# Salmon Cannery For Prince Rupert

## Announcement of New Industry Here Made; Will Start Next Year

Announcement is made today of the decision of Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd., well known fish handling and processing firm, to establish a four-line up-to-date salmon cannery at Prince Rupert, the plant to go into operation with the 1940 season. The western 140 feet of the ocean dock has been leased from the Canadian National Railways as a site and, immediately after the first of the year, the work of machinery installation will commence. Giving employment to some 100 persons and with a maximum capacity of 200,000 cases, it is anticipated that the plant will be in operation from June to February of each year. It is estimated that it will mean an added industrial income for the city of about \$250,000 annually.

Arrangements for the lease of the portion of the ocean dock have already been concluded with the railway company. The ocean dock will also provide storage facilities for the product after canning. While the maximum capacity will be 200,000 cases per year, the actual production will, of course, be regulated by the amount of fish available, market conditions and other contingencies as they arise. Fishing arrangements are now being made.

A considerable portion of the output, it is expected, will be shipped over the Canadian National Railways to the Canadian market.

Norman Nelson, president of the Nelson Fisheries Ltd., will be in personal charge of the management of the plant.

John A. Clark, production manager of Nelson Fisheries Ltd. and formerly manager of the B.C. Packers cannery at Claxton, and Thomas Anderson, manager of the Tucks Inlet Packing Co. reduction plant, are at present making local arrangements for the establishment of the new plant.

Both Mr. Anderson and Mr. Clark agree that Prince Rupert is an ideal location for a cannery.

It will be the second cannery of Nelson Bros. in this district. A couple of years ago, the company acquired the Massett Cannery salmon cannery at Old Massett, Queen Charlotte Islands.

## NAZI RAIDS DRIVEN OFF

Military Activity On Western Front Continues of Insignificant Nature

PARIS, Dec. 8.—French forces on the Western Front were kept busy yesterday driving back numerous German raiding parties on French outposts. All the Nazi thrusts, with the possible exception of a very few, were driven back by automatic fire which inflicted casualties on the enemy. Today was quiet on the front, a French communique announcing there was "nothing to report."

**"ABOMINABLE OUTRAGE"**  
PARIS—Premier Edouard Daladier told a cheering Chamber of Deputies today that the Russian invasion of Finland was an "abominable outrage" evoking "universal disgust."

**ON WAR SUPPLY BOARD**  
OTTAWA—W. C. Woodward, well known Vancouver merchant, has been appointed a member of the Canadian war supply board.

**DESTROYER DAMAGED**  
LONDON—The Admiralty announces that the destroyer *Thetis* was damaged by a torpedo fired by a German submarine yesterday. Ten members of the crew are missing.

**NAVAL BATTLE REPORTED**  
BERGEN—A large scale naval battle off Bergen was reported yesterday. Fishermen said they saw battleships and fighting planes in action but they could not identify them.

**UNITED STATES PROTEST**  
WASHINGTON—United States formally reserves all rights to recover damages which the country may suffer as a result of the British blockade of German exports which today was formally called a breach of the principles of international law. The United States also said that United States holds Russia responsible for damages and injuries Americans or American interests may sustain as a result of the blockade of Finland.

**ITALIANS IN ACTION**  
HELSINKI—Italian planes, manned by Italian pilots, have gone into action on behalf of Finland against Russia. One Russian plane was reported shot down by an Italian today.

**RUSS FIRES ON NAZI**  
COPENHAGEN—The German ship *Ilva*, 7,000 tons, out of Hamburg, was fired upon three times by a Russian submarine.

**IN SECRET SERVICE**  
NEW YORK—Dr. Walter Engelberg, secretary of the German consulate here, who has been murdered, was a member of the German secret service, it has been disclosed. So was the secretary of the German consulate at Budapest who has also been murdered.

