## Pacelli Is Chosen As Next Pope

### Pontifical Secretary Of State Succeeds To Throne Of St. Peter

Will Assume Title of Pius XII—First Time in Three Hundred Years Choice Has Been Made So Speedily

VATICAN CITY, March 2: (CP)—Eugenio Cardinal Pacelli was today elected the 262nd Pope. The new pontiff, who was papal secretary of state under Pope Pius XI, succeeded to the Throne of St. Peter on his sixty-third birthday. He will take the name of Pius XII. The word plus denotes peace. He is an Italian.

It was the first time in three hundred years that agreement on a new Pope was reached on the conclave's first voting day. Camillo Cardinal Caccia-Dominioni made the announcement of the election of the new Pope from the balcony of St. Peter's. An immense crowd broke through a cordon of carabinieri and militiamen to swarm up the broad steps of the Basilica.

### DAWSON IS FINE TOWN

People There Are All One Big, Happy Family With Real Community Spirit—Built on Ice But Heart Is Warm

"Dawson is no ghost town but a well equipped and modern little city with good streets, schools, clubs, churches, electric lights and telephones." Rev. Father E. M. LeRay, parish priest of the Roman Catholic Church in the famous old Yukon mining camp, told the Prince Rupert Gyo Club at its regular weekly luncheon yesterday in a very interesting talk. Possessing a spirit of cheerfulness and mutual helpfulness, the people of Dawson were like one big family. There were no such considerations there as creed, politics, state of life or nationality. It was a meeting place of nations where all reached common ground. Those who had a little more than they needed always tried to help those who had a little less. The depression had not been felt at Dawson as it had in many other places because of this attitude. There was a community spirit there such as might well be emulated in many other places.

Father LeRay gave his listeners considerable interesting information about the old camp. He told how the city was actually built on glacial ice which could be reached by digging down through eight or ten feet of ground. As a result, it was impossible to have permanent stone or brick buildings. The shifting ice made it necessary to renew the foundations of the frame buildings every four or five years.

The severe winter weather is apparently about the only thing Father LeRay does not like about Dawson. Seventy below zero in winter is really cold, he thinks. However, the people are prepared for it. Buildings and houses are snug, tight and well heated. Huge stocks of wood fuel are laid in every winter. Even the graves are dug in the fall before the freeze-up as it would be impossible to dig them in the winter. The undertaker and the gravedigger have to estimate how many people will die. The first snow comes early in September and sometimes it lasts into May. Dawson in June, July and August, however, is a virtual paradise with almost perpetual sunshine.

The palmy days of 1898, when millions were made overnight, were gone and he believed forever, said Father LeRay. Like anywhere else, the people there have to work and work hard for a living. Finding gold was no easy job, the father said. A man had to use his brain as well as his brawn.

Father LeRay urged his listeners to be like the people of Dawson—try to be cheerful and see the best side of everything, try to be mutually helpful, try to be understanding. That was the way in which

### Preliminary Hearing In Murder Attempt Case Is Heard Here; To Be Concluded Tomorrow

Jack Rutter Tells Magistrate of Attack by Nick Sulikowski in Rooming House

### Intent Statement Features Evidence

Accused Purported to Said Shooting Should Have Taken Place Years Ago

Evidence of how Nick Sulikowski, 38-year-old laborer, had entered the kitchen of the Westholme rooming house here on February 15 armed with a newly purchased rifle, aimed the weapon at his wife, was intercepted by Jack Rutter, a railway locomotive engineer, causing the bullet to be discharged into the ceiling after which, in the course of a struggle, Sulikowski seized a bread knife with which he slashed Rutter around the eyes before the melee was broken up by police officers was given at the preliminary hearing of Sulikowski yesterday afternoon before Magistrate Thomas McLennan on a charge of attempted murder. Evidence was also given as to how Sulikowski, after being placed under arrest and duly warned, had declared that "I intended to shoot the ——. He should have been shot a long time ago."

Rutter himself gave the evidence in regard to the affray. Provincial Constable W. J. Currie presented Sulikowski's purported statement after arrest.

Defence counsel R. L. McLennan objected to the statement being admitted on the grounds that accused was not competent of understanding the nature of a police warning but the Magistrate admitted it after Sergeant Chris Jacklin, who handled the prosecution, pointed out that the question of admissibility of such a statement could be argued out in the higher court.

The hearing was adjourned until Friday at the request of the defence counsel who, referring to a woman, Mrs. Helen Wolenski, now at Pacific, who was also in the room at the time of the affair, insisted that the crown should present at the preliminary hearing its principal material evidence.

