## NO CLOSED BOOKS NOW IN EUROPE

One's History With All Secrets Must Be Disclosed

## Passports and Identity Cards

These Tell the World All But Strange Things Happen Just The Same

PARIS, March 22: (CP)—So long as you are free, white or colored, you can't have any closed pages in your life and reside in Europe.

First you are obliged to have an "identity" card upon which is pasted a libellous photo of yourself made in one of those "your-photo-in-six-minutes machines" and upon which is written your height, weight, age and other intimate details which we usually keep decently dark in Canada.

If you are a foreigner to boot you have to have a residence card, a police permit, a passport, a birth certificate and a number of other things among which are five or more of those "front face, hat off and hair pulled back off the ears" photos which, fortunately, they thoroughly lose for you down at the commissariat's office.

The big job is to keep track of all this paraphernalia—because some drastic things can happen to you if you happen to lose them. Take the case which has caused a lot of amusement among Parisians recently—but which isn't such a laughing matter after all.

A man lost his identity card along with some other important papers in a billfold the other day. It was picked up by a young woman who after thinking it over considered this an excellent chance to get married. She got a friend of hers to go with her to the mayor's office and there they went through the marriage ceremony—the young man presenting the false identity card.

After the ceremony Madame X gathered up the papers and continued to the second act. Among these papers was the gentleman's bankbook. This she took down and with the aid of the identity card, marriage certificate and other papers succeeded in drawing out all the liquid cash he had. Her husband didn't wake up until he received a notice that his account was overdrawn by his wife.

Worse than that—after looking the case over, the legal authorities hold that the man is legally married and there is nothing he can do about getting his money back or rid himself of his un-asked wife unless he starts divorce proceedings.

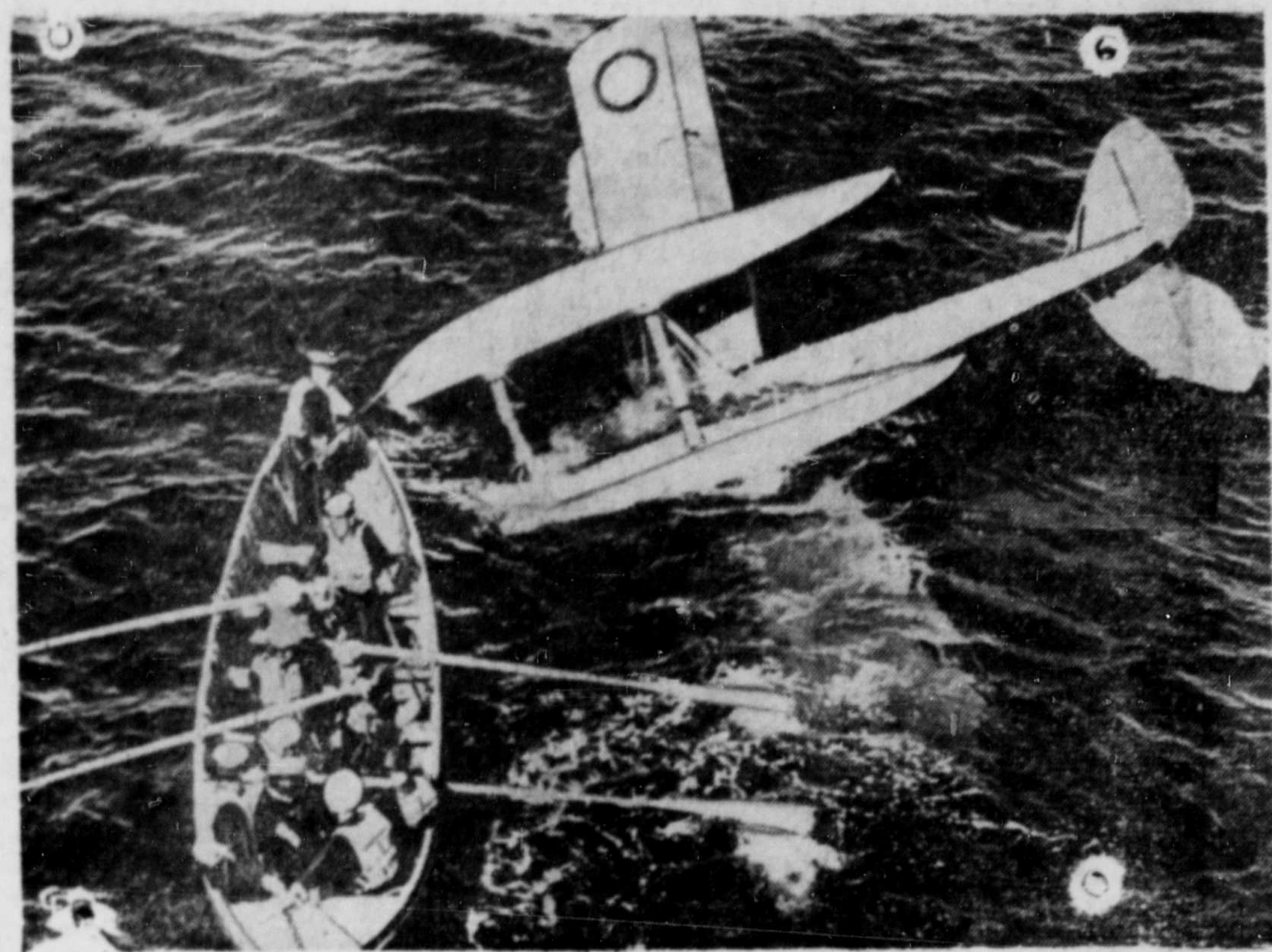
His only consolation is that he is not already married: "They would have me in for bigamy," he said, "and how could I explain a thing like this to a wife if I was already married?"

