CONGESTION IN GRAIN TRAFFIC

SIR GEORGE DOUGHTY ARRIVED ON THE BEATRICE

ENGLISH BARONET AND HIS SON GONE TO SKIDEGATE—BALANCE OF PARTY ON THE PRINCE RUPERT DUE AT FOUR THIS AFTERNOON.

The Princess Beatrice arrived here at four o'clock this morning, and among her passengers were Sir George Doughty, of Grimsby, England, his son Wilfrid Vere Doughty, and Mr. Carter, manager of the Oceanic cannery on the Skeena. They proceeded on the Beatrice to Skidegate to look over the cannery and fish plant there. Sir George and his associates recently purchased from the Simon Leiser company. Mr. Carter is to be the manager in charge of the Skidegate plant, and the trip now is to see what is required in the way of machinery to place the plant upon the most modern and up-to-date footing. The party will return on the Prince John, and probably remain in the city for several days.

Vancouver Sorely Troubled by Vagrants and Undesirables

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Vancouver, Feb. 7.—The city authorities have decided to establish chain gangs of the vagrants and undesirables, with a view to reducing the number of such individuals now infesting the city.

MOST RECENT ACCOUNT OF THE PEACE RIVER DISTRICT

JAMES RUTHERFORD, MINING ENGINEER OF VICTORIA, JUST RETURNED FROM AN EXPLORATION TRIP, CLOSELY DESCRIBES THE QUALITY OF THE LAND HE TRAVERSED.

James Rutherford, mining engineer of Victoria, B. C., who has just returned from a three months' prospecting trip in the Peace River country, having traversed and explored extensive areas of Northern British Columbia from Prince Rupert to Hazelton, along the Bulkeley and Nanaimo valleys and down the Parsnip and Finlay rivers, says: "I traveled from McLeod's Lake on the Peace River to Pine River Pass. The altitude of this pass is only 2,850 feet, and it is well adapted for the construction of railroads from east to west. The Peace River valley averages from one to two miles wide, throughout a distance of fifty miles, and is a charming valley, consisting of open meadows, interspersed with groves of poplar. This valley is well adapted to farming and stock raising.

Coupe prairie, surrounding Swan Lake, west of and adjoining the Alberta boundary line; from here there extends easterly into Alberta an area of agricultural land nearly 500 miles square, unsurpassed in the experience of man." Speaking of the mineral resources of the Peace River country, Mr. Rutherford said: "The whole country is underlain with extensive areas of coal, particularly in the neighborhood of Hudson's Hope, where the measures are of first class quality. "Hudson's Hope will probably become a strategic point for the railroads, as it is at the present time at the head of navigation on the Peace, and because its extensive coal deposits, available water power and rich farming lands surrounding will make it an industrial, manufacturing and agricultural centre."

VALIDATION BILL PASSES SECOND READING

Attorney-General Bowser Hints That He Will Discuss It Fully When It Comes Before Committee

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Victoria, Feb. 7.—In the Legislature last night Wm. Manson (Skeena), moved the second reading of the Prince Rupert validation bill, explaining that its passage was urgently necessary to satisfy the solicitors of the bank with which the city dealt. Attorney-General Bowser allowed it to pass the second reading and said

he would attend to it later in committee. A bill to incorporate an electric railway in the city of Nanaimo was introduced by Mr. Hawthornthwaite. Price Ellison gave notice of the introduction of the budget on February 14th. The Forests Act passed its second reading with division, but

Premier McBride took occasion to reply to the criticisms of Messrs. Brewster and Williams of the Government's policy in the matter. Mr. Manson (Comox), approved of the general principles of the bill, but thought some special provision should be made for dealing with fractions and small areas of timber on the islands or along the coast.

TUCK OF DRUM AND BUGLE CALL

Earl Grey's Rifles, Prince Rupert's Own Regiment, Will Shortly March to Music from Own Drum and Bugle Band.

With the prospect of having a drill hall and parade ground of their own very soon, Earl Grey's Rifles, through their commanding officer, Captain Stork, now announce that the equipment for their new drum and bugle band is practically all ready. At a turnout of the company in strength shortly the band will be in evidence. As soon as all the bugles and drums arrive the whole band will carry on steady practice, there being already a group of well trained buglers and drummers in the company. Probably to Master Bob Ritchie belongs the distinction of being the pioneer bugler and drummer of Prince Rupert's own regiment.

MONTREAL HARBOR

Plans for Improvement Costing Two Millions Before Minister.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Ottawa, Feb. 6.—Plans for an outlay of \$2,000,000 on the Montreal harbor next summer have been laid before the Minister of Marine by Harbor Commissioners Ballantyne, Geoffrion and Stephens. The projected work embraces the finishing of the dry dock, new sheds, dredging of a channel, piers, etc. The Minister will give his consent to the plans.

