


BURNING MILLIONS OF MONEY.

The fire losses in Canada during 1911 totaled \$21,459,575, an average of \$1,788,298 per month. This is equal to a daily 1836 loss of \$58,793. In other words, \$2,450 worth of property has been burned every hour that year, or \$41 every minute. In the past three years \$63,000,000 worth of property has been burned. This is an appalling fire loss, and little is being done to check such extravagant waste of capital.