## TERRACE IN GOOD SHAPE

Village Municipality's Finances Healthy—Improvements Were Made

TERRACE, March 22.—The village municipal corporation, in its annual statement for 1938, shows that it has managed pretty well considering the handicap carried by the stopping of most of the government grants, which grants were the chief encouragement to incorporate as a municipality. The total income was \$3359.28 and the total expenditure was kept fifty dollars below that figure.

The corporation provided a concrete reservoir for the water system which possesses a much greater capacity than the old earth reservoir held by a dam. The water system has been kept in repair and extended and the sidewalks have been kept up.

It is hoped it will be possible to put something by in a savings account toward the end of the present year.

Although the local lighting plant is not owned by the municipality, the corporation has encouraged the present efficient service and pays for the street lights which are placed at the most frequent spots and crossings.

## AROUND EUROPE TODAY

Memel Next Hitler Conquest Now Certain—Roumania Mobilizes On Two Fronts—Maginot Line Bristles

LONDON—Events of the past twenty-four hours make it evident that Chancellor Hitler's next move for expansion of Nazi Germany will be the absorption of Memel from Lithuania before the present week is out. Memel territory consists of about 1000 square miles off the Baltic Sea to the east of Memel River. Its absorption by Germany cuts off Lithuania's only seaport although Germany undertakes to accord Lithuania certain port privileges and guarantees.

KAUNAS, Lithuania.—Following the delivery last night by Germany to Victor Gaitius, Lithuanian governor of Memel territory, of a virtual ultimatum demanding cession of the territory to the Reich, a meeting of the Lithuanian cabinet was held and the way cleared for the cession. Lithuanian garrisons were being removed as well as some of the civilian population.

BUCHAREST, Roumania.—Meantime, the atmosphere in the Balkans continued tense as Hitler's next move in that direction is awaited. Roumania is mobilizing its armies not only on the northwest, where Hungarian troops are concentrated along the frontier, also along the Bulgarian frontier to the south following reports that the Bulgarian forces are gathering along their border. Roumania is not so concerned about the massing of the Hungarians and the Bulgarians as she is with the concentration of German armed forces in Moravia.

MOSCOW.—The Balkans, as they have been so often in history, are today again a European festering spot with uncertainty as to the direction in which some may spring in this time of crisis. Russia is still interesting itself in having a conference in which Roumania, Bulgaria, Jugo-Slavia, Turkey and Greece would participate. The fact that Great Britain has described such a conference as premature makes it still doubtful as to how far the Soviet may go in the "Halt Hitler" movement of Great Britain and France. Official Russia is inclined to feel that Great Britain did not show very good judgment in Munich.

LONDON.—In the British House of Commons yesterday, Rt. Hon. Oliver Stanley, President of the board of Trade, announced that a trade agreement between the Federation of British Industries and a German manufacturing concern was being examined. Sir John Simon, Chancellor of the Exchequer, stated that a loan agreement with Czechoslovakia was also being reconsidered, all of which indicates the intention of bringing economic pressure to bear upon Germany.