BIGGEST LAND DEAL IN WEST

Million and Half Cash Paid Down for Special Immigration Scheme Planned by Canadian Northern Railway.

A. R. Davidson, agent for the Canadian Northern Railway land department, has just closed the largest land deal for which cash was paid that has ever been consummated in Western Canada. The land, which comprises 500,000 acres, was sold to an English syndicate, whose names for the present are withheld, for a price involving over \$1,500,000. The property lies in the Humboldt district, a large acreage of which is in the near vicinity of the main line of the Canadian Northern Railway. A large portion lies 15 miles east of Rosthern and north of Bruno, Howell and Vonda. It is the intention of the purchasers to bring out young English and Scotch farmers, whom they will assist in putting the land under cultivation.

CROWDING TO CANADA

Immigration Supt. Looks for Rush from the South.

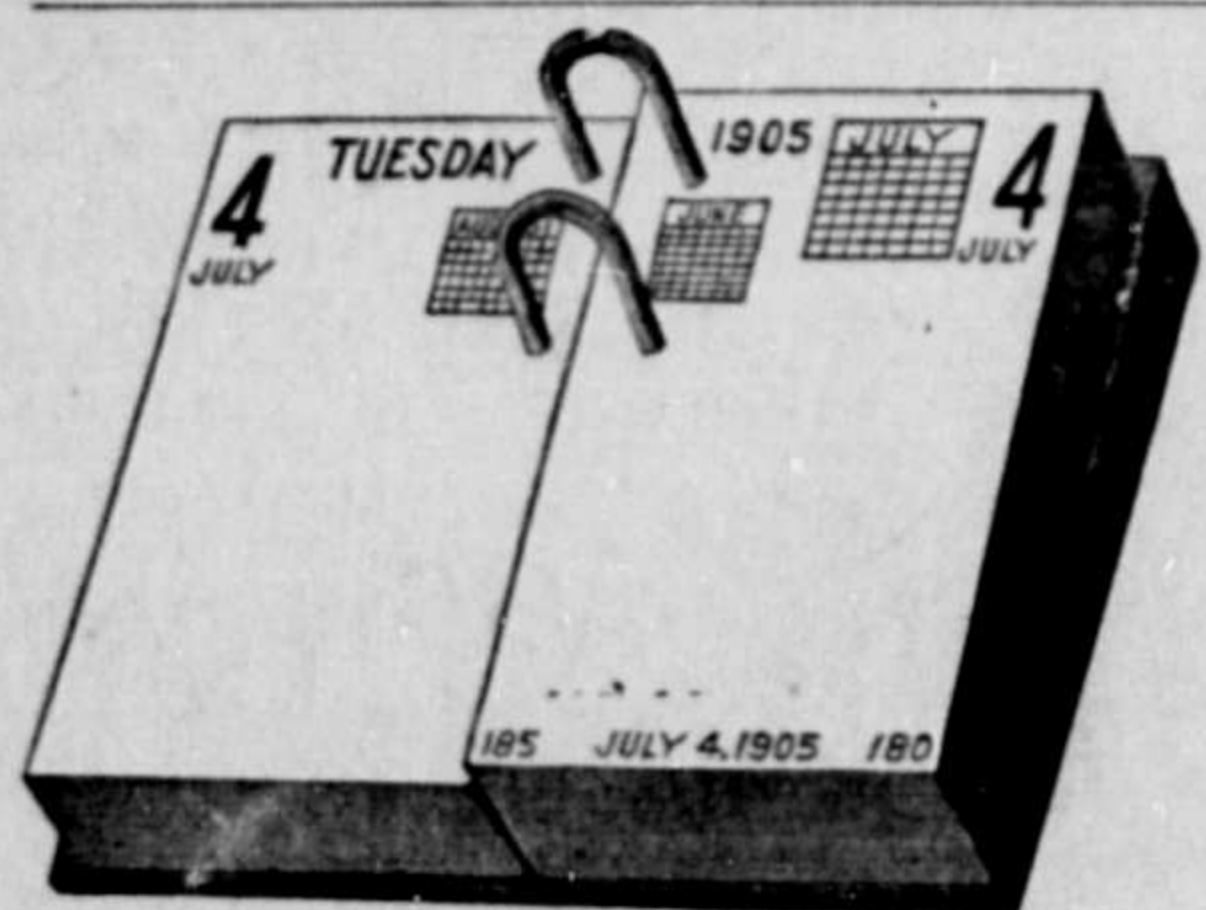
BURNING MILLIONS OF MONEY.

