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Submarine Mystery In Atlantic

No Trace Of British Ship Off Boston After Sending Signal That She Was Being Attacked

Incident Would Be Closest to This Side of Ocean Since Present War Began—No Word Since First S.O.S.

WASHINGTON, D.C., November 1: (CP)—The United States Coastguard announced today that the cutter... had reached the reported position of the British freighter Coulmore, which sent out an S.O.S. last night stating that she was being attacked by a submarine, but could find no sign of ship or survivors.

GT. BRITAIN ALL READY

Will Not Be Caught Unawares Should Hitler Essay One Big Aerial or Naval Blow

LONDON, Nov. 1: (CP)—Heavy warplane concentrations over the east coast indicate that the British are ready to meet any attack by planes or ships in the North Sea area, military observers say.

One tactical expert said: "You can be sure of one thing and that is that Great Britain will not be caught off guard if Hitler sends along his planes and submarines in a dash for one terrific North Sea battle."

NEGOTIATE WITH JAPS

Both British and United States Ambassadors at Tokyo are Having Conversations

TOKIO, Nov. 1.—Nichi Nichi newspaper says that negotiations will open this week between the Japanese government and Sir Robert Craigie, ambassador for Great Britain, looking to a settlement of the Tientsin issue and other questions in dispute between Japan and Great Britain. Trade negotiations between Japan and the United States are also expected to commence this week with Ambassador Joseph C. Grew representing the United States.

U.S. NOT SURPRISED

Molotov Was a Little More Vehement Than Might Have Been Expected Though

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—United States officials are surprised with the vehemence but not with the pro-German attitude displayed in the speech at Moscow last night of Premier-Foreign Commissar Molotov. Neither President Roosevelt nor Secretary of State Cordell Hull had any comment to make until they had studied the speech although the President observed that it had been made in the eve of the United States Congress dealing with important neutrality legislation.

Voluntary Research Committee Set Up

VANCOUVER, Nov. 1: (CP)—A voluntary research council representing forty-four organizations has been formed here to co-operate with the authorities in wartime price regulation.

War News

POCKET BATTLESHIPS

LONDON—Speaking in Parliament today, First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill admitted that two German pocket battleships—Deutschland and Admiral Scheer—were still at large on the high seas, one supposedly in the North Atlantic and the other in the South Atlantic.

BACON—BUTTER RATIONS

LONDON—Food Minister W. S. Morrison announced today that the government will ration consumption of bacon and butter beginning the middle of December. General rationing will not be started although distribution of ration books and other necessary prerequisites will be completed. Everyone will be entitled to four ounces of butter and four of bacon weekly. Reduced imports from Denmark are the immediate cause of decision to ration.

AERIAL ACTIVITY

LONDON—A German seaplane had an engagement with British planes over the North Sea yesterday but escaped and later unsuccessfully attacked a navy convoy. The Air Ministry reports that Royal Air Force planes flew over northwestern Germany and took photographs, all returning safely.

ANOTHER SINKING

LONDON—Sinking of the British freighter Bronte is disclosed. It was a submarine attack. The crew of forty and one passenger were rescued. Another British freighter eluded submarine attack today.

BELGIUM ANXIOUS

BRUSSELS—Some Anxiety was felt in Belgian official circles as a result of a foreign plane flying at a height of three miles over Namur yesterday. Anti-aircraft guns fired at it but it was too high to make a ready target. It was the first time since the war started that a foreign plane had flown so deep into Belgium.

SUBMARINE WASHED UP

PARIS—A German submarine is reported to have been washed ashore near Dunkirk on the French coast. No details were immediately available.

BERLIN PLACES BLAME

BERLIN—The Voerboeten Newspaper blames "Czech Jews and British war mongers" for starting the war.

MORE SHIPS SUNK

LONDON—Two more neutral ships—one Finnish, the other Norwegian—were sunk by German submarines yesterday in the North Sea. The crews were landed safely at an English port.