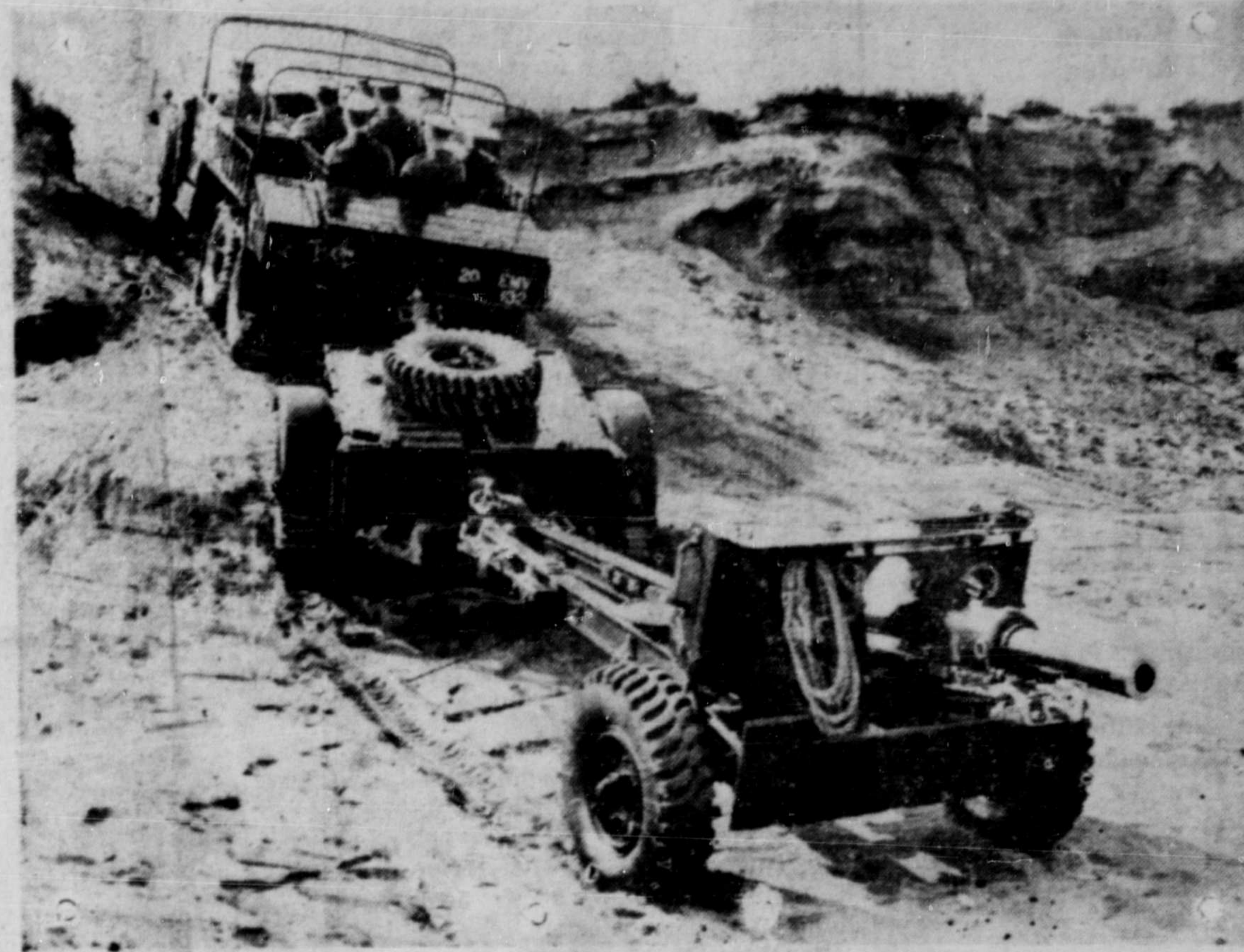
Further Floods In Courtenay District—Ten Families Homeless—Roads Inundated

COURTENAY, Dec. 8. (CP)—Flood waters of the Courtenay River subsided somewhat but an area of ten miles is still inundated. Ten homeless families on the highway towards Campbell River are cut off. The flood is said by pioneers to be the worst in years, being due to continued torrential rainfall.

## Loggers Injured When Train Goes Through Flood Weakened Bridge At Vancouver Id. Camp

FRANKLIN RIVER, December 8. (CP)—An undetermined number of loggers were injured fifteen miles inland from here when a small bridge collapsed under a logging locomotive and derailed a passenger coach in which they were riding. First reports to headquarters of Bloedel, Stewart & Welch Logging Co. said that none of the fifty or sixty men on the work train were killed. The injured are being rushed to hospital at Port Alberni. Names and extent of injuries are not available.

## ADVANCE AT GREAT COST

Russia Continues Invasion of Finland Despite Strong Resistance And Heavy Losses

LONDON, Dec. 8. (CP)—Russian armies continue their advance into Finland but at great cost, in view of the stubborn Finnish resistance, in men and equipment. A fierce Finnish counter-attack on the Isthmus of Karelia is reported. The Russians have resumed aerial bombing on the south coast. The Soviet continues to land troops along the Arctic coast where a large and decisive engagement is anticipated. Russia announces that a complete naval blockade of the Finnish coast becomes effective today. All shipping nations have been warned against attempting to run the blockade.

**Snow White Uniforms**  
Brief daylight in northernmost Finland, combined with the Finns' camouflage tactics in wearing white uniforms for use in Arctic snow, is reported to be causing heavy Russian casualties against relatively small Finnish losses. The Russians, apparently, have made no further progress in the drive to bisect Finland since the advance to Kuolajarvi where the Finns promised to meet them with renewed resistance.

## Million Share Stock Turnover

Heavy Day Recorded on New York Market Yesterday

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—There was a heavy turnover of 1,010,000 shares on the New York stock exchange yesterday. Industrials, closing at 148.70, were off .08. The rail average was off .09 at 32.23.

