

WORKS PROGRAM

British Columbia needs money to carry out highway construction work and especially to complete the last link of the highway connecting British Columbia with Alberta. 11/4c lower, May closing at 64%c. ads. Do you? Premier Pattullo went to Ottawa to try to get it and he announces that his mission is in a fair way to securing results. The provincial minister of labor is to meet the federal minister of labor to discuss the relief question in detail and the indications are that British Columbia will get pretty much what she asks providing the requests are reasonable.

It is all to British Columbia's benefit to be able to work in harmony with Ottawa as long as she gets reasonably good treatment. We cannot expect to get all we want but we must, in a huge and difficult province like this, get enough money to enable us to carry out such public works as are absolutely necessary. Roads are administered by the province but the federal government has made it a policy to help on main highways. Just as soon as the main highway in the south is built through we shall make much more strenuous efforts to secure the completion of the northern highway. We must acknowledge that the southern route has precedence for the bulk of the population is in the south. At the same time we shall press for some work on the highway connecting Prince Rupert with the rest of the highway.

DOUBLE PARTIES

It seems to have become the fashion in Prince Rupert for those planning to attend a dance to either precede it by a dinner or by a cocktail party that sometimes lasts until midnight, the rest of the night being but an incident instead of the main part of the entertainment. Nobody goes early with the result that dances have become something of a farce. The system is not only more expensive than it; should be but it also tends to break up the whole system of giving dances for entertainment.

POLICY OF ABOLITION

According to Mr. Herridge the only way to administer the affairs of Canada is to get rid of the existing political parties. Doubtless, he is referring to the Liberal, Conservative and C.C.F. parties, the only ones of any importance in the Dominion. He does not say whether he finds the present members of Parliament inefficient or dishonest or dilatory but he does not like them. He would have told a different story if at the Ottawa convention of the party the Conservatives had chosen him for leader. They did not do so and, as a result, he thinks they should! all be abolished.