PARIS.—France continues active mobilization on a large scale and it is understood that there are heavy movements to fully man the Maginot Line along the German frontier in readiness for any sudden emergency in the international situation. Sixteen decrees, all designed to immediately put the country on a fuller war basis, were issued yesterday.

## Efforts Being Made To Line Up Poland In Bloc To Halt Hitler's March

Loan of \$125,000,000 Being Dangled—Roumania Appears to be Wavering as Negotiations With Germany Continue

LONDON, March 22.—Great Britain seemed assured today of the support of three nations in her "Halt Hitler" move. Russia and France, it appeared, might be counted upon but Roumania, dickering with Germany, seemed doubtful. The United States would probably give her moral support but no active participation could be expected from that quarter, is generally admitted, unless it might come well along in a world war.

A \$125,000,000 loan is being held out, it is reported, to Poland to induce her to line up definitely against Germany. Poland occupies a key position between Germany and Russia and, in the event of trouble, would probably be a major battleground. Foreign Minister Paul Beck is a reputed pro-Nazi so the position that country may take is still a matter of doubt.

## KETCHIKAN HAS FIRE

Damage of \$2000 or \$3000 Done by Spectacular Blaze

KETCHIKAN, March 22.—Fire, which threw spectacular billows of smoke, swept the Yukon Bar in Ketchikan yesterday afternoon. Damage estimated at \$2000 or \$3000 was done. The fire originated in the basement.

## Alberta Speeches Are Being Limited

Private Members Will Not Be Permitted To Take More Than Forty Minutes In General Debate

EDMONTON, March 22: (CP)—Speeches in the Alberta Legislature will henceforth be limited to forty minutes except those of cabinet ministers, the leader of the opposition or private members introducing motions.

LONDON.—The government of Australia, through Premier J. A. Lyons, assured the British government of its full co-operation in any developments that may occur in international affairs. The South African government is asking its Parliament to decide at once where South Africa should consider itself automatically at war in the event of Great Britain becoming involved in international conflict.

ROME.—The Fascist Grand Council yesterday reiterated its adherence to the Rome-Berlin axis in face of "Bolshevism and the democracies who threaten to involve the totalitarian nations in war." Full approval was given to the action of Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany in Czechoslovakia. The Italian ambassador to Berlin is in Rome to confer with Premier Benito Mussolini.

CHICAGO.—Dr. Edouard Benes, former President of Czechoslovakia, answered a message of sympathy from Ignace Jan Paderewski, the famous pianist and former President of Poland. Paderewski, in Chicago in the course of a concert tour, condemned Chancellor Hitler's seizure of Czechoslovakia. Dr. Benes, in reply, said he had not abandoned the fight on behalf of democracy.

## SHOULD AID PROSPECTOR

Mining Industry Must Give Employment So Can Get Grubstake, Says Dr. Walker

VICTORIA, March 22: (CP)—Dr. John F. Walker, British Columbia's deputy minister of mines, believes the mining industry must support the prospector if new properties are to be developed in the province.

"The day has arrived when the industry must help the prospector either by giving him employment during the winter months and releasing him during the summer or by employing him to prospect during the summer at a wage which will provide him with a grubstake for the winter," he said recently.

"So far as the prospector is concerned, the most valuable work that can be done by governments is an active campaign of geological mapping by the federal department of mines and resources, supplemented by the provincial mines department in supplying more detailed information regarding what appear to be favorable areas indicated by work of the federal department.

Dr. Walker said there are "few, if any areas in British Columbia" so thoroughly prospected that there is no chance of finding a new prospect.

"It follows that even the older mining areas must be gone over again in a thorough and systematic manner," he said. "This can be done only by the modern prospector who has financial support.

"That support must be forthcoming either from the mining industry or from bona fide exploration companies or syndicates.

"Systematic prospecting has never been given a fair trial in this province. There has been too much of a rush and systematic work cannot bring results if hurried.

"If a modern prospector with financial backing can find but one good prospect in 10 years, he will do very well indeed. The industry must be prepared to finance prospecting parties over a number of years if it hopes to have any success."

## Favorable Areas

The deputy minister gave this summary of British Columbia prospecting possibilities:

### LET US DESERVE IT

Sir Evelyn Wrench, writing in Overseas, says: "We citizens of the British Commonwealth have much to be proud of—I refuse to apologize for the British Empire. Every reader of Overseas can be an apostle in the great crusade of strengthening our commonwealth of free peoples and making it a shining example to mankind—the forerunner of a world state. There are not lacking faint hearts and critics who whisper that the days of the British Empire's greatness are gone. Do not hearken to them. But if we are to be true to our vision, every member of the community must make sacrifices. A pleasure-loving generation that refuses the tasks of parenthood cannot expect to hold a world-wide commonwealth, nor does it deserve to."

