## INVASION IS NEAR?

Russia is Believed to be Preparing to Enter Finland—Threats Continue

## Atmosphere Tense

Great Britain Warns Soviet—What Other Nations Think

**RUSSIA DENOUNCES PACT HELSINGFORS, Nov. 28:** (CP)—A Foreign Office spokesman announced today that Russia had denounced her non-aggression pact with Finland in a note handed to the Finnish minister at Moscow.

**MOSCOW, Nov. 28:** (CP)—Helsingfors dispatches today stated that Finland has refused the Russian demand to withdraw her troops from the frontier in order to prevent a repetition of an alleged incident on Sunday when Finnish troops fired on Russians. A press campaign in Russia, strikingly similar to the one that preceded the invasion of Poland, is being continued by the Soviet. Soviet troops, in mass meetings, presumably organized by the government itself, have urged the government to "adopt strictest measures."

All Red Army officers and men to leave from Leningrad military district have been ordered to rejoin their units within a day and night.

The orders followed the point blank rejection of the Russian demand that the troops of Finland be withdrawn from the Soviet-Finnish border.

As military concentration in the Leningrad area increased, the newsman Red Star declared that, in event of rebellion of such a provocative border incident by the Finns, the Soviet would "answer fire by fire." There had been government orders to this effect, it was stated.

A broadcast in Finnish from Moscow urged the people of Finland to overthrow their present government.

In Helsinki Foreign Minister Eero declared that the Finns would not withdraw unless the Russians did likewise. He suggested a commission to settle the points at dispute.

In Stockholm it was felt that Russia was about to renew its demands for naval bases from Finland both on the Baltic and Arctic coasts so that Russia would have complete control of that portion of Europe to offset German influence.

**Great Britain's Stand**  
In London Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax received Russian Ambassador Ivan Malsky and is reported to have asked Russia to clarify its position in regard to Finland. While Great Britain was not actively interested in the Finnish-Russian dispute, Halifax is believed to have informed Malsky that any aggression by Russia upon Finland would make it impossible for Great Britain to increase her trade with Russia.

From Berlin German sources charge Great Britain with goading Finland on against Russia.

**New York Stock Mart Firm Today**  
Prices Moved Up in First Hour of Trading at Gotham  
**NEW YORK, Nov. 28:**—The New York Stock Exchange was firm with upward trend in early trading today. The turnover for the first hour amounted to 170,000 shares, the industrial average being up .63 at 149.22 and rails up .32 at 33.18.

## CAPTURE GERMANS

British Are, Apparently, Also Getting Their Toll In War At Sea

**LONDON, Nov. 28:** (CP)—A British auxiliary cruiser landed seventy-three German prisoners at a west of Scotland port. They are understood to be survivors of a German submarine and three merchant vessels.

The armed merchantman Chitral, landing eleven Rawalpindi survivors, also landed thirty-two Germans from captured ships.

## Win War Is First Thing—Chamberlain

**LONDON, Nov. 28:** (CP)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that the nation should not "make the mistake of underestimating the strength of the enemy." He said the Allies needed to focus every effort on winning the war without diverting too much attention now to proclamation of definite peace aims for a new Europe.

## Another British Freighter Sinks

Uxmouth Is Latest Victim of War At Sea—Three Of Crew Missing

**LONDON, Nov. 28:** (CP)—The 2483-ton British freighter Uxmouth is the latest victim of the war at sea, her sinking by a mine or submarine being reported today. Three of the crew of 42 are missing and believed lost.

## SAWMILL DESTROYED

Fifty Thousand Dollar Fire In New Westminster Lumber Plant

**NEW WESTMINSTER, Nov. 28:**—Main section of the Royal City Sawmill on the Fraser River was destroyed by fire last night. The fire is believed to have been started by newly installed electrical equipment. About all that was saved was stored lumber in dry kilns. Loss is estimated at \$50,000.