The fire losses in Canada during 1911 totaled \$21,459,575, an average of \$1,788,298 per month. This is equal to a daily loss of \$58,793. In other words, \$2,450 worth of property has been burned every hour that year, or \$41 every minute. In the past three years \$63,000,000 worth of property has been burned. This is an appalling fire loss, and little is being done to check such extravagant waste of capital.

COLD STORAGE AND CANNERY ENTERPRISES ACROSS BORDER

NEW ENGLAND FISH COMPANY PLANS LARGE COLD STORAGE PLANT AT KETCHIKAN—YAKUTAL CANNERY CHANGES HANDS—NEW CANNERY AT WARD'S COVE.

According to word received from the south by the last boat, says the Ketchikan Miner, the New England Fish Company intends to get in line with the rest of the industries of the region this year, and increase fourfold its cold storage plant here in Ketchikan, giving it the largest capacity of any American cold storage plant on the Pacific coast—Six million pounds of fish. This conclusion was arrived at after the arrival in the south of Manager Wilke of the local plant, and speaks volumes of the success of the plant and the judgment of those putting it in here.

From the fish standpoint, the year just closed has been a light one, but the scarcity of fish at times and the resultant high price brought by that which could be put on the market at such times has demonstrated the advantage of the cold storage system, and the proposed improvement and remodeling of the Ketchikan plant is the logical sequence.

Cannery at Ward's Cove.

During the past week another industry has been added to the many now making Ketchikan and its vicinity their headquarters, the new one being the Moore-Walsh Canning Co. The incorporators are E. F. Moore and Richard P. and Michael Walsh. They have bought the Paul Hauri

place, consisting of 20 acres on the shore of Ward's Cove and will erect a cannery of about twenty thousand capacity at once, intending to have it in operation this coming season. Associated in the company are several other local people, who in the past have been interested in the fish business.

Purchase of Yakutat Cannery.

According to the Pacific Fisherman one of the most important deals in the cannery business of the winter is the purchase by the T. J. Gorman Co. interests of the Yakutat cannery from the Yakutat & Southern Railway. The purchase price has not been made public as yet, but the record of the plant is such that the sum paid was a good one. The cannery was established in the neighborhood of eight or nine years ago, and is especially valuable because of its large annual pack of red salmon. It has an annual capacity of 75,000 cases, and the catch in the region averages about 75 per cent. reds and the balance almost all cohoes, with a small sprinkling of humpbacks.

LORD'S KINDNESS NOT ACCEPTED

Irish Peer Distributes Presents to Tenants—These Were Sent Back by United Irish League in Proud Independence.

Belfast, Feb. 4.—A Claremorris message states that the blankets which Lord Oranmore had distributed among his poorer tenants as Christmas presents have been collected and taken to Ballindine where they were counted, packed into a bale and addressed to Castle MacGarrett, the residence of his lordship. The bulky package was dispatched by rail to the consignee and bore on one side of it the words "From the Ballindine branch of the United Irish League." While the parcel was being made up and conveyed to the station cheers were repeatedly given for the league.

FOUR MILES OF C. P. R. STEAMERS

Imposing Fleet of Fine Passenger Boats Flying the Red and White Squared House Flag Will Reach from Fairview to Seal Cove.

When their vessels now on the slips are completed the Canadian Pacific Railway will possess a fleet of no less than seventy-five steamships, which, if placed end to end, would stretch for a distance of four miles. By the end of the year there will be twenty-five vessels engaged in the Pacific coast service, twelve of which will be of the "Princess" class, all of which are oil burners.

Two monster "Empresses" to be named the Empress of Russia and Empress of Asia are now on the stocks in Britain, and when completed will probably be engaged in the Pacific service. In its steamship department alone the Canadian Pacific employs over twelve thousand hands, while the daily coal consumption is in the neighborhood of five thousand tons.

PACIFIC COAST WAR MENACED

Expert in Military Strategy Foresees Great Naval Engagements Off Our Local Coast—Menace of Germany and Japan.

A gloomy prophecy as to the probability of conflicts in the Pacific Ocean was made by the well known lecturer on military strategy, T. W. M. Maguire, at a meeting of the Royal Colonial Institute, London, Eng. Mr. Maguire described the Pacific Ocean as the "strategic centre of mankind" and warned both the United States and Great Britain "that nothing could give them security but a race of military men, as with nations like Germany and Japan it was a word and a blow." The yellow races, he said, were going to demand equality of treatment. Japan was at present Great Britain's ally, but that would only last so long as the British alliance was worth having. Great Britain's territory in the Pacific Ocean, he said, were by no means safe, and the Japanese might attack and defeat the Americans any day.

