Dictators Are Becoming Milder

SCHOOL AS USUAL FOR ROYAL GIRLS STAYING AT HOME IN ENGLAND

Princesses Likely to be in Close Touch With King and Queen Visiting Canada in May and June

LONDON, April 13: (CP)—Princess Elizabeth and Margaret Rose will continue their usual round of lessons, and visiting while their parents are in Canada and the United States this summer. The two little girls will learn a lot about the Dominion over the Atlantic and learn probably from letters, some of which may go down in history. They will be waiting for messages every day as the blue speed across Canada with their royal parents.

It is recalled that when the King and Queen went to Australia as Duke and Duchess of York in 1927 they returned with two canaries, two parrots and three tons of toys, and presentations of loyal admiration from the Antipodes. Princess Elizabeth was then 18 months old.

School As Usual
 Routine in the Buckingham Palace school room will not be altered for the princesses during the absence of the King and Queen. There will be tea parties, visits to picture galleries, Girl Guide activities in the week and a trip to Windsor every week-end will follow their regular course under the direction of the princesses' governess, Mrs. Crawford.

Princess Elizabeth just now is specializing in the study of languages, particularly French, and is being thoroughly grounded in history. The princesses' day is carefully timed. They breakfast at 9 a.m. on English breakfast of cereal, toast and marmalade. They do their letters or play before lessons start. At noon they are free to amuse themselves until lunch time, 1:30 p.m. After lunch they sometimes go to art galleries or exhibitions. These visits formerly were supervised by Queen Mary. In those days they went to Marlborough House for tea afterwards and sat in specially-built low chairs which Queen Mary ordered made for them.

On Wednesdays the princesses visit the Bath Club for swimming lessons. On another afternoon during the week their friends visit Buckingham Palace for dancing lessons conducted by the famous Madame Vacanin. Then there are the Girl Guide meetings of the First Buckingham Palace Company.

Bids to Parties
 The princesses write their own invitations to lunches and teas they are allowed to give. Princess Elizabeth is allowed also to consult the chef and choose her own menus, order cakes and her favorite sandwiches fillings from the royal kitchen. Meals for the two royal children are not extravagant, although they have their own two footmen to wait on them. They prefer consommé to any other soup, like macaroni and tomato, grilled chops, boiled mushrooms and caper sauce, stewed rabbit, calves' liver and bacon. Their favorite deserts are steamed puddings.

They have about a dozen close friends whom they often ask to lunch or tea. Among them are: Diana Piers Leigh, daughter of Lieut. Col Piers Leigh who will visit Canada with the King and Queen; Patricia Mountbatten, daughter of Lord and Lady Mountbatten, two of their Majesties' closest friends; Lady Mary Cambridge; Lady Joanna and Lady Elizabeth Lambert, small daughters of the Duke of Devonshire; Miss Biddy Verney, niece of Sir Godfrey Thomas, aide-camp to the Duke of Gloucester; the small daughter of Alan Lascell-

STAYING IN SPAIN
 MADRID—Italian troops will remain in Spain until General Francisco Franco stages a "Victory March" on May 2, it is believed.

 TEULON—French and British warships, forty in number, are said to have formed a chain across the Mediterranean Sea from Teulon to Tunisia.

 COMOX—Nine graduate nurses of the staff of St. Joseph's Hospital here remained away from their jobs today in a labor dispute with hospital authorities, leaving only three nurses, two orderlies and sisters to care for fifty patients. The nurses who left the hospital are from Vancouver.

WILL FOIL ESPIONAGE
 OTTAWA—Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, yesterday introduced in Parliament a bill providing for the protection of military secrets of Canada. It embodies the main features of the British Official Secrets Act. The bill makes it an offence for persons to be found in prohibited places if it is not in harmony with the safety of the state, to be in possession or to divulge official information without authority, to harbor spies or withhold information in regard to espionage.