## Calm Restored To India Now

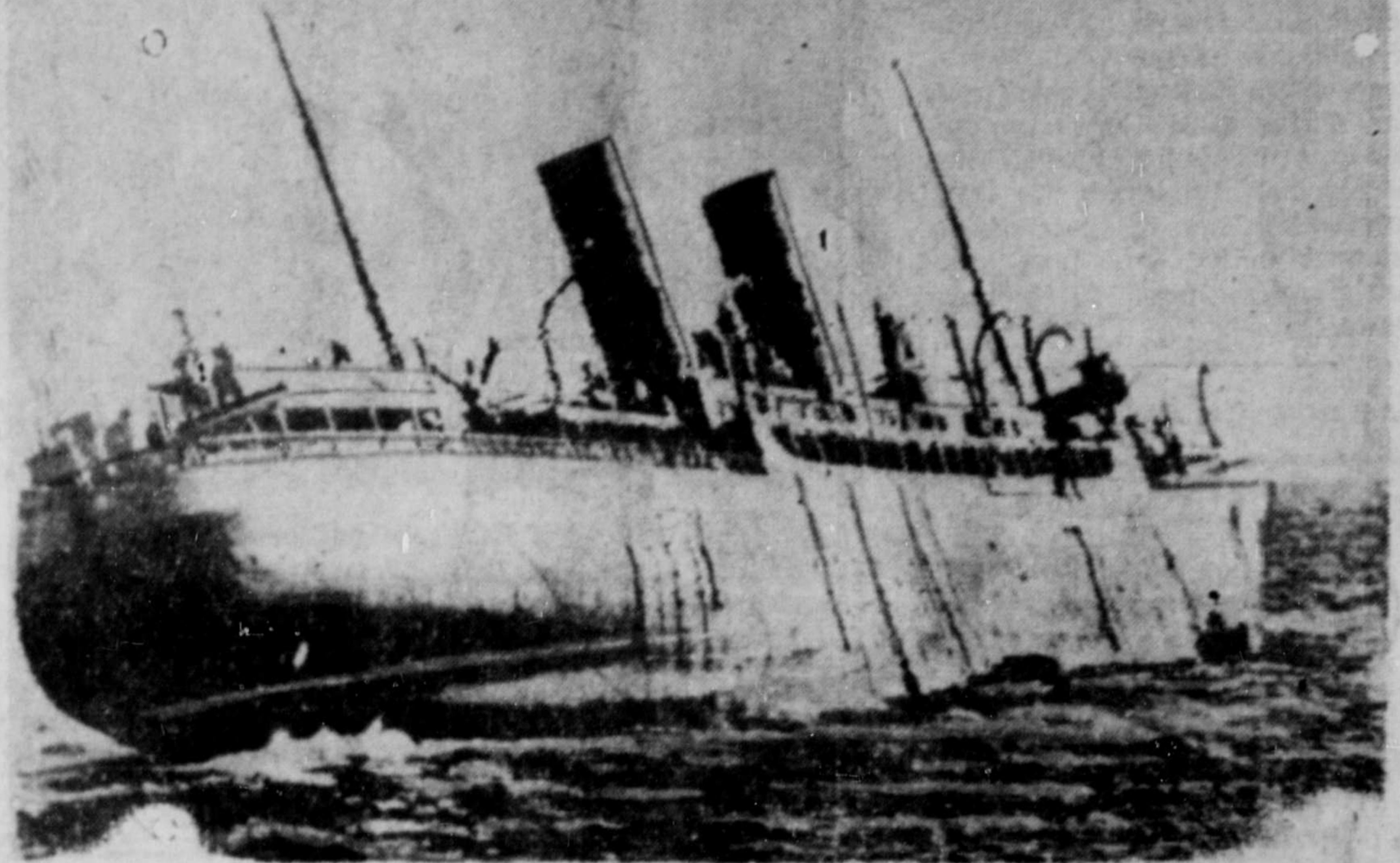
Uprisings Seem To Have Been Put Down Following Trouble Of Recent Days

## AS FRENCH LINER WENT DOWN AFTER U-BOAT ATTACK



Mortally hit by a German torpedo, the French liner Bretagne is shown sinking, somewhere in the Atlantic. It was reported that 14 persons lost their lives in the torpedoing of the liner, which was enroute from the West Indies with 124 passengers. Officers of the Bretagne said that the submarine was on the U-boats that were taking the passengers from the stricken ship. Although the sinking took place last month, the photo was only recently released and was radioed from London to New York.

## NEW HOUSE IS OPENED

British Parliament Will Be Asked To Provide More Money For War—King Opens Session

**LONDON, Nov. 28:** (CP)—King George VI personally opened a new session of Parliament today. The usual ceremonies were absent and the King wore a naval service uniform. The Speech from the Throne, a brief document, announced that Parliament would be asked to make further financial provision for carrying on the war, confidence was expressed in the ability of the Army and Navy, services of which were eulogized, to surmount the difficulties of war.

