GERMAN PLANES ACTIVE

Reports Given For More Attacks on British War Vessels in North Sea Area

BERLIN, Oct. 11.—The German air force has been ordered to continue the attacks on British warships operating in the North Sea. Officials said the order one of the most important announcements since the war ended. Germany claims that British vessels during the attack Monday but the British ministry denied any damage had been done before the German raiders were driven off.

NAZI PLANE IS DOWNED

LONDON, Oct. 10.—A German military plane was reported south of Norway in the North Sea. It was pursued by British fighters, making away in the direction of the coast.

CANADA ON WAR BASIS

What Has Been Accomplished During First Month of Campaign Is Reviewed

OTTAWA, October 11: (CP)—A month after entering the struggle against Germany finds Canadian economy on a war footing. Canadian federal politics in wartime and the armed forces of sea, land and air speeding up preparations for combat, said an official government statement yesterday.

The first month of Canadian participation in the war brought an actual clash between Canadian and enemy forces but saw upwards of sixty thousand young Canadians through recruiting office into barracks and training camps and the government reach out its hand to direct industry, agriculture and finance into channels considered most helpful to the general war effort.

NEUTRALITY VOTE SOON

Heavy Approval by Senate Of Administration Plan Now Indicated

WASHINGTON, D. C., October 11.—By Saturday it is expected a final vote will be reached on the question of revision of United States neutrality laws. Senator Key Pittman predicts that there will be at least sixty-five votes in the Senate in favor of the administration plan. The bill will be passed as it now stands, Pittman expects.

Yesterday the proposal of Senator Charles Tobey of New Hampshire to resubmit the administration plan to the committee was defeated 65 to 26 and this is taken as indicating the vote in favor of the plan. "You can't beat a steam roller," said Tobey.

Senator Tobey is a cousin of W. H. Tobey of Prince Rupert.

War News

FINNS EVACUATING HELSINGFORS—Extra trains and busses are being run to transport thousands of evacuees from Helsingfors and other Finnish cities and special air raid precautions are being taken against the possibility of an attack by Russia. Helsingfors had its first black-out last night.

TERRIBLE DEATH RAY—NEW YORK—The possibility of the use in war of a death-dealing ray which would be capable of painlessly killing people from a distance of miles is envisioned here. It might be used with terrible effect on civilian populations.

BRITISH AIR MISSION—OTTAWA—Lord Riverdale is the head of a British air mission now on the way to Canada in connection with the plan to make Canada the air centre of the Empire. There will also be corresponding delegations from Australia and New Zealand and all will meet here. Student fliers from Australia and New Zealand will be trained in Western Canada and those from Great Britain in the East.

INDIAN DELEGATES COMING—CALCUTTA—The government of India is sending representatives to London to confer with the British government on prosecution of the war.

HER SON KILLED—VANCOUVER—Mrs. Innes M. Hopkins has been advised that her son, Robert Innes, has been killed at Cambridge, England, while training in the Royal Air Force.

HOOVER'S STAND—NEW YORK—Former President Herbert Hoover favors sale by United States to warring nations of defensive instruments of war such as pursuit planes and anti-aircraft guns but would ban the export of instruments of attack such as submarine, bombing planes and poison gas.

BISHOP WELLS NAMED—OTTAWA—Rt. Rev. George A. Wells, Anglican Bishop of Cariboo, has been appointed chaplain general of the Canadian forces.

MUSSOLINI IGNORES PEACE—ROME—Premier Mussolini addressing 5,000 of his followers made no reference to Hitler's peace proposals.

AIRMEN ON MOVE—LONDON—Many squadrons of the Royal Air Force are already in France and many others are going across very soon.

PRESIDENT APPRECIATIVE—PARIS—Former President Dr. Benes of Czechoslovakia has thanked France for allowing the Czech army to reorganize there and said he expected an army would soon be fighting side by side with the French and British against the common enemy.

BRITAIN BUYS COTTON—LONDON—The British government has agreed to purchase from the Egyptian government a million and a half bales of cotton which ordinarily would have gone to Germany and other European nations.

