JAPAN IS DESIROUS OF PACT

Does Not Wish to See Treaty With United States Lapse as Threatened

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 21:—The Japanese government will ask the United States to renew the commercial treaty with Japan which expires January 26, it was announced today by the Japanese ambassador to the United States. "Failure to replace the treaty would be of distinct disadvantage to both countries," the Ambassador says. The Japanese Foreign Office will take the matter up with United States Ambassador Joseph C. Grew at Tokyo, it was stated.

In July the United States gave notice of intention to terminate the agreement when it expires because of Japanese disregard of American rights in its China campaign and because of the opposition of a large body of public opinion in United States against shipment of scrap iron and other war materials to Japan to assist it in prosecuting the war against China.

The existing treaty has been in force since 1911. In Tokyo Premier Abe today declared it would be fortunate if the treaty could be renewed before it expired. However, the Japanese government was studying measures to cope with the situation should it be allowed to lapse.

NAZI PLANE SHOT DOWN

Enemy Raider Is Disposed Of By Royal Air Force, According To British Claim

LONDON, Nov. 21: (CP)—The British Air Ministry announced today that a German airplane had been shot down on the east coast of England in combat with planes of the Royal Air Force. Other German planes had been driven off by pursuit craft.

German fighting planes appeared up and down the east coast of England and Scotland yesterday but were driven off by squadrons of Royal Air Force pursuit planes and anti-aircraft fire and were unable to drop bombs. Among the parts visited by the enemy aircraft were southeast England, Kent, environs of London, the Firth of Forth, northern Scotland and the Orkney Islands. In the most of cases the planes were flying at great height. Today one German plane flew over Sutherlandshire in Scotland and over the Orkneys. There were no bombs dropped and no gunfire.

Bad Weather Along Front

Germans Unable to Make Reconnaissance Flights—No Special Events Occur

BERLIN, Nov. 21: (CP)—Bad weather prevented German reconnaissance flights on the Western Front yesterday, the German news agency said in elucidating a High Command communique which said simply "no special events" had occurred.

LONDON, November 21: (CP)—John Simon, Chancellor of the Exchequer, will issue tomorrow public savings certificates and war bonds for sale to the public to finance the war. He said the time had not arrived to issue a loan on the open market.

# EDITORIALS

## CAMPAIGN OF KILLING

The latest Hitler campaign of indiscriminate killing is the most recent phase of the war. Mines are being laid in the shipping lanes without warning so that ships of no matter what nationality are liable to be blown up. The mines seem to be floating at large anywhere. Some have drifted ashore and exploded as they came in contact with coast obstructions. Many have blown up neutral ships, causing much loss of life. If the neutral countries affected were only strong enough to do so they would undoubtedly force Germany to stop the illegal practice. With Germany, however, might is right and the small nations have to take it.

## NON-CANADIAN OFFENDERS

Discussing the position of Quebec in Canada Louis Frapceur, addressing the Ontario-Quebec circulation manager's convention, the printed report of the proceedings of which is now to hand, traced the history of the province from its founding and pointed out how the people of Quebec felt toward Canada and the British Empire. Concluding he said:

"Concerning that announcement about Fascism and Communism and so forth in Quebec, please—take no stock in it. We are intelligent people. Go down the Gaspé and you will see the true Canadian, down the lower St. Lawrence. They are respectful of authority and they don't even know what Fascism and Communism mean—and they are not interested in finding out. Yesterday, my old friend Gratton O'Leary, spoke to you about the Padlock Law. I will not discuss the merits of the law, but let me remind you of one point. The so-called Padlock Law was vetoed unanimously by both houses of the Quebec Legislature—Catholic members, Protestant members and free-thinker members included. The idea is this. We do not want any special policy or principle, but merely endeavor to follow our normal course of living—which is the same course as yours. Since 1927 there have been two or three instances of Communist propaganda, in Ontario especially. It was thought wise to suppress them at their very point of origin, but let me tell you that from statistics compiled by a journalist friend of mine, of houses padlocked, eight out of every ten houses padlocked were in non-Canadian hands.