The Speech from the Throne referred only briefly to war legislation. "You will be asked to make further financial provision for the conduct of the war," it said.

Continuing, the Throne Speech said the war was commanding "energies of all my subjects" and my Dominions overseas are participating wholeheartedly and with effectiveness which is most gratifying to me.

His Majesty said the navies of the Empire were "keeping free and open the highways of the sea."

## Anti-Laborites Win In Regina

Socialist Incumbents In Saskatchewan Capital City Out of Civic Office

**REGINA, Nov. 28:** (CP)—Anti-Labor forces were swept into office in the Regina civic elections yesterday. There were also civic elections in Saskatoon, Moose Jaw and other Saskatchewan cities yesterday.

## RATIONING TO START

Britons To Be Limited In Use Of Butter and Bacon—Asked to Conserve Sugar

**LONDON, Nov. 28:** (CP)—Minister of Food Herbert Morrison announced in Parliament today that bacon and butter rationing would begin in Great Britain on January 8. The ration will be four ounces weekly. Mr. Morrison also appealed to the people to keep down their sugar consumption to one pound per week.

## Special Decrees For Daladier In France Are Given

Paris, Nov. 28:—Special wartime powers to rule France by decree have been renewed for Premier Edouard Daladier and his administration.

## French Bag Nazi Subs

**PARIS, Nov. 28:** (CP)—A French naval source said today that about ten German submarines have been sunk by the French navy since the war began. Six of these have been sunk during the past ten days by French naval patrols.

## War News

**WORKING FOR PEACE**  
**ROME**—An important announcement in regard to the Pope's efforts to restore peace is expected to be made December 15 when the new Italian minister to the Vatican presents his credentials to the Pontiff. His Holiness will disclose, it is anticipated, efforts he has made as liaison agent between belligerent nations and future plans to end the conflict.

**BRUSSELS GUNS BARK**  
**BRUSSELS**—Anti-aircraft guns barked here at noon today as an unidentified foreign plane appeared over the city.

**TO BUILD SHIPS**  
**OTTAWA**—Anti-submarine vessels, salvage boats and large freighters will be included in the war shipbuilding program for Canadian yards, it is announced.

## No Nobel Peace Prize This Year

**OSLO, Nov. 28:**—There being no candidates, the Nobel Peace Prize will not be awarded this year, being postponed until 1940.

## BLOCKADE DEFERRED

Neutral Nations To Be Given Until Next Monday To Make Arrangements

**LONDON, Nov. 28:**—The order-in-council providing for the blockade of German exports was published in the London Gazette today but will not become effective until next Monday or possibly later so that neutral nations may have the opportunity of making arrangements to relieve their position. Co-operation of neutrals, is asked by calling at examination points in Great Britain and France.

Following the announcement that the Allied blockade of German exports would not become effective before next Monday, it was though probable there would be extension to December 11 as a further concession to neutral shippers.

## SMOKE IS NOW USED BY NAZIS

New Type of Warfare Employed On Western Front Today—Germans Fall Back With Heavy Losses

**PARIS, Nov. 28:** (CP)—For the first time in this war German troops yesterday used smoke shells with artillery attacks on the western front east of the Moselle River. The enemy came up to within a few yards of fortifications of the Maginot Line and were then driven back by heavy artillery, machine gun and rifle fire. Hand grenades and pistols were also used by the French in effecting the repulse and heavy casualties were inflicted upon the Germans while French losses were light.

Today the weather was bad and there was only sporadic land activity with some artillery firing.

Poor weather held air reconnoitering to a minimum.

## Rawalpindi Was Victim Of Deutschland And Another German Warship Thursday

**LONDON, November 28.**—It was disclosed by the Admiralty late yesterday that the armed merchantman Rawalpindi, loss of which was announced earlier in the day, had been the victim of the German pocket battleship Deutschland and another German warship off Iceland. The sinking occurred last Thursday.

One of the few survivors is reported to have stated that the Rawalpindi was attacked by surprise and little, if any, effort was made to pick up survivors. Indeed the German ships passed at full speed by one of the lifeboats, evidently with the deliberate intention of capsizing it. Later another armed cruiser arrived on the scene and picked up a few survivors.