EXPORT OF ARMS
 WASHINGTON, D.C.—During the first quarter of this year the export of \$25,000,000 of war materials was authorized by the United States, it was revealed yesterday. Of this \$13,000,000 went to Great Britain, mostly in airplanes, and \$11,000 to France.

CHINESE VICTORIES
 SHANGHAI—Decisive victories by Chinese guerrillas in a wide-spread area resumed offensive in Kiangsi Province and elsewhere are claimed. The Japanese lines are reported to have been broken at many points. An air raid on Japan proper is said to have been planned but the Japanese destroyed the base from which it was to be made. In London a \$14,000,000 loan has been earmarked for Nationalist China, this being part of \$47,000,000 authorized for various nations.

BYLAW IS RATIFIED

Formation of Town Planning Commission in Prince Rupert Approved At Victoria

VICTORIA, April 13: (CP)—Creation of a Prince Rupert Town planning Commission is authorized in a government order-in-council approving the northern city's Town Planning bylaw. It provides for representation of six aldermen, the mayor, chairman of the Parks Board and chairman of the Board of School Trustees. As these functions are all handled by City Commissioner W. J. Alder, the municipal department explained that he would make appointments to the commission.

Activity In Housing Act

Unsettled International Conditions Having Adverse Effect, Says Minister of Finance

OTTAWA, April 13: (CP)—Hon. Charles A. Dunning, minister of finance, told the House of Commons yesterday of the activity of Canadians in availing themselves of the home building assistance offered by the Dominion Housing Act. Disturbed international conditions were, of course, having an adverse effect, the minister admitted. British Columbia was particularly active, Mr. Dunning said.

SUMMER TRAINS

Four in Each Direction Are Provided Between Prince Rupert and Jasper This Year

Official announcement is made of the summer train service on the line of the Canadian National Railway between Prince Rupert and Jasper. There will be four trains a week in either direction. Mixed trains will leave here Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 6 p.m. and a full passenger train Friday at 11 a.m. Mixed trains will arrive from the East Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday nights at 11 o'clock and a full passenger train will come in at 2:30 Saturday afternoons. The service becomes effective June 30.

Stiffer Policy Of Britain And France Appears To Be Resulting In Atmosphere More Like Peace

Full Support to Roumania and Greece in Event of Aggression is Pledged by Chamberlain and Daladier—Reactions Registered

LONDON, April 13: (CP)—With the dictators appearing to be moderating in their aggressive attitude as the democracies, under leadership of Great Britain and France, continue definite steps to check them, the European atmosphere appears to be clearing with war clouds passing over for the time being at least. Most important developments in the situation today were co-incident declarations of policy by Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain of Great Britain and Premier Edouard Daladier of France pledging full support to the two nations, Greece and Roumania, in the event of armed aggression against them.

Prime Minister Chamberlain made his announcement in a new statement of foreign policy before an emergent one-day session of Parliament today. Great Britain and France will place all their resources behind Greece and Roumania if independence of either is threatened. Mr. Chamberlain stated. This pledge of military support follows similar guarantees given recently to Poland and is another step in the united front against European aggression.

Daladier, in making his similar statement in Paris, announced that his country had reinforced its defenses "to guarantee the frontiers of France and its Empire against any surprise." Chamberlain condemned the Italian invasion of Albania but announced that the British would not denounce the Anglo-Italian treaty as having been violated by Italy.

The Statement

Great Britain's latest commitment in Europe was outlined by Chamberlain thus: "I, therefore, take this opportunity of saying that the government attaches the greatest importance to disturbances by force or fears of force in regard to the status quo in the Mediterranean and the Balkan Peninsula. Consequently, we have come to the conclusion that, in the event of action being taken clearly threatening the independence of Greece or Roumania and which the Greek or Roumanian governments consider it vital to resist with their forces, His Majesty's government will feel itself bound at once to lend the Greek or Roumanian government all the support in its power. We are communicating this declaration to the governments directly concerned and to others, especially Turkey, whose close relations with the Greek government are well known. We understand that the French government is making a similar declaration."

