THEIR FATE DISCOVERED

Wreckage of Boat of Alaska Couple Found Down Coast

The fate of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Russick, who sailed from Port Alexander, Alaska, in a small launch in November last has probably been discovered.

There was the remains of a pilot house, part of the hull, a Winchester 35 calibre rifle, a pair of men's gum boots and one ladies' gumbot.

Search was made ashore for any sign of the victims of the wreck but nothing could be found. There was nothing in the wreckage to show the name of the boat or the owner but it is a practical certainty that it is the boat which was on her way to Seattle and of which nothing had ever been heard since she left Alaska.

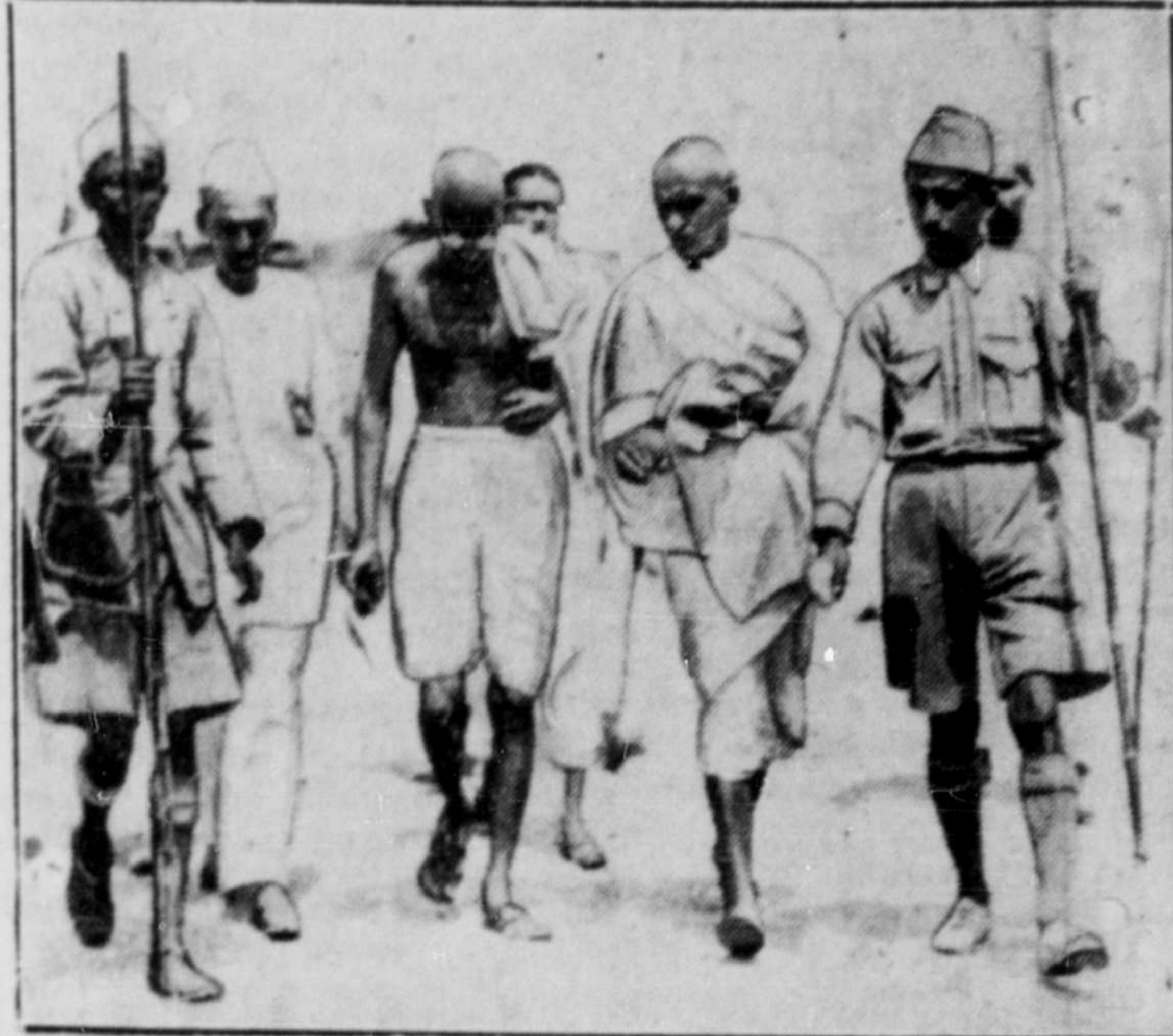

GOEBBELS' WARNING

BERLIN—Propaganda Minister Goebbels today warned outside nations against any effort to block German trade. "Germany must live and will live," he said. If the democratic nations wish to ease the tension in Europe, they will help Germany to trade, he declared.

GOERING IN ITALY

SAM REMO, Italy—Vice Chancellor Herman Goering of Germany and Frau Goering arrived today ostensibly for a holiday on the Italian Riviera. Diplomatic circles, however, believe there is more to it than that. It is thought Goering will go to Rome for discussions with Premier Mussolini in regard to the latter's territorial ambitions.

ARE ALL FARMERS

Migration of Sudetens Will Be Under Regular Restrictions

OTTAWA, March 6: (CP)—All the Sudeten Germans, who may come to Canada, are Socialists and have been on farms. They are accustomed to small and intensive farming. Their admission will be under the usual regulations applying to central Europeans. They will be required to have a minimum of \$1500 and be in good physical condition. They are being financed by the Czechoslovakian and British governments. They will be spread in various parts of the Dominion—some in the East, some on the prairies and some in British Columbia.