Latest word is that eleven survivors of the Rawalpindi a rived in Scotland. Ten of the men are those who took to the boat when the vessel sank and the other was picked up when clinging to another overturned boat. It is reported that 26 had been rescued, possibly picked up by the German ships.

The Admiralty announced that over 250 members of the crew of the Rawalpindi lost their lives in a stirring sea battle.

In the effort to ensnare the Deutschland, British naval patrol in the north Atlantic is being extended.

**German Account**  
In Berlin it is reported that 26 members of the crew of the Rawalpindi were saved. They were mostly Scotsmen.

It was about dusk Thursday evening, said the German account, that the Deutschland came out on the Rawalpindi. Flames broke out on the British ship soon after she was fired upon and it was not long before she was completely ablaze. Several detonations, supposedly from explosives aboard the Rawalpindi, were heard and the vessel sank rapidly. Rescue operations, the Germans claim, were immediately commenced but so rapid was the destruction of the vessel that it was difficult to save many.

## Kenney Urges Assay Office

VICTORIA, Nov. 28: (CP)—E. T. Kenney, Liberal member for Skeena, urged before the mining committee of the Legislature yesterday the establishment of a government assay office at Prince Rupert. Dr. J. F. Walker, deputy minister of mines, said the cost would be about \$3500.

## WILL MAKE STEEL HERE

Dr. J. F. Walker, Deputy Minister of Mines, Says British Interests Busy

**VICTORIA, Nov. 28:** (CP)—Dr. J. F. Walker, deputy minister of mines, told the mining committee of the Legislature yesterday that he thought British capital would be willing to finance an iron and steel industry in British Columbia. The department was making exhaustive reports on power facilities and coal and iron deposits.

"Something is afoot now in connection with a steel plant but I cannot say anything more about it," said the deputy minister.

## Reconnaissance Planes Are Busy

Further Flights Made During Last Night Over Northwestern Germany

**LONDON, Nov. 28:** (CP)—Royal Air Force reconnaissance planes were again active in scouting over northwestern Germany during the night, it is reported.

# EDITORIALS

## LIBERTY AT STAKE

In his address to the world on Sunday Prime Minister Chamberlain said "The liberties of all free people are at stake." That is why victory for the British and French people means victory for all free nations and seems like a good reason for support from those nations. Liberty is a priceless gift and one that comes only to those capable of using it wisely.

## INTERESTING GESTURE

The gesture made by Italy of giving leave to over a quarter of a million of her troops is looked upon as a friendly gesture toward Great Britain and a token to Germany that she will not be drawn into the present war in spite of all the pressure that can be brought to bear to that purpose.

## VALUE TO NATION

Addressing the Vancouver Board of Trade, S. W. Fairweather, chief of research and development of the Canadian National Railways, said: "I want to emphasize the point that, had the pioneer lines of railway, such as the Pacific Great Eastern and the Canadian National line from Red Pass Junction to Prince Rupert, not been constructed, the natural resources in these localities would be as useless to the Allies as if they were buried beneath the ice-cap of the Antarctic continent. How else than by a railway line can the resources of Central and Northern British Columbia be made available to the needs of industry?"

"Without railway connections how could the port of Prince Rupert be made fully effective as a base for naval operations, shipbuilding, shipping and as a base of operations for fishing fleets? I have used these two lines as examples because they are known to you, but the same can be said of lines of railway in every part of the country, lines which, from a narrow point of view, fail to earn enough revenue to pay for their operation, but which are of great value to the nation, even in peace time, and which become of even greater importance in war time."

WOMEN GOOD CAMP CHEFS

Auxiliaries Do Much of it in Blighty Camps and They Hope to Get to France

EASTERN COMMAND HEAD-QUARTERS, England, Nov. 27: (CP)—Women of the Auxiliary Territorial Service, eager to go to France, have taken over many duties from soldiers at the Eastern Command Headquarters and are regarded by the Tommies as "O.K." All the army cooks at the Headquarters have been replaced by women, and girls are working as clerks in the office and in the pay office; as mess servants, store women, private car drivers and ambulance drivers. A number of the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry whose job it is to drive and maintain ambulances are attached to the Headquarters. They are expert motor mechanics and many of them do the repairs to their ambulances which are mainly converted lorries.

"We were incorporated into the A. T. S. on its formation but we still keep our own individual entity," said one girl. "We do all our own maintenance work, except workshop jobs which naturally have to be handed over to the Royal Army Service Corps. Punctures, engine and chassis adjustments are all done by the girls. At the moment we are dealing with accidents and illness among the troops in barracks in this area but we are all on tip-toe to go to France. However, we have heard nothing about it."