EVACUATION CONTINUES—BERLIN—German citizens are arriving in Germany by thousands from Baltic States as part of the plan of repatriation being carried out. Most of the men sold their belongings in Latvia before leaving. The first to be

COMBAT ON IDOLIZING NORTH SEA CHURCHILL

Continued Engagements Between British Surface Craft And German Planes Reported

LONDON, Oct. 11.—British warships and German fighting planes were again in combat over the North Sea yesterday. In Berlin it was claimed that there had been six hits by the German planes but an official British announcement stated that there had been no losses and no casualties. It was not immediately known what the extent of the German casualties might have been although some of the enemy aircraft were forced down in neutral territory and some came down at sea.

TURKEY WARNED—BERLIN—Berlin, through its press, today warned Turkey to decide whether it would join the encircling nations against Germany or change its foreign policy.

BLACK OUT CANAL—PANAMA—Panama Canal will be blacked out at regular intervals, it was announced. The blackouts will be solely for training purposes against the eventualities of air attacks.

BERLIN—Chancellor Hitler broadcast a message yesterday in which he said that, while Germany was ready to accept any reasonable peace, it was also ready to carry on the war in fulfillment of rightful demands. Germany would never be brought to its knees again, declared Hitler.

Bulletins

FISHERIES PROSECUTIONS—Several local halibut boats, charged with violation of International Fisheries Commission regulations, were before Stipendiary Magistrate Andrew Thompson in provincial police court today, adjournment being taken until next Tuesday.

CANNOT EXPORT CHUMS—OTTAWA—Export from Canada of British Columbia chum salmon in the fresh state has been prohibited for the remainder of the calendar year under authority of the War Measures Act, the Fisheries Department said today. The aim is to conserve salmon supply for use within the Empire and the prohibition is imposed at the provincial government's request.

ARBITRATION INVOKED—VICTORIA—The provincial arbitration act has been invoked by Hon. George Pearson, minister of mines, in connection with the miners' strike at Pioneer mine in the Bridge River district which started this week.

KILLED IN INTERIOR—PRINCE GEORGE—Edward Marsden, a feller in a Longworth logging camp near here, was killed yesterday by a falling tree.

QUEFNEI BURGLARY—QUESNEL—The safe of the government liquor store here was blown and \$700 in cash taken. The stock is being checked to see if any liquor was taken.

SEINEBOAT BURNED—VANCOUVER—The seineboat Izumi was destroyed by fire in the Gulf of Georgia north of Parksville, Vancouver Island, after the engine backfired. The crew of five got away in the dinghy and were rescued.

PEACE IS UNLIKELY

Even Berlin Now Beginning To Admit That Hitler's Peace Terms Not Satisfactory

BERLIN, October 11: (CP)—Informed German quarters acknowledge that peace prospects will "not be bright" if Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain supports the rejection of Premier Edouard Daladier of France of Chancellor Adolf Hitler's conditional peace proposals.

Hope of neutral nations taking up Hitler's peace proposals is practically vanished. President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States said last night that he had not received any proposals of peace or mediation.

NEGOTIATE IN MOSCOW

Soviet Bargaining With Both Germany And Britain

MOSCOW, October 11:—Negotiations are proceeding between the Reich and the Soviet for commercial exchanges at a rapid pace on large scale.

At the same time important commercial negotiations are proceeding between Great Britain and the Soviet.

It is still unexplained how Soviet Russia is going to be able to obtain large quantities of natural products for export or how Germany is going to be able to produce enormous quantities of manufactured goods for export to Russia over and above her own intensive demands for war materials.

Hore-Belisha Tells House of Movements To Back Up French

So Far 158,000 Men and 25,000 Vehicles Have Been Transported to Fighting Arena and Organization Is Being Perfected

LONDON, October 11: (CP)—Great Britain has transported to France 158,000 men and 25,000 vehicles in the first five weeks of the war, Secretary of State for War Hore-Belisha told the House of Commons today. During the same period "we have created base and lines of communication organization so as to assure a regular flow of supplies and ammunition of every kind and to receive further contingents if and when we may decide to send them."

Many Priests Liquidated By Russians

MOSCOW, Oct. 11.—The organ of the anti-religious movement, indicated that a large number of Roman Catholic and Greek Orthodox priests had been "liquidated" when the Soviet troops marched into White Russia and the western Ukraine in partitioned Poland.