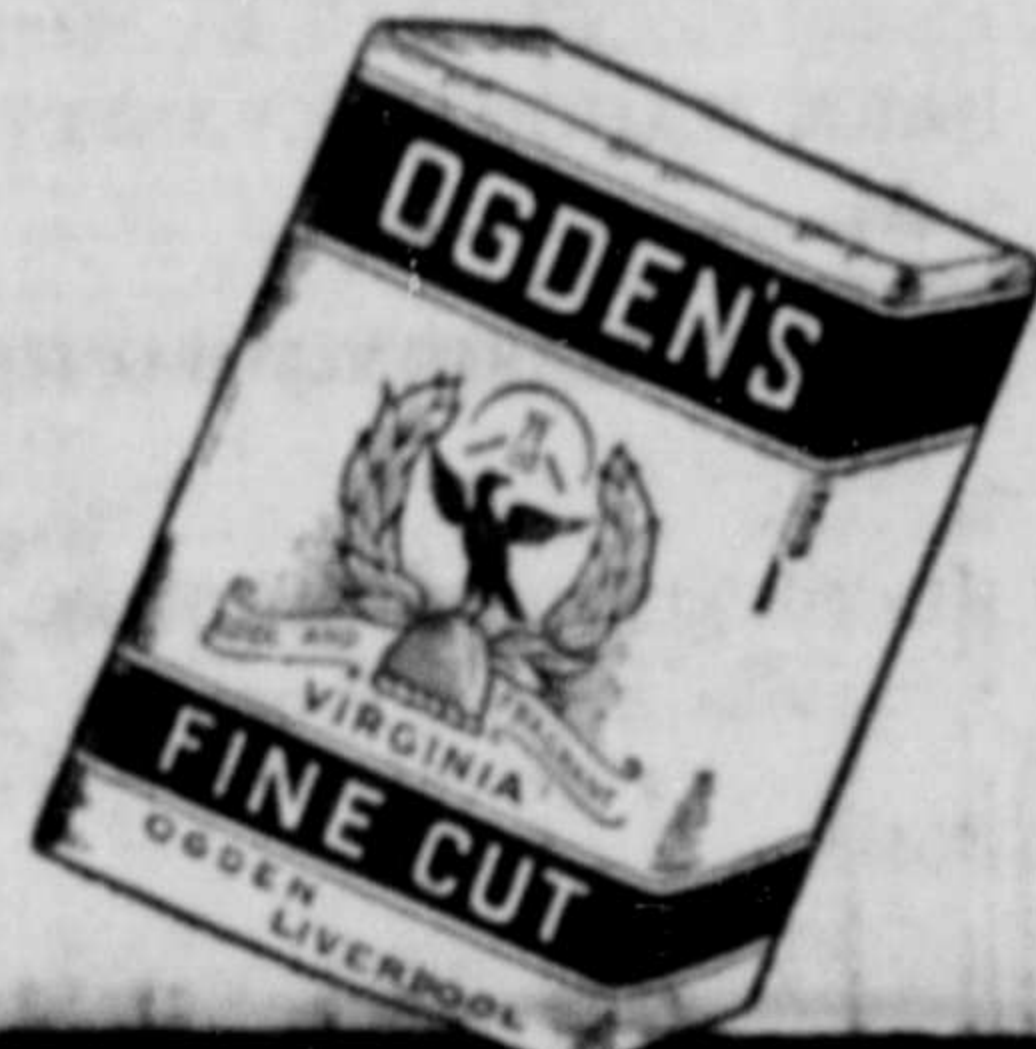

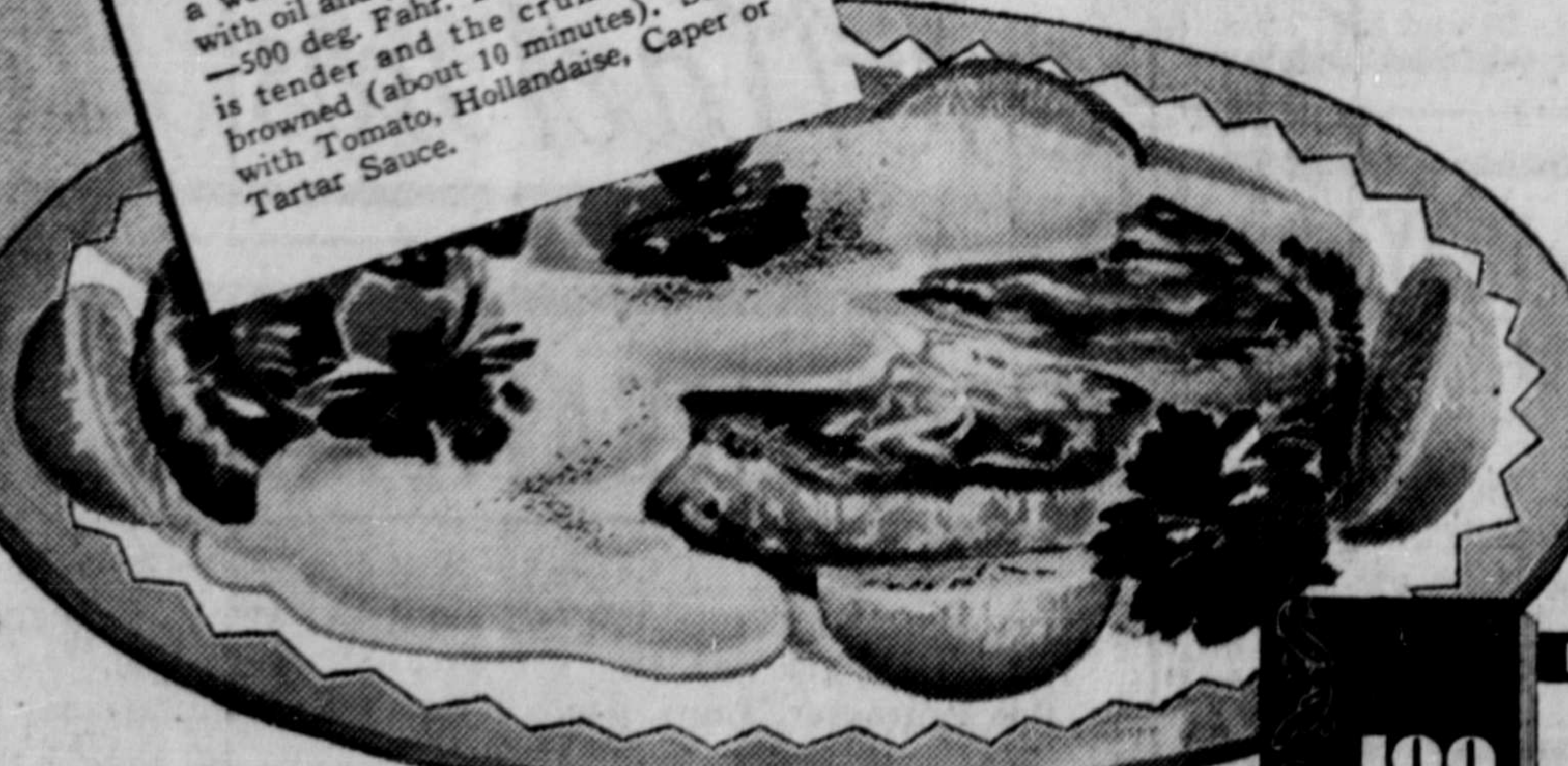

### OVEN COOKED FILLETS OF FISH

(Cod, haddock, halibut, whitefish, sole, etc., may be used.)  
The fish may be cut into pieces of suitable size for serving or the fillets may be left whole.