## NINE CREW MEN LOST

Collisions of British Vessels Off Nova Scotia Coast Due To Fog

HALIFAX, Dec. 8.—Nine members of the crew of the British freighter *Manchester Regiment*, which sank off the Nova Scotia coast following a collision with the freighter *Oropesa*, it is announced. There was no loss of life in the sinking of the *Chancellor*, another British freighter, with the tanker *Athelchief*. Both collisions were due to heavy fog.

## PLANE SINKS NAZI U-BOAT

Royal Air Force Patrol Ship Found Submarine Lying On Surface

LONDON, Dec. 8. (CP)—The British Air Ministry announced that a British plane sank a Nazi submarine with bombs. The submarine was located lying off the coast on the surface by a patrol plane which, with a first bomb, struck it amidships and, with a second, forward.

## SHIP TOLL INCREASES

Further Losses of British And Neutral Vessels Are Reported Today

**ROYAL MAIL SHIP LOST**  
LONDON, Dec. 8. (CP)—Forty-three members of the crew of the royal mail cargo liner *Navasoto*, 8,795 tons, were reported missing after the vessel was torpedoed in the Atlantic Ocean. A similar number are reported rescued.

LONDON, Dec. 8. (CP)—Sinking of the 734-ton British ship *Whinton* in a collision is disclosed. The freighter *Merel* sank after it struck a mine off the southeast coast with loss of fifteen men.

From Oslo the British steamship *Thomas Walton* is reported sunk after an explosion off the northern Norwegian coast, sixteen of the crew being killed.

The Swedish steamship *Vinga* sank after an explosion at sea, the crew being saved.

The Norwegian freighter *Primula* sank after an explosion in the North Sea. Eight are missing.

## PROTEST SEA WAR

Government of Netherlands Tells Germany It Does Not Like Nazi Methods

THE HAGUE, Dec. 8.—The Netherlands government has formally protested to Germany at the methods being followed by the Reich in the war at sea.

## STAND OF ITALIANS

Neutrality Reiterated—Alliance With Germany Stands But Warnings Issued

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The Fascist Grand Council in Rome yesterday reasserted Italy's neutrality. It also reaffirmed the alliance with Germany but issued an implied warning against any German or Russian expansion in the direction of the Balkans.

# EDITORIALS

## MUCH OVERRATED COUNTRY

The progress of the war in Finland indicates that the military strength of Russia has been very much overrated. The system of oppression that has been carried out there is such as to depress the people and they have no heart to fight. They have little to fight for.

We look back with a good deal of appreciation to the time when the Russian army saved Europe from the Germans. Later we hoped great things from the Russian revolution for many people felt that the Russian people had it in them to make something of the country. Then came the gradual growth of a despotism, more cruel and ruthless than anything Russia ever had in the past.

Today the country is anything but prosperous. The people are poorly fed, poorly clad and badly housed. Under these conditions it cannot be expected that they would be good fighters.

## WHAT WILL RUSSIA DO?

It looks to us as if Russia is bound to fight the democracies sooner or later. They have been so aggressive that even if Finland is overcome some country is bound to dispute their right to general overlordship. Now that they have shown that they are not as formidable as might have seemed, nobody is dreading a Red attack.

What a pity it is that the Scandinavian countries could not have got together and formed a mutual pact for defence of their countries. With all united, Russia would not have dared try to rob Finland of her nickel mines. Even as it is she may never get them.

It looks as if the Communist newspaper that announced Russia would try to force Roumania into a treaty was reflecting the wish if not the intention of the Kremlin. It is possible it was an attempt to get the world reaction to such a move. Russia will move against Roumania if she thinks she can get away with it. If the opposition is too great she will keep her hands off. Much will depend upon what happens in Finland.

## GROW POTATOES

It has been suggested to us that we should advocate growing potatoes on vacant lots in order to make sure of a food supply in case the war continues. The idea would be a good one if the lots could be cultivated with any reasonable amount of effort. A few of the lots have been tramped until they are covered with grass and it might not be so very difficult to turn the grass over but even there the task is greater than most people imagine. Those who have never tried cultivating in Prince Rupert cannot imagine how difficult it is to dig up even half a lot. Many have done it and others will do it but it is no job to be undertaken except by a man who has strong arms and a stout heart and a determination to complete the task no matter what the effort.

By all means grow potatoes. The crop is assured if the grower has the will to do the work.

## Panthers Win School Soccer

Final Game of First Round in Borden Street League Ends in Draw

Wild Cats and Panthers fought to a scoreless draw yesterday to wind up the first round of the Borden Street Football League. Lectures by historians and noted men of letters on the history of the country will be broadcast early in the morning on every Sunday and national holiday in 1940.

**IS AGAIN IN NEWS**

Finnish Defence Headed By Baron Who Routed Reds

NEW YORK, Dec. 8: (CP)—Twenty years ago the name of Baron Field Marshal Carl Gustaf Emil Mannerheim made headlines and with Finland and Russia once more in conflict, the redoubtable Baron is again in the news.

