Italy To Withdraw From Spain-COME WEST Britain May Not Denounce Pact-Consulting Again With Soviet-

LONDON, April 11: (CP)- Italy has given Great Britain assurances that Italian troops will be withdrawn from Spain within three weeks, it was reported here today. The assurance may strengthen the government in its intention not to denounce the Anglo-Italian treaty under which Premier Benito Mussolini agreed not to disturb the status quo in the Mediterranean area. Following the Italian occupation of Albania, it had been considered possible that the treaty might be denounced by Great Britain as having been violated.

Anglo-Russian consultations were resumed today between Foreign Minister Lord Halifax and Russian ambassador Maisky as a prelude to a special inner cabinet meeting to consider latest reports of troop concentrations and of Italian moves in the Balkans.

There has been no official declaration of British policy but it is reported in some quarters that announcement of guarantees to Greece and Turkey may be delayed for some days.