SOME ARE EXEMPTED

Canadian Industry Not to be Stripped of Key Men For Military Service

OTTAWA, Oct. 11.—Amplifying a statement of Hon. Norman Rogers, minister of national defence, that recruiting of Canada's active forces will not be permitted to strip industry of needed skilled or key men, Department of Defence officials have begun compilation of an extensive list of civilian posts from which men should not be recruited.

NAZIS ARE BEING HELD

Repeated German Assaults On Western Front Are Turned Back—Allies Ready For Anything

PARIS, October 11: (CP)—French troops repeatedly turned back numerous German assaults south of strategic Saarbruecken yesterday with hand grenades and rifle fire. The Nazi thrusts, it was indicated, were apparently aimed at breaking the French lines which are tightening on three sides of Saarbruecken.

German raiding parties also sought to take prisoners to obtain information on French advance positions, it was said. Both objectives failed, the French said.

German troops have been trying vainly to recapture lost positions between the Moselle and the Saar. Fighting, which of late has been concentrated to a large extent around Saarbruecken, is beginning to become more extensive. Artillery and machine gunning, particularly east of the Saar River, is becoming more intense.

Waves of Germans have been caught in French machine gun fire, paying dearly for their unsuccessful thrusts.

The French report that they have consolidated commanding positions overlooking Saarbruecken. An official statement, issued in London, says that French and British armies, after five weeks of victory on the western front, are ready for a terrific offensive by Germany wherever it may come. British and French have joined forces to resist any assault.

New Government For Lithuania

TALLINN, Esthonia, October 11: (CP)—Premier Eenpalus' cabinet has resigned to permit reorganization of the government on a broader basis following the non-aggression treaty with Russia which gives the Soviet a greatly increased scale of influence in the country.

IS READY TO RESIGN

If Duplessis Wins "Sabotage Election," Lapointe and Other Federal Ministers Will Quit

OTTAWA, October 11: (CP)—Rt. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, in a radio address over Quebec stations, said that a Duplessis government victory in the forthcoming provincial election would be a cue to himself and three other Quebec members of the federal cabinet to resign. He said that the election was an "act of national sabotage and already gangster methods were in use."

Contract For Skeena Road

Mannex Company Is Starting Work On Highway East of Usk

The Mannex Company of Vancouver has been awarded a contract for work on the Skeena River highway east of Usk, concentrating on a heavy piece of rock work. A working crew consisting of district men has been organized and a considerable amount of machinery has been unloaded at Usk. The work will be carried through to completion as rapidly as possible.

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PREVENT FIRES

Fire Chief H. T. Lock is leading a campaign to try to get Prince Rupert people to prevent fires, just as any good police chief tries to get people to prevent crime. It is much more effective to prevent fires than to put them out after they have started.

One of the big fire dangers is the smoker. The man who takes a last smoke in bed is apt to set fire to the bedclothes. Another danger is the woman who uses inflammables in cleaning. Mothers who leave matches within reach of small children also are inviting trouble.

The Fire Chief suggests that every institution or home examine its fire fighting apparatus to see if it is in good working order and get rid of accumulations of paper or other refuse. He says that gasoline, benzine and naphtha should never be kept in a dwelling. Oily rags are particularly dangerous. Putting hot ashes in wooden boxes is foolish. Poorly supported or corroded smoke pipes are a constant hazard.

Electric irons left with the power turned on often cause fires. Poor wiring is also dangerous. See that the electric wiring is in good shape and eliminate the hazard from accumulations of rubbish and careless smokers and fires are not likely to occur. We put in a plea for co-operation with the fire department in order that we may be free from fires in the city.

WAS EVER ANYTHING LIKE IT?

Here we have a condition in which the country is at war and a political party is sending around speakers, seemingly trying to do its best to interfere with war preparations. This is done in the name of liberty, that much abused word. Yet these are the people who only recently were blaming the British government for being lukewarm in regard to the trouble in Spain.

Then, too, down in Quebec an election is being held, for the purpose of protesting against Canada going into the war without first taking a vote of the people.

If, as suggested, Mackenzie King should decide to appeal to the country on a war policy it would be a hot election, anything but helpful at a time like this.