The First Great War was three years old when Finland proclaimed her independence in December, 1917. Almost immediately, the well-organized Social Democrats of Finland moved to set up a soviet regime like the one in Russia. Their Red Guard captured many important cities, including Helsingfors, the capital.

At this juncture, Baron Mannerheim became the leader of a counter-revolution. Scion of one of the important Finnish noble families, Mannerheim had served 30 years in the Imperial Russian Army. His Great War service as a cavalry general included periods on the Polish, Galician, Bukovinian and Bessarabian fronts. At the outbreak of the Russian Revolution in 1917, he returned to Finland. In January, 1918, the Finnish Diet, with the Socialist deputies excluded, authorized the organization of a White Force to fight the Red Guards and entered Helsingfors in triumph. Finnish sources say 2,000 people were executed before white supremacy was established. The Britannica says 15,000.

The Germans then foisted a German Prince on Finland as King. The Diet elected him to office but he never took over and finally in December, 1918, Mannerheim became regent.

He organized a force of 100,000 into a "Skyddkorps" to maintain internal order and in March, 1919, permitted elections for a new parliament. At the same time he offered to join the British interventionists against the Russian Bolsheviks in return for the city of Petrograd (now Leningrad). His offer was refused. Nevertheless, a Finnish army attacked Petrograd, without success.

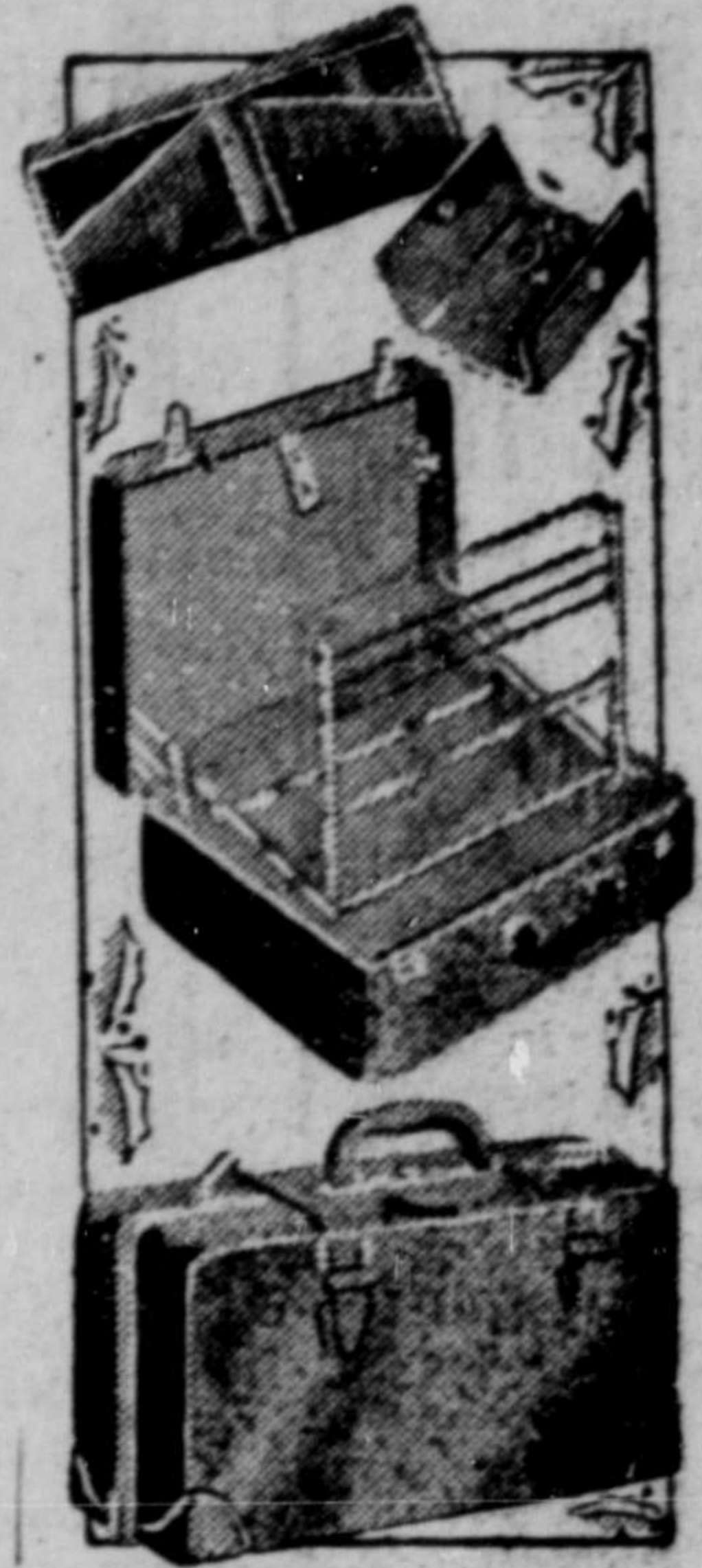
Under the constitution adopted in June, 1919, declaring Finland to be a republic, the Parliament chose its first president and passed over Mannerheim. He retired to private life.