Cook For Hundreds  
Girls in the cookhouse cook for about 300 men and women. There's no gas or electricity here and huge coal-burning cookers which have to be lit early each morning and kept going all day are used for cooking. "I don't think any of the girls were cooks before joining," the leader cook said. "They are simply wonderful. Practically every day we have to prepare and cook two hundredweight of potatoes for dinner. We have one man to help with the stoking." "A.T.S. women are allowed out of barracks while off duty," an officer said. "Their passes expire at 10 p.m. and 'lights out' is at 10.30. That may sound early but the girls are up very early in the morning. Moderate make-up is allowed. It would be an awful mistake if we lost our feminine individuality because we are doing this job." Age limit for the A.T.S. is from 18 to 43. Rate of pay for a volunteer—a private in ordinary army language—is 30 cents a day with uniform provided and all food found. Allowances for dependents are under consideration.

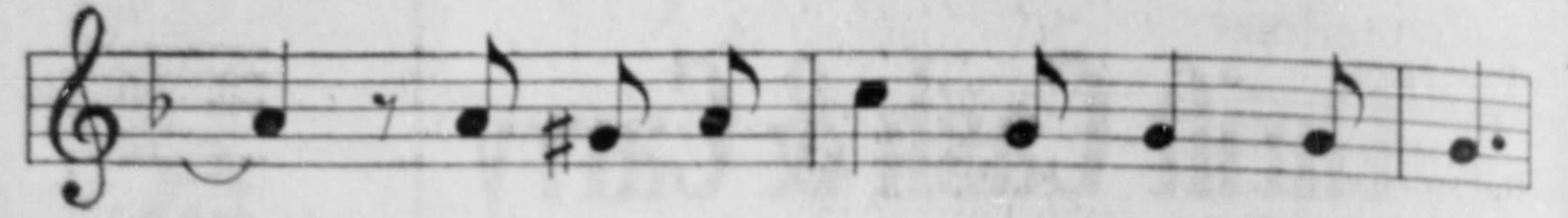

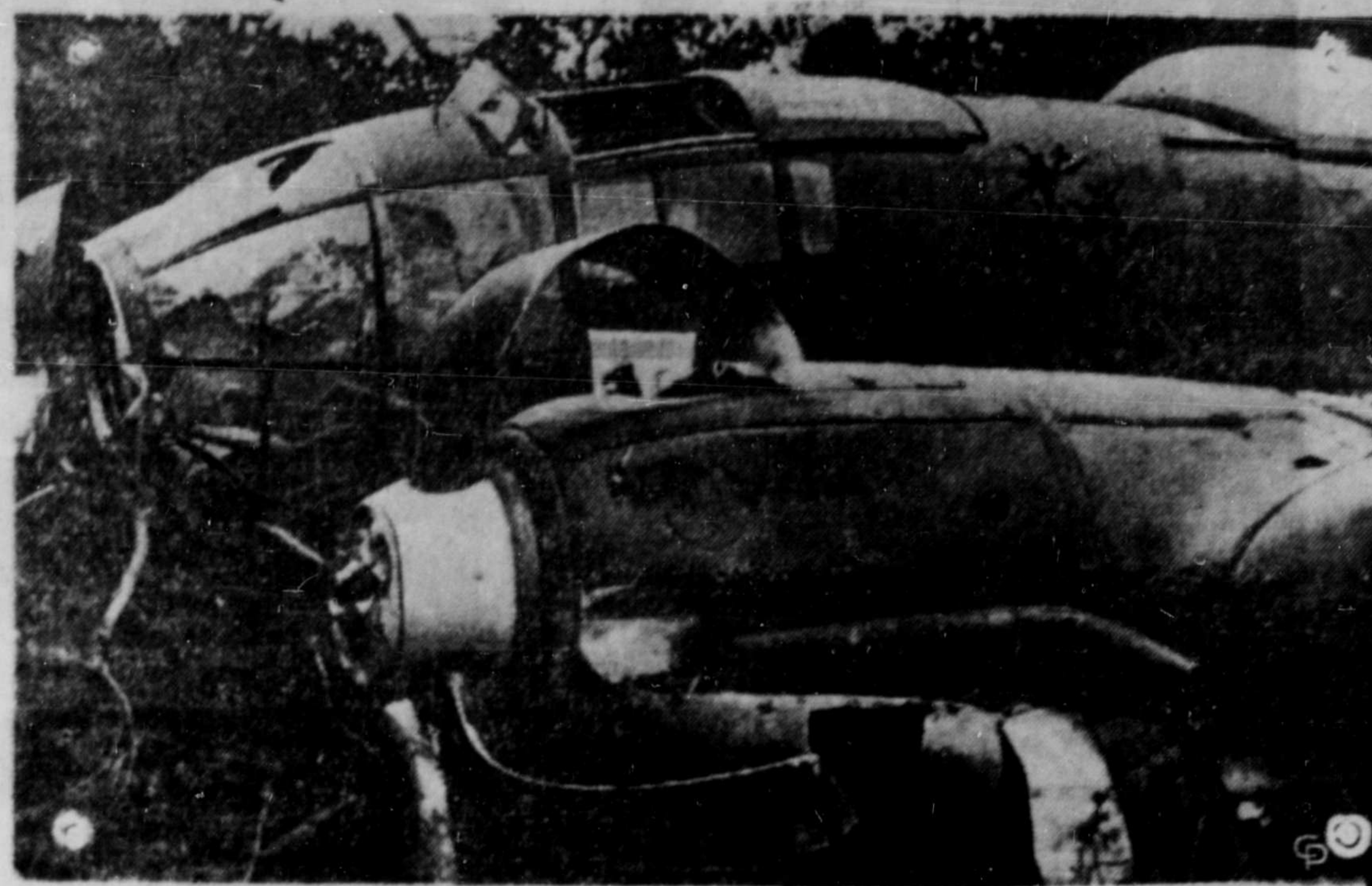

- 1/2 lb. bread crumbs
- 1/2 lb. beef suet.
- 2 oz. flour
- 1/2 lb. brown sugar
- 2 ounces mixed peel.
- pinch salt
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda.
- Grated rind and juice of half a lemon
- 1/4 pint milk
- 3 eggs
- 1/4 lb. sultanas
- 1/4 lb. raisins
- 1/4 lb. currants
- 1/4 oz. cinnamon
- 1/4 oz. nutmeg
- 1/4 oz. allspice
- 1 1/2 oz. brandy.