Langley Prairie Woman Succumbs

VANCOUVER, November 1: (CP)—Mrs. Harry Taylor of Langley Prairie died on Monday of injuries sustained in an automobile accident on Sunday when her four-year old daughter was killed.

ITALY NOW ANTI-NAZI

Mussolini's Cabinet Reorganization Shows Distinct Trend

PARIS, Nov. 1: (CP)—Reconstruction of the Italian cabinet, army and air command and Fascist party leadership, as announced yesterday by Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy, are interpreted here as a fresh sign of a growing rift between Italy and Germany. Havas News Agency said.

Pro-axis factors are given inferior posts in the shake-up which is distinctly marked by the looting off of pro-German heads. Military leaders who had conferred in Germany were removed and Nazi influence was distinctly lessened.

Premier Mussolini assumes even greater control over foreign affairs. Italian officialdom was disposed to call the new administration a "middle of the road" or "strictly neutral" group.

General Rodolfo Graziani is the new chief of military staff.

Recognize Conquest

LONDON, Nov. 1—Implying at last official British recognition of Italy's conquest of Albania, Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain yesterday announced that arrangements were being made to send a consul-general to Durazzo providing Italian permission can be obtained.

TO DRIVE OUT JEWS

Will Not Be Allowed to Remain in Vienna But Are To Go To "Reservation" in Poland

VIENNA, Nov. 1.—Nazi Germany is clearing all Jews out of Vienna. Four thousand have gone within the past two weeks and all must get out by March. They are being allowed to resettle on a "Jewish reservation" in Poland near the Russian partition with Lublin as the centre. They have to leave practically all their possessions, being permitted to take only 100 pounds of luggage and about \$125 of tools and machinery.

SURVIVORS IN NORWAY

Tell at Oslo of How Big Group of British Ships Was Set Upon by Nazi Submarines

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 1.—Sixty-one survivors from the Scottish ship Clan Chisholm, sunk by torpedo attack from a German submarine flotilla outside of Gibraltar October 14, have been landed at Oslo, Norway, according to reports reaching here. The survivors say that their ship and four others—two British and two French—were sunk almost simultaneously by the German submarines soon after being left by a naval convoy which took them out of the Mediterranean. At least forty-one members of the various crews are believed to have perished.

A Swedish ship picked up 151 survivors, landing ninety at Kirkwall in the Orkney Islands and bringing the sixty-one here. It is reported that there were nineteen other British and French ships in the same group.

RUSSIA IS FOR REICH

Soviet Determined To See That Germany Continues Strong Nation—Economic But Not Military Aid

HELSINGFORS, Finland, Nov. 1: (CP)—"A new situation has been created which may delay negotiations," declared an official Finnish communique last night in commenting on the speech of Premier-Foreign Commissar Molotov of Russia yesterday. The Finnish delegation, covering financial proposals to the Soviet over matters in dispute between the two countries, was on its way to Moscow when the speech was made. It halted at the frontier for instructions from the government and then proceeded.

Threatens Finland

Her Obduracy May Be Bad For Peace—Supreme Council Swallows Report Without Murmur

MOSCOW, November 1.—The Soviet Supreme Council, in extraordinary session yesterday, formally took over parts of Poland occupied recently by the Soviet forces simultaneously with the German invasion. This was the same meeting at which Foreign Commissar Molotov made an explanation of Soviet foreign policy.

Molotov pledged increased material aid to Nazi Germany, asserting the Soviet's determination to keep Germany a strong nation and see that she was not exterminated. He did not, however, pledge military aid to the Reich but gave assurance of all possible economic assistance. Russia, Molotov said, would strive for a cessation of the war. The Russian Premier-Foreign Commissar, saying that he had been unable to understand why Finland had declined to enter into a mutual assistance pact with Russia, disclosed that Finland on the grounds that they would involve a breach of her neutrality, had rejected extremely moderate and minimum demands which had been made upon her by the Soviet. If Finland continued to refuse moderate Russian demands, it might be bad for the cause of peace was Molotov's veiled threat on that question. Finland's refusal to lease a strip of land on the frontier for military purposes and islands in the Gulf of Finland for Russian air and naval bases was mentioned. Demobilization of the Finnish frontier was asked and Russia had offered to give Finland other land in return for the concessions.

