "all" Senator W. E. Borah of Idaho and Senator Charles McNary repeated their opposition to becoming involved in any way in European affairs.

The Russian Soviet, British, French and Canadian governments and seventy-five per cent of the nations of Latin America, including Argentina and Brazil have approved the President's plan. Messages of congratulation and support have been received from these nations. In England the plan was received with tremendous approval.

Two Important Key Nations To Unite With Great Britain And France Against Aggression

AROUND EUROPE TODAY

GIBRALTAR — Thirteen French warships are concentrated at Gibraltar while virtually the entire British Mediterranean fleet is around Malta following the annexation of Albania by Italy. Three French admirals are now at Gibraltar and destroyer are patrolling the strait.

LONDON—Air agreements under negotiation between Great Britain, France and Russia under the proposed anti-aggression pact would make 12,000 fighting planes available to go into the air at once as compared with a maximum of 19,000 for the axis powers, thus ensuring a definite superiority.

GIBRALTAR — A considerable number of Spanish troops which have been near the frontiers of this British Mediterranean outpost have been withdrawn, it is reported.

BRITAIN—Rumors that Chancellor Adolf Hitler has any intention of taking over the free port of Danzig are discounted in official quarters here. There may, however, be negotiations between Germany and Poland on the matter.

Soviet Would Give Full Military Guarantees to Roumania, Greece, Turkey and Poland—Bargain With Turks

LONDON, April 17: (CP)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain is expected to announce to Parliament late this week Anglo-French agreements with Russia and Turkey, adding these countries to the non-aggression front. The Turkish agreement may consist of Great Britain and France committing themselves to protect Turkey in return for a guarantee that the fleets of these two countries will be given unrestricted use of the Dardanelles in war time. Turkey is reliably reported to have agreed to join a pact on these conditions.

The Soviet agreement may consist of Russia giving full military guarantees to Roumania, Greece and Turkey and pledging to use her vast air strength in defence of Poland.

LUNENBURG Fishing Schooners Saw It—Identity Is Mystery

LUNENBURG, Nova Scotia, April 17: (CP)—Local fishing schooners reported sighting a submarine off the Nova Scotia coast on Saturday. A Royal Canadian Air Force plane went out to investigate but reported sighting no such craft. It was said that it might have been an American undersea craft but the United States Navy Department doubted it.

Looking After Protection Of King and Queen

LONDON, April 17: (CP)—Inspector Albert Gaining of Scotland Yard has sailed for New York. He will be in charge of making protective arrangements for the King and Queen during their tour of the United States and Canada. He will visit several of the points to be included in Their Majesties' tour and will meet them when they land at Quebec.

EIRE IS NEUTRAL

De Valera Says His Nation Will Not Take Part in War—Not So Northern Ireland
 ENNIS, Eire, April 17: (CP)—Prime Minister Eamon de Valera said that only "mercy of providence can save Europe from a war more terrible" than the last and proclaimed a policy of neutrality in wartime for his nation. Commenting at Belfast on de Valera's speech, Viscount Craigavon, Prime Minister of Northern Ireland, said that Northern Ireland would not remain neutral in a war involving Great Britain and the Empire.

 QUEBEC, April 17: (CP)—The Earl and Countess Baldwin landed in Canada yesterday from the liner Duchess of York. The Earl and Countess will spend three days at Ottawa as the guests of the Governor General and Lady Tweedsmuir before proceeding to Toronto where the Earl will participate in a convocation of the University of Toronto.

A STATE OF MIND

Last week a local man was listening to the radio when he happened to hear a speaker in the United States remark: "Democracy is a state of mind." It was a rather striking remark and he says it made him think about the state of mind of the people of Germany, Italy, Russia and almost a dozen other countries. There countries are not democracies because they are not imbued with the democratic idea.

Democracy was born in England. There it developed gradually step by step until the time came when every man had a right to vote, a right to free education, a right to express his opinion in any reasonable manner and the right to worship God as he pleased.

In no country are all the people democratic. In Prince Rupert, even, it is noticed that a good many have not the democratic mind. They would like to force people to do what they wish them to do. Happily they are a minority.

In any democracy there are bound to be differences. There are certain common interests such as those of labor, of business, professional interests, interests depending upon location. If the members of these groups are all tolerant and recognize fully the rights of the others there should be no difficulty in getting along well together.

THE TEN YEAR PACT

The ten year pact proposed by President Roosevelt would be a wonderful thing, especially if it were guaranteed by the United States as well as the other nations concerned. As it is today we seem to be rapidly drifting into a war which can end only in disaster to almost every nation including Germany and Italy. With Great Britain, United States, France and Russia guaranteeing the integrity of the smaller nations there would be a renewal of confidence and at once a general improvement in business conditions. People with money would be willing to invest it with the result that new industries would spring up and there would be more employment.

WHY KNOCK?

Let any citizen get an idea that he would like to do something for the community and immediately two other citizens want to know what sort of a fool he is to try to do anything in the "gol darn" town. For every constructive thinker there are always at least two knockers and, the more active the person who tries to do something, the more active becomes the knockers. It is the same everywhere. Let a man build a house and the neighbors at once want to know why he built it there, why he did not build it taller or lower, larger or smaller and why in the name of all that's foolish he ever thought of building in this town?

Most people do a little knocking occasionally, even those who object to other people doing it.