Today he is back in harness as the aged head of the Finnish Defence Council which directs Finland's army of 300,000 men, of a total population of 3,670,000.

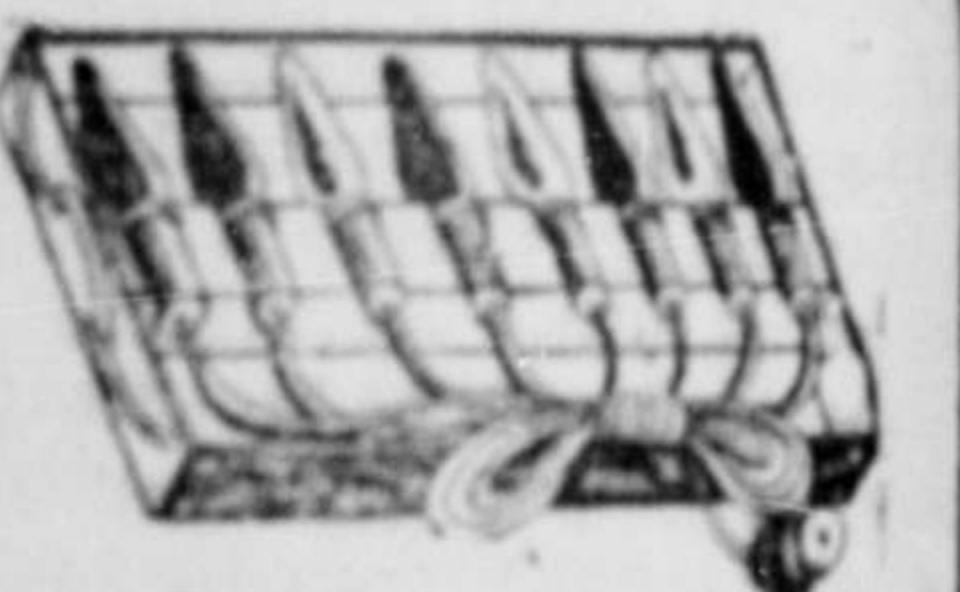

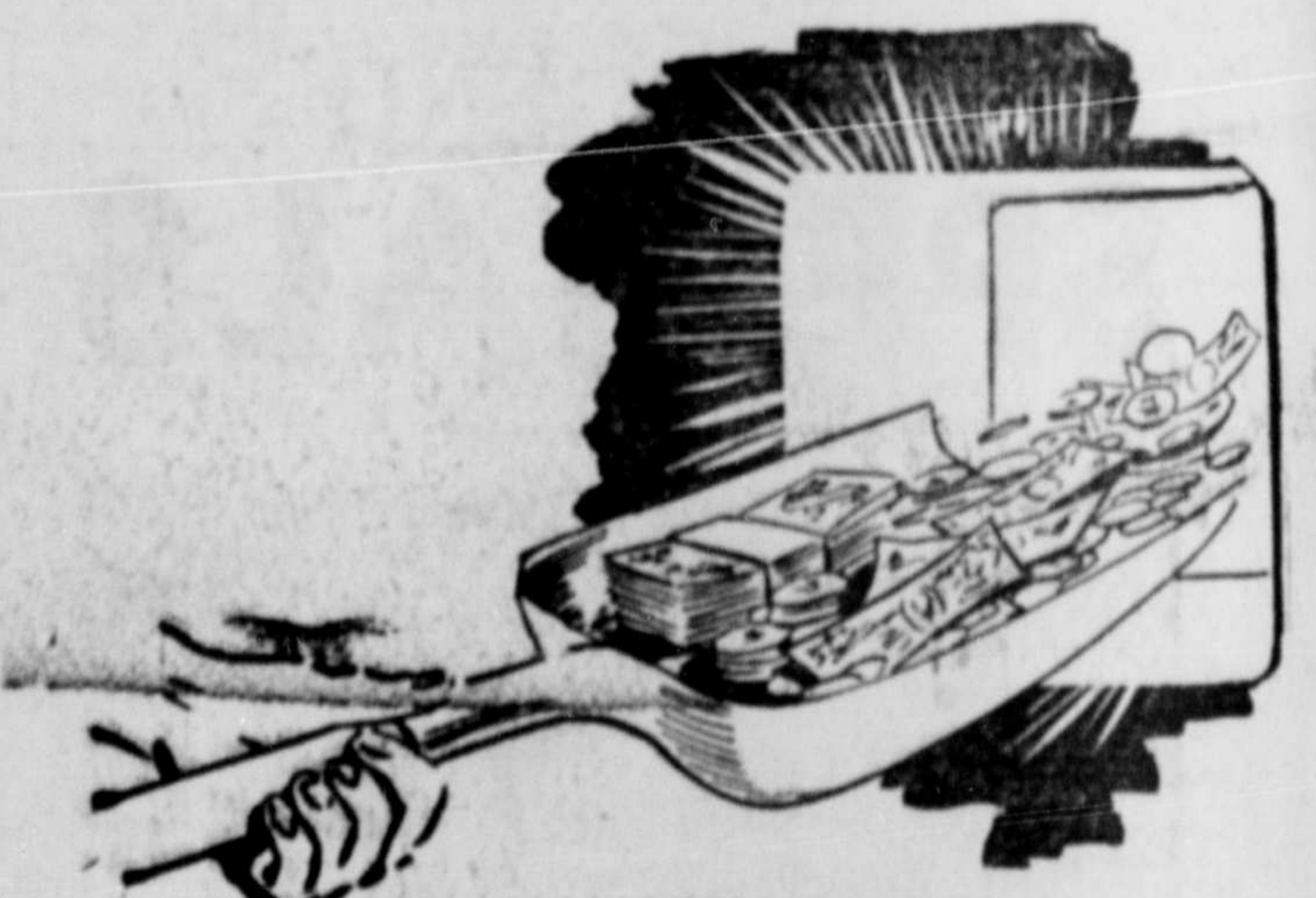

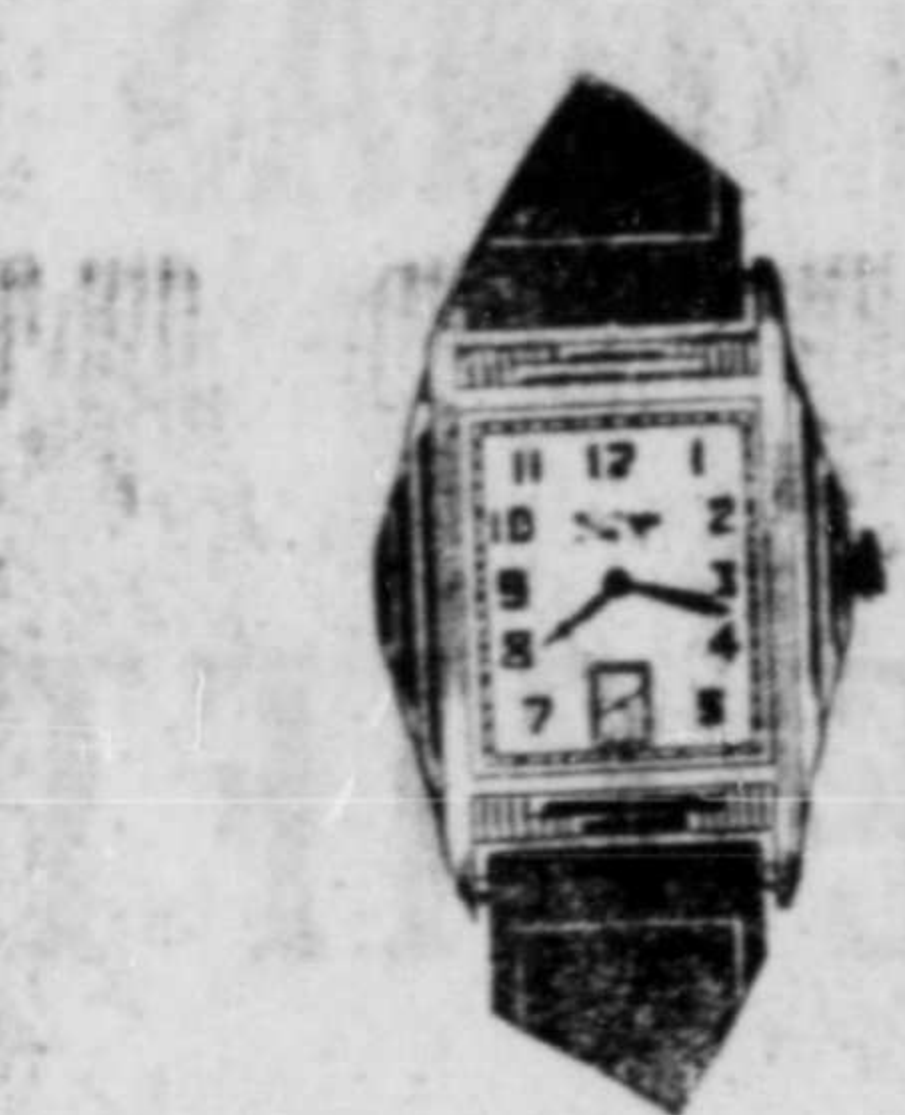

## SPORT CHAT

Winnipeg Blue Bombers, western football champions for the second successive year, have a squad of 27 men, averaging 25.4 years, and 184.7 pounds, ready for the Dominion final Saturday against Ottawa Rough Riders. The 10 linemen average 202.7 pounds, five outside wings 167.2 pounds and 12 backfielders 177 pounds. Seven of the players are former United States college stars and another, Haycock, once played high school football in Portland, Ore. There are veterans of five Dominion playoffs, beginning in 1933 when Toronto Argonauts beat Winnipeg 14-0. They are Greg Kabat, Herb Moberley, Bill Ceretti, Eddie Schaner, Cliff Roseborough and Lou Mogul. Moberley is the oldest on the team at 36 and the lightest at 146 pounds. Five others of the present squad, Fritz Hanson, Percy Daigle, Jeff Nicklin, Herb Peschel and Bud Marquardt, had the club in 1935, the year the Bombers beat Hamilton Tigers 22-0 to bring the national title back for the first time.

Best known is the 155-pound Hanson, blond halfback whose speed and elusiveness was a main factor in the 1935 victory. The former seems as "fast" as a cheetah. After seeing him this year in the early season he scored seven touchdowns in the last three scheduled games to earn a halfback berth on the Canadian Press all-star Western Interprovincial Union team for the third consecutive year. The veteran Kabat, who came to Bombers in 1933 from Wisconsin University, is probably the team's most valuable member. Now 28, the 180-pound Kabat is a great secondary defence player, the team's best blocker and placement kicker. Andy Bieber, 22-year old