#### Procedure

Mix the dry ingredients together thoroughly, then add the beaten eggs, milk and brandy, and mix all together thoroughly. Grease inside of pudding bowl or covered mould to prevent pudding from sticking. If pudding bowl is used, cover bowl with floured gauze tied tightly around bowl to keep moisture away from pudding. Boil the pudding for three hours. Heat thoroughly before serving, then unmould on dish. Serve with sprig of holly on top.

#### Hard Sauce

1/4 lb. butter  
1/4 lb. powdered sugar  
Mix butter and sugar until the mixture becomes snow white; add a few drops of lemon extract. Roll in wax paper, place in refrigerator until hard. Cut in slices. Serve slice on top of plum pudding.

## Wife's Pensions In U.K. Forces

### Scales of Allowances for Widows and Families, Also Disabled Cases

LONDON, Nov. 28: (CP)—Under a royal warrant for the United Kingdom fighting forces it is provided that soldiers' widows will get a rate of from 15s 6d (\$3.41) to 22s 6d (\$4.95) weekly, according to age, with additions of from 1s 6d (33 cents) to 7s 6d (\$1.65) weekly according to the soldier's rank.

The widow of a second lieutenant will receive £90 (\$400) yearly. A major's widow is entitled to £140 (\$623), a colonel's £200 (\$890), a major-general's £300 (\$1,335), a field-marshal's £600 (\$2,670).

Separated and "unmarried" officers' wives are also eligible for pensions, with a maximum of £90 (\$400) yearly for a separated wife or £50 (\$222) for an unmarried one. Pensions to widows cease on remarriage.

Family allowances for soldiers with 100 per cent disablement are as follows (weekly):

For a wife, 5s (\$1.10); for the first child, 3s (\$1.10), second and third, 4s 4d (72 cents) each; others, nothing.

Allowances for dependents of 100 per cent disabled officers are £25 a year for a wife and from £10 (\$44.50) to £20 (\$89) a year for the children.