The Dominions have been informed of all phases of the situation. When Labor and Liberal members demanded references to Russia, Mr. Chamberlain said the omission did not mean that the Soviets were not being kept informed. Britain's difficulty was that the government must deal not only "with what we wish but with what others will do."

There are reported to have been exchanges between Great Britain and Italy giving assurances from some quarters it is believed Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy that, now he had obtained control of the Adriatic, he was satisfied and had no intention of interfering with Greece or Jugoslavia. More resolution in British foreign policy was advocated last night by Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, former Chancellor of the Exchequer, in addressing his constituents. The new foreign policy of Great Britain was one he could support, Churchill said, but he thought that it might be so fearfully and timidly applied that it might not succeed.

Rt. Hon. David Lloyd-George, Great Britain's war premier, declared yesterday that Russian cooperation was necessary if Great Britain and France were to succeed in combatting the advance of the European dictatorships. In Paris Premier Daladier announced that France was ready militarily for emergencies and with Great Britain, had promised aid in case of need to Greece and Roumania as well as Poland. It was accepted that Daladier's statement was designed to tell Germany and Italy that any act of aggression would bring a serious risk of war and bolster up the determination of those countries which felt themselves menaced and were inclined to resist. Fascists in Rome regarded the Chamberlain announcement as "unnecessary and gratuitous" because, they said, independence of neither power had been threatened. Indications were given in official circles in Berlin that Nazi leaders were not prepared for the inclusion of Roumania as well as Greece in the Anglo-French protection pledges. Chamberlain's reference to Turkey also caused surprise. Berlin newspapers lashed out at President Roosevelt for his latest utterance yesterday in connection with the international situation in which he definitely placed himself on the side of the democracies against the dictatorships. They accused the President of trying to start a war for personal reasons and for private gain.

Albania Grovels
 Yesterday Albania offered the crown of King Zog, now in exile, to King Victor Emmanuel. Acceptance by the Fascist Grand Council today was a mere formality. The legislature of Albania, now completely under Italian domination and with Foreign Minister Ciano directing it personally at Tirana, yesterday abrogated the constitution of the country and declared Albania incapable of governing itself. It now becomes but a puppet state although described as a separate kingdom within the Italian Empire. Despite Mussolini's assurances that he intends no further aggression, there is still the question of what he means by continuing active mobilization of forces and calling out of more troops. In some quarters it is believed he may still be contemplating territorial demands against France. With 300,000 Hungarian troops reported to be menacing her on the northern frontier and 100,000 Bulgarians along the south, Rou-

United States Navy is Having Trouble, Committee at Washington Hears

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 13: (CP)—The naval affairs committee was told yesterday of difficulty the United States Navy was experiencing through the activity of agitators who were endeavouring to disturb the morale of the men. Complaint was made of lack of authority to deal with this situation.

King and Queen Are Coming Sure

Reports That Their Visit to Canada and United States May Be Cancelled are Spiked

LONDON, April 13: (CP)—Reports that the trip of the King and Queen to Canada and the United States next month may be cancelled are officially branded as unfounded speculation. There has been no change in the plans for the visit, it is learned on the highest authority. It is also denied that Their Majesties will sail on a liner in order that H.M.S. Repulse may be available at home in event of war emergency.

Home Town Fans Looking For Win By Leafs Tonight

TORONTO, April 13: (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs should be able to take the Boston Bruins tonight on the home ice and even up the Stanley Cup final series count at two games all. At least that is what the home town fans think and it will not be for lack of their support if Connie Smythe's crew falls and lets the Bruins get away with a stranglehold on the title.

The breaks were against the Maple Leafs on Tuesday night when they lost the third game, it is claimed. It was just a case of catching the opposition napping when Bobby Bauer, in the second minute of the third period, started the Bruins on the victory trail after both sides, up to that time, had been scoreless. Seven minutes later Rookie Roy Conacher added the second and Johnny Crawford completed the Bruins' scoring with seven minutes to play. Gus Marker sniped the lone Toronto tally in the final minute.

