HALIFAX, March 2: (CP)-More than a score of persons were listed missing and believed dead after a holocaust which devoured the old Queen Hotel and gnawed a huge chunk out of Halifax's close built business section, causing damage estimated at \$800,000. The exact toll of deaths and injuries is not yet estimated. Two bodies have been recovered and only fortyeight others of 117 persons who were in the big frame hostel have been accounted for. Of the 48 rescued and accounted for twenty are in hospital, some seriously hurt. Police said the death toll might reach as high as thirty.




