NTERNATIONAL CRISIS Emergency Press German Chancellor Indicates Willingness To Have Mussolini Mediate

LONDON, August 28: (CP)—Great Britain's answer to Chancellor Adolf Hitler's peace terms was finally drafted at a cabinet meeting lasting fifty minutes today while sweeping defence regulations were issued preparing the country for war. Informed sources indicated that Great Britain had told Germany that the Anglo-French pledge to Poland would not be lifted, reaffirmed the British intention to support Poland if she is attacked, and that the first requirement of any negotiations over Danzig and the Polish corridor must be removal of threats of force. Parliament will be assembled tomorrow when Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain will report to the nation on peace proposals and war preparations. Sir Neville Henderson, British ambassador to Germany, returned to Berlin with the government message today. He landed at Berlin at 8:32 p.m. (Berlin time) with the British reply to Germany's demands upon Poland. He was scheduled to meet Chancellor Hitler at 10 p.m. (1 p.m. Pacific Standard Time). Some quarters expect that Hitler will send another communication to London before talking a peace or war decision. The reply from Hitler, it was expected, would forstall any decisive action until tomorrow. Hitler is represented by well informed sources in Berlin as

willing to have some friends like Premier Mussolini of Italy mediate the German-Polish dispute. Rejecting the proposal of direct negotiations with Warsaw, the German Feuhrer disclosed that the demands on Poland not only included the return of Danzig and the Polish Corridor but also vaguely implied that he will insist on other adjustments at the Polish expense. The Polish right to the corridor to the Baltic is no longer recognized. Foreign observers were a little relieved by the fact that Germany had not already struck at Poland and that Hitler seemed in a mood to argue the merits of the situation.

In Rome Fascists said that Mussolini was ready to lend his good offices to a settlement of European problems but indicated that Great Britain and France would have to satisfy both Germany and Italy of their goodwill.

ter drove the judge around this Makes Another Appeal

Premier Edouard Daladier of France today drew up a second letter to Hitler in an effort to dissuade Der Feuhrer from warring. The French government extended preparedness with publication of a decree applying censorship to news and photographs. A French government spokesman said he considered it virtually impossible to find ground for a common understanding between France and Germany since the exchange of communications. Daladier and Hitler, it was said, showed "they do not speak the same language." France is including the entire Empire in defence measures.

French spokesmen insisted that this country would not back down on determination to support Poland in case of German attack and to reject any "domination by force."

The general impression was that the new proposals contain Hitler's "minimum demands."

France, is today mobilizing three additional military groups, making her mobilization almost complete with armed forces estimated to total 2,200,000, was strengthening her stand in case she definitely enters negotiations.

Premier Daladier meantime conferred with British Ambassador Phipps and French diplomats on the possibility of peace arising out of Hitler's reported eleventh hour offer of negotiations.

THE SITUATION

The international situation was this morning still very uncertain. Evidently Poland, France and Britain are still standing solidly together and Turkey is staying with them. In spite of efforts of Hitler to break up the combination there seems to be no weakening.

The only loophole left for avoiding war seems to be the statement of Britain that as long as there are threat: of force they will not negotiate in regard to Danzig or the Polish Corridor. This intimates that if the war threats are withdrawn they may consent to negotiate.

We do not see how they could possibly consider the offer of Premier Mussolini to mediate in view of the fact that he had declared that he would support Germany in

her demends. While we must admit that everything points to war we are still hopeful that Hitler will listen to reason and will withdraw his claims. The forces arrayed against him are too strong and if he can be brought to realize that, he may be willing to modify his demands so that they can be accepted.

A TERRIBLE PRICE

The Chinese have been defending their territory for a long time, have lost possibly a million men killed and many wounded. Nobody knows how many casualties there have been. These men remained at home and interfered with nobody until they found their country invaded. 