FOUGHT WOLVES TO SAVE SEVEN GIRLS IN SLEIGH

THRILLING STORY OF ONE MAN'S SPLENDID HEROISM COMES FROM HUDSON BAY—HARRY FENNEL SHOT NINE WOLVES THEN DIED A HERO'S DEATH.

Guelph, Feb. 4.—Word has been received here that by fighting a pack of timber wolves single handed all night long Harry E. Fennell, lately of Denver, Colo., but up to six years ago residing in Guelph, saved the lives of seven girls and the other men who were in a party and died as the result of the exposure he was forced to endure. Fennell's desperate fight with the wolves took place near Hudson Bay. He and a chum were trapping up near Hudson Bay and went to a party or dance that some half breeds were giving. They were the only people near, and on the way home were given a ride with another man and some girls in a bob-sleigh. It was late at night and they were chased by wolves. Mr. Fennell got out and got up a tree and told the others to run the horses to their cabin and he would fight the wolves. The others wanted to stay, but he begged them to go on and not take any chances with the girls. They then went home, but could hear shots all night. Fennell killed nine wolves. The men went back at daylight and there were only three wolves left. Fennell was so cold he could hardly walk, and died before they could get help, the nearest doctor being sixty miles away.

ANOTHER STEAMSHIP LINE FOR THIS NORTHERN COAST

SIR DONALD MANN SAYS CANADIAN NORTHERN WILL BE READY TO OPERATE AS SOON AS THEIR TRANS-CONTINENTAL LINE IS COMPLETED.

Vancouver, Feb. 3.—The Canadian Northern Railway will on the completion of its transpacific lines operate a coastwise service on the British Columbia coast, according to a statement made to the press by Sir Donald Mann, vice president of the railway, yesterday morning. "It is necessary to have the line completed in order to furnish traffic for our boats," he explained. Asked as to whether his railway would establish a line to Australia as well as one to Great Britain through the Panama Canal and to the Orient, the vice president stated that he had formed no plans other than the establishment of a coast service as yet. It was probable that there would be transpacific lines in time, but he could make no definite announcement. Sir Donald Mann was enthusiastic regarding the future of Vancouver as a port. He believed that the completion of the Panama Canal would be the port of import for a large portion of the prairie provinces. He foresaw the transcontinental railways would assist in the growth of the port of Vancouver by carrying enormous quantities of export grain through here. He saw no reason why the export crop of all Alberta, the Peace River district and at least a quarter of Saskatchewan should not find its way through Pacific coast ports.

BIG INDUSTRY FOR PROVINCE

U. S. Capital Will Develop Great Iron Ore Deposit in B. C.—Deposit Located Just South of Nelson.

Nelson, B. C., Feb. 4.—A five million dollar company has been formed in Spokane to develop vast iron deposits in Pend de Orielle valley, British Columbia, south of Nelson. Deposits have been known to exist for some time, but the extent and great value of the ore has only recently been conclusively proved by experiments undertaken by the capitalists who control the property. Deposits have hitherto been without transportation, but the Washington & Northern Idaho Railway will this summer build a branch from Metairie, where the largest bridge of its kind in the world crosses the Pend de Orielle River, through the valley of the Pend de Orielle in British Columbia. The valley has some of the best fruit lands in British Columbia, and is being rapidly settled. Ore will at first be smelted in Spokane, but to avoid duty it is proposed to establish works next fall in Pend de Orielle for the manufacture of pig iron and iron pipe which will employ a thousand men.

CLEANSE THE STAGE

Methodist Campaign Against Immoral Plays Announced.

Action toward barring immoral plays is likely to be taken soon by the Methodist temperance and moral reform department. It is reported that in theatres throughout the country plays are being presented which are immoral or at any rate suggestive of evil, and vulgarizing in their effect on audiences. The committee will take up the matter through investigations by the local temperance and moral reform committees all over Canada and by laying the facts before the proper authorities.

Ottawa, Feb. 1.—That the idea of a "great white way" to extend across the continent from St. John, N. B., to Prince Rupert, B. C., which it is claimed will realize the dreams of the late Sir John A. Macdonald for a real confederation of the provinces of the Dominion, was obtained from the effect of the Ottawa white way is the assertion of H. Maxwell Clark of Vancouver, B. C., traveling representative of the Canadian Highways Association.

"The idea is to have a nationally owned road which will bind together all the provinces of the Dominion," said Mr. Clark. "The railways do not do this, as they are not owned by the people. One of the greatest advantages of such a road would be that it would serve as an object lesson to municipalities when building their own roads. It would mean that the farmers in the east and west would build roads to correspond with the national highway."