### JUST 130 YEARS AGO

It was just 130 years ago that there was published in French and in English a propaganda journal for Napoleon named "The Argus." A student who has been looking up the files says they have a familiar ring. The tirades and vituperations against Britain resemble the tirades in the German papers today. British statesmen were ridiculed and the much-vaunted freedom of the British press was the subject of jeers. There are constant references to impending risings in Ireland and India. Three months before the battle of Trafalgar the British navy was represented as "dilapidated, dispersed, incompetent and on the verge of mutiny." Here is a sample of the anti-British propaganda of that day:

"Nothing can restore to Great Britain the continental influence that she has lost irretrievably. She will no more be seen to figure in the treaties of European powers. It is not a little humiliating for the Sovereign of the Seas to have today less influence than the powers of the second order. This is a just reward for her repeated effort to enslave the smaller powers to her own interests."

### BRITAIN'S PREPAREDNESS

Britain is evidently catching up in this matter of preparedness in spite of all the propaganda articles published today in American, British and even Canadian magazines and newspaper sheets. The air correspondent of the Daily Express, writing two months ago, says: "In three months' time Britain will be turning out more first line war planes than any other European country, Germany included." The factories are scattered all over the country, in many cases far from the great centres. New factories are springing up over night and the work goes merrily on. Britain today is evidently very much awake and the dictators of Europe are taking notice. She is choosing her own time for action.

## RUPERT IS WINNER IN HOOP GAME

Again Took Measure of Ketchikan in Speedy Inter-Town Contest

Local basketball fans again witnessed a fast and thrilling game last night in the Armory when the Ketchikan and Prince Rupert Standard Oil teams brought their series to a close with the oilers emerging victors on a final count of 39 to 32, giving them an 11-point lead in the four game series.

In the first quarter Ketchikan had the right of way with Elliott scoring the first basket and then running up a six-point lead which was followed by a series of wild out-of-bound passes on the part of the local team. Dominato opened the scoring for the locals and Beynon, starting for Standard Oil, brought the score to 6-6 at quarter time. At this point the game went into a roughhouse rally with referee Johnny Comadina bearing down and calling personals equally on both sides. Rupert took the lead only to even the score with Ketchikan when the latter made a penalty.

After a few seconds of man-to-man defense rallying, Morgan converted a superb long shot, followed by a series of wild shooting under the local basket with Beynon and Morgan making the score 16 to 9 in their favor. Speedy Hagiwara now opened a come-back for the Alaskans and a constant hold on the ball brought the score at half time to 19 to 17 in favor of the visitors.

The opening of the second half brought the crowd to its feet as the teams indulged in a mad scramble with both taking hard bumps, Phil Elliott, a hard fighter for Ketchikan, went off on personals. Ketchikan continued to hold the lead with Hinkleman scoring. Morgan and Beynon again launched a double scoring spree with Ketchikan battling hard to retain their lead. Hagiwara and R. Elliott starred at this point although Hagiwara was constantly held in check by Houston.

The oilers now gave a fine display of team co-ordination with Beynon always in the foreground, bringing the score to 25-25. Bussanich and Hagiwara again set the pace rolling up four more points and keeping Rupert on the defensive. At the end of the third quarter the local team took the lead from the visitors 30 to 39. ### SHOULD AID PROSPECTOR

(Continued from Page One)

coast and at other points are ample proof that the island still offers plenty of possibilities for the modern prospector.

The coast district from Vancouver to northern Stewart has been cursorily prospected only. This is difficult prospecting country in that it calls for a well-organized party having a sea-going boat from which the prospector can get off at what appear to be favorable points.

The eastern side of the coast range batholith has been prospected in part, but there are large areas which have not been prospected systematically. Parts of this area are a considerable distance from transportation.

The area between the international boundary and the Canadian Pacific Railway, including the area immediately north of the railway, has been pretty thoroughly gone over, and prospecting within this region should be confined largely to the scientific prospector with ample backing.

The area contiguous to the Pacific Great Eastern railway can be prospected in part by the modern day prospector and also by the scientific prospector. The Bridge River mining district is in this area. The same applies to the area contiguous to the Canadian National Railways northern line to Prince Rupert.

