FDITORIALS

TEUTON BIAS

Those who get news from the American radio broadcasts should remember that some of the announcers seem to be biased strongly in favor of the German side in the! struggle now going on. Others may be biased toward the British side. Allowance should always be made for this. The Germans are leaving no stone unturned in their efforts to influence the American people in their favor and to prevent aid going to the Allies in either war materials or men.

Unfortunately in Prince Rupert it is often difficult to hear Vancouver or other Canadian stations. The Galgary station gets a news service from an American organization. The result is that radio fans find it difficult to get reliable information except from the Daily News and its Canadian Press service.

THE RUSSIAN MENACE

Only recently Germany was looked upon as the menace to European solidarity. Now it is Russia that seems to be the greatest menace. She has forced her attentions on Esthonia and Lithuania after picking off half of Poland and so far has had to fight very little. Finland seems to have held out successfully against Russian forced friendship and so has Turkey. Britain is now conferring with a representative of the Soviets but the treacherous manner in which the pact with Germany was signed makes it doubtful if any of the countries can depend upon any agreement made.

TURKEY IS FEARFUL

Turkey finds it impossible to come to any arrangement with Russia. Stalin has an Oriental mind which works in devious ways. After coming to an arrangement with Turkey as to a course of action he then follows the example of Hitler and raises the ante. Happily, the Turkish government feels itself strong enough to resist and withdraws from further conferences.

Turkev may prove to be a valuable friend of Britain and. doubtless, the British government will see to it that nothing happens to make that country pay the same penalty that Poland did for this friendship.