TERRACE IS MUCH DRIER

Marked Decline in Precipitation in Two Years is Recorded

TERRACE, March 6.—Weather in February brought one brief cold snap which lasted for a week and which sent the thermometer down to eight below. This was the lowest recorded temperature since February 1936.

Washington Legislature Has Already Approved Them

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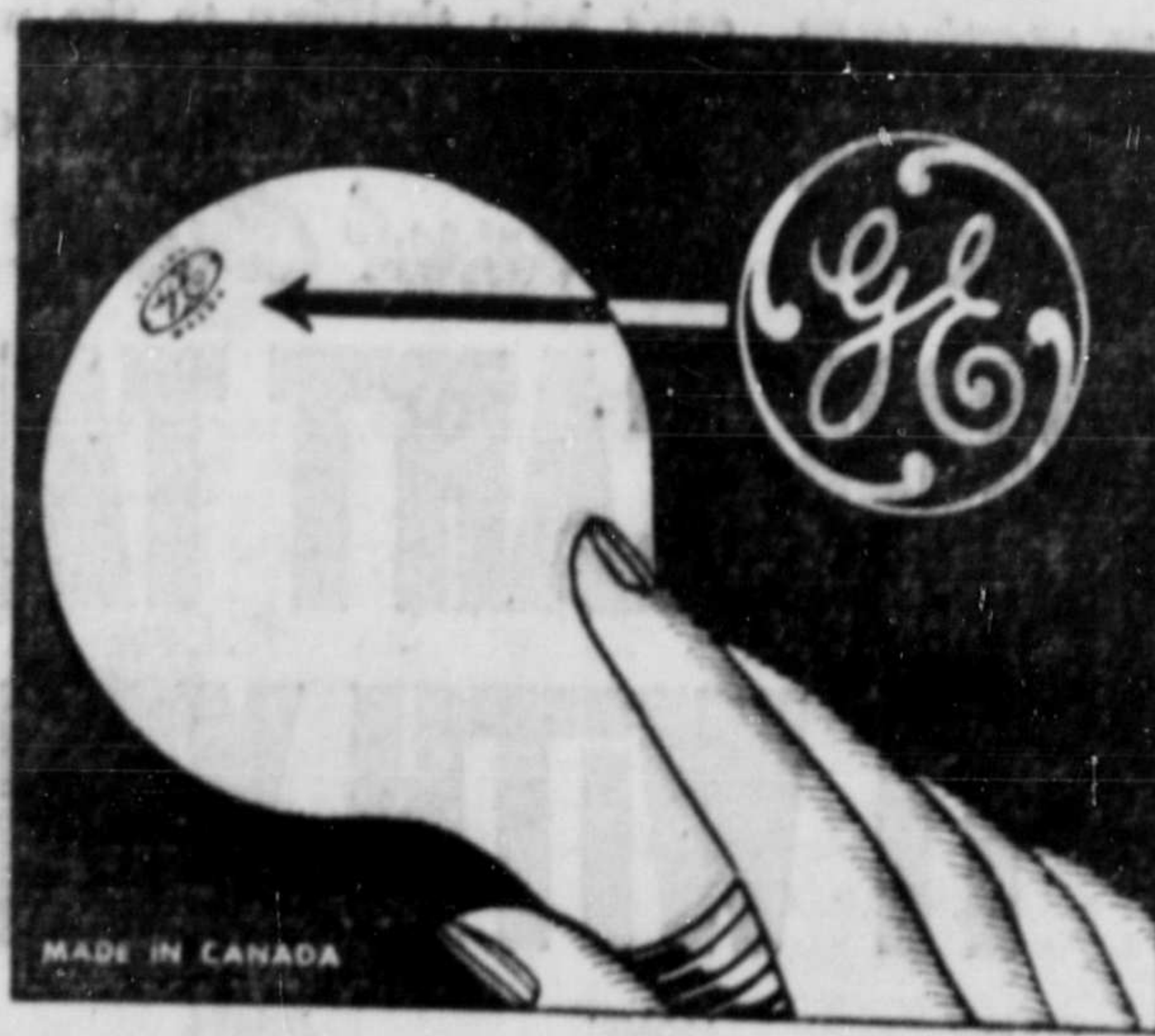

Timely Recipes

HALIBUT AND KIDNEY PIE

One pound halibut or one tin chicken haddle, salt and pepper, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 1/4 cupfuls water, 1 small onion, chopped, 1 beef kidney, baking powder biscuit dough.

Place the halibut on a rack, sprinkle with salt and pepper and cook over boiling water until tender, 6 to 10 minutes, depending on the thickness. Separate into flakes. Wash and split the kidney, remove the core and membrane and cut into sections. Cover with cold salt water and let stand for half

an hour. Drain and cook in the butter for 2 or 3 minutes. Add the flour and cook from 2 to 3 minutes longer, stirring frequently until nicely browned. Add the water, chopped onion and seasonings, cover and simmer for 15 minutes. Add the flaked halibut and turn the mixture into a deep baking dish. Roll baking powder biscuit dough to one-third inch thickness, cut with a medium cutter and place biscuits on top of the mixture in the baking dish. Bake in a hot oven (450 degrees F) until the biscuits are risen and nicely browned. Four to five servings. Smoked haddock may be used in place of halibut.