GOVERNING OF LONDON

New Set-Up for Big City is Proposed

LONDON, April 17: (CP)— An ambitious scheme to eliminate overlapping legislative machinery in Greater London and creation of a central administrative authority is advocated in a report just released by W. A. Robson, of London University.

A noted specialist on civic government, Mr. Robson has produced his plans after years of investigation and study of the peculiar problems of the Empire's metropolis which critics have declared "the most over-governed" area in the world.

Under the heading "The Government and Misgovernment of London," Robson's report recommends abolition of the present London County Council, the Corporation of the City of London, the Middlesex County Council, amalgamation of boroughs and councils and sweeping revision of county boundaries.

The plan provides for the creation of constituencies or wards of 75,000 people, each of which would have an equal voice in the election of an administrative council of 120 members and 30 aldermen.

It is proposed to abolish the ancient office of Lord Mayor which the Corporation of London has elected annually since King John granted a new charter to the city in 1214. The chairman of the new body would become the Lord Mayor of Greater London.

Mr. Robson believes millions of pounds would be saved annually by his plan. At present the corporation of London consists of the Lord Mayor, 25 aldermen and 206 councillors. The L.C.C. has its chairman, 20 aldermen and 124 councillors. There are also 111 local councils within the L.C.C. area. Robson suggests these be reduced to 29 by geographical amalgamations and that the 28 Metropolitan boroughs along with the "City" be merged into 12 groups. Similar amalgamations are advocated for other areas in Greater London.

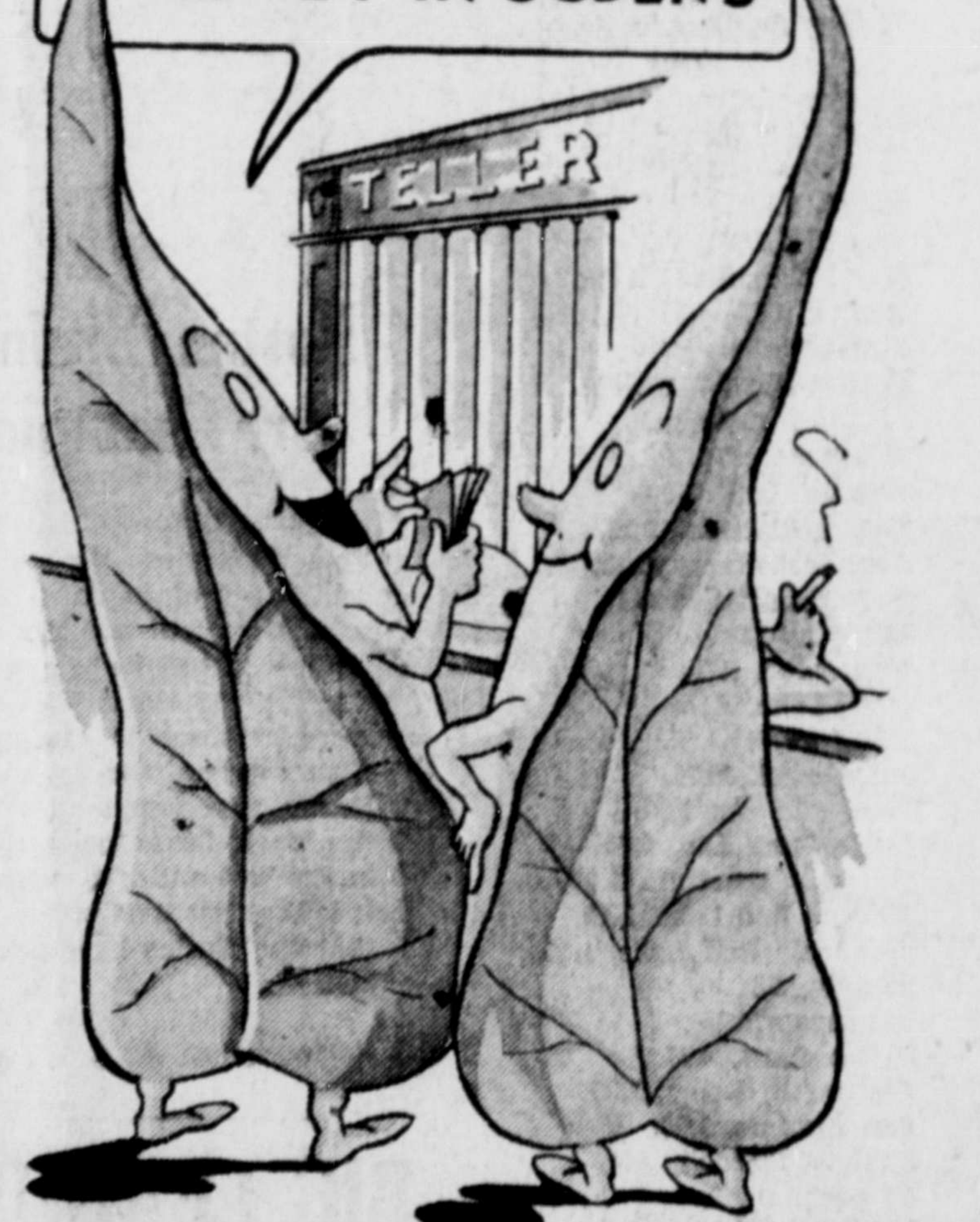
WINNIPEG WHEAT PRICES