back who moved up from junior ranks last year, is the team's most effective plunger. Four years out of junior ranks, Harry Badger became a regular this year as blocking halfback and won the Hudson's Bay trophy as the team's most improved player since 1938. He is 24 and weighs 172.

Jeff Nicklin, 24-year old son of Percy Nicklin who coaches hockey teams in England, won all-star recognition in 1937 and 1938 as an outstanding outside wing but when Coach Reg Threlfall shifted Nicklin's 190 pounds to the flying wing post this season. Jeff was so outstanding, offensively and defensively, that he made the mythical team in that position. Nicklin has been practically a 60-minute man this year and his relief, Al Haycock, has seen little action, but this former Portland boy, aged 22 and weighing 175, is a fast and capable back. Latest of Bombers' United States college recruits, 180-pound Wayne Sheley, came to the club last year from Augustana College, South Dakota and was not eligible for the 1938 Dominion final under the residence rule. He is eligible this year, however, and his accurate forward passing is one of the Bombers' chief threats. Sheley made the all-star team at quarter-back. He is a tricky ball-carrier and fair kicker.

Art Stevenson, all-star quarter-back the last two years, injured an ankle this season and saw little action. He was the former Hastings College, Nebraska, player in competition now. In his third season with the Bombers, this 23-year old, 180-pound back is the west's best punter and a dangerous forward passer. Graduated from high school football last year, 21-year old Carl Krisko is a dangerous plunger. The 183-pound Krisko and Mill Bolvon relieve Bieber in the back field. Percy Daigle, rated by club officials as possibly faster than Hanson, has been kept on the bench the past four seasons only because