North of the Canadian National northern line, mineral occurrences are known, although in the coastal section transportation problems are serious. The remainder of the

### northern area offers possibilities

the prospector with ample backing. Rough gold found in drift mining operations near Atlin offers possibility of finding gold in that area.

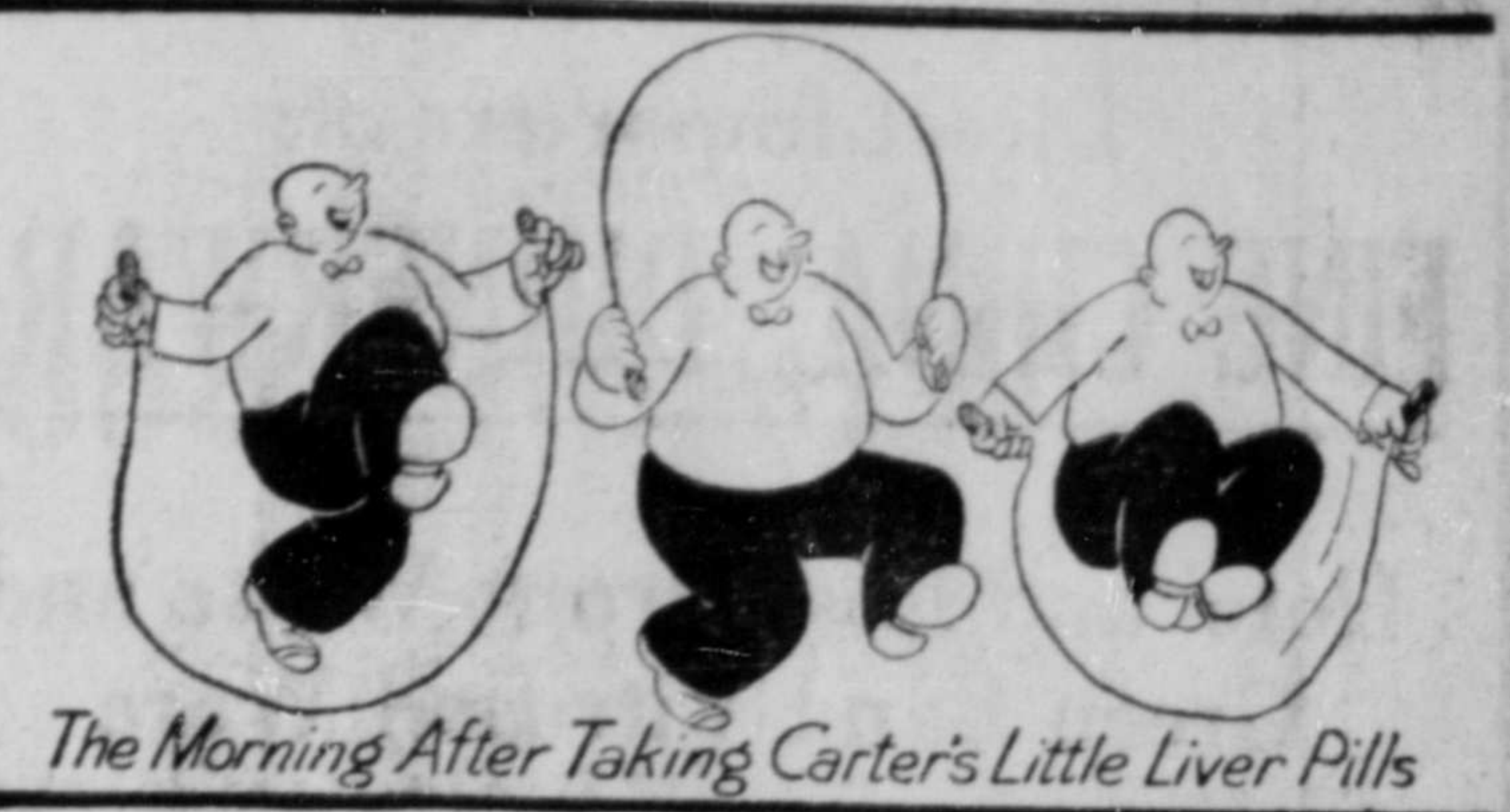
William Manson M.L.A. says he favors the government keeping Warke Canal power in reserve rather than giving it to the city.