PACT WITH LITHUANIA

Agreement With Russia Has By No Means Been A Total Loss For This Baltic State. It Is Evident

MOSCOW, October 11: (CP) — The mutual assistance pact between Russia and Lithuania was completed last night. No naval or air base sites are ceded under the pact to Russia, the agreement thereby differing from those reached with Estonia and Latvia. Provision is, however, made for Russia to garrison troops in Lithuania. Russia also gets railway concessions. Lithuania also gets something quite definite out of the agree-

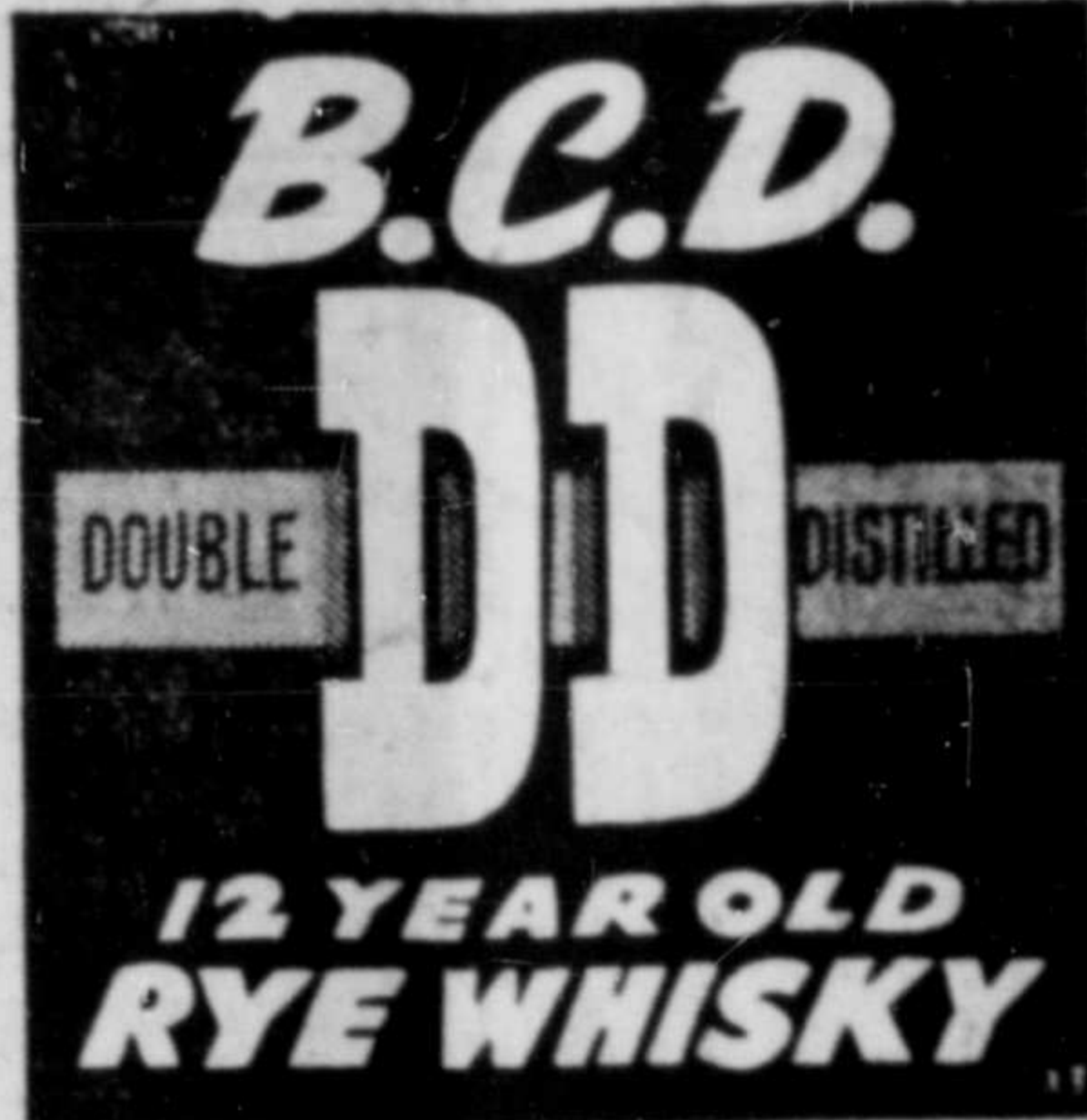
From The Waterfront