Women members of the military forces receive slightly smaller payments. Pay for total disablement ranges from 22s 6d (\$5) weekly for Class V members to £150 (\$667.50) yearly for a principal matron or member with a status above that of a major. The lowest scale is 4s 6d (99 cents) for Class V and £30 (\$133.50) for highest ranks. Women also receive family allowances.

(Note: Foregoing apply to United Kingdom troops. The scales for the Canadian Active Service Forces are not available.)

### REGISTER COMPLETE

Survey of Voluntary War Workers Throughout Canada Well Ahead

TORONTO, Nov. 28: (CP)—By the end of November registration of Canadian women for voluntary service will be practically complete. Miss Margaret Hyndman, national chairman of the Voluntary Registration of Canadian Women, believes.

Although Ontario has not had a full registration yet organization is well underway with more than 20,000 registered in Toronto alone.

British Columbia opened its registration booths October 16 and a week later questionnaires were being filled out on Vancouver Island. Volunteers in gas-boats distributed the forms to the out-of-way places not available by train or car.

Alberta began its registration in the southern part October 16 and in the North October 23. In the scattered districts volunteer horsewomen rode with the questionnaires to women who were unable to get to town during the week.

Southern Saskatchewan is just finishing its registration and Northern Saskatchewan begins next week. Winnipeg has been registering for several weeks and organization is underway throughout Manitoba. Beginning November 14 the women of the Maritimes will volunteer their services.

Then tabulation begins at head office in Toronto and early in the New Year the results, compiled, tabulated and indexed, will be in readiness for the government should they be needed.

### OTTAWA BUSTLES FOR WAR

Military and Civilian Population of Capital District Increases and Activity at Peak

OTTAWA, Nov. 28: (CP)—The tempo quickens in Ottawa in these days of strife and the Dominion capital, shaken out of its usual period of placidity between parliamentary sessions, has become the nerve centre of a nation at war.

Members of Canada's three fighting forces crowd the city. Highlanders in large numbers swing along the streets and the Royal Canadian Air Force blue mingles on very hand with the old reliable khaki of the army.

Other hundreds—civilians come to work at war jobs—have swelled the population and there is an undercurrent of excitement as the government prepares to launch a vast industrial and military drive to aid the allies.

Outwardly the capital, like most Canadian cities, has settled down to war. On the other hand, however, on Parliament Hill and in government buildings along Wellington Street, there are few "dog-days" common to other autumns when political circles sat back quietly to speculate on the next session of Parliament.

Now, in speech and action, without any actual threat of the fighting coming close, the capital is geared to war, the reality of which is perhaps more distinct here than in any other city of the Dominion. Troop concentrations have been heavy in the Ottawa area with the staff of the National Defence Department greatly increased.

But instead of blackouts and sandbags, the Peace Tower on Parliament Hill is brightly floodlighted at nights. On the Plaza the National War Memorial, fuzzy in its coating of autumnal hoar frost, stands out under the arc lights like a cameo.

#### Fighters Everywhere

Scouting planes and bombers drone over the city daily on training flights from Rockcliffe and Up-lands airports. Evening theatre-goers near military camps have soldier-life impressed on them, when, during the performance, a break is made in the film to flash the message: "Soldiers, it is now 9:30 p.m." The soldiers must leave to reach camp by 9:30 closing.

Lansdowne Park, where the Big Four football games are played, is a military camp and several thou-

### EVEN FLOW OF TRAFFIC

Special Control in Interests of Efficiency on Canadian Railroads

MONTREAL, Nov. 28.—The railway Association of Canada is putting into effect immediately a system of control of traffic offered at stations in Canada for rail movement to Canadian Atlantic ports for export, according to statement made by J. A. Brass, western secretary of the Association.

"Irregularity in trans-Atlantic sailings and heavy increased demand for vessel space and freight car equipment under wartime conditions make it necessary to control the movement so that shipments will reach seaboard at such times as the steamship lines are in a position to accept them," Mr. Brass said. "In this manner it is hoped to avoid congestion and the utilization of freight cars for storage purposes inevitably slows up transportation services and every effort must be made to prevent such conditions arising at a time when the need for efficient transportation is so urgent.

"Under the system now being put into effect railway freight agents are required to obtain permits from designated railway traffic officers for each individual carload or less than carload shipment before he may accept same from shippers for movement to seaboard.

"While congestion has not yet developed at any Canadian port," Mr. Brass further explained "the railways feel an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure and it is hoped that timely action in adopting measures of control will meet the situation.