Molotov criticized President Roosevelt of the United States for "meddling" by interfering in the Finnish issue. Such constituted a violation of United States neutrality. He suggested that the Philippine situation was no credit to the United States which had not given independence to the Philippines whereas Russia had recognized Finland's independence as far back as 1917 and the present demands would not contravene its sovereignty.

The Soviet Commissar also criticized the United States for its action in repealing the embargo clause and revision of the neutrality act. This would provide more profits for the munitions makers and would have the effect of prolonging the war.

Turning to the Turkish situation, Molotov said that Russia had wanted a mutual assistance pact only in respect to the Black Sea but Turkey, instead, had chosen to enter into a pact with Great Britain and France.

'FINAL VICTORY MAY BE SHAPED ON CANADA SOIL'

SAYS PRIME MINISTER

Premier King Speaks to Country on Subject of War Aims—Organization is Well in Hand

OTTAWA, November 1.—"Final victory may be shaped on Canadian soil," said Prime Minister Lyon Mackenzie King Tuesday night in a radio address to the people of Canada on "Canadian War Aims." The Premier was referring to the making of Canada as the aviation training centre for the Empire. This large scale advance aerial training would involve many millions of dollars and thousands of young men.

The Premier told how the three branches of Canadian service army, navy and air force—had been rapidly placed on an effective war basis and how the agricultural and industrial resources were being organized for the Great War effort. Partisanship, personal influence and political patronage would not be permitted to bring about personal advancement or profit under war conditions and there would not be the least hesitation in taking criminal proceedings in cases of hoarding or profiteering.

Mr. King expressed gratification at the result of the Quebec provincial election which he described as "one of the greatest contributions since confederation to Canadian unity" and "a complete endorsement of war policies of the Dominion government."

WHEAT ON WAY HERE

Local Elevator To Receive Million Bushels Starting November 10, It Is Announced

Wheat will start rolling into Prince Rupert about November 10, according to word received at the local elevator today by R. Hetherington of Fort William, general manager of Canadian government elevators. About one million bushels, some 400 carloads, will be brought here, keeping the railway busy for a couple of months at least during the winter.

The elevator, which has not had any grain in it since it was emptied in the spring of 1938, is now being put in shape to receive the crop.

PRESIDENT IS HOPEFUL

Thinks There is Good Chance of City of Flint Being Restored to United States

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—President Roosevelt still expresses confidence that the United States will be able to recover the steamer City of Flint which today is running the British Blockade while on her way from Murmansk to a German port with a German prize crew in charge and the American crew still on board. The vessel is given an even chance of getting safely past the blockade.

Lieut. William Elkins R.C.N. returned to the city yesterday from Esquimalt in connection with his naval duties, being here in connection with the establishment of an examination centre for ships here.

PROVINCE FINANCES REVEALED

Expenditures Exceeded Revenues In British Columbia Last Year, Public Accounts Show

VICTORIA, November 1: (CP)—Public accounts tabled in the Legislature today shortly after the opening of the session showed the provincial treasury had collected revenues of \$32,639,825 during the fiscal year ending March 31, the surplus on current account being nearly \$4,000,000, not taking into account special debt redemption and unemployment relief costs.

The accounts showed that the government had spent \$28,664,445 in the 1938-39 fiscal year on current accounts and the usual debt allotments, \$2,974,379 on special debt redemptions and \$4,519,061 on unemployment relief, a total of \$36,157,885.

The expenditure figure does not include capital works. To meet the bills, Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, used revenue of \$32,639,825, borrowed \$2,966,100 in the open market, picked up \$5,400 from a previously unspent loan and borrowed \$546,551 from the federal government.