Germany and Poland
 Reports from Warsaw say that Germany has expressed a willingness to bargain for rights in respect to the Polish corridor without, however, endangering independence of Poland. This is believed to be the German answer to the alliance of Poland with Great Britain and France.

MOSLEM OPINION

Evidently the invasion of Albania by Italy is proving somewhat of a boomerang to the Italians. The country is largely Moslem and the Moslems in Asia take great exception to the killing of people of their own faith in Albania and the deprivation of their liberty by the invaders. Anti-Italian demonstrations have taken place and the Mohammedan newspapers have been attacking that country. Prior to the move against Albania, Italy had been posing as protector of the Moslem world.

THE AIR BASE

Southern newspapers have all been carrying more or less full reports of an interview with Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of national defence, in which he told about the defences of the coast. The part of the speech that dealt with Prince Rupert told of the spending of \$375,000 at the mouth of the Prince Rupert harbor and confirmed the previous understanding that the work on the seaplane base at Seal Cove would commence in June.

The spending of over half a million dollars in the neighborhood of Prince Rupert together with a follow-up next year is bound to make business lively. Already a good many new faces are noticed in the city and more will be seen as the work here advances. The expenditure at Seal Cove is mostly for preparing the site and putting in the cement work. The erection of buildings will be part of the complete scheme but it is not yet announced whether any building will be erected this year.

CAN THEY BE TRUSTED?

There are still people who think the dictators of Europe may be trusted when they say they will respect the rights of other countries. They may be right and we hope they are but the mass of opinion here is that they can be trusted only so far as their interests are served. As long as the opposition to their advances is strong enough they will refrain from attacking. Evidently President Roosevelt is among those who believe nothing but a mailed fist is effective in restraining them.

MEETING OF INTEREST

KITSEGUOKA, April 13:— On Saturday night a very interesting council meeting was held in the Community Hall here, attended by nearly all the villagers. It was a unique meeting, something new in Indian life.

On the platform was the Chief, Councillor in the chair. On either side of him sat the newly elected councillors. The background was decorated by a large Union Jack flag in the centre of which was fixed the tribal emblem, the lion.

In his opening remarks the Chief said: "We recognize our emblem and we place its authority within the greater emblem, the Union Jack, under whose power we have come. Our laws are sacred possessions but we acknowledge and pledge our loyalty to the Dominion of Canada represented by the British flag."

The chief councillor called upon the various members of the council to support him during the year in preserving order and working for better conditions on the reserve.

The secretary then read the roll and also announced the duties assigned to each individual councillor. To the chief councillor, Moses Jones, was assigned the duties of police commissioner, being held responsible, in co-operation with the Indian Agent Capt. Mortimer, for the enforcement of all laws.

He is also chief magistrate and police commissioner.

Then was read the name of Sam Wesley and to him was assigned the duties of health officer—a committee of one to look after health to co-operate with Dr. Austin and the hospital in preserving health conditions.

Peter Mark heads the roads committee, being expected to keep roads in good order and prevent unnecessary accidents.

Alfred McDames is head of the fire and lights committee, his duty being to watch against fire and light hazards in homes and on the streets.

Capt. J. H. Johnson, was made the council's treasurer. There is to be some self-imposed taxation during the coming year. Herbert Russell, the secretary, heads the taxation committee.

The meeting was conducted in an orderly and business-like way.

During the meeting, the two local police constables, E. Wesley and Wilfred Weget, chosen and appointed by the new council in the interval since their election, were presented and the people were informed of the council's choice. The people were asked to support loyally these two officers.

Speeches were delivered by each councillor in turn. Also the two local chiefs were called upon. Chief Weget spoke briefly and Chief Malkin, being a lady, took just a little more time.

A very successful evening was brought to a close with serving refreshments provided by the wives of the new councillors.