Kabat's relief, when he takes it, is 212-pound Johnny Lake, 22, junior graduate for whom many predict a great grid future. Mel Wilson, 22 and 190 pounds, was impressive in 1938 in his first season as regular snap and the former junior forward improved tremendously this year. Benny Hatskin, heaviest man in the club at 235 pounds, relieves Wilson.

The club's outstanding lineman is Martin (Butch) Gainer, 190-pound middle wing who came to Bombers from University of North Dakota in 1937, made the western all-star team that year and won unanimous recognition for the mythical squad in 1938 and again this season. Gainer carries the brunt of secondary defence work. Herb Peschel, 219 pounds and aged 26, holds down the other middle wing berth. He came to Winnipeg with Hanson from North Dakota State. Middle relief is given by 220-pound Lou Mogul, now 29, and 195-pound, Les Lear 22-year old rookie. The veteran Bill Ceretti, age 27 and weighing 190, holds one of the backfield berths. Roseborough, the same age as Ceretti and weighing 205, has been used much of the season at the other wing. Roseborough was moved this year from the backfield. Inside relief is provided by Eddie Kushner, 30 and weighing 185, and Bill Nairn, 26 and 207 pounds.

Bud Marquardt, who came to Winnipeg from North Dakota State College in 1933 along with Hanson and Peschel, is the club's best out-

side winger, a six-foot, three-inch, 170-pound pass receiving ace. Marquardt dislocated a shoulder on October 21 and it is doubtful whether he will be in shape for the Dominion final.