The minister of finance revealed that income tax collections for the past year at approximately \$10,000,000 were \$3,000,000 more than the previous year.

SURVEY OF BIG SHIP

Underwriters Representatives Will Decide What to do With Mary D.

Arrival tomorrow morning by the Princess Norah of underwriters' representatives from San Francisco is being awaited before disposition is made of the big American freighter Mary D. which is moored at the lumber dock after having been damaged by running ashore Monday night in Grenville Channel south of here.

Inspection by Diver Ray Montgomery here yesterday revealed that the vessel was damaged near the stern. She is leaking. A further survey will be made by the San Francisco underwriters' representatives to determine whether the vessel may proceed or be dry docked here.

The Mary D., belonging to Pacific American Fisheries and under charter to Alaska Steamship Co., was bound from Seattle to Easter Island, Alaska, when the stranding occurred.

C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. H. E. Nedden, is late today in arriving from Vancouver via Powell River and Ocean Falls and will not be in until 3 o'clock this afternoon. Later in the afternoon, after discharging local cargo, the vessel will proceed to Ketchikan and Stewart whence she is due back here tomorrow evening southbound.

## WEATHER IS STILL POOR

Official Figures Make Dismal Picture Here, October Adding To General Dreariness

The rainiest and, except for January, the darkest month Prince Rupert has had so far this year, October added its part towards making the year 1939 one of the most dismal from a weather standpoint this city has ever experienced.

The precipitation here in October, according to the official figures of the Dominion meteorologist, S. J. Mellor of Doby Island, was 14.88 inches, bringing the total precipitation for the year to date up to 88.57 inches as compared with 74.58 inches in the entire year 1938.

During this October sunshine amounted to only 35.3 hours which was little brighter than mid-winter January with its 28.3 hours. Sunshine so far this year aggregates 773.7 hours, a far cry from the 963.3 hours recorded in the first ten months of last year.

To add to the general discomfort of the month just ended, October also had the first frost of the fall which came rather early when 29 above was recorded on October 25. The detailed weather summary for October was as follows:

- Maximum temperature, 60 on October 31.
- Minimum temperature, 29 on October 25.
- Mean temperature, 44.5.

Drain on a crumpled paper towel or absorbent paper and serve piping hot, garnished with lemon wedges and parsley.

## FOREIGN EXCHANGE CONTROL BOARD NOTICE

All persons exporting property from Canada, or importing property into Canada, or receiving any foreign currency in Canada or abroad, or dealing in any way with foreign securities or other foreign assets should take notice that activities of this character are subject to the provisions of the Foreign Exchange Control Order. This Order was passed under the authority of the War Measures Act, and it is incumbent upon all concerned to become familiar with the Order and the Regulations of the Board. Penalties have been established for infractions of the Order or Regulations. Under the Order any resident who had in his possession, ownership or control on September 15th, 1939, any foreign exchange valued at more than \$1,000 or any foreign securities valued at more than \$1,000 is required to declare them to the Board. Notice is hereby given that any resident who has not filed such declaration with the Board by November 15th, 1939, will be considered to be in default under the provisions of the Order.

Notice is also given that the Board has provided a special form of permit for exporters who are being allowed to make exports for payment in Canadian dollars. Temporary arrangements previously made in this regard will be terminated on November 30th, and any exporter who has not then obtained a special "Control Permit-Canadian Payment" from the Board will not be able to make any further exports otherwise than for payment in foreign exchange. Any exporter who wishes to make applications for payment in Canadian dollars and who has not yet made application in this connection to the Board should do so immediately, giving full particulars of the nature of the transactions.

For the information of the public, the Foreign Exchange Control Order and Regulations 1 to 34 of the Board are contained in special issues of the Canada Gazette dated September 15th, 17th, 23rd and 25th and October 23rd. Copies may be obtained from the King's Printer, Ottawa.

Further information may be obtained from the Board, from Collectors of Customs and Excise and from Canadian banks.