## Timely Recipes

**PIGS-IN-BLANKETS**

Either oysters or scallops may be used. Salt the fish very lightly. Roll each oyster or scallop in a strip of bacon and skewer in place with a toothpick. Grill or bake until the scallop is snowy white, or the oyster curls around the edges, and the bacon is crisp. The oven should be hot, but scallops should not be too close to the strong heat.

They may be sauted instead, turning each so that the bacon is resting on the hot pan. Baste the "pigs" frequently, when broiling, with fat from bacon.

Snowy mounds of mashed potatoes, and tender green peas go with this dinner.

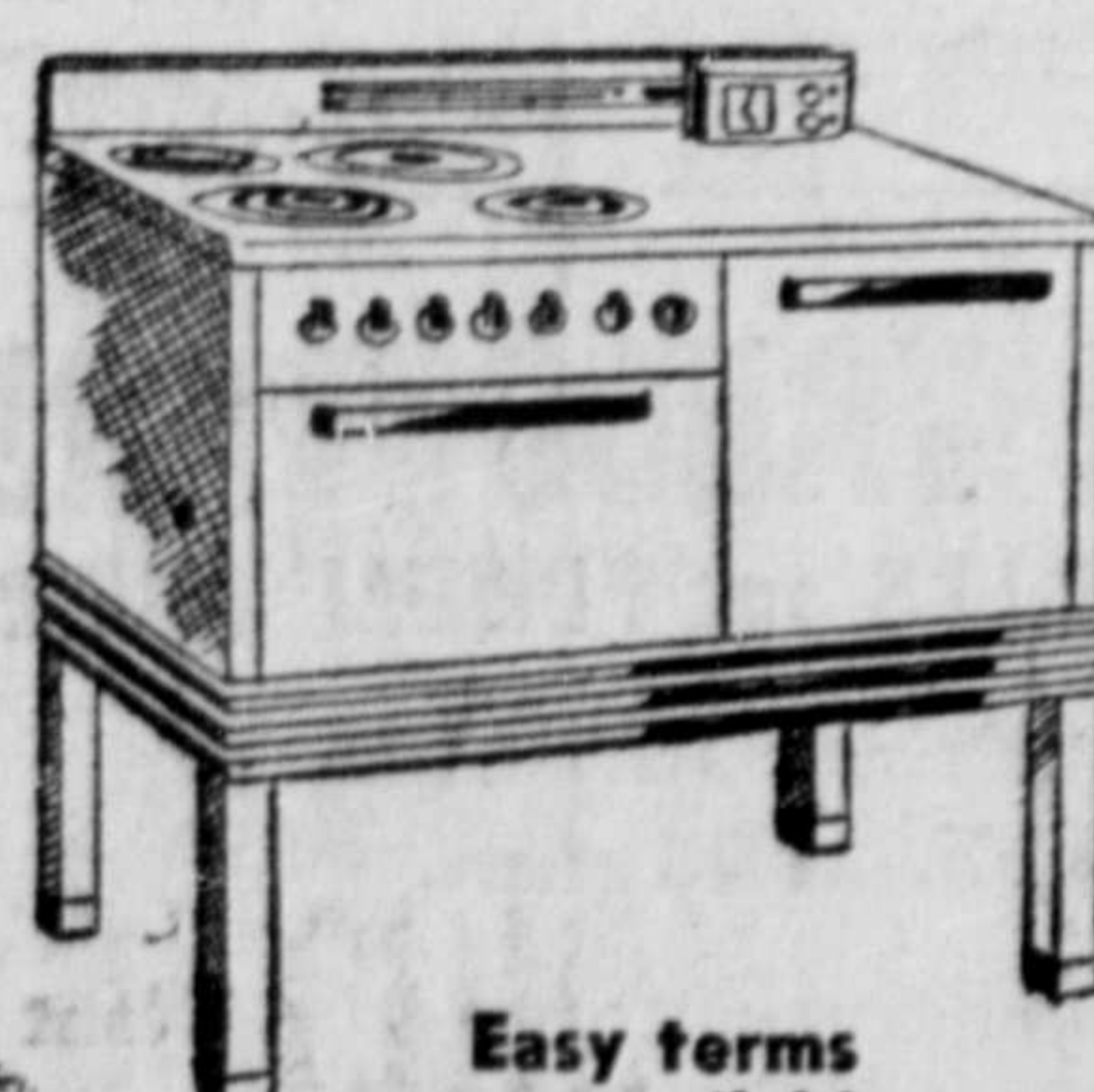