Martin Platz, 21-year old, 155-pound rookie who played junior football last year, is regarded as a "find" and may fill Marquardt's shoes in the final. The other regular end is Ches McCance, 190-pounder in his third year with the club. ## Scout News

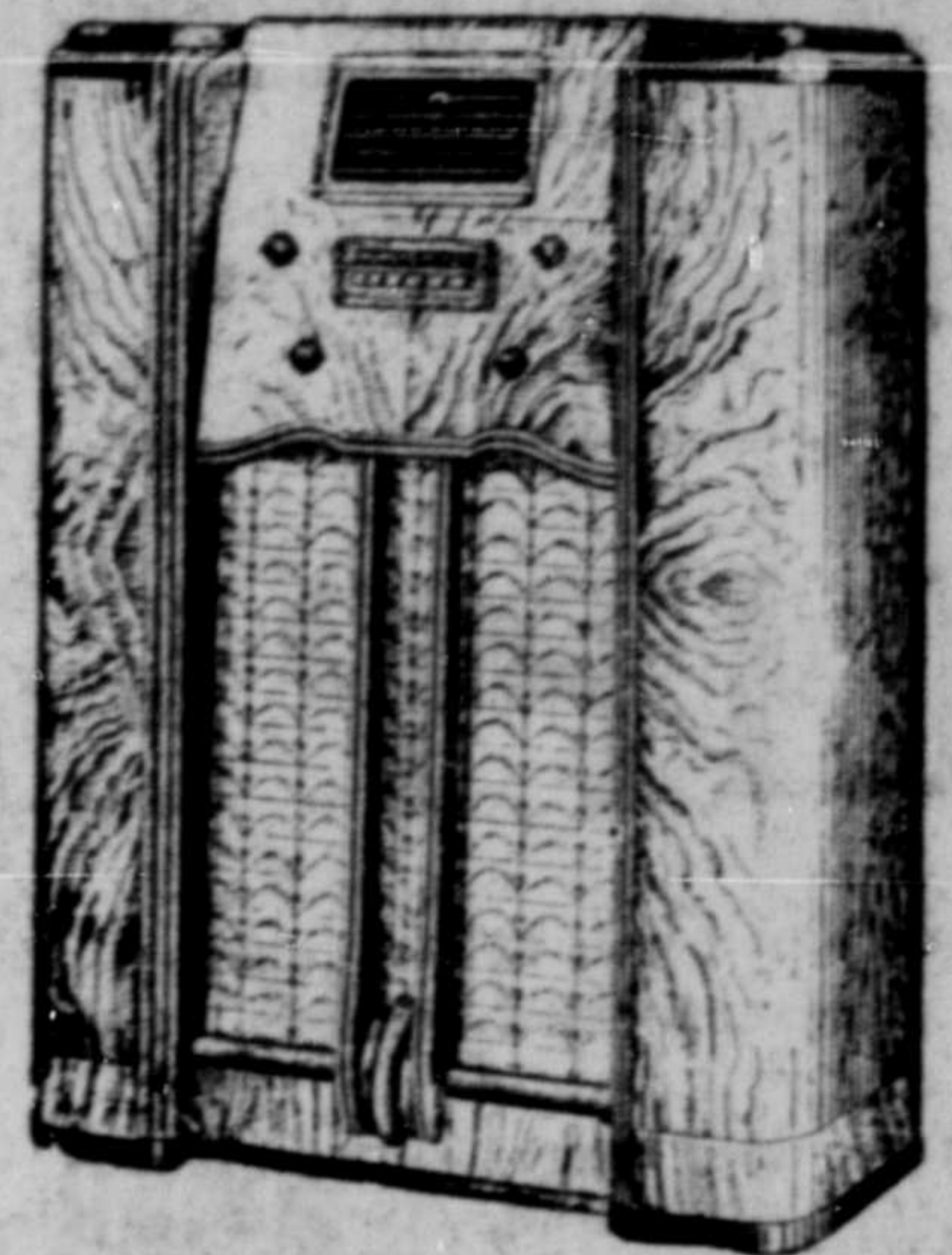

## NAVY WILL BROADCAST TOMORROW

Canada's coasts are constantly patrolled. Merchant ships are being safely conveyed out of port on voyages to other countries, being escorted safely home again. Ships entering Canadian harbors are being examined. Mine-sweepers are performing their duties in Atlantic and Pacific waters.

On Saturday at 7 p. m. C.F.P.R. will illustrate to listeners of Prince Rupert details of the splendid organization behind this all-important work now being handled quietly and efficiently by the Royal Canadian Navy.

It is not only at Canada's ports and harbors that her future Drakes and Nelsons are learning to carry on the priceless traditions of the British Navy. All across the country, hundreds of young men rather at the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve training stations, preparing themselves for the time when they will be called to serve their country at sea. In the course of the broadcast, commanders of these Reserve Units will report on the strength of their units and on the work being accomplished in their districts.

Ship-to-shore transmitters will give the listener a picture of the Navy at work in war time. From the bridge of a destroyer on patrol, with R. C. A. F. planes droning overhead; from the little patrol boats that go out to examine ships being piloted into port; from mine-sweepers and from ships carrying torpedoes and depth charges in ceaseless conflict against U-boats, comes this vivid portrayal of Canada's own "Hearts of Oak."