Attack Is Described  
Rutter, in his evidence, stated that the time was just about noon. They were just finishing lunch. The door was three or four inches open. Two slight taps were heard and the door was pushed open by the barrel of a rifle. Witness was sitting on a chair about eight feet from the door. Nick had the rifle and was carrying it low. It was pointing into the kitchen and he was working at the mechanism with his right hand. Then he brought the weapon up to his shoulder, aiming, witness presumed, at his (Sulikowski's) wife. Rutter then moved over quickly and caused the barrel to raise just as the rifle discharged. Accused shook his head, stared hard and seemed surprised that Mrs. Sulikowski was still there. "I closed with him and caused him to drop the rifle," continued Rutter. In the course of the struggle that ensued, accused dragged witness into the kitchen and got a knife out of the pantry. Rutter took hold of the knife by the blade and bent it. Accused made several vicious stabs and he did not see anything after that. Exhausted he fell to the floor with Sulikowski, still with the knife, bending over him. Witness remembered the police arriving. Accused had never threatened him before. During the struggle, witness could remember nothing having been said either by accused or himself.

### Thirty Are Feared To Have Lost Lives In Halifax Hotel Fire; \$800,000 Damage Done

MOST OF 117 PERSONS WHO WERE IN HOSTELRY ARE STILL UNACCOUNTED—SOME KNOWN TO HAVE BEEN SERIOUSLY INJURED

HALIFAX, March 2: (CP)—More than a score of persons were listed missing and believed dead after a holocaust which devoured the old Queen Hotel and gnawed a huge chunk out of Halifax's close built business section, causing damage estimated at \$800,000. The exact toll of deaths and injuries is not yet estimated. Two bodies have been recovered and only forty-eight others of 117 persons who were in the big frame hostel have been accounted for. Of the 48 rescued and accounted for twenty are in hospital, some seriously hurt. Police said the death toll might reach as high as thirty.

Too Many Seeking Job and Age to Students at Heidelberg Must Forego Swing Music

HEIDELBERG, March 2: (CP)—The Heidelberg Nazi student leader has taken steps to protect this centuries-old German university centre from an invasion of modern dance music. He has forbidden the playing of "swing" music and the "Lambeth Walk" at all student affairs because such music and dances are "foreign to German nature and the National Socialist behavior of Germans students."



According to Madeleine Kent, author of the book "I Married a German," there are something like twenty-five per cent of the German people who are violently antagonistic to the present regime but they are powerless against the opposition of the ruling faction. This lady tells of some of the horrors of the dictatorship, particularly of the concentration camps. She tells of eighteen men being kicked to death in the camp where her husband was. She says some of the things that came to her attention are too horrible to relate.

## TEACHERS' MEETING

Considerable Business Dealt With at Gathering Last Night

In addition to routine business the Prince Rupert Teachers' Association, at the monthly meeting last evening, had reports of two committees to consider and also the matter of resolutions for the annual provincial convention to be held in Vancouver during Easter week.

The report of the committee on the King report on school finance emphasized the need for the immediate taking over by the provincial government of the responsibility of providing the funds necessary to carry out the curriculum as laid down by the Department. Teachers should not be faced with the problem of raising money to provide the equipment, visual aids

and other supplies. The report of the salary committee was considered at length and the recommendations were referred back to the various sections for their consideration.

Resolutions for the Easter convention reiterated the need for a provincial salary scale so that teachers may be paid more equitably. The present pupil's monthly report card was felt to be unsatisfactory. No provision is made on it to show the pupil's individual progress and it is manifestly unfair to expect children of unequal mental ability to do the same mental work. Provision should be made for showing the progress a child makes compared with his own possible achievement.

There was a good attendance with J. S. Wilson in the chair.



## Whifflets From The Waterfront

The Port Edward reduction plant is getting large quantities of herring from down the coast in the neighborhood of Namu. On Tuesday four boats, heavily laden, arrived at Porpoise Harbor.

On a regularly scheduled voyage to Alaska, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver and sailed at 10 a.m. for Skagway and other Alaska points whence she is due to call here next Monday afternoon southbound. The Princess Norah had on board 140 passengers including White Pass and Yukon Route shipyard employees going north for the season. Three persons disembarked here and five went north on the vessel.

Fred Coram, who came north from Vancouver aboard the Prince George yesterday, has transferred to the steamer Prince Rupert, now in dry dock here, to take over the duties of purser on that vessel which will be resuming service in a couple of weeks.

On its way back to its base at Ocean Falls after a trip along the coast with Dr. S. S. Osterhout, retiring superintendent of United Church missions for British Columbia, the United Church mission boat Thomas Crosby arrived in port last evening from Port Essington and left at noon today for down the coast. Calls will be made at Hartley Bay, Ocean Falls and other points enroute to Ocean Falls. Dr. Osterhout left the Thomas Crosby here and will proceed to Vancouver on the steamer Prince George tonight.


